PBA Tour Begins Points Race to PBA Playoffs in Season Opener

PBA Hall of Fame Classic kicks off 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 3, 2019) – As the Professional Bowlers Association kicked off its 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season Thursday with the first round of qualifying in the PBA Hall of Fame Classic at the International Research and Training Center, the race to qualify for the new PBA Playoffs that will be held in April in Portland, Maine, officially begins.

During the 2019 season, competition points will be awarded to all players in all PBA Tour events that are open to all players, with point values varying according to a three-tier system under a new system being introduced this season. Under the tier system, Tier 1 tournaments are major championships, Tier 2 events are standard PBA Tour events, and Tier 3 are limited field or abbreviated format events.

Here's how the points system will work: Tier 3 tournaments establish the "base points" values starting with 2,500 for first place, 1,500 for second, 1,150 for third, 950 for fourth, 850 for fifth, etc. Points decline based upon how a player finishes in the event, but all players in the tournament will earn points. For Tier 2 events, the points values are doubled. For Tier 1 championship events, points will be worth three times the base value (i.e., 7,500 for first place, 4,500 for second, etc.) For a complete summary of the PBA's competition points structure and tier values per tournament, visit: https://www.pba.com/SeasonStats/PointsList/114?list=1.

The PBA Hall of Fame Classic, which launches the PBA Tour's historic season of television coverage by FOX Sports on its FOX and FS1 channels, will be the first event to offer points. The HOF Classic, which airs live on FS1 Sunday at 11 a.m. EST, is designated as a Tier 3 event because it includes a limited field (70 players) and an abbreviated format (six qualifying games for all players Thursday and Friday plus another six qualifying games for the top 18 on Saturday to determine Sunday's top five stepladder finalists). All qualifying rounds will be live-streamed by PBA's online streaming partner, FloBowling.

The FOX Sports portion of the 2019 schedule, concluding with the USBC Masters, will be the basis for qualifying for the PBA Playoffs. Of the 24 qualifiers, the top eight players will earn first round byes for the single-elimination match play playoffs which will reward the winner with a \$100,000 prize.

Competition points also will be important for other reasons:

• Points earned during the summer tour's USBC Cup series will qualify players for the end-of-season PBA China Tiger Cup;

• Points earned in 2019 will qualify players for invitations to the 2020 DHC PBA Japan Invitational;

• The 2019 competition points champion will win the Harry Smith Competition Points award;

• 2019 points will be considered in selecting the 2019 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year and Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year.

• Composite points from 2018 and 2019 will determine the field for the 2019 PBA Tour Finals.

The Hall of Fame Classic field of 70 was filled during a six-game Pro Tour Qualifier at the IRTC on Tuesday. Players who advanced into the tournament proper are Canada's Mitch Hupé with 1,493 pins, rookie Greg Young of Viera, Fla., 1,360; Brian Robinson, Morgantown, W.Va., 1,352; Justin Wyman, Fairport, N.Y., 1,336, and Nate Garcia, Port St. Lucie, Fla., 1,283.

Jakob Butturff Holds Early First Round Lead in PBA Hall of Fame Classic

First live FS1 telecast of 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season set for Sunday

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 3, 2019) – Jakob Butturff, a 24-year-old left-hander from Tempe, Ariz., averaged 258.5 for six games Thursday to take the early first round lead in the Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame Classic, the first tournament of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

Butturff, who is trying for his fifth career PBA Tour title, rolled games of 244, 279, 266, 226, 269 and 267 to cruise to a 141-pin lead over EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., after half of the 70-player field had completed its first round. The second half of the field bowls its six-game round at 5 p.m. EST.

Squad B bowls its second six-game qualifying round Friday at 10 a.m.; Squad A will complete its qualifying at 5 p.m. The top 18 bowlers then will bowl a third six-game qualifying round Saturday at 10 a.m., after which the top five players will advance to Sunday's 11 a.m. FS1 stepladder finals. All preliminary qualifying rounds are being live-streamed on FloBowling.com.

Jakob Butturff Averages to 258 to Lead PBA Hall of Fame Classic First-Round Qualifying

First live FS1 telecast of 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season set for Sunday at 11 a.m. EST

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 3, 2019) – Jakob Butturff, a 24-year-old left-hander from Tempe, Ariz., averaged 258.5 for six games Thursday to take the first-round lead in the Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame Classic, the first tournament of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

Butturff, who is trying for his fifth career PBA Tour title, rolled games of 244, 279, 266, 226, 269 and 267 for a 1,551 pinfall total in cruising to a 135-pin lead over Australian two-handed star Jason Belmonte, who finished the opening six-game qualifying round with a 1,416 total. EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., was third with 1,410 pins followed by Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., with a 1,383 total and Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Mich., with 1,360 pins.

"I had a really good year in 2018 and what I want to do is prove to everyone that I can keep it going," Butturff said. "I found the lane conditions today very much like the PBA 60th Anniversary Classic last year, which I won. If I'm on a lane condition where I see early hook, that fits my game perfectly. That's what I saw today, and I just kept it going."

Squad B returns to bowl its second six-game qualifying round Friday at 10 a.m.; Squad A will complete its qualifying at 5 p.m. The top 18 bowlers after 12 games will bowl a third six-game round Saturday at 10 a.m. to determine the top five players for Sunday's live FS1 stepladder finals on FS1 at 11 a.m. EST.

Red-Hot Jakob Butturff Dominates PBA Hall of Fame Classic Qualifying

Top 18 players advance to final qualifying round; live FS1 finals set for Sunday at 11 a.m. EST

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 4, 2019) – Jakob Butturff, the unorthodox 24-year-old left-hander from Tempe, Ariz., continued his torrid scoring pace, threatening the Professional Bowlers Association's 12-game scoring record as he dominated qualifying in the PBA Hall of Fame Classic Friday at the International Training and Research Center.

The Hall of Fame Classic is the opening event of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

After averaging 258 for his first six qualifying games Thursday, Butturff he nearly duplicated that performance Friday, starting the second round with games of 238, 259, 255, 263 and 268. Needing to finish with a 249 game to break the PBA 12-game record of 3,083 pins set by PBA Hall of Famer Mike Aulby in Baltimore, Md., in 1996, Butturff closed with a 197 (his only sub-200 game of the tournament) for a 3,031 pinfall total and a 175-pin lead over four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia who had 2,856 pins.

"I came up short of the record, but a record's a record, and winning a title is just as important. When I bowl, I always put my foot down," Butturff said. "I may lead by 300 pins, but I'm never going to let my opponent think it's a gimme. I have a pretty comfortable lead, but I'm still going to give it the best I've got. I know the other guys are capable of putting up big numbers."

Rounding out the top five were Jason Sterner, Fayetteville, Ga., and Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa., who were tied for third with 2,756 pins, and Rhino Page, Orlando, with a 2,749 total.

The top 18 bowlers after 12 games will bowl a third six-game round Saturday morning to determine the top five players for Sunday's live FS1 stepladder finals on FS1 at 11 a.m. EST.

Jakob Butturff Hangs on to Top Berth for PBA Hall of Fame Classic Finals

First Go Bowling! PBA Tour title of 2019 season to be decided live on FS1 Sunday at 11 a.m. EST

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 5, 2019) – Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., held off a hard-charging Jason Belmonte of Australia to earn the top berth for Sunday's Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame Classic finals at the International Training and Research Center.

The finals will air live on FOX Sports' FS1 channel at 11 a.m. EST. The Hall of Fame Classic will be the first title decided in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

Butturff, a 24-year-old left-hander who is trying for his fifth PBA Tour title, led the tournament through all three qualifying rounds, finishing with an 18-game total of 4,284 pins, 11 ahead of Belmonte. After scoring at a 252 clip for the first 12 games, Butturff slowed down Saturday, rolling games of 268, 214, 215, 138, 215 and 203 while Belmonte steadily closed in. A split in the 10th frame, which he converted, prevent Belmonte from overtaking the young left-hander.

"It was a bit of a struggle today. There were fewer bowlers and a different crossing pattern, so things were different, "Butturff said. "But I was able to hold on to the lead and tomorrow's a different day."

Belmonte, who finished with 4,273 pins, wasn't dismayed. The Australian two-hander and four-time PBA Player of the Year had games of 185, 260, 247, 228, 253 and 244 to close the gap.

"I got off to a slow start, but I bowled well after that," the 18-time titlist said. "I have no goals this year; I'm just going to try to be the best bowler I can every week. I want to be bowler of the year again, but if I start to focus on things like that, I get in my own way. If I bowl my best, good things will happen." Rounding out the top five are Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., who finished with 4,111 pins; Swedish twohander Jesper Svensson with a 4,091 total and veteran left-hander Rhino Page of Orlando with 4,076 pins.

The GoBowling! PBA Tour's next events will be the PBA Oklahoma Open and Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship at FireLake Bowling Center in Shawnee, Okla. Qualifying, which will run concurrently for both events, begins Tuesday. FloBowling will live-stream all qualifying rounds. PBA Hall of Fame Welcomes Four New Members

International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame hosts first induction ceremonies

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 5, 2019) – There was no more appropriate place to welcome the Professional Bowlers Association's four newest Hall of Fame members than the International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame itself, and that's exactly what happened Saturday when Finland's Mika Koivuniemi; Patrick Allen of South Salem, N.Y.; Jim Doty of Indianapolis, and Bob Johnson of Las Vegas joined the PBA's elite.

The first induction ceremonies ever held within the IBM/HF itself were part of the PBA Hall of Fame Classic weekend which concludes Sunday with the PBA's first live stepladder finals telecast on FOX Sport's FS1 channel at 11 a.m. EST. The HOF Classic is the first tournament of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

But Saturday night was for coats and ties, and cocktail dresses, as two decorated PBA Tour champions, a long-time PBA tournament host and an award-winning bowling journalist were honored for their highly successful careers contributions to professional bowling. It was a ceremony filled with good humor, serious appreciation and moments of emotion.

MIKA KOIVUNIEMI

Koivuniemi, who now resides in the United Arab Emirates where he is coaching the UAE national bowling team, is a 14-time PBA Tour champion who earned his nickname – Major Mika – after winning two majors before he won his first "standard" PBA Tour title. In his first PBA television appearance, he defeated PBA star Pete Weber by a single pin to win the 2000 USBC Masters. A year later he won the U.S. Open, and he claimed the crown jewel of his PBA career in 2011, when he won the \$250,000 first prize in the \$1 million PBA Tournament of Champions.

"I have sat in these ceremonies many times and don't remember what anyone said," Koivuniemi began, "so I thought, how can I do something people will remember? Maybe give my speech in Finnish. Or maybe with my accent, they won't remember anyway.

"I've very proud to be the first European elected to the PBA Hall of Fame," he continued on a more serious note. "In 1995, I decided to come to the U.S. to see how good I was."

He related how after one early failure, PBA member Mike Miller offered him some advice that stuck.

"Mike Miller said to me, you have to get better or you'll go back home in a year," Koivuniemi said. "I decided to work harder."

PATRICK ALLEN

Allen, a 13-time PBA Tour title winner, won PBA's 2004-05 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year after becoming the second player in PBA history to finish among the top five in all four PBA majors during the same season – finishing second in the USBC Masters and U.S. Open, fifth in the PBA Tournament of Champions and winning the PBA World Championship.

"To make it into the hall of fame on the first ballot was a thrill," Allen said. "Seventeen years later, it was like it all happened in a flash. But here we are. The day comes when you have to say when. It's painful, but it's great to be back among my friends tonight." Allen also had special words for his presenter, fellow PBA Hall of Famer Doug Kent.

"Doug was responsible for two careers: his own and mine," Allen said. "He told me I had to learn the technical side of the sport, and then he taught me."

JIM DOTY

Doty is general manager of Royal Pin Leisure centers, the Indianapolis chain that includes long-time PBA host Woodland Bowl. Under his leadership, Woodland Bowl has hosted PBA events over a span of 20 years, including the U.S. Open, PBA Touring Players Championship, USBC Masters, PBA World Championship, PBA Tournament of Champions and PBA League Elias Cup finals among other events. Woodland Bowl is the only center to host all five PBA major Championships.

"It's been close to 40 years we've been hosting tournaments, and I've got a lot of stuff on some of you," he said jokingly to the numerous PBA players in the room.

"It's been a labor of love," he said, "but if it wasn't for my dedicated staff, we'd never host the PBA. I can't put into words how important this is to me. It's amazing the talent the players have; you have to love having these guys come to our place.

"Randy Pedersen once called Woodland Bowl the Yankee Stadium of bowling, and he's right. The list of players who have grown up here is a long one. It's great to know all of the people who know us as the place where the pros bowl. I'm proud of that."

BOB JOHNSON

Johnson began his journey into bowling journalism at age 15 and eventually served as editor of four national bowling magazines, winning 75 national writing awards for his news, feature and editorial compositions, many of which directly involved the PBA. Currently Senior Editor of Bowlers Journal International and editor of the BJI Cyber Report, he is a recipient of both the International Bowling Media Association's Luby Hall of Fame Award and the Mid-America Bowling Writers Golden Quill Award.

To mark the occasion, Johnson and his wife Michelle purchased a commemorative brick for the sidewalk outside the IGM/HF, wrote a check to the breast cancer charity of PBA staffer Mary von Krueger's charity of choice and donated the cost of his Hall of Fame ring to BVL, bowling's official charity in support of the nation's military veterans.

"I'm not a ring guy," Johnson said, "except for this one (pointing to his wedding ring)."

"I learned that one of the secrets to bringing a story to life is what you put between the commas," he noted. "I've always tried to write the best stories I can. I doesn't always work... Telling PBA players' stories has been a real pleasure and I hope I can continue doing it for many more years."

Also recognized during the ceremonies were 2018 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson of Holly, Mich.; Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year Kamron Doyle of Brentwood, Tenn.; PBA Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award winner Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Mich., and PBA Tony Reyes Memorial Community Service Award recipient Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas.

Bill O'Neill Becomes Hall of Fame Eligible with Win in PBA Hall of Fame Classic,

Go Bowling! PBA Tour makes its 2019 debut live on FOX Sports' FS1 channel

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 6, 2019) – Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., defeated top qualifier Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., 199-194, to win the Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame Classic title at the International Training and Research Center Sunday and in the process became title-eligible for election to the PBA Hall of Fame in the future.

The finals aired live on FOX Sports' FS1 channel in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour's debut event in its new multi-year television agreement with FOX.

O'Neill, after throwing 17 strikes on 22 attempt in eliminating Sweden's Jesper Svensson, 258-219, and Australia's Jason Belmonte, 268-188, struggled through his first four frames of the title match before throwing four strikes in a row to take the lead against Butturff, who missed two spare attempts. Butturff's failure to convert the 4-7 in the ninth frame proved to be the difference.

"It might have appeared on TV that I got super nervous (early in the title match), but actually I was really calm," O'Neill said. "I just made a bad shot and got a little out of rhythm, so in the third frame we talked about trying another ball. I wanted to try one more hand position change, and I made what I thought was a pretty good shot, but I left the 7-10, so I switched balls and I was good to go.

"It was one of those things," he continued. "When it's your day, it's your day. I believed in myself. I believed in my game plan. I've been on TV enough to know things happen fast and you have to stick with your plan, and you go down with the ship."

With his 10th title, O'Neill will be eligible for the 2025 PBA Hall of Fame ballot, his 20th year of PBA membership. But reaching the title-eligible part of the criteria was the key step.

"Anyone in my position who says he isn't thinking about it would be a liar," O'Neill added. "To become Hall of Fame eligible in the Hall of Fame Classic is pretty cool, but I'm not done yet. I'm ready to keep going."

In the opening match, Svensson defeated Rhino Page of Orlando, Fla., 201-198.

Sweden's Jesper Svensson Averages 259 to Lead

PBA Oklahoma Open First Round

Svensson and Kyle Troup lead Roth-Holman Doubles after first round

SHAWNEE, Okla. (Jan. 8, 2019) – Seven-time Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour winner Jesper Svensson of Sweden averaged 259 for seven games to lead after the first round of the PBA Oklahoma Open Tuesday at the FireLake Bowling Center.

The two-handed left-hander bowled an 1,814 pinfall total with games of 237, 275, 299, 268, 228, 257 and 250 to hold a 70-pin lead over four-time tour winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., who finished the round in second with a 1,740 pinfall.

"That was crazy," said the 23-year-old Svensson, who won the 2016 PBA Tournament of Champions in Shawnee. "I didn't have a bad game and I really only had a few bad shots. Everything was working the way I wanted it to."

Svensson won twice in 2017 but failed to win in 2018 with best tour finishes of second in the PBA Tournament of Champions and third in the PBA Tour Finals. He finished fourth in the PBA Hall of Fame Classic 2019 season opener last Sunday in Arlington, Texas.

"Since the second half of last year I've been struggling with my mental game," Svensson added. "I've worked with a coach to help improve my focus and I feel like I'm in a good place with that now. The goal is to recognize when you're in a good flow or rhythm and stay in that moment."

Butturff, who finished second in the Hall of Fame Classic, had games of 216, 227, 258, 266, 256, 239 and 278 in the first round.

Qualifying continues Wednesday with the second seven-game qualifying round after which the field will be cut to the top 24 players for a casher's round Thursday morning. The top 16 players after the cashers round will advance to the first match play round Thursday afternoon and the second match play round Friday morning that will determine the top five for the stepladder finals which will air live on FS1 Sunday at 11 a.m. ET (10 a.m. CT).

The qualifying rounds of the Oklahoma Open also determine the standings for the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship. After Wednesday's qualifying round, the top 12 doubles team will advance to two Baker format match play rounds on Friday and Saturday that will determine the top five doubles teams for the taped FS1 telecast at 1:30 p.m. ET (12:30 p.m. CT) on Sunday. The Doubles Championship will air on FS1 Jan. 20 at 1 p.m. ET (noon CT).

Svensson and three-time tour winner Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., who teamed up to win the 2017 Roth-Holman Doubles Championship, lead after the first round with a 3,471 combined seven-game pinfall total holding a 117-pin lead over Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill. and Matt Ogle of Louisville, Ky., who finished with 3,354.

Jesper Svensson Averages 252 After Second Round

To Retain Lead in PBA Oklahoma Open

Svensson and Kyle Troup also retain lead in Roth-Holman Doubles after two rounds

SHAWNEE, Okla. (Jan. 9, 2019) – Sweden's Jesper Svensson continued to set the pace after the second round of qualifying in the PBA Oklahoma Open Wednesday, averaging 252 for two rounds to lead 24 players who advanced to Thursday's cashers round.

Averaging 259 after Tuesday's first round, the two-handed left-hander, who owns seven Go Bowling! PBA Tour titles, compiled a 3,529 14-game two round pinfall total. He bowled games of 236, 230, 265, 234, 258, 255 and 237 in the second round.

"When 230 is your low game you can't complain," said the 23-year-old Svensson. "My focus is good and I'm confident on every shot. I'm able to stay ahead of my game and what I need to do as the round progresses so if I don't throw a strike I'm getting nine which makes it easy to adjust from there."

Svensson holds a 101-pin lead over four-time tour winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., who finished with a 3,428 pinfall after the second round. Butturff had games of 234, 198, 244, 255, 278, 221 and 258 in the second round.

In what turned out to be a disappointing runner-up finish in the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic last Sunday when he opened twice in the title match to lose to winner Bill O'Neill, the 24-year-old Butturff is hoping to make amends in the Oklahoma Open.

"You have to have the mindset to let it go especially when you're bowling week-in and week-out," said the 24-year-old left-hander. "I had my 15 minutes of disappointment but that's history now. All I can do is give 100 percent on every ball I throw."

Four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia moved from a tie for 20th after the first round to third after bowling games of 246, 236, 245, 212, 253, 277 and 279 in the second round finishing with a 3,381 pinfall.

Svensson, Belmonte and Butturff all made the championship round in the Hall of Fame Classic.

The top 16 players after the cashers round will advance to the first match play round Thursday afternoon and the second match play round Friday morning that will determine the top five for the stepladder finals which will air live on FS1 Sunday at 11 a.m. ET (10 a.m. CT).

The qualifying rounds of the Oklahoma Open also determine the standings for the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship.

With the conclusion of Wednesday's second round, Svensson and partner Kyle Troup continued to top Roth-Holman Doubles qualifying after two rounds with a combined 6,643 pinfall total leading 12 doubles teams advancing to two Baker format match play rounds on Friday and Saturday that will determine the top five teams for the taped FS1 telecast at 1:30 p.m. ET (12:30 p.m. CT) on Sunday. The Doubles Championship will air on FS1 Jan. 20 at 1 p.m. ET (noon CT).

Two Solid Rounds Move Jakob Butturff Into PBA Oklahoma Open Lead

SHAWNEE, Okla. (Jan. 10, 2019) – Four-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., averaged 243 for eight games and posted a 5-3 record after the first match play round Thursday to take the lead in the PBA Oklahoma Open at the FireLake Bowling Center.

The 24-year-old lefthander finished with a 7,252 29-game pinfall total including match play bonus pins to lead seven-time tour winner Dom Barrett of England in second with 7,210.

Butturff, the runner-up in last week's season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic, bowled games of 277, 245, 191, 279, 195, 258, 265 and 239 in match play.

"I had two bad games but wasn't too worried about it," Butturff said. "I'm in a good mindset where I don't have to ask myself 20 questions when something's wrong. I'm able to stay ahead of my game and make the right adjustments quickly and start striking again.

"In the two 190 games I got to a couple pair of lanes where it seemed like I had one lane figured out but not the other," he continued. "In the next match I just had to start over, repeat good shots and start striking again."

Butturff had moved into the tournament lead after the cashers round earlier in the day bowling games of 279, 237, 264, 265, 259, 228 and 193. In the 193 game he again fell victim to failing to make easy spares when he missed a seven pin and a four pin.

The lefthander admitted to the weakness in his game, especially in higher scoring tournaments.

"When the scoring pace is high in a tournament, I'm always thinking about what I need to do to keep striking and sometimes don't give spares the attention I need to," Butturff said.

Barrett's 6-2 record in match play was highlighted by a 300-276 win over 12-time tour winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., in the second match. Barrett's other games in the round were 243, 279, 269, 259, 240, 212 and 224.

Rounding out the top five were Jesper Svensson of Sweden (4-4) 7,161; Kristopher Prather, Plainfield, Ill. (5-2-1) 7,148 and Nick Pate, Inver Grove Heights, Minn. (6-2) 7,142. Four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia finished the day in sixth with a 5-3 record and 7,133 pinfall.

Pate has bowled three 300 games in the tournament thus far including one in Thursday's cashers round, which is one short of the record of four in one tournament held by Walter Ray Williams Jr., Dave D'Entremont and John Bauerle Jr.

The 16-player field will return Friday morning for the final match play round at 11 a.m. CT that will determine the top five for the stepladder finals which will air live on FS1 Sunday at 11 a.m. ET (10 a.m. CT).

PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship action also resumes on Friday with 12 teams competing in the first round of Baker format match play at 6 p.m. CT. The 12 doubles teams will return Saturday for the second Baker match play round at 10 a.m. which will determine the top five teams for the taped FS1 telecast at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday. The Doubles Championship will air on FS1 Jan. 20 at 1 p.m. ET (noon CT).

IT'S EARLY, BUT BILL O'NEILL TAKES PBA PLAYOFFS POINTS LEAD

It's a small sample and there's a long way to go, but after the opening event of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, PBA Hall of Fame Classic winner **Bill O'Neill** of Langhorne, Pa., is the leader in the race to the inaugural PBA Playoffs.

Why bring it up when there are still 12 events to be held between now and the USBC Masters – the final PBA Playoffs qualifying event that will conclude on April 1 in Las

Vegas. Just to give fans an idea of how easy it will be to follow the points race as the season moves along. Right now, it's as easy as clicking on this link on <u>pba.com</u>: <u>https://www.pba.com/SeasonStats/PointsList/132?list=1</u>.

In the very near future it'll be even easier to find because a new PBA Playoffs link is under construction and will have a prominent presence on the <u>pba.com</u> home page. In addition, the Foundation has awarded over \$52,000 in scholarships to youth bowlers.

PBA STARS BARNES, KOIVUNIEMI, KULICK ELECTED TO USBC HALL OF FAME PBA stars Chris Barnes and **Mika Koivuniemi**, and **Kelly Kulick**, the first woman to win a PBA Tour title, will be part of the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame class that will be inducted on May 1 during the annual USBC Convention at The Orleans in Las Vegas.

Patrick Girard, Jesper Svensson, Dom Barrett and Tom Daugherty will join Butturff in Sunday's stepladder finals telecast on FS1

SHAWNEE, Okla. (Jan. 11, 2019) – For the second consecutive tournament of the season, four-time PBA Tour winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., captured the top qualifying position for a Go Bowling! PBA Tour stepladder final and will lead a five-player field for the PBA Oklahoma Open finals telecast which will air live on FS1 this Sunday at 11 a.m. ET from the FireLake Bowling Center.

It is actually the third consecutive PBA Tour event that Butturff has earned the top qualifying spot for the finals dating back to the season-ending 2018 U.S. Open in October where he finished second to England's Dom Barrett, losing 207-206 in the title match.

Butturff, who finished second in last week's PBA Hall of Fame Classic, posted a 10-6 overall record in match play and finished with a 9,362 37-game pinfall total (including match play bonus pins) to take the top qualifying position.

In what turned out to be a disappointing runner-up finish in the Hall of Fame Classic title match to Bill O'Neill because of two missed spares, the 24-year-old Butturff is more than prepared to break his string of runner-up finishes from the top qualifying spot.

"Failure doesn't mean give up – it means stay patient," said the left-hander. "I've had to work hard on my mental game strength and it's been put to the test recently. You need a lot of mental strength to rebound from disappointment. I'm learning from my past mistakes and believe that just makes you stronger."

Canadian Patrick Girard posted an 8-0 record in Friday's match play round (12-4 overall) and averaged 257 to move from ninth heading into the round to finish second for the finals with a 9,251 pinfall.

Girard will be trying for his first PBA Tour title with previous best finishes of fourth twice in 2005 and a fifth-place finish in the 2018 PBA Players Championship.

Also making his second consecutive championship round appearance of the young season was Sweden's Jesper Svensson who qualified third for the finals with a 9-7 overall match play record and 9,214 pinfall.

The 23-year-old left-handed two-hander who owns seven PBA Tour titles, finished fourth in the Hall of Fame Classic.

The 43-year-old Daugherty went 11-5 in match play and finished with a 9,146 overall pinfall total to edge out Belmonte, who finished sixth with a 7-9 record and 9,133 pinfall.

PBA Tour titles, Brad Miller and Kyle Sherman rode a 6-0 record in the final Baker format match play round to earn top qualifier honors for Sunday's FS1 taping of the PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship at the FireLake Bowling Center.

Miller, of Lees Summitt, Mo., and Sherman, of O'Fallon, Mo., who finished with a 9,802 40-game pinfall total (including match play bonus pins) and 9-3 overall record in match play, combined for games of 279, 266, 279 248, 248 and 246 (261 average) to move from fifth heading into the round to the top qualifier spot.

The Baker format requires each player to alternate frames in a game combining for one score. Miller's best previous best tour finish was fifth in the 2015 Xtra Frame Iowa Midwest Open and Sherman's previous best was ninth in the 2017 U.S. Open.

"Our game plan was to stay slow in all parts of the game," said the 28-year-old Miller. "Our experience throughout the whole tournament was if we got too fast in our approach, or with our ball speed, we would leave a lot 10 pins. So, staying was the key for us."

Both players star in a popular YouTube channel called Brad & Kyle, with more than 10,000 subscribers, that chronicles their exploits on and off the bowling circuit.

"We'll have a lot of good content for that now," Miller said. "We're both a little bit in dreamland at the moment, so we want to just soak it all in and enjoy the experience of making our first TV show."

Another feature on the channel is the 24-year-old Sherman's recovery after hip surgery for a torn labrum in August. The PBA Oklahoma Open and Roth-Holman Doubles Championship are his first tournaments back since then.

Also trying for their first PBA Tour titles will be No. 2 qualifiers Sam Cooley of Australia and Anthony Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, and No. 3 qualifiers Canadians Patrick Girard and two-hander Zacharay Wilkins.

Cooley and Lavery-Spahr combined for an 8-4 overall match play record and finished with a 9,724 pinfall. Girard, who also qualified second for Sunday's live FS1 Oklahoma Open finals, and Wilkins posted a 6-6 record and 9,671 pinfall.

Defending champions four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia and Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., qualified fourth thanks to a 9-3 overall match play record and finishing with a 9,658 pinfall. Their second match play round was highlighted by a 300-268 win over Cooley and Lavery-Spahr. Belmonte will be trying for his 19th tour win and O'Neill his 11th after winning the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic.

Twelve-time tour winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill. and partner Matt Ogle of Louisville, Ky., making his first tour stepladder final, made a dramatic run in the position round match jumping from eighth to qualify for the fifth and final spot with a 279-245 win over brothers Darren and Michael Tang.

PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke and 2008-09 PBA Player of the Year Wes Malott found the going tougher in the second match play round dropping from first after the first round to seventh. The 2011 and 2015 Roth-Holman Doubles champions finished with a 6-6 match play record and 9,600 pinfall

The Roth-Holman Doubles Championship taping on Sunday will take place at 1:30 p.m. CT after the live PBA Oklahoma Open Championships on FS1 at 10 a.m. CT. The Doubles Championship will air on FS1 Sunday, Jan. 20 at 1 p.m. ET (noon CT).

Jakob Butturff Ends Top Qualifier Slump to Win PBA Oklahoma Open for Fifth Career Tour Title

SHAWNEE, Okla. (Jan. 13, 2019) – Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., finally closed the deal by winning the PBA Oklahoma Open as the stepladder finals top qualifier to capture his fifth career tour title Sunday at the FireLake Bowling Center.

After losing last week's 2019 season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic and the 2018 season-ending U.S. Open title match as top qualifier, the 24-year-old left-hander finally broke the slump by defeating left-handed two-hander Jesper Svensson of Sweden 267-201, in the title match of the second stop of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season televised live by FS1.

In the title match it looked like missing easy spares might again prove to be Butturff's undoing when he missed a seven pin in the second frame. As it turned out, he wouldn't need to attempt a spare again in the match, throwing the next nine strikes to seal the win against Svensson who couldn't mount a challenge to Butturff's strike barrage.

"I did have flashbacks from last week, but I got over it quickly and was able to get back in the mindset of letting that go and start fresh with the next shot," Butturff said. "I decided to make a ball change to improve pin carry at that point and fortunately started striking again."

Butturff joined Hall of Famers Earl Anthony, Johnny Petraglia and Walter Ray Williams Jr. as the only players to earn a top seed for the stepladder finals in three consecutive PBA Tour telecasts. Had he lost, he would have become the first player to lose three consecutive tournaments from the top qualifier position.

Butturff missed two easy spares in his loss to Bill O'Neill in the Hall of Fame Classic title match which ended up costing him the win.

"I knew I would break through with a win sooner or later because I've had experience winning out here (on tour)," Butturff said. "I feel like I'm in good company when you think of the greats in the game who were in a similar position that have had their share of second-place finishes.

"I will say that I think after all I've been through recently, this is probably my most satisfying win so far," he added.

Svensson, who qualified third for the finals and was trying for his eighth tour title, advanced to the championship match by beating No. 2 qualifier Patrick Girard of Canada, 239-218, in the semifinal. Girard was trying for his first PBA Tour title and to become only the third Canadian to win on tour.

In the opening stepladder match, No. 4 qualifier, seven-time tour winner Dom Barrett of England beat No. 5 qualifier, two-time Tour winner Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Fla., 245-162, to advance to the

second match against Svensson. Svensson then beat Barrett in the second match, 267-231, to advance to the semifinal.

The next stop for the PBA Tour will be the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Jan. 22-27 at South Plains Lanes. The finals will be televised live by FS1 at 3 p.m. ET on Sunday, Jan. 27.

ARLINGTON, Texas (Jan. 15, 2019) – The Professional Bowlers Association, United States Bowling Congress and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America today announced a multi-year agreement to include the USBC Masters and U.S. Open as major events on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour television package on FOX Sports.

FOX Sports will televise the U.S. Open live on FOX from 2020 through 2022 and the USBC Masters live on FS1 from 2019 through 2022. The announcement was made today at the BPAA Mid-Winter Summit in New Orleans.

"The PBA is thrilled to have these two major professional events as part of the PBA Tour television package on FOX Sports for years to come," PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark said. "It is terrific for the bowling industry to rally behind the PBA Tour on FOX Sports and collaborate on a long-term commitment for these major events."

As a result of the agreement, the 2020 U.S. Open will move up in the calendar with the televised finals set for Sunday, Feb. 23, 2020. The current U.S. Open format will continue, with a host venue for the 2020 event to be announced later.

The USBC Masters will continue to be conducted in its traditional time window in conjunction with the USBC Open Championships.

"The PBA Tour move to FOX Sports is fantastic for bowling and everyone associated with the U.S. Open and USBC Masters is excited to be part of it," USBC Executive Director Chad Murphy said. "The media attention and investment in competitive bowling keeps growing and this partnership is another great win-win for the sport."

Known as the BPAA All-Star from 1941-1970, the U.S. Open now is a collaborative effort of the BPAA and USBC.

"Elevating the U.S. Open to FOX provides a new level of exposure for a tournament with a rich BPAA history," BPAA Executive Director Frank DeSocio said. "The launch of the PBA Tour on FOX has been extremely impressive and we are proud to be involved."

Hall of Famer Chris Barnes to Defend PBA Lubbock Sports Open Title

Jakob Butturff to try to set new mark for consecutive No. 1 stepladder finals qualifying berths

LUBBOCK, Texas (Jan. 17, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer and defending champion Chris Barnes will lead a world-class field of established and rising PBA stars from around the globe who will return to South Plains Lanes for the 2019 PBA Lubbock Sports Open.

This year, the Lubbock Sports Open will be in the national sports spotlight when FS1 televises the stepladder finals of the fourth stop of the 2019 GoBowling! PBA Tour season live at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT) on Sunday, Jan. 27.

One of the PBA's young stars competing in Lubbock will be last week's PBA Oklahoma Open winner and last season's Lubbock Sports Open runner-up Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., who will be trying to break a record he currently shares with PBA greats Walter Ray Williams Jr., Earl Anthony and Johnny Petraglia.

If Butturff can qualify first for the stepladder finals in Lubbock, he would become the first player to be the No. 1 seed in four consecutive singles PBA Tour tournaments.

Butturff finally broke through to win from the No. 1 stepladder finals qualifying spot in last Sunday's Oklahoma Open on FS1 for his fifth career tour title after losing the title match in two previous tournaments. He lost the season-ending 2018 U.S. Open as No. 1 qualifier to winner Dom Barrett of England and the 2019 season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic to winner Bill O'Neill before beating Jesper Svensson from the top spot in the Oklahoma Open.

Barnes, a 2018 PBA Hall of Fame inductee who also will join the USBC Hall of Fame on May 1, won his 19th PBA singles title in Lubbock last year, striking out in the 10th frame to defeat top qualifier Butturff, 207-206. Lubbock was also the site of Butturff's first PBA Tour title victory in 2016.

The Lubbock Sports Open will also feature a mixed (or dual) lane condition which will add to the challenge for the 96-player field.

The tournament officially gets underway at 8 a.m. Wednesday with the first of two seven-game qualifying squads on the PBA's 32-foot Wolf oiling pattern. The other half of the field will bowl its first qualifying round at 1:30 p.m. The two squads reverse order for a second seven-game qualifying round on the 42-foot Scorpion lane condition Thursday, after which the top 25 percent of the field advance to a seven-

game cashers round Friday at 8 a.m. on mixed lane conditions – the Scorpion on the left lane and the Wolf on the right. The top 16 players after 21 games will bowl two eight-game match play rounds at 1:30 p.m. on Friday and 8 a.m. Saturday. The top five after 37 games will compete in the stepladder finals live on FS1 Sunday at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT). The stepladder finals will also feature the Scorpion pattern on the left lane and Wolf pattern on the right lane.

Because LED lights don't generate heat, they don't affect lane conditions like tungsten lights did in the good ol' days. Observant television fans might also notice the lighting is much closer to "daylight white," and Darden said some of his new LEDs include color options that allow him to change lighting to red, blue, green or whatever special effect the situation might call for, just by making some subtle adjustments.

Rash, Ogle Sweep Stepladder Finals to Win PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship

Rash and Ogle beat Missourians Brad Miller and Kyle Sherman 213-200 in Baker format title match

SHAWNEE, Okla. (Jan. 20, 2019) – Doubles partners Sean Rash and Matt Ogle won all four Baker format stepladder matches to win the 2019 PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship aired Sunday on FS1 from the FireLake Bowling Center.

Rash, who won his 13th career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title, and Ogle, who won his first title in his first TV appearance, beat Missourians Brad Miller and Kyle Sherman, 213-200, in the title match.

The Baker format requires each player to alternate frames in a game to combine for one score.

After Rash opened with a 4-7-9 split in the first frame, he and Ogle got back on track by striking in the next four frames to take a 13-pin lead into the sixth frame. Miller and Sherman, also making their first telecast appearances, tried to make a challenge by striking in the fifth, sixth and seventh but when Miller opened in the eighth by missing a four pin, it enabled Rash and Ogle to stay in front for the rest of the match.

It was an emotional win for both Rash and Ogle who qualified fifth for the stepladder finals. It was Rash's first win since 2017 and after what he described as his worst season of his year career in 2018.

I was almost in a depression," said the 36-year-old Rash, whose last tour win came in the 2017 Xtra Frame Gene Carter Pro Shop Classic. "It got to the point where I wondered if I wanted to do it (bowl) anymore, but then I just had to force myself to do the things I needed to do to get better by getting in shape, eat right and make the changes with my game like going from a 16-pound ball to a 15. In 2018 Rash finished in a tie for fifth in the PBA Tour Finals for his best finish of the season.

"You hear a lot of chat in the background like, 'is he ever going to win again,' or people just generally writing you off," Rash added. "I finally saw some improvement at the end of last year but I was just hoping for the best when the new season started. You never know when you're going to get it back again."

For the 34-year-old Ogle, who is in his third season as a PBA member and bowls on tour mainly parttime, winning a PBA title fulfilled a lifelong goal in the sport.

"It's a dream come true," said Ogle, who has used a two-handed delivery since suffering from a carpal tunnel injury in his right wrist in 2006. "When someone like Sean believes in you and wants you to be his doubles partner that's an opportunity that's not going to come around too often.

"It was a situation where we have good communication and have a good understanding of each other's game so it was a natural fit from the start," Ogle added. "We had our ups and downs during the tournament but it's a sign of a good team when you can come back from adversity to make the adjustments to recover."

Rash and Ogle started the finals with a 256-172 win over No. 4 qualifiers defending champions four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte and Bill O'Neill, who won his 10th career title in the season opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic, to advance to the second stepladder match.

Rash and Ogle then defeated No. 3 qualifiers Canadians Patrick Girard and Zach Wilkins, 216-210, in the second stepladder match to advance to the semifinal match where they beat No. 2 qualifiers Sam Cooley and Anthony Lavery-Spahr, 258-216.

The five doubles teams reached the finals through their combined individual qualifying scores from the PBA Oklahoma Open after which the top 12 teams advanced to two Baker format match play rounds to determine the top five teams for the finals.

The next stop for the Go Bowling! PBA Tour will be the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Jan. 22-27 at South Plains Lanes in Lubbock, Texas. The stepladder finals will be telecast live by FS1 at 3 p.m. ET on Jan. 27.

Jakob Butturff Wins PBA Lubbock Sports Southwest Open

Lubbock, Texas (January 20, 2019) –Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., overcame a tightly bunched leaderboard in the final position round match to win his 20th PBA Regional title Sunday in the PBA Lubbock Sports Southwest Open at South Plains Lanes, a prelude event to the Go Bowling! PBA Tour's Lubbock Sports Open that begins Tuesday.

Butturff, undoubtably the hottest player in the PBA, held a 38-pin lead over Sam Cooley of Australia going into the 21st and final game of the tournament while snapping at their heels were former PBA Player of the Year Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., and Tom Daugherty from Riverview, Fla. Only 66 pins separated the top four players. In the final game, Butturff suffered a first frame open, but rebounded with a plethora of strikes to win his match against Cooley, 248-202, earn an additional 30 bonus pins for winning the match, and he won the tournament going away by completing an unbeaten 8-0 round of match play.

Rash defeated Daugherty, 222-210, to jump to second place as Cooley claimed third while Daugherty maintained fourth place. Butturff earned \$4,000 for the victory, Rash collected \$2,400, as Cooley added \$1,600, while Daugherty settled for \$1,200.

The PBA's Lubbock Sports Open follows at South Plains with the finals to be televised live on Fox Sports' FS1 channel on Sunday at 2 p.m. Central.

TRUE OR FALSE: BO BURTON MAY HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO WEBER'S TROPHY CRASH

Bowling fans who watched the televised finals of the 1991 U.S. Open from Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis will never forget the trophy presentation when winner Pete Weber hoisted the majestic ceramic eagle trophy, gave it a shake and saw it crash and shatter into a thousand pieces on the approach.

How that *actually* happened came to light during the 2019 PBA Hall of Fame ceremonies in Arlington, Texas, when PBA HOF legend **Nelson (Bo) Burton Jr.** told the crowd he may have contributed to the trophy incident. According to Bo, when he saw the trophy sitting off to the side before the ABC-TV telecast, he decided to show the eagle to the crowd, so he unscrewed the nut that held the eagle to the base...and forgot to re-attach the nut when he replaced the eagle 0n the base. So, bottom line, one of PBA's historic moments was actually his fault.

Was the story true or a fable invented by Burton? When asked to confirm the story, he laughed and said, "You decide. It remains a mystery. What I actually did was mention to **Chris Schenkel** that it was a really pretty trophy, so I picked it up and staged it for a camera shot," Burton said. "Whether or not I loosened the eagle, who knows? I honestly don't know what happened...but it's a good story."

PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: BUTTURFF JOINS ELITE GROUP WITH 20TH REGIONAL TITLE

Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., overcame a tightly bunched leaderboard in the final position round match to win his 20th PBA Regional title Sunday in the PBA Lubbock Sports Southwest Open at South Plains Lanes, reaching the 20-title milestone in only 59 tournaments.

At age 24, Butturff is believed to be the youngest player to reach that title milestone. He is the 38th player in PBA history to win 20 regional titles.

Butturff, undoubtably the hottest player in the PBA, held a 38-pin lead over **Sam Cooley** of Australia going into the 21st and final game of the tournament while snapping at their heels were former PBA Player of the Year **Sean Rash** of Montgomery, III., and **Tom Daugherty** from Riverview, Fla. Only 66 pins separated the top four players. In the final game, Butturff suffered a first-frame open, but rebounded with a plethora of strikes to win his match against Cooley, 248-202. He earned an additional 30 bonus pins for winning the match and won the tournament going away by completing an unbeaten 8-0 round of match play.

The tournament was a prelude event to the Go Bowling! PBA Tour's Lubbock Sports Open that begins Wednesday in Lubbock, Texas.

Rash defeated Daugherty, 222-210, to jump to second place as Cooley claimed third while Daugherty maintained fourth place. Butturff earned \$4,000 for the victory, Rash collected \$2,400, as Cooley added \$1,600, while Daugherty settled for \$1,200.

The PBA Tour's Lubbock Sports Open follows at South Plains with the finals to be televised live on Fox Sports' FS1 channel on Sunday at 2 p.m. Central.

• Brian Kretzer of Dayton, Ohio and partner Ronnie Russell of Marion, Ind., defeated Eugene McCune of Munster, Ind. and non-PBA member Ryan Burks of Valparaiso, Ind., 2-0, in a best-of-three-game title match to win the PBA/PBA50 Don Vay Memorial Central Doubles Classic title at Legend Lanes in Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio, Sunday.

Kretzer and Russell blanked **Larry Verble** of Mason, Mich., and **T.J. Schmidt** of Mishawaka, Ind., 2-0, while McCune and Burks topped **Doug Kent** of Newark, N.Y. and **Tim Pfeifer** of Oakdale, Pa., 2-1, in the best-of-three semifinal round to set up the championship match.

After Slow Start, Prather Rebounds to Take PBA Lubbock Sports Open Lead After First Round

LUBBOCK, Texas (Jan. 23, 2019) – After a slow start, Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., rebounded to average 236.8 after the first round to lead the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Wednesday at South Plains Lanes.

In a tournament that features mixed (or dual) lane condition patterns, bowling on the PBA 32-foot Wolf lane condition, Prather finished the first round with a 1,658 seven-game pinfall total. After starting with games of 188 and 215, he came back with games of 258, 234, 290, 237 and 236.

"I started a little slow the first couple of games trying to find the right rhythm and ball speed," said the 27-year-old Prather. "If I was too aggressive, the ball was going through the nose, and if I wasn't aggressive enough, I couldn't get the ball to the pocket. I think it was a matter of just staying patient, getting lose and letting the rest of the round develop. My ball motion got better as the round went on."

Looking for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title, Prather started the season with two 10th-place finishes, in the PBA Hall of Fame Classic and PBA Oklahoma Open, after finishing 2018 with four consecutive championship round appearances.

Prather withstood a challenge by AJ Chapman of Manchester, Iowa, who finished the round in second 22 pins behind with 1,636. Chapman faltered in the final game of the round bowling 181.

Last week's Oklahoma Open winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., who has been the No. 1 qualifier for the stepladder finals in a record-tying three consecutive PBA Tour singles tournaments, struggled in the first round finishing the day in a tie for 42nd with a 1,450 pinfall. Butturff won the 2016 Lubbock Sports Open, finished second last season and third in 2017.

Defending champion PBA Hall of Famer Chris Barnes, who beat Butturff in last season's title match 207-206, finished the first round in a tie for 18th with 1,532.

The field returns for the second seven-game qualifying round on the 42-foot Scorpion lane condition Thursday, after which the top 24 players will advance to a seven-game cashers round Friday with the Scorpion condition on the left lane and the Wolf on the right.

The top 16 players after Friday's cashers round will advance to an eight-game match play round Friday afternoon and Saturday morning after which the top five will advance to the stepladder finals live on FS1 Sunday at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT). The stepladder finals will also feature the Scorpion pattern on the left lane and Wolf pattern on the right lane.

EJ Tackett Jumps Into PBA Lubbock Sports Open

Lead After Second Round

2016 PBA Player of the Year leads 24 players advancing to Friday's cashers round

LUBBOCK, Texas (Jan. 24, 2019) – EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., bowled a 1,566 seven-game pinfall total on PBA's 42-foot Scorpion lane condition in the second round of the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Thursday at South Plains Lanes to lead 24 players who advanced to Friday's cashers round.

The 26-year-old 2016 PBA Player of the Year and 12-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner finished the day with a 3,137 overall 14-game pinfall (224 average) after two rounds, surging from seventh with 1,571 after Wednesday's first round on the 32-foot Wolf lane condition.

Tackett, who won the 2015 Lubbock Sports Open, bowled games of 257, 190, 234, 199, 219, 272 and 195 in the second round to hold a narrow three-pin lead over three-time tour winner Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., in second with a 3,134 after two rounds.

"For me, the key to bowling in tournaments with different lane conditions is staying ahead of the moves and adjustments you need to make and make sure you dial in your focus on each lane," said Tackett. "It's tough enough when you're bowling a tournament on the same condition, but on multiple conditions, it can create a domino effect of problems if you fall behind. You don't want to have to play catch up."

Despite finishing the second round with a 169, PBA Oklahoma Open winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., vaulted from 42nd to 19th, with a 2,982 pinfall. With the cashers round and two match play rounds to go, if the 2016 Lubbock Sports Open winner can become the top qualifier for Sunday's live stepladder finals on FS1, he would become the first player to qualify for the top position in four consecutive PBA Tour singles events.

Rounding out the top five after the second round were AJ Chapman, Manchester, Iowa, 3,107; Kyle Sherman, O'Fallon, Mo., 3,100 and Anthony Lavery-Spahr, Pasadena, Texas, 3,099.

Defending champion PBA Hall of Famer Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, maintained his position in 18th with a 2,995 pinfall to advance to the cashers round. First round leader Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., dropped to ninth with 3,083.

The players advancing to the cashers round will have the added challenge of having to bowl on the Scorpion condition on the left lane and Wolf condition on the right lane.

The top 16 players after Friday's cashers round will bowl an eight-game match play round on Friday afternoon and another Saturday morning after which the top five will advance to the stepladder finals live on FS1 Sunday at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT). The stepladder finals will also feature the Scorpion pattern on the left lane and Wolf pattern on the right lane.

Prather Regains PBA Lubbock Sports Open Lead Heading Into Match Play

First round PBA Lubbock Sports Open leader Kris Prather regained his lead after Friday's cashers round on the mixed 42-foot Scorpion and 32-foot Wolf lane conditions heading into this afternoon's first round of match play at South Plains Lanes at 2:30 p.m. ET (1:30 CT).

Prather fired a 1,667 seven-game pinfall total with games of 205, 227, 243, 300, 266, 203 and 223 to lead 16 players who advanced to match play with a 4,750 pinfall total for 21 games.

Five-time PBA Tour winner Jakob Butturff continued his march up the standings into seventh after finishing in a tie for 42nd after the first round. He posted a 1,606 pinfall in the cashers round with games of 247, 190, 238, 204, 268, 214 and 245 finishing with a 4,588 overall pinfall after three rounds.

If the 2016 Lubbock Sports Open winner can become the top qualifier for Sunday's live stepladder finals on FS1, he would become the first player to qualify for the top position in four consecutive PBA Tour singles events.

Defending champion PBA Hall of Famer Chris Barnes just made the cut finishing 16th with a 4,508 pinfall. Second round leader 2015 Lubbock Sports Open winner EJ Tackett dropped to sixth with 4,604.

After this afternoon's first match play round and another round Saturday morning, the top five will be determined for the stepladder finals live on FS1 Sunday at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT). The stepladder finals will also feature the Scorpion pattern on the left lane and Wolf pattern on the right lane.

Prather Regains PBA Lubbock Sports Open Lead After First Match Play Round

16-player field returns Saturday morning for final match play round to determine five finalists for Sunday's stepladder finals on FS1

LUBBOCK, Texas (Jan. 25, 2019) – With a leaderboard that saw a lot of movement, Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., posted a 4-4 record in the first match play round but still emerged as the leader of the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Friday at South Plains Lanes.

Bowling on dual lane conditions – PBA 42-foot Scorpion pattern on the left lane and 32-foot Wolf condition on the right lane – Prather holds the lead with a 6,607 29-game pinfall total, including 30 bonus pins for each match win, to hold a seven-pin lead over three-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., who had a 6-2 record in match play and finished the day with a 6,600 pinfall.

"It's tough out there," said the 27-year-old Prather who led after the first round and holds a 223.6 average thus far in the tournament. "Pair to pair the lanes are playing so different because guys are bowling different angles with different types of equipment trying to find what works best for them.

"You just hope that you can make the most of the pairs of lanes you match up the best with," he added. "You're kind of at the mercy of who bowls on the pair that you move to after each game and how the bowlers played them."

Looking for his first tour title, Prather started the season with two 10th-place finishes, in the PBA Hall of Fame Classic and PBA Oklahoma Open, after finishing 2018 with four consecutive championship round appearances.

Making a jump from 10th after Friday morning's cashers round, San Francisco native Michael Tang, who now makes his home in Johnstown, Ohio, went 7-0-1 in match play and had a 6,595 pinfall to move into third.

Rounding out the top five were six-time tour winner Rhino Page, Orlando (5-2-1) 6,525, in fourth, and 13-time tour winner Sean Rash, Montgomery, Ill., who moved from 11th after the cashers round to fifth after posting a 5-3 record and 6,523 pinfall.

Rash teamed with Matt Ogle to win the PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship which aired last Sunday on FS1.

The 16-player field returns Saturday morning for the final match play round at 9 a.m. ET (8 a.m. CT) after which the top five players will be determined for Sunday's live stepladder finals on FS1 at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT)

Rash Goes 8-0 in Final Match Play Round to Take

PBA Lubbock Sports Open Stepladder Finals Top Seed

Rash will be joined by Dick Allen, Michael Tang, Kyle Troup and Rhino Page

in Sunday's live FS1 stepladder finals telecast

LUBBOCK, Texas (Jan. 26, 2019) – Boosted by an 8-0 record in the final match play round, Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., earned the top seed for the stepladder finals of the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Saturday at South Plains Lanes.

After three qualifying and two match play rounds, Rash earned the top berth with a 37-game 8,586 pinfall total (including match play bonus pins) and 13-3 overall match play record, to lead the five players who advanced to Sunday's finals that will air live on FS1 at 3 p.m. ET (2 p.m. CT).

"Last week was a big confidence boost," said the 13-time tour winner, who teamed with Matt Ogle to win the PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship that aired on FS1 last Sunday. "Obviously winning is a big confidence boost but you're always going to have the ups and downs. There's still work to be done but it feels good to be riding the ups right now."

Rash's 8-0 performance moved him into the lead after finishing Friday's match play round in fifth with a 5-3 record.

In match play, players bowled on a dual lane condition – the PBA 42-foot Scorpion lane condition on the left lane and 32-foot Wolf condition on the right lane. The same conditions will be used for the stepladder finals.

"It was about filling frames and taking advantage of opportunities," said Rash, whose last singles tour title came in the 2017 Xtra Frame Gene Carter Pro Shop Classic. "If you were bowling an opponent who was struggling, you had to take advantage of that by bearing down and making your spares if you weren't able to strike."

Qualifying second for the finals with a 9-7 match play record and 8,428 pinfall was five-time tour winner Dick Allen of Lexington, S.C. Making his first telecast appearance of 2019, Allen's last tour win came in the 2018 PBA Xtra Frame Maine Shootout.

San Francisco native Michael Tang rode an 11-4-1 match play record and 8,412 pinfall to qualify third for the finals to make his first career singles telecast appearance as a PBA member. Now living in Johnstown, Ohio, the 23-year-old right-hander finished second in the 2018 Roth-Holman Doubles Championship with his brother Darren, and was runner-up in the 2017 USBC Masters as an amateur. Tang finished with a 7-0-1 record after Friday's first match play round.

Three-time tour winner Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., had an 8-8 record in match play and 8,393 pinfall to qualify fourth. Making his first telecast appearance in 2019, the 23-year-old two-hander's last tour win came in the 2018 Lucky Larsen Masters in Sweden.

Six-time tour winner Rhino Page of Orlando earned the No. 5 position with a 10-5-1 match play record and 8,373 pinfall. The left-hander jumped from seventh in the position round match with a 246-245 win over 12-time tour winner EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., for his second telecast appearance of 2019. Page, the 2017 U.S. Open winner, finished fifth in the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic.

Missed Spare in 10th Frame by Sean Rash Enables Dick Allen to Win PBA Lubbock Sports Open

Allen gets just enough in 10th frame of title match to win 201-200

LUBBOCK, Texas (Jan. 27, 2019) – Taking advantage of a missed 10 pin in the 10th frame by top qualifier Sean Rash in the title match, Dick Allen won the PBA Lubbock Sports Open Sunday for his sixth career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title.

Bowling on a dual lane condition – the PBA 42-foot Scorpion condition on the left lane and the 32-foot Wolf lane condition on the right lane – the 40-year-old Allen, who qualified second for the finals, defeated Rash 201-200 in the title match at South Plains Lanes.

Down by 18 heading into the 10th frame, Allen doubled on his first two shots in the 10th and then got eight on his fill ball after Rash's misfortune which was just enough for the victory. Allen benefited from a late falling 2 pin on a light hit on first strike.

"I knew it was a bad shot about 35 feet down the lane," Allen said of his first strike in the 10th. "Whatever the result was going be, it was definitely out of my hands at that point. I think when Sean missed that spare it took me a while to realize I still had a shot to win."

Allen recovered to throw a solid strike on his second ball in the 10th but then threw another bad shot leaving the 3-6 on the fill ball.

"I was very fortunate on that last shot because that could have easily been six," Allen added. "It was a roller coaster ride out there."

The title match was a far different experience for Allen than the semifinal where he beat two-hander No. 4 qualifier Kyle Troup 278-188 to advance to the title match against Rash.

For Allen, who is in his 20th year on tour, it was his first win since the 2018 PBA Xtra Frame Maine Shootout and his first title on television since winning the 2011 Dick Weber Playoffs.

"I'm no spring chicken anymore," Allen said. "I hope I can continue a trend of being a late bloomer. At my age I know I don't have that many competitive years left so I'll just enjoy the ride as long as I can."

Rash was trying for his second consecutive and 14th career win after teaming with Matt Ogle to win the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship which aired on FS1 last Sunday.

In the second match, Troup, who was trying for his fourth career title, finished with four strikes in a row to beat Michael Tang 228-215 to advance to the semifinal match. Tang, the No. 3 qualifier for the finals, was trying for his first career tour win.

Troup capitalized on open frames in the ninth and 10th by No. 5 qualifier Rhino Page, who was trying to win his seventh career title, to win the opening match 198-186.

The 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour heads to Ohio for back-to-back majors in February for the PBA Tournament of Champions from AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn (Feb. 4-10) and the PBA Players Championship at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl (Feb. 12-17). The Tournament of Champions will air live on FOX at 4:30 p.m. ET on Feb. 10 and the Players Championship will air live on FS1 at 1 p.m. on Feb. 17.

The next PBA telecast on FS1 will be the CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitational presented by Go Bowling! Feb. 3 at 2 p.m. ET.

Terrell Owens, Mookie Betts, JJ Watt join PBA stars for Super Bowl Sunday special event's debut on FOX

CONROE, Texas – National Basketball Association star Chris Paul will welcome an all-star lineup of athletes, entertainers and Professional Bowlers Association stars to his 10th anniversary CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitational, presented by Go Bowling!, when it makes its broadcast television debut on FOX on Sunday, Feb. 3 at 2 p.m. EST, at Bowlero at The Woodlands.

The Super Bowl Sunday special, benefitting the Chris Paul Family Foundation, will feature well-known athletes including returning competitors Terrell Owens, recently inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, and reigning American League MVP and World Series champion Mookie Betts of the Boston Red Sox, along with a guest appearance by Houston Texans superstar defensive end J.J. Watt. Also participating will be Paul's Houston Rockets teammate PJ Tucker, Cincinnati Bengals wide receiver William Jackson III, and NASCAR champion Aric Almirola, driver of the No. 10 Go Bowling! Ford. Entertainers in the field will include Big Brother Season 20 star Tyler Crispen, model and Big Brother contestant Angela Rummans, and Grammy-nominated rapper/artist Bun B.

"This is totally different than any bowling I do during the summer or with my friends and teammates," Paul said of his annual event. "The pressure is different, there are a lot of people here, the lights are bright, but I'll make sure I do enough to win."

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PBA Tournament of Champions and Players Championship Already a Critical

Stretch for Players in Young Go Bowling! PBA Tour Season

PBA Playoffs, \$1 million 300 game bonus come into focus in season's first major championships

CHICAGO (Jan. 30, 2019) – With the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season barely a month old, players already find themselves at a critical juncture in the PBA Playoffs race with two majors back-to-back in February.

Both are Tier 1 points events under the PBA's new competition points system. The 54th PBA Tournament of Champions – PBA's signature event that requires a player to have a PBA title to compete – gets underway Feb. 4-10 at AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio. It will be followed a week later by the PBA Players Championship, Feb. 12-17, at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl in Columbus, Ohio.

The Tournament of Champions stepladder finals will be televised live on FOX at 4:30 p.m. ET on Sunday, Feb. 10 and the Players Championship finals will air live on FS1 on Sunday, Feb. 17 at 1 p.m. ET.

In addition to the PBA Playoffs race, the Tournament of Champions and Players Championship will be the first tournaments to feature a \$1 million bonus if a player bowls a 300 game in the title match of either stepladder final. While there have been 26 televised 300 games in the history of the PBA Tour, only two have been accomplished in the title match and neither of those took place in a major championship.

The two other opportunities to win the \$1 million 300 game bonus will come in the title matches of the live Go Bowling! Indianapolis Open finals Sunday, Feb. 24 at 3 p.m. ET on FS1 and PBA World Championship that will air as part of the PBA World Series of Bowling X in suburban Detroit on March 21 at 8 p.m. ET.

In the upcoming majors stretch, four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte will again try to tie, and or break, the record for most PBA major wins. The nine-time majors champion made a run at the record in 2018 by finishing fourth in the Tournament of Champions and second in the Players Championship when he lost to Tom Smallwood, 259-239, in the title match. PBA Hall of Famers Earl Anthony and Pete Weber share the record for most major titles with 10. Weber also will bowl in both events, trying to take sole possession of the record.

Tournament of Champions defending champion Matt O'Grady of Rahway, N.J., made an incredible run to win the 2018 title, coming all the way from a pre-tournament qualifier to the stepladder finals where, as the No. 5 qualifier, he won all four stepladder matches culminating with a 207-193 title match win over Sweden's Jesper Svensson to win his first PBA Tour title.

Competition points earned in both majors will be valuable for players who are competing for 24 berths in the inaugural PBA Playoffs. Players will continue to compile points through the USBC Masters which concludes April 1. The preliminary rounds of the PBA Playoffs will be held April 7-10 at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine, which will air on FS1 throughout April and May with the top four players returning to Portland to compete for a \$100,000 first prize – the richest in bowling – during the live finals that will air over two days (June 1-2) on FOX. PBA LEGEND CARMEN SALVINO TO COMPETE IN TOC AT AGE 85

There seems to be no stopping PBA legend Carmen Salvino.

The 85-year old PBA Hall of Famer will compete in his 29th PBA Tournament of Champions, extending his record as the oldest player to compete in a Go Bowling! PBA Tour event.

PBA's most famous showman is one of the few remaining links to the storied tournament's origin dating back to the inaugural event in 1962.

"I'm in shape and ready to go," said the 17-time tour winner. "I'm working out and doing a lot of bowling to get ready. My weight hasn't changed in 63 years. I'm 195 (pounds) and haven't fluctuated five pounds either side of that."

Salvino began planning to bowl in the 2019 TOC after competing in last season's PBA 60th Anniversary Classic in Indianapolis.

"People have no idea of how it feels to go into the locker room of one of the great tournaments and see all the guys," Salvino said. "For me, it goes beyond bowling—just to be there with those guys is a thrill."

The 1962 TOC was held at Play Bowl in Indianapolis and was actually billed as the Indianapolis 500 Festival Tournament of Champions according to the Indianapolis Star's coverage of the tournament. It's an often-overlooked event because the tournament would not be held again for three years. In 1965, Firestone began its landmark sponsorship, the classic moved to Bowlarama in Akron, Ohio and then to AMF Riviera Lanes the following year where it remained for 29 years.

The first TOC was a two-day event featuring 25 PBA Tour champions – everyone who had won a title since the PBA's formation four years earlier. It was conducted immediately after the Indianapolis PBA Open, the final regular event of the Tour season, which also was held at Play Bowl. Salvino finished third in the inaugural tournament (his best finish in the classic). Joe Joseph won with a two-game total of 480 pins followed by fellow Michigan star Billy Golembiewski with 413 pins and Salvino with a 409 total.

"I'm an example of not letting your age stop you," Salvino added. "I'm looking forward to showing those young guns a thing or two."

LIVE LUBBOCK SPORTS OPEN TELECAST CONTINUES STRONG FOX VIEWERSHIP GAINS

Sunday's live FS1 telecast of the PBA Lubbock Sports Open continued a strong trend of viewership gains under the PBA's new relationship with FOX Sports.

"We are gaining momentum with our new broadcast partner FOX Sports," said PBA CEO and Commissioner Tom Clark. "Our fans are finding us."

Sunday's telecast of the PBA Lubbock Sports Open finals was the most viewed show on FS1 so far this year, Clark said, producing a 28% gain over the previous week's Roth-Holman PBA Doubles Championship telecast, and an 83% gain over the PBA Oklahoma Open telecast the Sunday before the doubles show. The original airing of the Lubbock Open averaged 345,000 viewers with the first re-air later Sunday evening tallying another 157,000 viewers. The live Lubbock show also had 316% more viewers than the program FS1 aired in the same time slot the previous year.

For the year to date, through five original shows plus re-airs on FOX, FS1 and FS2, the PBA has attracted 6,921,000 viewers, up 26% over the first five shows in 2018 on different network, Clark noted.

LIVE FOX TELECAST HELPS SPARK MEDIA FRENZY OVER KYLE TROUP'S HAIR...AND FLAIR

Guppy Troup built his legion of fans with his showmanship and colorful wardrobe in a 1970s and '80s PBA Tour career that resulted in eight titles, and now son Kyle Troup is extending the Troup family legacy by adding an Afro hairdo, a two-handed delivery and his own charisma to the family portfolio.

Troup's third-place finish in Sunday's Lubbock Sports Open, live on FS1, helped the 27-year-old Taylorsville, N.C., two-hander create his own unique fan club when his hair – and flair – became a social media hit. It was noted prominently by TMZ (https://www.tmz.com/2019/01/28/bowler-afro-kyle-troup/?fbclid=IwAR1yqIjTMwsAqVbavfQcCUgn6bu30bLA63UmwSNKsDfU_Eco72TMTcJcJ4M); became a trending topic on Twitter (https://twitter.com/barstoolsports/status/1090036603484020736), and captured the attention of SI.com's "Extra Mustard" (https://www.si.com/extra-mustard/2019/01/29/pba-bowler-kyle-troup-fro-pants-celebration-video).

Jakob Butturff Continues to Shine; Canadians Impact 2018 PBA Regional Awards

CHICAGO (Feb. 1, 2019) - Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., continued to be the player to beat in the PBA Northwest Region, winning another title and finishing second in his other three Northwest Region tournaments to retain his Player of the Year title in 2018. But across the PBA's seven regions, players with Canadian roots made a major impact in 2018, claiming three regional Player of the Year honors and a Rookie of the Year award.

While the 24-year-old Butturff only bowled in four PBA Northwest tournaments in 2018, he also won PBA Regional titles in the Central, Midwest and West Regions while running his career titles total to 19 by the end of the year.

Butturff's accomplishments in 2018 were among the highlights of the PBA Regional Award winners, announced today by Director of the PBA Regional and PBA50 Tours John Weber, recognizing Players of the Year, Rookies of the Year, PBA50 Players of the Year and Pat Patterson Award winners, for contributions to the regional program, in each of its seven domestic regions.

Award winners were selected by the PBA's regional managers: Russ Mills, East Region; Sam Zurich, South Region; Bobby Jakel, Central Region; recently-retired Rich Weber, Midwest Region; Pete McCordic, Southwest Region, and Gary Mage, West and Northwest Regions.

Here's a summary of the 2018 PBA Regional Award winners:

EAST – Darren Andretta of Wantagh, N.Y., bowled in six events, winning two titles and finishing second in a third to earn Player of the Year. Rookie of the Year is Todd Sigeti of Lititz, Pa., after a seven-for-seven record as a casher and a 13th place best finish. Rick Graham of Lancaster, Pa., won Senior Player of the Year after recording six top-five finishes in eight tries, including one title. Steve Pavlinko Sr. of Sewell, N.J., was recipient of the East Region's Pat Patterson Award.

SOUTH – PBA Tour veteran Dick Allen of Lexington, S.C., won PBA South Region Player of the Year honors for the first time since the 2004-05 season, making match play in nine of 12 events, winning three titles and added three other top-five finishes. Former Teen Masters champion and two-time Junior Team USA member Mike Coffey of Melbourne, Fla., won Rookie of the Year honors after winning one title and recording two other top-five finishes in his first five tournaments. Veteran Stoney Baker of Canton, Ga., with three titles and six total top-five finishes in PBA50 events, was a dual honoree – winning Senior Player of the Year honors along with the South Region's Patterson Award.

CENTRAL – Ontario native Graham Fach, the first Canadian to win a PBA Tour title (2016 PBA Players Championship), repeated as the Central Region Player of the Year after finishing in the top five in six of 13 tournaments, including winning one title. Kyle Cook of Centerville, Ohio, captured Rookie of the Year honors after posting three top-five finishes including his first title. Harry Sullins of Chesterfield Twp., Mich., ended Brian Kretzer's two-year hold on Senior Player of the Year, claiming that honor for the third time himself after winning a pair of titles and finishing in the top five on two other occasions. Bill Wammes of Bowling Green, Ohio, was recipient of the region's Pat Patterson Award.

MIDWEST – PBA Tour player AJ Johnson of Oswego, Ill., retained the PBA Midwest Region Player of the Year award after a first-, second- and third-place season. Chicago's Dakota Vostry won Rookie of the Year honors, cashing in six of 11 events with a season-best fifth-place finish. Jeff Johnson of Freeport, Ill., won Senior Player of the Year honors after posting four top-five finishes, including one title, in eight events. Kevin Kullman of Lockport, Ill., repeated as the Midwest's Pat Patterson Award recipient.

SOUTHWEST – Two of the PBA's Tour Canadian stars, Francois Lavoie and Mitch Hupé, won the Southwest Region's top honors. Lavoie repeated as Player of the Year after winning a pair of titles and posting two additional top-five finishes. Hupé, a Wichita State University alum like Lavoie, earned Rookie of the Year cashed in four of five events with a fifth-place finish. Beaumont, Texas proprietor and PBA Hall of Famer Mark Williams won the region's Senior Player of the Year honors along with the Southwest Pat Patterson Award.

WEST – The fourth native Canadian to impact the PBA Regional program was Quebec's Ray Lussier, now living in San Jose, Calif., who won both Player and Rookie of the Year honors after winning his first PBA Regional title and posting two second-place finishes. Ron Mohr of Las Vegas won West Region Senior Player of the Year honors for the fourth time after second- and third-place finishes in a limited schedule of five events. Joe Goldstein Jr. of San Bruno, Calif., was awarded the Pat Patterson Award.

NORTHWEST – In addition to Butturff's third straight Northwest Player of the Year award, Tanner Spacey of Burian, Wash., recorded second- and five-place finishes in the four tournaments he entered to earn Rookie of the Year honors. PBA Tour and PBA50 Tour veteran Hugh Miller of Mercer Island, Wash., repeated as PBA50 Player of the Year after one win and two other top-five finishes in three events. Darron Stanley of Vancouver, Wash., was selected as the Pat Patterson Award recipient.

The PBA's regional program, founded in 1970, provides bowlers with a proving ground to develop their skills in high-level competition against some of the sport's established stars. The PBA Regional program annually conducts roughly 150 events across the nation and in its Japan Region.

Mookie Betts, Tommy Jones Win CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitational

American League's top player in 2018 achieves another goal in third Chris Paul benefit appearance

CONROE, Texas – Boston Red Sox star Mookie Betts was still in the midst of celebrating a stunning baseball season in which he won almost every key award possible, including helping his team to a World Series victory. But stuck in the back of his mind was the fact that in two previous appearances, he and his Professional Bowlers Association partners had finished second in NBA star Chris Paul's annual CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitationals.

Betts was determined to end that streak, and in the 10th anniversary CP3 benefit bowling event that aired on FOX on Sunday just ahead of the Super Bowl, Betts found his stroke just in time as he and 18-time PBA Tour titlist Tommy Jones rolled to a convincing 101-86 victory over 2017 CP3 champions Pete Weber and Pro Football Hall of Famer Terrell Owens in the modified five-frame title match at Bowlero at the Woodlands.

"I finally got one," Betts said after hoisting his Heisman-style trophy. "Now I'm going to enjoy it and get ready for baseball."

The doubles competition involved a modified five-frame format in which the PBA partner bowled the sixth, eighth and 10th frames while the celebrity bowled the seventh and ninth frames.

Betts, a life-long bowler who has demonstrated his skills on the lanes as a competitor in the PBA World Series of Bowling twice – including bowling a 300 game in the 2017 WSOB – made a key speed adjustment in his delivery just in time to give Jones the help he needed. The 2018 American League MVP, batting champion, defensive player of the year, etc., thrilled the crowd inside Bowlero when he converted the challenging 2-10 split in his first frame of the doubles competition. Jones led off with a strike and then sandwiched two more strikes around Betts' 10 pin spare conversion to record a 100-84 decision over Australia's Jason Belmonte and NASCAR champion Aric Almirola in their opening match.

"I was just throwing the ball too hard but I figured it out," Betts said. "It was fun. I don't think Tommy missed, so I kinda rode his back."

In the semifinal round, Betts struck in both of his frames, providing key support especially after Jones left a 4-10 split that he failed to convert in his second frame. Betts and Jones advanced to the title match with a 116-72 decision over the split-plagued team of Big Brother star Tyler Crispen and his PBA partner, Kyle Troup.

Betts again made a key contribution in the final match, following Jones' first-frame strike with one of his own, and when Jones struck again, the outcome was all but decided after Weber and Owens started their game with back-to-back splits and open frames.

"The charity is first and foremost, but the competition is fun too, and seeing guys from other sports, different backgrounds and other professions, all coming together to play one sport is definitely fun. But I don't like to lose; you never like to lose, so I'm glad we won this time."

The 10th anniversary Super Bowl Sunday special, benefitting the Chris Paul Family Foundation, again featured a field of well-known athletes including a guest appearance by Houston Texans superstar defensive end J.J. Watt; a supporting cast of PBA stars and an opportunity for Teen Masters age-group winners Brandon and Justin Bohn, Tom Hankey Jr. and Jenna Williams, and collegiate All-American Gazmine Mason to rub elbows with the celebrity stars.

"We have a lot of great guys who come out for this event," Paul said. "When Mookie doesn't strike, we're surprised, but this is the first year he's won it so that shows that even if guys might be better players, when you get out here, things happen. It's a whole lot of fun."

The 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season and the race to the PBA Playoffs heats up with back-to-back major championships (and Tier 1 points events), beginning with the PBA Tournament of Champions at AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio, Feb. 4-10, followed by the PBA Players Championship, Feb. 12-17, at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl in Columbus, Ohio. Jason Belmonte Averages 235 After Two Rounds

to Lead PBA Tournament of Champions

FAIRLAWN, Ohio (Feb. 6, 2019) – Australia's Jason Belmonte began his quest for a record-tying 10th PBA Tour major title by averaging 235 after two rounds Wednesday to lead the PBA Tournament of Champions at AMF Riviera Lanes.

Finishing second after the first round earlier Wednesday with a 1,451 six-game pinfall total, the 35-yearold two-hander, who owns two Tournament of Champions titles, came back with a 1,373 pinfall in the second round to finish the day with 2,824 overall for 12 games.

The four-time PBA Player of the Year and 18-time PBA Tour titlist bowled games of 225, 247, 245, 215, 214 and 227 in the second round of the first major of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

"I'm really striving to get a good roll on the ball and keep the shape of my ball rolling down the lane smooth," Belmonte said. "I wanted to get the ball down the lane without a lot of sharp moves which I think helped my strike percentage."

For Belmonte, a third TOC title would also tie him with Jason Couch and Mike Durbin for most wins in PBA's signature tournament that requires a player to have a PBA title to compete.

"I don't want to be cliché, but my job is to bowl as good as I possibly can and the wins and trophies will come," Belmonte added. "We're only a third of the way through the tournament at this point but I'm looking at it from the perspective as more opportunity to bowl even better."

Belmonte holds a 97-pin lead over Matt Ogle of Louisville, Ky., in second with a 2,727 pinfall and Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., in third with 2,698. Ogle and Rash teamed up to win the PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship in January. It was Rash's 13th tour win and Ogle's first.

Rounding out the top five were 2018 PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson of Holly, Mich., who finished the day in fourth with 2,693 and four-time PBA Tour winner Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., who finished fifth with 2,690.

The entire field returns Thursday for the third qualifying round at 11 a.m. ET. The field will then be cut to the top 24 players who will advance to the first eight-game match play round Thursday at 6 p.m. Match play continues Friday with rounds at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. that will determine the top five players who will advance to Sunday's live stepladder finals on FOX at 4:30 p.m.

Belmonte Extends Lead, Tops 24 Players Heading Into PBA Tournament of Champions Match Play

FAIRLAWN, Ohio – As the PBA Tournament of Champions leader after Wednesday's second round Australia's Jason Belmonte was looking for opportunities to bowl even better and it seems he found them. The two-time Tournament of Champions winner extended his lead after Thursday's third qualifying round with a 4,279 18-game pinfall total (237 average) to lead 24 players who advanced to the match play portion of the tournament this evening at AMF Riviera Lanes.

Belmonte, who bowled games of 242, 277, 190, 240, 238 and 268 in the third round extended his lead to 225 pins over Sean Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, in second with a 4,054 pinfall.

Rounding out the top five after qualifying were 2016 PBA Player of the Year and 2017 TOC winner EJ Tackett, 4,046; Josh Blanchard, 4,043, and 2018 PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson, 4,029. PBA Lubbock Sports Open winner Dick Allen and 18-time tour and 2007 TOC winner Tommy Jones tied for 23rd to take the final match play spots with 3,862.

With support from his Avon Lake High School bowling team, Chris Loschetter, who is an assistant coach for the team, jumped from 33rd after the second round to 17th bowling games of 211, 186, 245, 220, 261 and 254 in the third round.

The 30-plus member Avon Lake team made a field trip to the TOC to see the second day of competition. "I'd like to say it was all for me but this was an opportunity for our players to see the greatest bowlers in the world," Loschetter said. "It's one thing for us as coaches to teach the game but for young bowlers to have the opportunity to see what we teach them at the highest level is an invaluable experience." "This is as much fun as I've had bowling in a long time," Loschetter added. "I don't know if I would have made it to this point without their support."

The first match play round gets underway at 6 p.m. ET. Match play continues Friday with rounds at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. that will determine the top five players who will advance to Sunday's live stepladder finals on FOX at 4:30 p.m.

Belmonte Extends Lead After Strong Finish in

PBA Tournament of Champions First Match Play Round

FAIRLAWN, Ohio (Feb. 7, 2019) – Dominating after three rounds of qualifying and compiling a 6-2 record in Thursday's first match play round, two-hander Jason Belmonte of Australia extended his lead in the PBA Tournament of Champions at AMF Riviera Lanes.

The two-time Tournament of Champions winner, who is trying for a record-tying 10th career major title in the first major of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, finished with a 6,226 26-game pinfall total, which includes 30 bonus pins for each match play win. He leads seven-time tour winner Dom Barrett of England, who also posted a 6-2 record but still finished 264 pins behind in second with 5,962.

Belmonte, a four-time PBA Player of the Year, had wins with games of 247, 201, 205, 196, 278 and 268 while losing with games of 205 and 157 in the middle of the round.

"There were definitely some things we saw in this first match play round we didn't see in qualifying," said Belmonte, who owns 18 career tour titles. "What you're going to typically see going forward is guys get out to a good start after the first one or two games, then who you bowl each match is really going to influence the adjustments you make from there.

"I definitely got caught in a couple games mainly because I didn't expect to see how drastically the lanes were changing," Belmonte added. "It was looking like I was going to be happy with a few wins and call it a day, but fortunately, I really executed the last two games."

If Belmonte can win the Tournament of Champions, he would tie PBA Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony for the all-time PBA majors record. A third Tournament of Champions win would also tie him with Jason Couch and Mike Durbin for most wins in PBA's signature event that requires a player to be a PBA champion to compete.

Finishing the day in third was 12-time tour titlist and 2017 Tournament of Champions winner EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., who had a 4-4 match play record and 5,942 pinfall.

Two-time tour winner Michael Machuga of Erie, Pa., surged from 14th after the final qualifying round to fourth after posting a 5-3 record and finishing with a 5,926 pinfall. Also making a big move after qualifying was Jake Peters of Henderson, Nev., who moved from 13th after qualifying to fifth with a 6-2 record and 5,912 pinfall.

Match play continues Friday with eight-game rounds at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. ET that will determine the top five players who will advance to Sunday's live stepladder finals on FOX at 4:30 p.m.

The Tournament of Champions will be the first tournament of the season to offer a \$1 million bonus if a player can bowl a 300 game in the title match of the finals.

PBA UNVEILS EXPANDED LIBRARY OF LANE CONDITIONING PATTERNS

The PBA has unveiled an expanded library of defined lane conditioning patterns for 2019 in order to create a more diverse series of challenges for PBA competition at all levels.

The PBA's well-known library of "animal patterns" that were introduced in the early 2000s include the Bear 41, Chameleon 39, Cheetah 33, Scorpion 42, Shark 48, Viper 36, Wolf 32 and Dragon 45. The numerical designation indicates the length in feet that oil is applied to the lane for each pattern.

The PBA also has a robust series of "legends" patterns named in honor of several of the PBA's greatest hall of famers. The new "legend" patterns introduced for 2019 include the **Billy Hardwick** 44, **Del Ballard** 34, **Mike Aulby** 38 and **Marshall Holman** 41. They join the list of previously introduced legends patterns that include the **Carmen Salvino** 44, **Dick Weber** 45, **Don Carter** 39, **Don Johnson** 40, **Earl Anthony** 43, **Johnny Petraglia** 37 and **Mark Roth** 42. The PBA also has a **Chris Paul** 42 pattern that has been used for the annual CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitational.

The entire library of oiling patterns can be found on <u>pba.com</u> (<u>https://www.pba.com/OilPatterns</u>). Click on the "plus" sign beside the title of each pattern to view a colored diagram of the pattern.

"Each PBA lane pattern presents a different challenge for our players," said PBA Deputy Commissioner **Kirk von Krueger**. "Our lane maintenance team has created the library of patterns to provide our staff and tournament hosts with a variety of scoring environments which will test the versatility of our players, whether in PBA Tour, PBA Regional or PBA50 competition."

The Don Johnson 40 pattern is currently in use in the PBA Tournament of Champions. In addition to using specific patterns for certain events, the PBA Tour also is using "mixed patterns" for select events in 2019, where two different patterns will be used for qualifying rounds along with applying one of the two patterns to the left lane and the other to the right lane for other rounds in the tournament. The recently-completed Lubbock Sports Open, for example, used the Wolf 32 and Scorpion 32 patterns; the upcoming Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open will use the Aulby 38 and Weber 45 patterns.

Belmonte Will Bowl for 10th Major Title as Top Qualifier for

PBA Tournament of Champions Stepladder Finals

Marshall Kent, EJ Tackett, Josh Blanchard and Sean Lavery-Spahr will join Belmonte

for Sunday's live FOX finals telecast of first major of the season

FAIRLAWN, Ohio (Feb. 8, 2019) – As top qualifier for the stepladder finals of the 54th PBA Tournament of Champions, four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia will have to win one match in Sunday's live FOX telecast for his 10th PBA Tour major which would tie him for the majors record with PBA Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony.

The finals telecast will air Sunday on FOX at 4:30 p.m. ET from AMF Riviera Lanes.

The 35-year-old two-hander compiled a 16-8 match play record and 10,097 42-game pinfall total, including match play bonus pins, at the end of Friday's final match play round to finish 224 pins ahead of four-time tour winner Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., who qualified second for the finals with a 9,873 pinfall and 18-6 match play record.

"When you have a big lead you can get complacent so my goal was just to keep a good steady pace," said Belmonte, who averaged 229 for the tournament. "If I could just bowl some solid 220s or 230s and win a few matches along the way, the other guys were going to have to shoot 250s and 260s consistently to catch me and that's hard to do."

For Belmonte and his opponent in the title match there will be more on the line than winning a major title as the Tournament of Champions will be the first of four tournaments during the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season that will pay a \$1 million bonus if a player bowls a 300 game in the title match.

Belmonte will also be trying for his third Tournament of Champions title, which would tie him with Jason Couch and Mike Durbin for most titles in PBA's signature tournament that requires a player to own a PBA title to compete. Belmonte, who finished fourth in 2018, won the Tournament of Champions back-to-back in 2014 and 2015.

"I just have to do my job to the best of my ability, hit my target and bowl the 10 best possible frames I can," Belmonte said. "The priority is to win the tournament, but hopefully I can start with at least a few strikes to make it exciting."

The 26-year-old Kent will be making his first telecast appearance of 2019 and will be trying for his first major title.

Also making his first telecast appearance of the season, 26-year-old EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., a 12time tour winner including the 2017 Tournament of Champions, won his last seven matches of the final eight-game match play round Friday to take the No. 3 seed for the finals. The 2016 PBA Player of the Year finished with a 14-10 match play record and 9,766 pinfall.

Qualifying fourth for the finals and trying for his first major was three-time tour winner 31-year-old Josh Blanchard of Mesa, Ariz., with a 13-10-1 match play record and 9,658 pinfall.

Sean Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, who qualified fifth for the finals will try to duplicate what 2018 Tournament of Champions winner Matt O'Grady did last season and that is qualify for the tournament through a pre-tournament qualifier, advance through the qualifying and match play rounds, and then win all four stepladder matches for the title. The 28-year-old Lavery-Spahr, who owns four PBA regional titles, had a 10-13-1 record and 9,608 pinfall.

Belmonte Wins PBA Tournament of Champions for 10th Major to Tie Weber and Anthony on All-time Majors List

Belmonte beats EJ Tackett 225-196 in title match to also win record-tying third Tournament of Champions title

FAIRLAWN, Ohio (Feb. 10, 2019) – Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte won his third PBA Tournament of Champions title Sunday to record his 10th PBA Tour major title, tying him with Hall of Famers Pete Weber and the late Earl Anthony for first on the all-time major titles list.

The 35-year-old Belmonte defeated 2017 Tournament of Champions winner EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., 225-196, in the title match of PBA's signature tournament at AMF Riviera Lanes to also tie Hall of Famers Jason Couch and Mike Durbin for most Tournament of Champions titles. Belmonte, a four-time PBA Player of the Year, had previous Tournament of Champions wins back-to-back in 2014 and 2015.

"It's madness," said Belmonte, who was top qualifier for the stepladder finals. "To work so hard at your craft means the world to be here at this moment. "It hasn't completely sunk in and to have my name next to Pete and Earl is an overwhelming feeling right now.

"Never in my wildest dreams did I think I would achieve this," he added. "It doesn't seem real to have my name on that list with two of the greatest bowlers of all time."

In the title match, Belmonte started with the first four strikes before leaving a 10 pin in the fifth frame, which he missed. Despite the open frame, Belmonte held a 19-pin lead and Tackett could not take advantage of the opportunity to mount a challenge.

The Tournament of Champions also offered a \$1 million bonus if a player bowled a 300 game in the title match.

"I started off with five good shots and was pretty calm for the most part," Belmonte said. "I did feel the nerves on that spare shot and rushed it. I pride myself on making 10 pins, but my heart was racing and I think I was trying a little too hard to get that frame over with."

Belmonte, who won his 19th career tour title, also became the youngest to win 10 major titles. Anthony won his 10th major at 46 and Weber won the 2013 Tournament of Champions for his 10th major at 50. It also took Belmonte 12 years since becoming a PBA member in 2008 to win 10 majors which is also a record. It took Anthony 16 years and Weber 35 years.

Tackett, who was trying for his 13th career title and third major, qualified third for the finals and won matches against three-time tour winner Josh Blanchard of Mesa, Ariz., 264-236, in the second match, and No. 2 qualifier four-time tour winner Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., 238-192, in the semifinal match to advance to the title match against Belmonte.

In the opening stepladder match, Blanchard beat Sean Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, 190-180, to advance to the second match against Tackett. Lavery-Spahr, a four-time PBA regional winner who qualified fifth for the finals, earned his spot in the Tournament of Champions field through a pre-tournament qualifier.

It won't be long before Belmonte will have an opportunity to break the majors record when the Go Bowling! PBA Tour travels to Columbus, Ohio for the season's second major – the PBA Players Championship – Feb. 12-17 at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl.

"Now that I've won 10 I can't wait to get to 11," Belmonte said. "If I get to 11, I'll be able to put my total focus on bowling and not so much on about the records."

The \$ 1 million bonus title match bonus remains in effect for the Players Championship stepladder finals which will be televised live on FS1 Feb. 17 at 1 p.m. ET.

COLUMBUS, Ohio – Two-hander Jason Belmonte rocketed out of the gate in his pursuit to win a record 11th career PBA major title by firing a 1,508 six-game first round pinfall total (251 average) Wednesday to lead the first round of the PBA Players Championship at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl. Smallwood defeated Belmonte 259-239 in the title match of the 2018 Players Championship for his second major and third career tour title.

After this evening's second qualifying round at 5 p.m. ET, qualifying continues with the third round at 10 a.m. on Thursday with a cut to the top 24 players advancing to the first match play round Thursday at 6 p.m. Match play continues Friday with rounds at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. which will determine the top five players for Sunday's live stepladder finals on FS1 at 1 p.m. ET.

Belmonte is also trying to become the first three-time winner of the Players Championship. The 2011 and 2017 winner currently shares the lead with Dennis Horan, Dave Ferraro and Steve Hoskins.

Belmonte Has Strong Start After Two Rounds

To Take PBA Players Championship Lead

COLUMBUS, Ohio (Feb. 13, 2019) – Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte got off to a strong start in his bid to win a record 11th career PBA major title, averaging 234 after two rounds Wednesday to lead the PBA Players Championship at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl.

The 35-year-old Belmonte finished with a 2,817 12-game pinfall total, firing 1,508 in the first six-game round earlier in the day with games of 268, 279, 267, 245, 231 and 218, followed by 1,309 in the second round with games of 232, 209, 214, 204, 193 and 257.

"The lanes got really tricky starting at the end of the first round," said the 19-time tour winner. "The friction was really building up in the middle of the lane, so it was time to make an adjustment. You had to go way right or way left. My strength is moving left so that's what I did.

"At this point in the tournament I'm not trying to necessarily shoot 260 every game," he added. "The guys are playing the lanes quite a bit differently, so you just have to find that part of the lane where you can be most effective."

Belmonte is also trying for his second consecutive major title on the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour, after winning his third PBA Tournament of Champions title last Sunday. He is also trying to become the first three-time winner of the Players Championship.

Belmonte holds a 50-pin lead over defending champion Tom Smallwood of Saginaw Mich., in second with 2,767. Smallwood, a three-time tour winner defeated Belmonte 259-239 in the title match of the 2018 Players Championship for his second major and third career tour title.

Coming off a third-place finish in the Tournament of Champions, four-time tour winner Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., finished third after two rounds with 2,723.

Qualifying continues with the third round at 10 a.m. on Thursday with a cut to the top 24 players who will advance to the first match play round at 6 p.m. Match play continues Friday with rounds at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. which will determine the top five players for Sunday's live stepladder finals on FS1 at 1 p.m. ET.

The Players Championship will offer a \$1 million bonus if a player can bowl a 300 game in Sunday's title match.

2018 Champion Jakob Butturff Heads Field for PBA's Go Bowling! Indianapolis Open

Changes in store as Woodland Bowl hosts another big event on 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule

He trailed only Jason Belmonte, the two-hander from Australia who won a PBA record-tying 10th major championship in the PBA Tournament of Champions on Sunday in Fairlawn, Ohio, and carried his hot streak into this week's PBA Players Championship in Columbus, Ohio, where he's trying for sole possession of the all-time major titles record.

Trailing Belmonte is Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., who won the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship with Matt Ogle of Louisville, Ky.; finished second in the Lubbock Sports Open and placed ninth in last week's TOC.

LIVE TOC TELECAST ON FOX AGAIN POSTS GREAT AUDIENCE TOTALS

Sunday's live FOX telecast of the PBA Tournament of Champions finals from AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio, averaged 1,131,000 viewers over the course of two hours, according to Nielsen Media Research figures released this week. The audience was 75% larger than last year's 646,000 viewers and ranks as the most-watched non-NFL adjacent PBA telecast since 2010.

Sunday's show, which featured **Jason Belmonte**'s PBA record-tying 10th major championship, also hit a peak of 1.301 million viewers during the championship match according to Nielsen's figures. Belmonte defeated **EJ Tackett**, 225-196, to tie PBA Hall of Famers **Earl Anthony** and **Pete Weber**, the only other players in PBA history to win 10 major championships.

The 2019 telecast drew the largest audience for a live PBA Tour finals telecast since the historic 2010 PBA Tournament of Champions when **Kelly Kulick** won the PBA Tournament of Champions at Red Rock Bowling Center in Las Vegas to become the first woman ever to win a PBA Tour title.

Through seven events since the PBA on FOX series began, 12,281,000 viewers have tuned-in to watch the PBA on FOX, FS1 or FS2 including repeats, which is up 56% over last year's total audience through seven events (7,891,000) and 13% higher than the total audience for the entire 2018 season (10,907,000).

Belmonte will try for sole possession of the major titles record this week in the PBA Players Championship which is underway at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl in Columbus, Ohio. The finals will air live on FOX Sport's FS1 channel Sunday at 1 p.m. Eastern.

JASON BELMONTE JUMPS INTO PBA PLAYOFFS POINTS LEAD WITH TOC VICTORY

With his victory Sunday in the PBA Tournament of Champions – the first Tier 1 event on the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule – **Jason Belmonte** jumped from 10th place into the 2019 PBA Playoffs points lead with 11,050 points.

Under the new PBA competition points structure in play this season, a win in a Tier 1 (major championship) event is worth 7,500 points – triple the value of the base points total for a victory (2,500 points) in a Tier 3 (limited entry and/or modified format) tournament. Tier 2 (standard PBA Tour) events award double the Tier 3 points.

Previous points leader **Jakob Butturff** slipped to third place with 8,645 points after finishing 48th in the TOC while **Sean Rash** moved into second place with 8,885 points after his eighth-place finish in Fairlawn. Rounding out the top eight heading into the PBA Players Championship – another Tier 1 major championship event – were TOC runner-up **EJ Tackett** (8,610), **Dick Allen** (6,950), **Bill O'Neill** (5,310), **Jesper**

Svensson (5,145), and **Kyle Troup** (4,700). Right behind Troup are **Marshall Kent** (4,620) and **Dom Barrett** (4,610).

Finishing in the top eight as of the end of the USBC Masters on April 1 is important because those players will earn a first-round bye in the new single-elimination PBA Playoffs. Finishing in the top 24 is a necessity to qualify for a place in the Playoffs. Belmonte Recovers From Slow Start in First Match Play Round

to Regain Lead in PBA Players Championship

COLUMBUS, Ohio (Feb. 14, 2019) – After losing his first two matches and falling as far down as seventh, Australia's Jason Belmonte finished strong by posting a 5-3 record to regain his lead after the first match play round of the PBA Players Championship Thursday at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl.

Trying for a record 11th PBA major title, Belmonte finished the day with a 6,124 26-game pinfall total, which includes 30 bonus pins for each match win, to hold a 127-pin lead over defending champion Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Mich., in second who had a 6-2 match play record and 5,997 pinfall.

Smallwood beat Belmonte 259-239 in the title match of the 2018 Players Championship for his second major and third career tour title.

Belmonte, who won the PBA Tournament of Champions last Sunday for his 10th major to tie Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony for first on the all-time list, won with games of 257, 225, 268, 289 and 249 and lost with games of 186, 205 and 186 in the first match play round.

"I got off to a bad start because I was playing the lanes the way I wanted to play them and not the way the conditions dictated I should play them," said the two-time Players Championship winner. "I was having trouble getting the big games down the stretch, but fortunately, I was able to get a run at the end of the round.

"Generally, the lanes are playing tight down lane and there's not enough friction to get a consistent roll into the pocket," Belmonte, a four-time PBA Player of the Year added. "You just have to learn from your experience throughout the tournament and pull out whatever tricks you can to get the ball to the pocket consistently." Four-time PBA Tour winner Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, rode 6-1-1 record and averaged 233.5 in the first match play round to surge from 21st into third with a 5,959 pinfall. Simonsen, who became the youngest to win a major when he won the 2016 USBC Masters at age 19, is trying for his second major title.

PBA Hall of Famer Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, compiled a 7-1 record and 5,905 pinfall to move into fourth while Brad Miller of Lees Summitt, Mo., finished the day in fifth with a 4-4 record in match play and 5,893 pinfall.

Match play continues Friday with rounds at 11 a.m. and 6 p.m. ET which will determine the top five players for Sunday's live stepladder finals on FS1 at 1 p.m. ET. The Players Championship, the second major of the Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, will offer a \$1 million bonus if a player can bowl a 300 game in Sunday's title match.

Belmonte Will Try for Record 11th PBA Major Title as Top Seed

For PBA Players Championship Finals

Simonsen, Archer, Tackett and Troup also qualify for stepladder finals in second major of

2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season which will air Sunday at 1 p.m. ET on FS1

COLUMBUS, Ohio (Feb. 15, 2019) – For the second consecutive week, Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte will have the opportunity to make bowling history as he tries for a record 11th PBA major title from the top seed of the PBA Players Championship stepladder finals.

The 35-year-old Belmonte earned the top seed for Sunday's finals after finishing with a 17-7 overall match play record and 10,183 42-game pinfall total Friday at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl.

The finals will air live on FS1 Sunday at 1 p.m. ET and will carry with it a \$1 million bonus if Belmonte or his opponent can bowl a 300 game in the title match.

Belmonte, who averaged 230 and led all six rounds of the tournament, won last week's PBA Tournament of Champions for his 10th major to tie Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony on the all-time majors list.

A win in the Players Championship would also make the four-time PBA Player of the Year the event's first three-time winner. He's currently tied with Dave Ferraro, Dennis Horan and Steve Hoskins with two Players Championship titles.

"I really feel like I know where the ball is going every single frame," said Belmonte, who earned his third consecutive top seed in the Players Championship. "These past couple weeks are probably some of the best weeks I've ever bowled in my life. It's really nice when you feel like you are physically executing and the pins are also falling."

"I'd love to get 11 now, just get it out of the way and done, and that's exactly what my game plan is going to be," Belmonte added. "I want to come out, throw the exact same shots I've been throwing all week and hopefully I'll raise the crown again."

Belmonte, who is also trying for his 20th career tour title, is one of three players who use the unique twohanded delivery to make the finals.

Coming all the way from 21st heading into Thursday's first match play round, two-hander Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, posted a 17-6-1 record and finished with a 10,014 pinfall to earn the No. 2 seed for the finals.

The 22-year-old Simonsen, who became the youngest player to win a major when he won the 2016 USBC Masters at age 19, is trying for his second major and sixth career tour title.

Another Texan, two-time tour winner DJ Archer of Spring, Texas, who is trying for his first major, compiled an 18-5-1 match play record and 9,763 pinfall to qualify third for the finals.

EJ Tackett, of Bluffton, Ind., will try for his third major and 13th career tour title from the No. 4 seed after finishing with a 15-9 record and 9,744 pinfall.

Tackett finished second in last week's Tournament of Champions after losing to Belmonte 225-196 in the title match.

Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., the third two-hander to make the finals field, qualified fifth for the finals with a 12-12 match play record and 9,736 pinfall.

In sixth heading into the final position round match, Troup, a three-time tour winner, earned his way into the finals with a 246-192 win over 2018 Players Championship winner Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Mich., who ended up finishing seventh.

Simonsen Wins PBA Players Championship to Become Youngest to Win Two PBA Major Titles

Simonsen denies Belmonte a record 11th PBA major title by winning championship match 232-212 for sixth career tour title

COLUMBUS, Ohio (Feb. 17, 2019) – Anthony Simonsen, a 22-year-old two-hander from Little Elm Texas, won the PBA Players Championship Sunday to become the youngest player to win two PBA major titles, while denying Australia's Jason Belmonte a record 11th career major crown.

In a battle between two players who use a two-handed delivery, Simonsen, the No. 2 qualifier for the stepladder finals, beat No. 1 qualifier Belmonte 232-212 in the title match at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl for his sixth career title.

The 35-year-old Belmonte, who was also trying for his second consecutive major title after winning last week's PBA Tournament of Champions, held a three-pin lead in the fifth frame of the title match when Simonsen left a 4-6-7-9-10 split after being distracted by a cell phone. Both players then threw strikes from the sixth through the ninth frames but Belmonte left the door open for Simonsen when he left a pocket 7-10 split on the first shot of the 10th frame.

"I had to reset after I heard the cell phone but it really just came down to a bad shot," said Simonsen about his first ball in the fifth frame. "I was still confident I could refocus, get back to throwing good shots and execute the way I needed to.

"I was fortunate to get the momentum back and be able to keep the pressure on Jason," Simonsen added. "I had the feeling that if he didn't strike at some point, I could take advantage of the opportunity."

PBA Hall of Famer Billy Hardwick held the previous record for youngest to win two majors when he won the 1965 Tournament of Champions for his second major title at 23 years and 259 days.

Simonsen, whose Players Championship win was his sixth career tour title, became the youngest player to win a PBA Tour major when he won the 2016 USBC Masters at age 19.

"To have a second major at this point in my career, I'm speechless," Simonsen said. "Jason is the guy everyone is gunning for and as a fellow two-hand player, he's an inspiration."

For Belmonte, who was also trying for a 20th career title, the 7-10 in the 10th frame was his second of the match after also leaving one in the fourth frame.

"I threw the ball the way I wanted to," said the four-time PBA Player of the Year. "This game has its good breaks and bad breaks and they just didn't go my way this time."

Belmonte won last week's Tournament of Champions for his 10th major title to tie Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony for first on the all-time majors list.

A win for Belmonte would have also made him the first to win three Players Championship titles. He won in 2011 and 2017 and joins Dave Ferraro, Dennis Horan, and Steve Hoskins as two-time winners of the event.

The stepladder finals started with two-hander and three-time tour winner Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., beating EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., who was trying for his third major and 13th career tour title, 255-245.

Troup then threw three strikes in the 10th frame of the second match to beat two-time tour winner and No. 3 qualifier DJ Archer of Spring, Texas, 194-193, to advance to the semifinal against Simonsen. Simonsen dominated the semifinal, beating Troup 259-202 to advance to the title match against Belmonte.

The 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour travels to Woodland Bowl in Indianapolis for the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open Feb. 19-24. The \$1 million title match bonus will again be in effect if a player can bowl a 300 game in the title match of the stepladder finals which will be televised live on FS1 Feb. 24 at 3 p.m. ET.

BJ Moore Averages 248 to Move into Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open Lead

Nine-year PBA member advances from 10th to first in bid for his first PBA Tour title

INDIANAPOLIS (Feb. 20, 2019) – BJ Moore, a nine-year PBA member from Greensburg, Pa., who is trying for his first PBA Tour title, averaged an impressive 248 during his second qualifying round Wednesday to advance from 10th place into the lead in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open at Woodland Bowl.

"I was kind of the pace car in the morning round, but I figured I could do something different in the night block and everything kind of fell into place for me."

The pursuit of his first PBA Tour title isn't something Moore is dwelling on, but it remains a goal.

"I've been close a couple of times," he said. "It's more of a process for me, applying things I've learned. It's a roller coaster, but my ball reps have helped me a lot, especially with my mental game. I'll just have to keep after it."

19-time PBA Tour titlist holds 52 pins lead over 2018 Indianapolis winner Jakob Butturff

INDIANAPOLIS (Feb. 21, 2019) – Australia's Jason Belmonte has demonstrated time and again that once he figures out how to attack the lanes, other PBA players have a difficult time keeping up. He did it again Thursday when he charged into the lead in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open, and held on despite an up-and-down fourth round.

Belmonte, the 35-year-old two-handed player and four-time PBA Player of the Year, averaged 247.8 for his final six qualifying games on the mixed lane conditioning environment at Woodland Bowl Thursday morning to overtake second-round leader BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pa. He then retained his lead in Thursday evening's first round of match play, winning five of his eight matches and maintaining a 230.6 average for the tournament, finishing a rocky evening round with a 26-game total of 6,146 pins, including match play bonus pins, for a 52-pin lead over defending Indianapolis champion Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz.

All rounds of the tournament are being contested on a mixed lane conditioning environment where the Dick Weber 45 oiling pattern is applied to the left lane and the Mike Aulby 38 oiling pattern is applied to the right lane. The numerical designation refers to the length in feet oil is applied to each lane.

"Pair to pair tonight was night-and-day, especially when you are dealing with a dual oiling pattern," Belmonte said. "You're trying to find a way to strike, but you have nothing to guide you because the two lanes are so different. It'll take your two or three shots on each lane to figure it out, and by then the game's half over, so you have to take your poison, make your spares and go from there."

Belmonte won his 19th PBA Tour title two weeks ago when he won the PBA Tournament of Champions in Fairlawn, Ohio, for a record-tying 10th major title, matching Earl Anthony and Pete Weber for the most career PBA major titles. Last week he finished second in the PBA Players Championship, another major, after leading all week. In Indianapolis, he has continued to bowl with a high level of confidence and it's again producing positive results.

"It's a culmination of some changes I've made in my physical and mental game," he said. "When you have confidence in your physical game, it helps you mentally, and when your mental game is good, you tend to make better shots. When you put a lot of work in, it really feels good when you're able to put it all together on the biggest stage."

Rounding out the top five after four rounds were Moore with 5,965 pins; Wes Malott, Pflugerville, Texas, with a 5,886 total, and Tom Daugherty, Riverview, Fla., with 5,874 pins.

The Indianapolis Open, a Tier 2 PBA Playoffs points event, continues with the final two eight-game match play rounds Friday at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. The top five players after 42 games will compete in Sunday's stepladder finals, live on FS1, beginning at 3 p.m. EST.

MARSHALL HOLMAN, AMLETO MONACELLI TO MANAGE "USA VS. THE WORLD" AT WSOB X

With a pair of PBA Hall of Famers guiding them, the USA vs. The World team match will return to the 10th anniversary PBA World Series of Bowling as the fifth consecutive night of WSOB coverage on FOX Sports' FS1 channel. The team match will air on Friday, March 22 at 8 p.m. EST from the historic Thunderbowl Lanes arena in Allen Park, Mich.

Back to manage the two-time defending champion USA team will be PBA Hall of Famer **Marshall Holman.** Under Holman's guidance, the USA won the two most recent matches in 2016 and 2017. ANTHONY SIMONSEN ADVANCES TO FOURTH PLACE IN PBA PLAYOFFS POINTS RACE

Thanks to his victory in the PBA Players Championship Sunday, **Anthony Simonsen** moved into fourth place in the race to qualify for the inaugural PBA Playoffs.

Finishing second in the second Tier 1 event on the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule helped **Jason Belmonte** expand his lead in the 2019 PBA Playoffs points lead to 15,550 points while **EJ Tackett**, moved into second place on the basis of his second straight top five finish in the PBA's first two major championships of the year.

Under the new PBA competition points structure in play this season, a win in a Tier 1 (major championship) event is worth 7,500 points – triple the value of the base points total for a victory (2,500 points) in a Tier 3 (limited entry and/or modified format) tournament. Tier 2 (standard PBA Tour) events award double the Tier 3 points.

Sean Rash dropped one spot to third, Jakob Butturff fell from third to fifth, and Kyle Troup advanced to sixth. Rounding out the top eight heading into the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open (a Tier 2 event) were Dick Allen in seventh place and Bill O'Neill in eighth. Marshall Kent and Jesper Svensson dropped out of the top eight to ninth and 10th, respectively.

The race for the 24th-and-final berth in the PBA Playoffs currently involves Kyle Sherman in 24th with **Darren Tang**, **Patrick Girard** and **Zacharay Wilkins** in hot pursuit.

Finishing in the top eight as of the end of the USBC Masters on April 1 means those players will earn a first-round bye in the single-elimination PBA Playoffs. Finishing in the top 24 is a necessity to qualify for a place in the Playoffs; finishing in the top 40 is required for eligibility to enter the 2019 PBA League Draft. Seventh PBA League Elias Cup finals set for live coverage on FS1 July 16, 17 and 18

PORTLAND, Maine (Feb. 22, 2019) – For the past four years, tournament host Bayside Bowl in Portland has given the PBA League team bowling competition a jolt of electricity because of its exuberant fans and unique location.

Now for the first time, Bayside fans will get a chance to see up close how the 2019 teams take shape when the PBA League Draft is held at Bayside Bowl on Monday, April 8.

The draft will be covered live on FloBowling, PBA's official online live-streaming outlet, beginning at 4 p.m. EDT.

Adding to the drama for the hometown fans, their own Portland Lumberjacks, managed by Tim Mack, will own the first pick by virtue of their last-place finish in the 2018 Elias Cup tournament.

Jason Belmonte Closes Fifth Round with 300 Game, Regains Lead in Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open INDIANAPOLIS – Australia's Jason Belmonte rolled a perfect game to close his fifth round in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open Friday afternoon as he regained the lead going into Friday night's final round of match play.

Belmonte, a 35-year-old two-handed player, is trying to win top qualifying honors for a record-tying third consecutive week. He followed a 166 game that dropped him into third place with his 300. He won four matches and lost four in a roller-coaster round before regaining the lead with a 34-game total of 8,051 pins – 86 pins ahead of Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, who had the lead just one game earlier.

Four players in the PBA's 61-year history have been top qualifier in three consecutive tournaments: Butturff, earlier this year; Earl Anthony, 1976; Johnny Petraglia, 1971, and Walter Ray Williams Jr., 1993.

Jason Belmonte Qualifies No. 1 Again in Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open

Australian two-handed star tops qualifying for record-tying third straight tournament

INDIANAPOLIS (Feb. 22, 2019) – Australia's Jason Belmonte rolled a perfect game to close the fifth round of the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open Friday at Woodland Bowl to take the lead and he continued his torrid pace in the final round to earn top qualifier honors for a record-tying third consecutive tournament.

As the no. 1 qualifier, Belmonte will head the five-player stepladder finals field that will air live on FS1 Sunday at 3 p.m. EST. A win Sunday will give Belmonte his second title of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season and the 20th of his career.

Belmonte, a 35-year-old two-handed player, posted a 16-8 match play record while averaging 229.69 for 42 games to finish with 10,127 pins, 386 pins ahead of PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Fla.

Belmonte became the fifth player in the PBA's 61-year history to lead qualifying in three consecutive tournaments. He joins Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., who accomplished the feat in the 2019 season's first three tournaments; Earl Anthony, who did it in 1976; Johnny Petraglia in 1971, and Walter Ray Williams Jr. in 1993. Petraglia is the only one in the group who won all three tournaments he led.

Belmonte, who won the PBA Tournament of Champions two weeks ago, also led qualifying in the PBA Players Championship last week but lost in the title match to fellow two-hander Anthony Simonsen when he left a pocket 7-10 split in the 10th frame. Regardless of that loss, the Australian star has taken a big lead in the new PBA Playoffs points race and has established himself as an early favorite to win a fifth PBA Player of the Year award.

"We're in the beginning stages of the season," Belmonte said of the Player of the Year idea. "There are a lot of majors coming up. It's way too early. I'm not taking anything for granted."

But tying the record as top qualifier for a third consecutive tournament was another matter.

"Someone told me about that tonight.," he said. "That's pretty cool. It's fun to lead but it's a lot more fun to win the tournaments. It's now a matter of bowling the best game I can on Sunday."

Reinforcing his lead in the PBA Playoffs points race also is a big deal.

"The Playoffs is a huge event for us," he said. "I'm going to miss a few events, so it's important for me to do as well as I can when I have the opportunity. That's my job; that's why I fly around the world, to do the best I can and capitalize on the moment. Now it's one more match. Ten little pins, knock them over 12 times and walk away happy."

Duke, who ranks third on the all-time PBA Tour titles list with 38 – behind only Williams' 47 and Anthony's 43, posted a 14-9-1 match play record and a 9,741 pinfall total. He is trying for his first title since winning the 2015 Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship with partner Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas. Rounding out Sunday's stepladder finals field will be Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Fla., with 9,695 pins; Malott with a 9,672 total, and Rhino Page of Orlando, Fla., with a 9,649 total. All rounds of the Indianapolis Open, a Tier 2 event in the 2019 PBA Playoffs points competition, are being contested on a mixed lane conditioning environment where the Dick Weber 45 oiling pattern is applied to the left lane and the Mike Aulby 38 oiling pattern is applied to the right lane. Norm Duke Wins Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open for 39th Title

PBA Hall of Famer upsets top qualifier Jason Belmonte, 237-219, for first singles title since 2012

INDIANAPOLIS (Feb. 24, 2019) – A month shy of his 55th birthday, PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Fla., defeated top qualifier Jason Belmonte of Australia, 237-219, to win his 39th PBA Tour title in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open Sunday at Woodland Bowl.

Duke, who is third on the all-time PBA Tour titles list behind Walter Ray Williams Jr.'s 47 and Earl Anthony's 43, never trailed after starting the title match with three strikes and then converting the 4-9 split. Belmonte, who entered the finals as the top qualifier for a record-tying third consecutive tournament, kept the match close throughout, but when the Australian two-handed player left the 3-10 split on his first shot of the 10th frame, all Duke needed to clinch was seven pins in his 10th frame.

Duke immediately turned to Belmonte, who led the stepladder qualifiers by nearly 400 pins, and said, "We've been watching you dominate us, and we know it hurts to lose. We've all been through it enough, but I'll never forget this as long as I live."

Duke, who hadn't won a singles title since the 2012 PBA Dick Weber Playoffs – also at Woodland Bowl – said he knew he'd win again. His doubles win with Malott in 2015 also was at Woodland, where he now has had more success than any other PBA player.

"I was in control," Duke said. "I've been there before. I knew what to do. It was hard, but the shot was there and the stepladder format gives you a chance to win, so I'm grateful for that chance.

"I always believed I'd win again," he said. "The first game I ever bowled on television was against Earl Anthony, and I won. In my mind, Jason's the best ever, in spades. I feel for him, because I've been there, but for me, I get to say I bowled Earl, and Walter, and Pete, and I beat 'em all."

Belmonte said, "Today I watched my idol (Duke) bowl the most impressive game against me. I tried my best to keep up, but a few stubborn corner pins...ended my chances. Norm's a treasure."

Duke earned his trip to the title match with a 214-195 victory over his two-time Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship partner, Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, when Malott left a solid 10 pin on his first shot in the 10th frame. Duke's early turkey gave his an 18-pin lead in the fourth frame, but Malott then doubled and chipped away as Duke failed to carry key pocket hits. When Duke left a 10 pin on his last shot in the 10th frame, Malott had a chance to strike out to win by a pin, but failed to carry his first attempt in the 10th.

In the first match, after leaving a 2-8-10 split and failing to convert in the opening frame, Malott reeled off a string of seven strikes and cruised past Rhino Page of Orlando, Fla., 242-192. Malott then rallied to eliminate Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Fla., 174-170, by throwing four strikes in a row to end a match that saw Daugherty leave three splits and Malott four. The difference was Malott's conversion of the 3-4-6-7-10 split in his sixth frame.

Kris Prather Surges into First Round Lead in PBA Jonesboro Open

PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke remains in contention for 40th career title

JONESBORO, Ark. (Feb. 27, 2019) – Kris Prather, a 27-year-old fifth-year PBA member from Plainfield, Ill., averaged 230 Wednesday to take the opening round lead in the PBA Jonesboro Open at Hijinx Family Entertainment in his bid for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title.

PBA Spare Shots

NORM DUKE ADVANCES TO SIXTH IN PBA PLAYOFFS POINTS RACE

By earning 5,000 points for his win Sunday in the Tier 2 Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open, Norm Duke advanced from 34th to sixth place in the race to qualify among the top 24 for the inaugural PBA Playoffs.

Indianapolis runner-up Jason Belmonte continued to expand his lead in the 2019 PBA Playoffs points race with 18,550 points, nearly 7,000 points ahead of EJ Tackett. The top eight, with their points totals (and last week's ranking in parenthesis) are:

1, Jason Belmonte, 18,550 (1); 2, EJ Tackett, 11,590 (2); 3, Sean Rash, 11,210 (3); 4, Jakob Butturff, 10,285 (5); 5, Anthony Simonsen, 10,200 (4); 6, Norm Duke, 8,565 (34); 7, Wes Malott, 8,170 (12); 8, Kyle Troup, 8,150 (6). Marshall Kent retained ninth place with 8,105 points.

The race for the 24th-and-final berth in the PBA Playoffs currently involves Anthony Lavery-Spahr in 24th place with 5,020 points followed by Nick Pate (4,660) and Tom Smallwood (4,620).

Under the new Go Bowling! PBA Tour competition points structure in play this season, a win in a Tier 1 (major championship) event is worth 7,500 points, a Tier 2 (standard PBA Tour tournament) title is worth 5,000 points and a Tier 3 (limited entry and/or modified format tournament) title is worth 2,500 points. There are only five events remaining on the PBA Playoffs schedule after Jonesboro: the Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Champions (all Tier 3 events) and the PBA World Championship (a Tier 1 event) during the PBA World Series of Bowling X, March 11-21, and the USBC Masters (a Tier 1 event) in Las Vegas, March 26-April 1.

Players finishing in the top eight after the USBC Masters ends on April 1 will earn a first-round bye in the PBA Playoffs. Players finishing in the top 24 qualify for a berth in the Playoffs; finishing in the top 40 is required for eligibility to enter the 2019 PBA League Draft. The PBA Playoffs begin on Monday, April 8, with live coverage of the opening Round of 24 matches on FS1 at 7 p.m. EDT from Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

NORM DUKE MOVES UP ON PBA TELEVISION STATS LISTS

With his two match wins in the FS1-televised finals of Sunday's Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open finals, Norm Duke became the third player in PBA history to record 100 wins in nationally-televised matches. Duke now has 101 wins, trailing Walter Ray Williams Jr.'s 154 and Pete Weber's 120.

Duke also broke a tie with Parker Bohn III to take sole possession of third place on the television appearances lists with 116. Williams again is the leader with 177 and Weber is second with 137.

Duke also moved into third place in the career television average list for players with at least 10 TV appearances. Duke's TV average for 116 appearances is 228.97. Ryan Ciminelli is the leader with a 232.05 average for his 19 TV appearances while Roger Bowker is second, averaging 229.17 for his 16 career TV shows.

JASON BELMONTE ON THE BRINK OF JOINING ELITE PBA TOUR 20 TITLES CLUB

With his next Go Bowling! PBA Tour victory, Australia's Jason Belmonte will become the 15th player in PBA history to win 20 PBA Tour titles. Belmonte will join PBA Hall of Famers Dick Ritger, Wayne Webb and Amleto Monacelli on the 20 titles list.

Belmonte, 35, joined the PBA in 2008 and won his first PBA Tour title in the 2009 Bowling Foundation Long Island Classic, leading to his selection as Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year for the 2008-09 season. He became title-eligible for PBA Hall of Fame consideration when he won the first of his four USBC Masters titles in 2013, but he won't be eligible for election until the Class of 2028 when he completes his 20th year of PBA membership.

In the meantime, Belmonte continues to add impressive accomplishments to his portfolio. Most recently:

• He qualified No. 1 in all three Go Bowling! PBA Tour events in February: the PBA Tournament of Champions (which he won); the PBA Players Championship (where he finished second) and the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open (where he also finished second).

• Belmonte, Marshall Kent and Wes Malott were the only players who qualified for match play rounds in all three of those events. All three bowled 126 games in those three events. Belmonte's pinfall total, including match play bonus pins, was 30,407. Kent had 28,979 (1,428 behind Belmo) and Malott had a 28,500 total (1,907 behind the Australian star).

Belmonte's actual average for those three events was 229.65, almost 10 pins ahead of Kent (219.77) and more than 11 pins ahead of Malott (218.21).

• Because Belmonte bypassed the Jonesboro Open in order to spend a week at home in Australia with his family before the PBA World Series of Bowling X, he'll not be able to break his record-tying streak of being top qualifier for three consecutive television finals.

PBA PLAYERS HAVE ONE MORE SHOT AT \$1 MILLION 300 GAME BONUS

The \$1 million bonus offered for a 300 game bowled in the title match of four select Go Bowling! PBA Tour events thus far in 2019 has gone unclaimed, but players will have one more chance: in the PBA World Championship telecast on Thursday, March 21, at 8 p.m. EDT on FS1.

And because no one has bowled a perfect game in any nationally-televised PBA Tour finals this season, the new Go Bowling Free America promotion also is still unredeemed. The Go Bowling Free America offer will kick in if any player bowls a nationally-televised 300 game, but fans must pre-register at www.gobowling.com/BowlFreeAmerica to be eligible to download a free game of bowling coupon.

PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: KOELTZOW WINS FIRST PBA REGIONAL TITLE IN LAS VEGAS

Non-PBA members Bryanna Cote of Red Rock, Ariz. and Bryan VanSickle of Tucson, Ariz. teamed up to win Sunday's South Point Member/Non-Member Doubles title at South Point Bowling Plaza after Kris Koeltzow of Wheat Ridge, Colo., won his first PBA Regional title in the South Point West Challenge portion of the PBA West Region doubleheader on Friday.

In the preliminary singles event, Koeltzow defeated Cerell Cardines of Las Vegas, 265-237, to earn the \$1,800 first prize. In the semifinal round, Koeltzow defeated VanSickle, 214-203, while Cardines eliminated Steve Kloempken of Pleasant View, Utah, 235-204, to set up the championship match. All but Koeltzow were non-members.

In Sunday's title match, Cote and VanSickle defeated Kloempken and David Haynes of Las Vegas, 485-472, to claim the \$4,000 first prize.

Cote and VanSickle advanced to the title match by eliminating non-member Kendle Miles of Daytona Beach, Fla. and Raymond Lussier of San Jose, Calif., 455-371, while Kloempken and Haynes ousted nonmembers Steve Smith of San Diego, Calif. and Barefoot Jr. of Las Vegas. 506-463, in the other semifinal match. Norm Duke Overtakes Kris Prather to Top PBA Jonesboro Open Qualifying

Tightly-packed leaderboard leads top 16 qualifiers into match play Friday

JONESBORO, Ark. (Feb. 28, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke, making a bid for his 40th PBA Tour title, tracked down Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., and finally took the lead by 12 pins with a 266 final game Thursday in the PBA Jonesboro Open at Hijinx Family Entertainment.

Duke, who is closing in on his 55th birthday, can become the third player in Professional Bowlers Association history to win 40 titles if he can win Sunday. He won his 39th title last Sunday in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open. Walter Ray Williams Jr. (47) and Earl Anthony (43) are the only PBA players ever to win 40 titles.

"I've never thought about 40 titles, ever," the Clermont, Fla., resident said, "but I guess that would be a milestone. In my mind, the next milestone would be catching Earl Anthony, and the only reason I'm close to him is my longevity. I've been bowling for 37 years. Earl bowled for what? Fourteen, fifteen years? I'm on borrowed time, but just to be mentioned with those guys is amazing."

Duke, as he did in Indianapolis, managed the dual lane condition challenge like a hall of famer.

"On the dual pattern situation, you look across the center and see 150, 160 games everywhere," he said. "You can get a good game if you get a good start, but for the most part, it's seven games of managing safely and trying to find something. To get done with the round and see myself in the lead, man, that's something."

Prather, who is trying for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title in his fifth year as a PBA member, bowled a consistent, trouble-free round, taking the lead earlier in the day by two pins over Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz.

Duke finished with a 14-game total of 3,138 pins. Prather had 3,126. Rounding out the closely-packed top five heading into Friday's match play finals are Butturff at 3,124, Shawn Maldonado of Houston, Texas, at 3,083 and EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., with 3,054 pins.

Prather, who made six championship round appearances in 2018 including three third-place finishes, is trying for his first television appearance of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. He currently ranks 15th on the 2019 PBA Playoffs points list, but being a frequent contender is now driving him to step it up.

"Being close the past couple of years and not having won anything has really motivated me," Prather said. "Missing the cut last week has really fired me up. I'm at a point in my career where I feel like I shouldn't be missing cuts. I should get a check every week and, if not, it's infuriating."

Prather said he intends to turn that frustration into aggression starting in tomorrow's two rounds of match play.

"Being that close and getting that taste of victory in my mouth has really motivated me, so I'm just going to keep working hard," he added. "I really haven't had much success in match play, so tomorrow I'm going to be really a lot more aggressive than I have been in the past. Other than that, nothing's really going to change."

All rounds of the Jonesboro Open, a Tier 3 event in the 2019 PBA Playoffs points competition, are being contested on a mixed lane conditioning environment where the 45-foot Shark oiling pattern is applied to the left lane and the 36-foot Viper pattern to the right lane.

Norm Duke Earns Top Berth for Sunday's PBA Jonesboro Open Finals

PBA Hall of Famer to compete for second consecutive title, 40th career victory

JONESBORO, Ark. (March 1, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke needs to win one more match Sunday to become the third player in Professional Bowlers Association history to win 40 career titles after earning the top berth in the PBA Jonesboro Open stepladder finals at Hijinx Family Entertainment Friday.

Sunday's finals will air live on FS1 at 5 p.m. Eastern. Also qualifying for the finals are EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., in second place with a 30-game total of 6,803 pins – 43 behind Duke; Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, 6,794 pins; Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., 6,715, and Japan's premier player, Shota Kawazoe, 6,709.

Duke, Tackett and Simonsen are trying for their second title of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. Prather and Kawazoe are each looking for his first PBA Tour title.

"That was a long, long day," Duke said of the two eight-game rounds of head-to-head match play on a challenging mixed lane condition environment. "As soon as you thought you could put some distance between guys, up jumped the devil. It was so hard. The left lane was so slippery; on the right lane the ball would check up and you'd leave some ugly spares. You couldn't remember what lane you were on, what target you were throwing at, where you wanted to start...

"It would wear you to death. If you don't believe it, just look at all the carnage out there.

"I know I'm in the lead, but I feel like I choked it. I didn't feel like I bowled well," Duke continued. "But then I said, Norm, the lanes are just hard. Deal with it."

Duke, who turns 55 in less than a month, said he has never given up on winning another PBA Tour title, but he also never thought about getting to 40 titles, a milestone only Walter Ray Williams Jr. and Earl Anthony have exceeded with 47 and 43 titles, respectively. Even after winning his 39th title last Sunday in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open, winning 40 wasn't a target.

Sunday, he'll await the survivor of three preliminary matches to bowl one game for another slice of bowling history.

"One more game to win," he said. "It's a tough ordeal, but would I rather be in the lead or not? I get to bowl more one game for the title. As cool as the idea of 40 titles is, you forget about all of it. You don't think about accomplishments. It's just win one more game."

All rounds of the Jonesboro Open, a Tier 3 event in the 2019 PBA Playoffs points competition, were contested on a mixed lane conditioning environment where the 45-foot Shark oiling pattern was applied to the left lane and the 36-foot Viper pattern to the right lane.

Next up on the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule is the 10th anniversary PBA World Series of Bowling at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., March 11-21. The PBA's next televised event is the World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals, presented by the PBA, on FS1 Sunday, March 10, at 10 p.m. EST.

Norm Duke Wins Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open for 40th Career Title

54-year-old PBA Hall of Famer becomes oldest player to win back-to-back titles

JONESBORO, Ark. (March 3, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke, three weeks shy of his 55th birthday, defeated 22-year-old Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, 212-164, to win the Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open Sunday at Hijinx Family Entertainment Center.

With an error-free game including one string of three strikes against the split-prone Simonsen, Duke became the third player in PBA history to win 40 PBA Tour titles, joining Walter Ray Williams Jr. (47) and Earl Anthony (43). He also became the oldest player to win consecutive PBA Tour titles, and the first to win two titles during the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season following his victory in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open a week earlier.

This win was classic Norm Duke, an accomplished veteran who uses less to create more against an emerging legion of strong young high-revolution power players.

"I don't really care if I bowl 280 or 180 if it's more than the other guy has," Duke said. "You just give it all you've got. I was so scared down there, it was hard to make shots. It gets that way when you're so close to winning."

Just as he has done throughout his career, Duke accomplished his mission Sunday by eliminating errors and taking advantage of what the scoring environment allows, rather than trying to overpower the lanes and pins.

"You never know what's good enough until it's over, but I love the fact that I didn't have any open frames," he added. "Spares win titles."

Simonsen, a 22-year-old two-handed player, advanced to the title match against Duke – who had been bowling on Tour for 25 years by the year Simonsen was born – with a 214-199 victory over 26-year-old EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind. The semifinal match was a battle between two of the PBA's most powerful high-revolution players. Simonsen started the match with four strikes to establish a solid lead that held up because Tackett was unable to throw consecutive strikes on the dual lane conditions until the 10th frame.

In the final match, however, Simonsen completely lost the right lane, leaving unmakeable splits on his first three attempts to give Duke the room he needed to open a big lead.

"Uncomfortable is the word for it," the frustrated Simonsen said.

In the opening match, Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., started with four strikes, converted a 10 pin and threw three more strikes to build a lead Japanese star Shota Kawazoe couldn't overcome despite a late string of four strikes. Kawazoe, a 17-time Japan PBA title winner, didn't miss the pocket but three single-pin spares kept him from closing the gap and Prather won, 246-236.

In the second match, Simonsen jumped into an early 44-pin lead by starting the match with five strikes while Prather lost the pocket after a first-frame strike. Simonsen hit a speed bump when he left the 4-9 split in the eighth frame and failed to convert, but he then threw four more strikes to eliminate Prather, 247-203.

Sunday's live FS1 finals were contested on the same dual lane conditioning environment that was used throughout the tournament, with the 45-foot Wolf oiling pattern applied to the left lane and the 36-foot Viper pattern applied to the right lane.

Next up on the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule is the 10th anniversary PBA World Series of Bowling at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., March 11-21. WSOB X will award four PBA Tour titles, including the PBA World Championship, the year's second major, and will include five consecutive nights of prime-time telecasts on FS1, March 18-22.

Leading into the World Series will be the World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals, presented by the PBA, on FS1 next Sunday at 10 p.m. EST.

ARLINGTON, Texas – Capping a year-long points competition in the international bowling arena, PBA star Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, and PWBA champion Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, N.Y., will lead their respective fields into the World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals, presented by the PBA, Sunday at 10 p.m. EST on FS1.

The WBT Men's Finals also will include Stuart Williams of England and first-time WBT finalist EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., who earned his berth after a gold-medal performance in the 2018 World Bowling Men's Championships in Hong Kong. International Field, Live FS1 Telecasts, PBA World Championship Among World Series of Bowling X Storylines

FloBowling to provide nearly 50 hours of qualifying and match play round coverage

ALLEN PARK, MICH. (March 5, 2019) – Go Bowling! PBA Tour history will be made once again when Thunderbowl Lanes hosts the 10th anniversary PBA World Series of Bowling March 10-21. World Series of Bowling X will be highlighted by the first-ever prime-time live telecasts of four consecutive days of PBA Tour stepladder finals on FS1, plus a special USA vs. The World team match in prime time on the fifth day.

Since the World Series of Bowling was first hosted at Thunderbowl Lanes in 2009, the multi-event series has become the premier international showcase of professional bowling competition.

Twenty countries will be represented in the 2019 event which will culminate with the PBA World Championship, the third major of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. The PBA World Championship will also feature a \$1 million bonus if a bowler can bowl a 300 game in the title match of the stepladder finals.

A field of 135 players is expected to compete in the qualifying and match play portions of the WSOB leading up to the FS1 telecasts March 18-21. In another WSOB first, all four Go Bowling! PBA Tour title events will award valuable points toward the new PBA Playoffs that will begin on April 8 in Portland, Maine.

PBA's live streaming partner, FloBowling, also will provide approximately 50 hours of coverage during the qualifying and match play rounds.

Key storylines to watch for are:

Four live telecasts on FS1 – The World Series of Bowling X will be highlighted by four live prime-time telecasts of the stepladder finals on successive nights March 18-21, all beginning at 8 p.m. ET on FS1. A fifth event, the USA vs. The World, will be taped by FS1 for airing March 22 at 8 p.m. ET. WSOB is an international showcase – The preliminary list of the 20 countries represented includes: Argentina, Australia, Canada, Colombia, Denmark, Ecuador, England, Finland, Germany, Ireland, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Puerto Rico, South Africa, Sweden, Thailand, Venezuela and the United States.

Jason Belmonte to defend World Championship title and try to set record for most PBA major titles – Four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia will try for a record 11th PBA major if he can make it to the stepladder finals of the PBA World Championship. The 35-year-old Belmonte won

the recent PBA Tournament of Champions for his 10th major title to tie Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony for first on the all-time list. Belmonte, who uses the unique two-handed delivery, won the PBA World Championship when it was last held in November of 2017.

Norm Duke still making history at almost 55: At nearly 55 years of age and in his 36th full season, PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke proved he is still a force to be reckoned with on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour after winning the recent Jonesboro Open for his 40th career tour title and his second consecutive win of the season.

The WSOB field also includes five other PBA Hall of Famers – Chris Barnes, Parker Bohn III, Amleto Monacelli, Pete Weber and Walter Ray Williams Jr.

Michigan's Andrew Anderson is reigning PBA Player of the Year: Andrew Anderson of nearby Holly, Mich., earned 2018 PBA Player of the Year honors winning two titles including the USBC Masters for his first major win.

WSOB X begins stretch drive for PBA Tour Playoffs: The four title events of the WSOB will be critical for tour players as they try to make the top 24 in points at the conclusion of the USBC Masters on April 1 to qualify for the PBA Playoffs which begins in April in Portland, Maine. The winner of the Playoffs will take home a \$100,000 first prize. The Cheetah, Chameleon, and Scorpion Championships are Tier 3 points events while the World Championship is a Tier 1 points event. Woman standout Liz Johnson tries for another PBA Tour title: USBC Hall of Famer and three-time and reigning PWBA Player of the Year Liz Johnson will be trying for a second PBA Tour title. Johnson won the PBA Chameleon Championship in WSOB IX to join 2010 PBA Tournament of Champions winner Kelly Kulick as the only women to win a PBA Tour title.

PBA Tour events include diverse lane conditions – Three of the World Series events – the Cheetah Championship, Chameleon Championship, and Scorpion Championship – are named after specific PBA lane conditioning patterns. Each different lane condition requires players to be on top of their games in making the right lane and equipment adjustments to be successful. The ability to excel on all three lane conditioning challenges will ultimately determine the finalists who will compete for the PBA World Championship which will be conducted on the Earl Anthony lane condition.

USA vs. The World – The USA vs. The World team event will feature the top five U.S. performers against a team of the top five international players. Teams will be determined through players' pinfall in WSOB qualifying rounds. PBA Hall of Famer Marshall Holman will manage the U.S. Team and fellow Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli will manage the international team.

PBA Spare Shots

EVEN FELLOW PBA COMPETITORS JOIN "NORM DUKE FAN CLUB"

Norm Duke knows he has been a fan favorite for quite some time. The extended "Duuuuukkke…" chant whenever he's introduced is a clue. But what the 54-year-old 40-time PBA Tour champion and hall of famer didn't fully realize until the past couple of weeks is how much he's idolized by the growing group of 20-something future stars who will soon steal the spotlight.

"The kids out here treat me unbelievably good, unbelievably!" Duke said after winning his 39th PBA Tour title in the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open, a week before he captured title no. 40 in last Sunday's Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open in Arkansas. "They make every day I spend on this tour so enjoyable. To get this title means maybe they can appreciate other things, like winning when you're not bowling your best."

First in line to proclaim his admiration for what Duke has contributed to the sport was Australia's **Jason Belmonte**, who is widely considered the best bowler in the world, and who was Duke's victim in the Indianapolis Open title match. After that match, Belmonte posted a comment on his Facebook page that in part said, "...you're a treasure to the game and still my idol."

A week later, after his win in Jonesboro, Belmonte proclaimed Duke the front-runner in the 2019 PBA Player of the Year race.

Duke, who had proclaimed earlier in the season that he fully intended to win another title despite his age and a seven-year dry spell since his last singles victory, also noted the new PBA Playoffs have provided him with a renewed drive to win, especially after sitting in 31st place – on the outside looking in – heading into the Indianapolis tournament.

"I know what it takes," he said after his win in Indy not only moved him into the top 24 who will qualify for the PBA Playoffs, but all the way to seventh place in the points race. His win in Arkansas moved him into third place, comfortably (for now) within the top eight who will earn a first-round by when the Playoffs begin.

"Everything I've done the last three months has been with the Playoffs in mind. It's everyone's goal," Duke said. "Everyone wants to win that \$100,000 (Playoffs first prize) and you can't win it if you don't get there.

"It's a tall order, but to this point, everything I've done in my life has been a tall order," the 5-foot-6 Duke said as a point of emphasis.

Duke also addressed the PBA's dual, or mixed, pattern scoring environments he conquered in both of his Indianapolis and Jonesboro victories. It's a challenging test of skill and patience the PBA has employed, applying dramatically different oiling patterns on the left and right lanes in both events.

"I think they're a tremendous requirement to make you better than you thought you'd needed to be," Duke said. "Every pattern changes. Every day they change. You have to be smart enough to deal with the patterns and physically strong enough to get all that extra equipment across the center, because you're using different balls on each lane.

"It's ridiculously hard, but for those of us who have been out here a long time, it's an advantage if you're prepared for it."

To further endear himself to his adoring fans, Duke has created what may be a new tradition by handing his championship trophy to the fans to pass around, kind of like NHL players sharing the Stanley Cup with their fans. That might not be the end of it.

"The next time, I might just jump into the crowd myself," Duke said with a laugh.

DUKE, TACKETT, SIMONSEN FORTIFY PBA PLAYOFFS POINTS POSITIONS

While Australia's **Jason Belmonte** took a break from PBA Tour competition to spend time with his family before the start of the PBA World Series of Bowling X, **EJ Tackett** and **Anthony Simonsen** joined **Norm Duke** in fortifying their positions among the top eight players in the race to qualify for first-round byes in the inaugural PBA Playoffs.

Belmonte was solidly in the lead in PBA Playoffs points after his win in the PBA Tournament of Champions followed by back-to-back second-place finishes in the PBA Players Championship and Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis Open with 18,550 points and Tackett retained second place on the basis of his third straight top five finish in Jonesboro with 13,890 points. Duke, with back-to-back titles in Indy and Jonesboro, advanced from 31st to third (13,565) while Simonsen (13,200) has advanced from 35th prior to the TOC to fourth, in great part thanks to his win in the PBA Players Championship.

Rounding out the top eight after Jonesboro are **Sean Rash** (12,640), **Jakob Butturff** (11,475), **Marshall Kent** (9,595) and **Tom Daugherty** (9,250). Heading into the WSOB X, **Wes Malott** (8,260) and **Kyle Troup** (8,150) sat in ninth and 10th places, respectively.

The race for the 24th-and-final berth in the PBA Playoffs currently involves **Brad Miller** and **Nick Pate** in a tie for 24th with **Tom Smallwood** and **Stuart Williams** right behind as the Tour heads toward the April 1 cutoff date.

Under the new PBA competition points structure in play this season, a win in a Tier 1 (major championship) event is worth 7,500 points, a Tier 2 (standard PBA Tour tournament) title is worth 5,000 points and a Tier 3 (limited entry and/or modified format tournament) title is worth 2,500 points. In the upcoming WSOB X, the Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Championships will be Tier 3 events; the PBA World Championship will be the season's third Tier 1 event.

Players finishing in the top 24 in points as of April 1 qualify for a berth in the Playoffs. Finishing in the top 40 is required for eligibility to enter the 2019 PBA League Draft. EJ Tackett, Liz Johnson Win World Bowling Tour Finals Titles

Tackett spoils Anthony Simonsen's birthday with one-pin decision in "current frame" scoring match

ARLINGTON, Texas – It took EJ Tackett a gold-medal performance in the 2018 World Bowling Men's Championships just to sneak into the World Bowling Tour Men's Finals, and then it took a clutch 10th-frame strike to locked up a one-pin victory over top qualifier Anthony Simonsen at the International Training and Research Center.

The WBT Men's and Women's Finals, presented by the PBA, aired Sunday on FS1, concluding a year-long global competition. Liz Johnson of Palatine, Ill., won the women's title, defeating top qualifier Danielle McEwan of Stony Point, N.Y., 246-223, for her first WBT Finals win in six tries.

Tackett, who made his WBT Men's Finals debut after winning the all-events gold medal in the World Bowling Men's Championships in Hong Kong, eliminated England's Stuart Williams in another single-pin thriller, 243-242, before spoiling Simonsen's 22nd birthday, 233-232, in the title match.

The WBT Finals again used World Bowling's experimental "current frame" scoring system where a strike counted for 30 pins, a spare counted for 10 plus the first-ball count, and an open frame counted for actual pins knocked down. The 10th frame counted the same as all other frames.

Tackett, who led Simonsen by 11 pins after eight frames, left the 4-6-10 split and opened in the ninth to open the door for the young Texas two-hander, who bowled the match using a reverse-hook technique from the left side of the lane. Simonsen, who won the 2018 PBA Xtra Frame Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic in Delaware using the "backup ball" technique, converted the 8 pin for a spare in the ninth to close to within a single pin. The Little Elm, Texas resident then struck in the 10th frame to force Tackett to also strike for the win.

"This format is interesting because when you get to the 10th frame, you know you only have one shot," Tackett said. "You have one chance to do it right, and fortunately, I threw a good shot. It's absolutely another nice title to have on my resumé."

Johnson, who made the women's finals for the sixth time in the event's eight-year history, eliminated Poland's Daria Pajak in the first match, 242-235, and threw six strikes in 10 frames in denying McEwan a third women's title.

"Every title is special. This was my sixth WBT show, but this is my first win," the 24-time PWBA titlist said. "Two years ago I had a chance (in the title match against McEwan), but I threw a pocket 7-10 in the 10th and lost by three pins, so that's the closest I've been to winning.

"To qualify for the finals again, I really wanted to try my best," she added. "This is not an easy format. I knew I only needed eight pins in the 10th to win, but I wanted to get as many as I could (she struck). The scoring system is different, but it's an honor to be part of it."

Ronnie Russell Bowls 288 in Final Game to Surge into PBA Chameleon Championship First Round Lead

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – Four-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Ronnie Russell bowled a 288 in the final game of the first round to surge into the early PBA Chameleon Championship lead Wednesday at Thunderbowl Lanes.

Bowling on the PBA 39-foot Chameleon lane condition in the second event of PBA World Series of Bowling X, Russell bowled a 1,253 pinfall for five games with games of 246, 236, 235, and 248 before the 288 game. He holds a 45-pin lead over Tim Pfeifer of Oakdale, Pa., in second with 1,208 heading into tonight's second round at 6:30 p.m. ET.

"I knew I had something special going when it seemed like a lot of the guys around me were struggling," said Russell, whose last tour win came in the 2016 Fall Classic Team Challenge. "I'm just not sure what it was.

"After the first game I made the right decision to go to another ball and stayed with it for the rest of the round," Russell added. "When you have a five-game round, you can sometimes over react with your adjustments but I stayed patient and everything came together. It also helped that I didn't have any opens."

After this evening's second round, the top 16 players will advance to single elimination match play on March 19. After match play, the top four players will advance to the Cheetah Championship live finals on FS1 March 19 at 8 p.m. ET. The Chameleon Championship finals will be the second of five prime-time WSOB X telecasts on consecutive nights (March 18-22).

Rounding out the top four after Chameleon qualifying were Mitch Hupe of Canada with 1,195 and fourtime PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia, who surged into fourth with 1,187 after a 180 game to start the round. Belmonte finished with games of 257, 268, 258 and 224.

In a tie for fifth are PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke who recently won back-to-back tour titles to reach the 40-title career milestone and reigning PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson of Holly, Mich., with 1,176.

The total pinfall from the qualifying rounds of the Cheetah, Chameleon and Thursday's Scorpion Championships also serve as qualifying totals for the PBA World Championship – the season's third major – which will culminate with the live FS1 finals on Thursday, March 21 on FS1 at 8 p.m.

The top five in World Championship qualifying after 15 games are Bill O'Neill with a 3,453 pinfall, followed by BJ Moore, 3,395; Tom Daugherty, 3,386; Rhino Page, 3,382, and Kyle Sherman, 3,373.

Bowling on the PBA 39-foot Chameleon lane condition in the second event of PBA World Series of Bowling X, Russell bowled games of 246, 236, 235, 248 and 288 in Wednesday's first round and followed it up with 213, 195, 201, 280 and 208 in the second round.

Russell led 16 players who advanced to single elimination match play on March 19. After match play, the top four players will advance to the Chameleon Championship live finals on FS1 March 19 at 8 p.m. ET.

Rounding out the top four after Chameleon qualifying were four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia, 2,318; two-time tour winner Tom Daugherty, Riverview, Fla., 2,288, and Mitch Hupe of Canada with 2,270.

Daugherty leads World Championship qualifying after 20 games from the Chameleon and Tuesday's Cheetah qualifying rounds with a 4,587 20-game pinfall (229.3 average). The 10 games of qualifying in Thursday's Scorpion Championship will also count toward World Championship qualifying.

"It's a grind out there," said Daugherty. "I'm just trying to put 30 solid games together and be in the best possible position for the World Championship. Bill O'Neill Leads PBA Scorpion Championship, World Championship Heading into Final Qualifying Round

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – Ten-time PBA Tour winner Bill O'Neill tied with one-time PBA regional winner Kevin Donovan with a 1,179 five-game pinfall total Thursday to lead the first round of the PBA Scorpion Championship, the third tournament of the PBA World Series of Bowling X at Thunderbowl Lanes.

O'Neill's performance in the first round of the Scorpion Championship also moved him into the qualifying lead for the PBA World Championship with a 5,695 pinfall for 25

games heading into this evening's final Scorpion Championship qualifying round this evening at 6:30 p.m. ET.

In the Scorpion first round, O'Neill had games of 236, 254, 266, 214 and 209 while Donovan bowled games of 247, 249, 256, 179 and 248.

The top 16 players will advance to best-of-five single elimination match play on March 20. After match play, the top four players will advance to the Scorpion Championship finals on live on FS1 March 20 at 8 p.m. ET.

O'Neill and Donovan have a five-pin lead over 10-time PBA major winner Jason Belmonte in third with 1,174 and nine-pin lead over two-time tour winner Thomas Larsen of Denmark in fourth with 1,170.

After Scorpion Championship qualifying concludes, the top 45 players from the 135player WSOB X field will advance to two five-game casher's rounds on Friday at 12:30 and 6:30 p.m. ET. After the casher's rounds, the field will be cut to 16 players for two eightgame round robin match play rounds on Saturday at 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. which will determine the top five players for the World Championship finals that will be aired live March 21 on FS1 at 8 p.m. ET.

O'Neill holds a 32-pin lead over two-time tour winner Tom Daugherty in second in World Championship qualifying who has a 5,663 25-game pinfall after the first Scorpion round.

Currently third in World Championship qualifying with a 5,655 pinfall is 2017 World Championship winner Belmonte, who is trying for a record 11th PBA major title if he can win the third major of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. Rounding out the top five are Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Mo., 5,605 and BJ Moore, Greensburg, Pa., 5,600.

Belmonte Averages 239 to Surge Into PBA Scorpion Championship

and PBA World Championship Leads in WSOB X

Field cut to 45 players for Friday's World Championship cashers' rounds

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 14, 2019) – Four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte bowled a 2,396 10-game pinfall total to top qualifying in the PBA Scorpion Championship Thursday which also propelled him to the top of the World Championship standings in PBA World Series of Bowling X at Thunderbowl Lanes.

The Australian two-hander, a 19-time PBA Tour winner, who owns a record-tying 10 major titles including the 2017 World Championship, bowled games of 258, 210, 257, 213 and 236 in Thursday's first Scorpion round and 257, 194, 265, 258 and 248 in the second round.

Belmonte led 16 players who advanced to best-of-five single elimination match play on March 20. After match play, the top four players will advance to the Scorpion Championship finals live on FS1 March 20 at 8 p.m. ET.

Another one of the tour's premier two-handers, six-time tour winner Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, finished second in Scorpion qualifying with a 2,332 pinfall. Overcoming a slow start with games of 185, 170, 273, 231 and 237 in the first round, he came back with games of 276, 258, 224, 279 and 199 in the second round.

With the conclusion of Scorpion qualifying, the top 45 players from the 135-player WSOB X field advanced to two five-game World Championship cashers' rounds on Friday at 12:30 and 6:30 p.m. ET which will be conducted on the PBA 43-foot Earl Anthony lane condition. After the cashers' rounds, the field will be cut to 16 players for two eight-game round robin match play rounds Saturday at 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. which will determine the top five players for the World Championship finals that will be aired live March 21 on FS1 at 8 p.m. ET.

The 35-year-old Belmonte has made a steady climb in the World Championship standings since finishing 37th in Cheetah Championship qualifying on Tuesday. After Scorpion qualifying, he finished with a 6,877 30-game pinfall total (229 average) to lead World Championship qualifying.

"For this event, the start can be an added challenge for me because the shorter lane conditions are usually my Achille's heel plus the fact I'm just getting in from Australia so I pretty much know going in I have to build up as the event progresses," said Belmonte, who is trying to win a record 11th major title in the third major tournament of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. "I just concentrate on getting as many pins as I can early and then look to capitalize as much as possible when I get to a condition where I have a good ball reaction."

Belmonte holds a 103-pin lead over 10-time tour winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., who is second in World Championship qualifying with 6,774 heading into Friday's cashers' rounds.

Also determined after Scorpion qualifying were the top five U.S. and international scorers for The USA vs. The World team competition which will be taped March 21 at 4 p.m. and will air March 22 at 8 p.m. ET on FS1.

Based on 30-game pinfall totals from the Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion rounds, representing the U.S. will be O'Neill (6,774), EJ Tackett (6,663), Tom Daugherty (6,641) Simonsen (6,605) and Kyle Sherman (6,605). Representing the international team will be Belmonte (6,877); Andres Gomez, Colombia (6,437); Dom Barrett, England (6,411); Sam Cooley, Australia (6,399) and Pontus Andersson, Sweden (6,374).

The U.S. team will be managed by PBA Hall of Famer Marshall Holman and the international team will be managed by fellow hall of famer Amleto Monacelli.

Australia's Jason Belmonte Extends PBA World Championship Lead Heading Into Match Play

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 15, 2019) – Four-time PBA Player of the Year and defending champion Jason Belmonte of Australia averaged 237 in Friday's cashers' rounds of the PBA World Championship to extend his lead in the fourth event of PBA World Series of Bowling X.

The right-handed two-hander, who is trying for a record 11th major title in the third major tournament of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, bowled games of 289, 235, 257, 194 and 224 in Friday's first cashers' round and 225, 268, 232, 236 and 210 in the second round at Thunderbowl Lanes.

Belmonte finished the day with a 9,247 40-game overall pinfall total (231 average) consisting of 10-game qualifying totals from the WSOB Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Championships in addition to the 10 games from the cashers' rounds.

Bowling on PBA's 43-foot Earl Anthony lane condition, Belmonte led 16 players who advanced to two eight-game match play rounds Saturday scheduled for 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. ET. After match play the top five players will be determined for the live FS1 stepladder finals March 21 at 8 p.m.

Having to deal with an especially tough condition in the last game of the second round, Belmonte went to a backup ball delivery in the sixth frame and went on to throw five of the last six strikes to salvage the 210 game.

"It's something I'll do when I feel I have nothing going bowling traditionally from the right and that was the case in the last game," said Belmonte. "Since the right side was very tricky for me, I made a decision that if I can figure it out quickly – within a frame or two – I have time to save the game.

"I think it's something every bowler should work on and develop as a tool to find a shot," Belmonte added.

The 35-year-old Belmonte won the PBA Tournament of Champions in February for his 10th major title to tie PBA Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony for first on the career majors list. He was denied an 11th major title when he lost to fellow two-hander Anthony Simonsen in the title match of the Players Championship a week later.

Belmonte holds a commanding 259-pin lead over BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pa., in second with 8,988. Rounding out the top five are two-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Tom Daugherty, Riverview, Fla., 8,901; Kristopher Prather, Plainfield, Ill., 8,852, and 10-time tour winner Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa., 8,848. O'Neill is the only player to make the match play cuts in the four WSOB tour events.

EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Ind., the 2016 World Championship winner, finished eighth with an 8,733 pinfall. PBA Hall of Famer and three-time World Championship winner Norm Duke of Clermont, Fla., finished 12th with an 8,657 and fellow Hall of Famer 2011 World Championship winner Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, took the 16th and final spot with 8,602.

Jason Belmonte Will Try for Record 11th PBA Major Title As Top Qualifier for PBA World Championship Finals

Matt McNiel, Bill O'Neill, Jakob Butturff and BJ Moore will join Belmonte in finals of third major of The 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season to air live on FS1 Thursday at 8 p.m. ET

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 16, 2019) - As top qualifier for the 2019 World Series of Bowling X PBA World Championship stepladder finals, Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte finds himself once again one more match win away from a record 11th career PBA major title.

The stepladder finals of the fourth event of WSOB X, and the third major of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, will air live next Thursday (March 21) at 8 p.m. ET on FS1 from Thunderbowl Lanes in suburban Detroit.

The four-time PBA Player of the Year and World Championship defending champion earned top-qualifier honors for the finals by posting an 8-8 match play record and 12,953 56-game pinfall total (including match win bonus pins) after Saturday's match play rounds.

"I'm feeling confident as I usually do when I get to this point – maybe a little more relaxed because we have a few days before the (World Championship) finals," said Belmonte, a 19-time tour winner. "It's a little more rewarding when you come back from a slow start. First, you just chip away, and then if you get the lead stretch it out if you can."

The title match of the World Championship will offer a \$1 million bonus if Belmonte or his opponent can bowl a 300 game.

Belmonte won the PBA Tournament of Champions in February for his 10th PBA major title to tie PBA Hall of Famers Earl Anthony and Pete Weber for first on the all-time list. The following week, also as top qualifier, he was denied an 11th major title losing to fellow two-hander Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, in the title match of the PBA Players Championship.

Qualifying second for the World Championship finals was part-time tour player Matt McNiel of Minneapolis, who put together a 12-4 match play record and a 12,630 pinfall total, 323 pins behind Belmonte after 40 qualifying and 16 match play games.

McNiel, making his first tour singles television appearance, has finished 11th in the last three World Championships. He has a best tour finish of fifth, which came in the 2015 Roth-Holman Doubles Championship with Anthony Pepe.

Qualifying third for the finals was 10-time tour winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., with a 10-6 match play record and 12,603 pinfall. O'Neill, trying for his second major title, won his 10th career title in the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic in January.

Five-time tour winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., compiled a 12-4 record in match play and finished with a 12,597 pinfall to qualify fourth for the finals. Butturff, trying for his first major win, won the PBA Oklahoma Open in January for his fifth career tour title.

Qualifying fifth for the finals was BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pa., with a 7-9 record and 12,518 pinfall. Moore, who has a best tour finish of second in the 2016 Scorpion Championship, will be making his second major telecast after a fifth-place finish in the 2018 Tournament of Champions.

Live WSOB X telecasts on FS1 will begin when FOX Sports airs the championship finals of the PBA Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Championships live on FS1 on consecutive nights Monday, Tuesday

and Wednesday at 8 p.m. Eastern. After the World Championship telecast on Thursday, WSOB will wrap up with the telecast of the tape-delayed USA vs. The World team competition Friday, also at 8 p.m. ET.

The four finalists for the Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Championships will be determined after single-elimination match play competition earlier on the days of their respective FS1 finals telecasts. WSOB to conclude with live PBA World Championship finals and tape-delayed USA vs. World team competition

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 17, 2019) – The 10th anniversary PBA World Series of Bowling is headed into another historic chapter of national television coverage when FOX Sports airs the championship finals of the PBA's Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Championships live on FS1 on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday at 8 p.m. Eastern from Thunderbowl Lanes.

Each of the three PBA animal pattern championships – named for specific lane conditioning patterns used for their respective events – will be preceded by a full day of single-elimination match play (airing live on FloBowling, PBA's online video streaming partner) to determine the four FS1 finalists later the same night.

FS1's WSOB coverage will continue Thursday with the stepladder finals of the PBA World Championship, the season's third major at 8 p.m. followed on Friday by a special USA vs. The World team event featuring American vs. international World Series stars to conclude the first-ever package of five consecutive nights of PBA television coverage.

As top qualifier for the World Championship stepladder finals, which were determined Saturday, defending champion Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte finds himself once again one match win away from a record 11th career PBA major title. Joining Belmonte in the finals will be No. 2 qualifier Matt McNiel, No. 3 qualifier Bill O'Neill, No. 4 qualifier Jakob Butturff, and No. 5 qualifier BJ Moore.

The title match of the World Championship finals will pay a \$1 million bonus if a player can bowl a 300 game.

The animal pattern championships have been a key component of the WSOB since its inaugural event at Thunderbowl in 2009. In addition to awarding titles as events on their own merit, players must compete at a high level across the challenging oiling patterns to reach the World Championship finals.

PBA World Series formats and events have changed over the years, but the animal patterns have always been an integral part of challenging the versatility of player skills. This year is no different.

The PBA World Series of Bowling X Cheetah Championship final four have been determined for this evening's live finals on FS1 at 8 p.m. Eastern.

Bowling on the 33-foot PBA Cheetah lane condition, five-time tour winner Rhino Page, six-time winner Dick Allen, Kyle Sherman and Matt McNiel advanced to the finals after Round-of-16 and Round-of-8 best-of-five elimination competition at Thunderbowl Lanes Monday.

Page has three fifth-place finishes this season and Allen already has one win which came in the Lubbock Sports Open. for Second Title of the Season

Allen also notches seventh career title in first event of PBA World Series of Bowling X on FS1

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 18, 2019) – Dick Allen of Lexington, S.C., defeated Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Mo., 234-195, in the title match Monday to win the PBA Cheetah Championship for his second tour title of the season and seventh of his career.

As the first event of PBA World Series of Bowling X, the Cheetah Championship finals telecast was the first of four consecutive live PBA Tour telecasts on FS1 this week from Thunderbowl Lanes.

The 40-year-old Allen, in his 20th year on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour, had things in hand from the start striking on the first five shots and opening up a lead that Sherman could not challenge.

"I just focused on keeping it together and not falling apart," Allen said. "When you have a good lead you don't want to let the bad thoughts creep in, or the good thoughts either. Just focus on making the best possible shot every frame and fortunately I was able to do that."

Allen, who won the PBA Lubbock Sports Open in January, ran his career singles title match record to 5-1 and joined PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke as the only two-time winners this season.

"When I get to TV I'm hard to beat," Allen said. "It's a matter of getting here. I wish I could be as effective in the qualifying and match play rounds of tournaments and I then would be here (in the finals) more often."

Bowling on the PBA 33-foot Cheetah lane condition, the telecast opened with a seeding round that determined the qualifying order for three stepladder matches. Allen earned the top seed for the finals with a 230 game followed by No. 2 qualifier Rhino Page, Orlando, 173; No. 3 qualifier Sherman, 172, and No. 4 qualifier Matt McNiel, Minneapolis, 163.

The four finalists survived Round-of-16 and Round-of-8 best-of-five elimination rounds earlier Monday after qualifying rounds bowled last week to advance to the telecast.

The 25-year-old Sherman burst out of the gate with a 290-152 win over McNiel and then went on to beat Page 229-204 in the semifinal match to advance to the title match against Allen.

Sherman's second-place finish was his career best in a tour singles event in three seasons as a pro. He finished second with partner Brad Miller in the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship earlier this season.

Page's third-place finish was his best of the season. The six-time tour winner also has three fifth-place finishes this season.

McNiel, who finished fourth and has already qualified second for the PBA World Championship finals which will be televised live Thursday on FS1, was making his first PBA Tour televised singles appearance.

WSOB X competition continues with Round-of-16 and Round-of-8 elimination rounds Tuesday for the PBA Chameleon Championship which will determine the four finalists for the finals telecast at 8 p.m. ET on FS1.

Four-time PBA Player of the Year and WSOB X World Championship top qualifier Jason Belmonte will try for his 20th career PBA Tour title and second of the season when he joins four-time tour winner Ronnie Russell, three-time winner Andres Gomez and AJ Chapman in tonight's finals of the PBA Chameleon Championship live on FS1 at 8 p.m. ET

All four players survived Round of 16 and Round of 8 best-of-five game competition today in the second event of PBA World Series of Bowling X at Thunderbowl Lanes.

Bowling on the 39-foot PBA Chameleon lane condition, Belmonte beat Tim Pfeifer, who advanced all the way from the pre-tournament qualifier, 3-2. Gomez, who has won two of his tour titles in previous World Series events, beat PBA Hall of Famer and 40-time tour winner Norm Duke, 3-2, while Russell beat Rafiq Ismail of Malaysia, 3-1, and Chapman, trying for his first PBA Tour title, beat Anthony Pepe, 3-1, in Round-of-8 best-of-five elimination competition to advance to the telecast.

Belmonte owns the record for most titles bowled in WSOB events at four. He won his first title of the season in the PBA Tournament of Champions for a record-tying 10th major title.

Jason Belmonte Wins PBA Chameleon Championship for 20th Career Title

236-194 title match win over Andres Gomez makes Belmonte season's third two-time winner

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 19, 2019) – Four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia won the PBA Chameleon Championship Tuesday for his 20th career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title and to become the third two-time winner this season.

The 35-year-old two-hander from Australia defeated three-time tour winner and Chameleon Championship finals top qualifier Andres Gomez of Colombia 236-194 in the second event of PBA World Series of Bowling X at Thunderbowl Lanes which was televised live by FS1.

Belmonte threw seven strikes in the match and didn't throw a shot worse than nine on the first ball to maintain a comfortable lead over Gomez throughout the match.

"What you find is that making a good shot to get to the pocket really isn't the issue, it's how the ball goes through the pins once it gets there," said Belmonte, who won his 18th career title in the 2018 PBA Tour Finals at Thunderbowl Lanes. "When you leave a single pin, it puts you in an odd position of deciding how much of a change you should make to carry those single pins because you're basically making good shots. But, on the other hand, you don't want to leave those single pins all day."

By winning the Chameleon Championship Belmonte joined PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke and Dick Allen as two-time winners this season. He also joined Hall of Famers Amleto Monacelli, Dick Ritger and Wayne Webb in the 20 career win club.

Belmonte won the PBA Tournament of Champions in February for his 19th career title and to tie Hall of Famers Pete Weber and Earl Anthony for most major titles with 10.

"It's a crazy big number I never thought I would reach," Belmonte said. "I'm just enjoying the moment and then moving forward to the next tournament. I'll celebrate a little tonight and then focus on what I need to do tomorrow. "You don't want to live in the past or the future because it will distract you from what you need to do now."

Bowling on the PBA 39-foot Chameleon lane condition, the finals opened with a seeding round that determined the qualifying order for three stepladder matches. Gomez earned the top seed for the finals with a 235 game followed by Belmonte, 227; No. 3 qualifier AJ Chapman, Manchester, Iowa, 205, and four-time tour winner Ronnie Russell, Marion, Ind., 179.

In the opening stepladder match, Chapman, making his second tour telecast and trying for his first tour win beat Russell 244-233 to advance to the semifinal match against Belmonte. Belmonte beat Chapman 200-197 in the semifinal to advance to the title match against Gomez.

The four finalists survived Round-of-16 and Round-of-8 best-of-five elimination rounds earlier Tuesday after qualifying rounds bowled last week to advance to the telecast.

Belmonte will have an opportunity to add more milestones to his career this week. He will try for his 21st tour win when WSOB X competition continues with Round-of-16 and Round-of-8 elimination rounds Wednesday for the PBA Scorpion Championship which will determine the four finalists for the finals telecast at 8 p.m. ET on FS1.

Belmonte has already earned top qualifier honors for Thursday's stepladder finals of the PBA World Championship where he will try for a record 11th major title. The World Championship finals will air live Thursday at 8 p.m. ET. A \$1 million bonus will be paid if Belmonte or his opponent can bowl a 300 game in the title match.

WSOB wraps up with the tape-delayed USA vs. The World team competition Friday also at 8 p.m. on FS1.

Kris Prather Wins PBA Scorpion Championship for First Career PBA Tour Title

Prather beats BJ Moore 200-190 in title match of third animal pattern event of WSOB X

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 20, 2019) – With seven career top-five finishes over the past two seasons without a win, Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., finally made it to the winner's circle Wednesday by winning the PBA Scorpion Championship for his first career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title.

The 27-year-old Prather defeated stepladder finals top qualifier BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pa., 200-190, in the title match of the third tournament of PBA World Series of Bowling X at Thunderbowl Lanes.

After five frames in the title match, Prather held a 10-pin lead over Moore, who was also trying for his first tour win, when he left the 4-10 split in the sixth frame on a seemingly good hit.

"I didn't have a clue what happened there because it was a pretty good shot as far as I was concerned," said Prather. "It could have been a turning point in the match but there was still time to get back on track. I decided after that shot the best thing to do was move a little further left and create a little more angle to the pocket and that turned out to be a good adjustment."

Prather's previous best tour finish was third which he had achieved four times.

"Even though I wasn't winning, I was fortunate to achieve small breakthroughs in my game over the past 18 months," Prather said. "That was a good thing because I didn't want to go backwards. I could still find something positive to take away from those (top five) finishes even though I didn't win."

Moore, whose best previous finish was second in the 2016 Scorpion Championship, earned the top seed for the finals with a 224 game in a seeding round to open the live FS1 telecast. Ten-time tour winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., earned the No. 2 spot with 215, followed by Prather, 212, and three-time tour winner Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, N.C., 194.

In the first stepladder match, Prather beat Troup 222-208 to advance to the semifinal match against O'Neill. Prather doubled in the 10th frame to beat O'Neill 198-190 to advance to the title match against Moore.

As was the case with the first two animal pattern events, the four finalists survived Round-of-16 and Round-of-8 best-of-five elimination rounds earlier Wednesday after qualifying rounds bowled last week to advance to the telecast.

In the Round-of-8, Prather swept two-hander Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, 3-0, and beat PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke, 3-2, in the Round-of-16 which included a 300-211 match win in the last game.

The focus of WSOB X now swings to the stepladder finals of the PBA World Championship which will be televised live Thursday at 8 p.m. ET on FS1.

As the World Championship top qualifier, four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia, who won the Championship Tuesday for his 20th career tour title, will try for a record 11th major win in the third major of the season.

The finals will also include O'Neill and Moore who qualified third and fifth, respectively, for the finals. The No. 2 qualifier is Matt McNiel of Minneapolis and the No. 4 qualifier is five-time tour winner Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz.

A \$1 million bonus will be paid if Belmonte or his opponent can bowl a 300 game in the title match.

Jason Belmonte Wins PBA World Championship for Record 11th Major Title

Australian two-hander beats Jakob Butturff 236-227 in title match for 21st career tour win

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 21, 2019) – Australia's Jason Belmonte successfully defended his PBA World Championship title Thursday for a record 11th PBA major crown, continuing to set new benchmarks of performance for the PBA Tour's most prestigious and challenging tournaments.

The 35-year-old two-hander defeated Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., 236-227, in the title match of the stepladder finals televised live by FS1. The World Championship, the Go Bowling! PBA Tour season's third major, was the pinnacle event of the multi-event PBA World Series of Bowling X at Thunderbowl Lanes.

In his 11th season on tour, Belmonte broke a tie with PBA Hall of Famers Earl Anthony and Pete Weber for most major titles, after winning his 10th major in the PBA Tournament of Champions in February. He had a chance to win his 11th major in the Players Championship a week after the Tournament of Champions but was defeated by fellow two-hander Anthony Simonsen in the title match of that tournament.

Having been top qualifier for the finals of the Tournament of Champions, Players Championship and the World Championship, Belmonte also set a new mark for earning the top qualifier position for the finals in three consecutive major tournaments in a season.

"I'm so overwhelmed right now that if I could express how I feel I don't know if anyone could understand me," said Belmonte, who also won his 21st career tour title. "To break a record held by two of the greatest players of all time is just something I never thought was possible when I first started on tour more than 10 years ago. I'm proof that you can achieve your dreams."

Belmonte got off to a fast start in the title match with strikes in the first three frames, while Butturff, trying for his first major and sixth career tour title, struggled until striking in the third frame. Butturff ran into trouble again in the sixth frame when he missed a seven pin but recovered to throw the last six strikes of the match to eventually force Belmonte to strike on the first ball in the 10th and then finish the frame with a spare. Belmonte doubled in the 10th to seal the win.

"Jakob is a great player and I knew what he was capable of so for him to come back from that missed spare really didn't surprise me," Belmonte said. "He put together a clutch performance to the very end.

"Going into the 10th I knew my ball had to be perfect going through the pins and those were two of the best shots of my life," Belmonte added. "I can't think of a better way to win this tournament."

Belmonte also became the season's first three-time winner having also won the Chameleon Championship on Tuesday. He also extended his record of career tour wins in WSOB competition to six.

The stepladder finals started with Butturff, who qualified fourth, beating No. 5 qualifier BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pa., 236-183. Moore, who was trying for his first PBA Tour title, finished fifth which tied his best finish in a major when he also finished fifth in the 2018 Tournament of Champions.

The 24-year-old Butturff then beat 10-time tour winner No. 3 qualifier Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa, 235-226, to advance to the semifinal match where he beat part-time tour player and No. 2 qualifier Matt McNiel of Minneapolis, 184-179, to advance to the title match against Belmonte.

The next stop for the Go Bowling! PBA Tour will be the USBC Masters March 26-April 1 at the Gold Coast Bowling Center in Las Vegas where Belmonte will try for his 12th major win. After the season's fourth major has concluded, the top 24 players in points will earn berths in the PBA Playoffs which begin April 8 with the Round of 24 eliminations at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

World Series of Bowling X action concludes Friday on FS1 with the USA vs. The World team competition from Thunderbowl Lanes at 8 p.m. ET.

'The World' Beats USA in PBA World Series of Bowling X USA vs. The World Team Challenge

ALLEN PARK, Mich. (March 22, 2019) – The five leading International scorers from PBA World Series of Bowling X qualifying beat the five highest U.S. scorers to win the USA vs. The World team competition, 2-0, in a best-of-three Baker team format finals to conclude a historic week of PBA competition on FS1 at Thunderbowl Lanes in Suburban Detroit.

The World team, made up of Pontus Andersson (Sweden), Andres Gomez (Colombia), Dom Barrett (England) and Australians Sam Cooley and Jason Belmonte defeated the U.S. team of Bill O'Neill, Kyle

Sherman, Tom Daugherty, Anthony Simonsen and EJ Tackett, to end the U.S.'s two-year reign as champion of the non-title WSOB "all-star" event.

The U.S. team, captained by PBA Hall of Famer Marshall Holman, jumped out to the lead in the first game of the second match 184-176 but The World team, captained by Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli, came back to win the second game 204-156 to force a sudden death one-ball roll-off. Belmonte, who was coming off a historic PBA World Championship win Thursday, won the roll-off against Tackett with a nine-count to seven for Tackett, who left the 2-8-10 split, for the title.

In the first match, the U.S. team also took the early lead, winning the first game 234-227 but then lost to The World team in the second game 213-202 to force another one-ball roll-off. Belmonte and Tackett tied with strikes in the first roll-off frame with a strike, forcing a second roll-off where Barrett struck to beat Simonsen's eight-count (2-10 split) to give The World team a 1-0 lead heading into the second match.

The Baker format requires each player to bowl two frames in one game to combine for one score. The leadoff bowler bowls frame one and six, the second bowler frames two and seven and so on until the anchor bowler bowls frame five and 10.

"It's another great example of showcasing the international scope of the sport and the talent that exists all over the world," Belmonte said. "I felt good about this team because we bowl against each other all over the world so I knew we could develop a good chemistry right away.

"Like all team competitions, the key is communication between the players," Belmonte added. "We share what we experience on every shot, then it's up to each player to execute."

Monacelli, a 20-time PBA Tour and eight-time PBA50 Tour winner, who is also coach for the Dominican Republic national team, echoed Belmonte's comments as a coach for the highly talented World team.

"They know what to do as far as their physical game is concerned," Monacelli said. "What's important is putting together a good order (lineup). I try to help with the mental side and give them another pair of eyes to see what is happening with the lanes and their games. What the eyes can't see, the body feels so I try to get them to connect with that feel so they can trust in the decisions they make."

The players earned berths on their respective teams based on their finishing positions after 30 qualifying games from the 10-game qualifying rounds of the WSOB X Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion events.

PORTLAND, Maine (March 25, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famers Walter Ray Williams Jr. and Pete Weber are in. Two-time PBA League Most Valuable Player Dick Allen is among the "free agents" on the outside awaiting his fate after the PBAL's eight team managers announced on Monday the players they have returned to their 2019 rosters based on previous performances in PBA League competition.

PBA League fans can begin the debate over who will fill out the team roster vacancies when the PBA League Draft is held on Monday, April 8 at Bayside Bowl. Among those hoping to make their PBA League debut in 2019 are 2018 PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson of Holly, Mich., and first-time PBA Tour title winners Kris Prather of Plainfield, Ill., and Matt Ogle of Louisville, Ky.

For the first time, Bayside fans will have an opportunity to attend the draft when the eight 2019 team managers complete their rosters as the draft airs live on FloBowling, PBA's official online live-streaming outlet, beginning at 4 p.m. EDT.

Leading off the draft, Portland Lumberjacks manager Tim Mack will make the first pick from a pool of players who finish in the top 40 in 2019 competition points as of Monday, April 1 by virtue of the Lumberjacks' last-place finish in the 2018 Elias Cup tournament. Choosing second will be L.A. X, followed by the Brooklyn Styles, New York City Kingpins, Motown Muscle, Dallas Strikers, Philadelphia Hitmen and defending champion Silver Lake Atom Splitters. LAS VEGAS - Just days after returning home from the World Bowling Junior Championships in Paris, Solomon Salama of Beverly Hills, California, has ascended to the top of the standings after the opening round at the 2019 USBC Masters

The 16-year-old two-hander, who is bowling the Masters as an amateur, leads a field of 450 bowlers at the Gold Coast Hotel and Casino after posting a five-game block of 1,184, a 236.8 average, on Wednesday.

Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, rolled Wednesday's only 300 game to move into second place in the standings with 1,158. Greg Thompson Jr. of Tempe, Arizona, is third with 1,147, Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri, is fourth with 1,138 and Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tennessee, is fifth with 1,134.

imageSalama, who attacks the lanes from the left side, had been competing as part of Junior Team USA at the World Junior Championships, where he claimed a silver medal in doubles with Anthony Neuer of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania.

After returning from his trip, he stayed home for just one evening before beginning his trek to Las Vegas to make his debut at the Masters.

"It was a little hectic at times," said Salama, a two-time winner at the Junior Gold Championships. "I only had one night to wash all of my clothes and make it here, but since I enjoy doing this, I didn't really find it to be too much of a hassle."

Salama started competition Wednesday on the "burn" variation of this week's 39-foot condition, meaning one squad already had bowled on the pattern before his squad.

He quickly found the right line, firing games of 206, 279, 280 and 228 before finishing with 191.

"The first couple of games, I wasn't seeing a lot of shape in the middle," Salama said. "So, I had to keep it outside the whole time. I tried to keep everything in front of me to get my ball to roll off the spot." Salama's final two rounds of qualifying will be contested on the fresh, but he feels confident in his ability to create the ball reaction he'd like to see.

He also has confidence from finding previous success at Gold Coast. Earlier this year, Salama finished in fourth place at the USBC Team USA Trials to also earn his spot on Team USA for 2019.

"I feel like the right-handers have to chase the fronts, and I can keep left and do what I do," Salama said. "My carry has been pretty good here, too. It just seems to match up for me."

Salama entered this year's event hoping to gain experience and test himself against the best in the world. Through one round, he's put himself in the best possible position to advance to the tournament's doubleelimination match-play bracket to continue his education process.

"I wasn't expecting very much coming in this year," Salama said. "I was just looking to see what the competition is like and gain some experience. I'm going to try and enjoy my time and hope to continue to bowl well."

All competitors will return to Gold Coast on Thursday for the second round of qualifying, starting with B Squad competitors at 11 a.m. Eastern.

Qualifying will consist of three five-game blocks over three days to determine the 63 players joining defending champion Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, in match play. Anderson is guaranteed the No. 64 spot in the bracket but can improve his seeding through qualifying. After Wednesday's opening round, Anderson is tied for 199th place with a 958 total.

Four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte who is coming off a PBA World Championship win for a record 11th career major finished the first round in a tie for 94th with a 1,010 pinfall total. He's having to use an altered grip with the fingers on his right hand because of an accident suffered in a youth event prior to the Masters.

Competition in the match-play bracket will begin Saturday, with three-game total-pinfall matches determining which players advance. The top five players will advance to Monday's stepladder finals, which will be broadcast live at 9 p.m. Eastern on FS1.

AJ Johnson Averages 232.8 after Two Rounds to Take USBC Masters Lead by Jerry Schneider | Friday, March 29, 12:09 AM

AJ Johnson Averages 232.8 after Two Rounds to Take USBC Masters Lead By Aaron Smith, USBC Communications

LAS VEGAS - AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, posted the top block Thursday at the 2019 USBC Masters to take over the top spot through two rounds at the Gold Coast Hotel and Casino.

The 26-year-old right-hander, fired games of 246, 222, 234, 257 and 256 for a five-game total of 1,215 to bring his overall tally for 10 games to 2,328, a 232.8 average.

Opening-round leader Solomon Salama of Beverly Hills, California, dropped to second with 2,314, while Japan's Shota Kawazoe moved into third with 2,281. Jake Peters of Henderson, Nevada, is fourth with 2,242, and Michael Machuga of Erie, Pennsylvania, is fifth with 2,217.

Johnson, trying for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title, has been avoiding mistakes through his first two rounds, recording a low game of 211.

"I'm just staying patient," said Johnson, who was the runner-up at the 2015 USBC Masters. "This pattern is playing pretty tough, so all I'm trying to do is hit the 1-3 (pocket) as much as I can. I'm trying to take everything in stride. Just hit the pocket, make my spares and move on."

Johnson has made some changes to his game early in 2019, including switching his bowling ball brand and dropping to 15 lb. equipment. It's been an adjustment, but he's seeing progress each week.

"It's been a slow progress, but it's been progressing in the right direction each week," said Johnson, a five-time member of Team USA. "I've been bowling really well, but I've just been missing one or two things here or there. I feel the switch to from 16 to 15 has helped my ball reaction because the (bowling ball) core numbers are so different. I feel like I have more variety and don't feel like I'm locked into certain balls at certain times throughout the day. Plus, all of the guys on the team have been really helpful."

Johnson's second round was contested on the fresh 39-foot oil pattern being used this week, and he'll return to the fresh Friday to conclude qualifying. He was able to play to his strengths Thursday and hopes to continue to find that reaction for the remainder of his time at Gold Coast.

"I tried to stay behind it and roll it a little more, while staying right," Johnson said. "Once you get in, the pattern tends to flatten out a bit and get tricky. A lot of guys were throwing urethane today, so I felt I could stay a little closer to it and roll it, which plays to my A game. It worked out very well today, and hopefully my A game still is in play tomorrow."

All competitors will return Friday for the final round of qualifying, with bowlers on C Squad kicking off the action at 11 a.m. Eastern.

Qualifying consists of three five-game blocks over three days to determine the 63 players joining defending champion Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, in match play. Anderson is guaranteed the No. 64 spot in the bracket but can improve his seeding through qualifying. After two rounds, Anderson is tied for 99th place with a 2,004 total.

Heading into Friday, Colombia's Oscar Rodriguez and Minneapolis' Matt McNiel are tied for 63rd place with a 2,048 total, a 204.8 average.

Competition in the match-play bracket will begin Saturday, with three-game total-pinfall matches determining which players advance. The top five players will advance to Monday's stepladder finals, which will be broadcast live at 9 p.m. Eastern on FS1.

BRAD MILLER WINS WORLD SERIES "CARANO AWARD" AS MOST IMPROVED PLAYER

Brad Miller of Lees Summit, Mo., earned the 2019 PBA Don Carano Award as the most improved player in PBA World Series of Bowling X compared to his performance in WSOB IX in Reno in 2017.

Miller, a 29-year-old seven-year PBA member, finished 41st in the 135-player field at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., moving up 99 places compared to 2017. He won the honor by a single place in the standings over **Brian Robinson** of Morgantown, W.Va., who finished 43rd on the overall standings after the Cheetah, Chameleon and Scorpion Championship qualifying rounds, 98 places better than his 141st place in 2017. Coincidentally, Miller and Robinson were the only two players in the 2019 field who posted higher averages than they did in the 2017 qualifying rounds. Miller averaged 209.63 for his three animal pattern events in 2019 – up 1.36 pins over 2017 – while Robinson averaged 209.33 this year compared to 208.25 – a 1.08-pin improvement over 2017.

"A lot of great things are happening this year and this just solidifies it," Miller said, referring in part to his second-place finish in the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship earlier in the season with partner **Kyle Sherman**. "From year to year I worked on my balance. Before, I didn't have a lot of leverage, so I got lower to ground and got my hand under the ball, and it's changed everything."

As the winner of the second Carano award, Miller will receive a premium bottle of Ferrari Carano wine from the Carano family winery, dinner for two at Carano's La Strada Ristorante and complimentary luxury accommodations at Eldorado or Silver Legacy Resort Casino. Germany's **Tobias Börding** won the inaugural PBA Don Carano Award in 2017, honoring the patriarch of the Carano family that was integral in the building of the National Bowling Stadium and the development of Reno's Tri-Properties. Carano died on Oct. 3, 2017, at age 85.

LAS VEGAS - Solomon Salama, a 16-year-old two-hander, is the qualifying leader after 15 games at the 2019 USBC Masters

Salama, from Beverly Hills, California, led a field of 450 of the top bowlers in the world at the Gold Coast Hotel and Casino, finishing qualifying with a 3,492 total, a 232.8 average.

AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, finished qualifying in second place with 3,423, Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, is third with 3,362, Michael Machuga of Erie, Pennsylvania, is fourth with 3,335 and Japan's Shota Kawazoe rounds out the top five with 3,329.

Johnson, who finished second in the 2015 Masters, is trying for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title.

The 2019 event now will transition to match play starting Saturday at 1 p.m. Eastern. A total of 64 players advanced to the tournament's double-elimination bracket.

The final spots in match play went to Jonathan Van Hees of Charlestown, Rhode Island, and Canada's Patrick Girard, who finished qualifying tied for 62nd place with a 3,069 total, a 204.6 average. Van Hees rolled 206 in his final game to move into the cut, while Girard was able to hold on after finishing qualifying with 139.

Defending champion Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, finished qualifying in a tie for 153rd place with 2,944, but he was guaranteed the No. 64 spot in the bracket if he was unable to improve his seeding through qualifying.

image[1]Salama, who attacks the lanes from the left-side, will face off against Anderson, a 23-year-old right-hander, in Saturday's first round.

Salama also was the leader after Wednesday's opening round of competition and reclaimed the top spot after games of 250, 178, 258, 213 and 279 on Friday for a 1,178 set.

The two-time Junior Gold Championships winner recently competed for Junior Team USA at the World Bowling Junior Championships in Paris, winning a silver medal in doubles with Anthony Neuer of Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, and he showed total command of his game on this week's 39-foot oil pattern.

"It feels pretty good," said Salama, who also is part of Team USA after earning a spot at the 2019 USBC Team USA Trials, which also was held at Gold Coast. "My strategy won't change heading into match play. I'm going to execute and try to keep it all left. I doesn't really matter who I bowl, I just need to focus on my game."

USBC Masters Field Down to 16 Heading into Final Day of Match Play By Aaron Smith, USBC Communications A total of eight players remain in the winners bracket at the 2019 USBC Masters after the opening rounds of match play Saturday at the Gold Coast Hotel and Casino.

Eight additional players still are in contention with the tournament's double-elimination format and have the opportunity to advance to the stepladder finals and claim the \$30,000 top prize and major championship on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour schedule.

The 16 players left in the field will return to Gold Coast on Sunday at 1 p.m. Eastern, and match play will continue until the top five players for Monday's stepladder finals are determined. The finals will be broadcast live at 9 p.m. Eastern on FS1.

One of the eight remaining players in the winners bracket is Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tennessee, who is making his USBC Masters debut this week.

After finishing qualifying in 12th place, the 26-year-old left-hander rolled through his three matches Saturday by averaging more than 239 in wins over Martin Larsen of Sweden (733-574), Greg Thompson Jr. of Tempe, Arizona (740-536), and Dom Barrett of England (686-575).

He'll face Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, in Sunday's opening three-game total-pinfall contest. Holliman started his week with a strong opening block of qualifying Wednesday, which included a 299 game, but he admitted the second and third rounds didn't go as well as he would have liked, primarily with his spare shooting.

Holliman.Mykiel_WichitaKS_2019WSOB (1)Holliman came in with a fresh mindset Saturday for match play and was able to minimize mistakes throughout his three victories.

"Coming into today, I told myself I needed to start over," Holliman said. "It's a new day and new tournament, so I wanted to come out and just make good shots and go from there. This morning, I saw a little more hook on the gutter and was able to play that a little better. I also had a few breaks in there, but I made all my spares."

Holliman is a rookie on the PBA Tour this season, and he's fresh off a strong showing at the PBA World Series of Bowling X. He was able to make the top 16 at the PBA Cheetah Championship and just missed advancing to the championship round, finishing in fifth place.

The World Series of Bowling and Masters had been events on Holliman's bucket list, and he's been able to show that he can compete with the best players in the world.

He's ready to take the next step and now is just two wins away from securing a spot in the stepladder finals.

"This is a tournament I've always wanted to bowl, and it's been a fun experience," Holliman said. "But, it's definitely been challenging so far. For tomorrow, I plan to come in like I did today. It's a new day and a new tournament. I'm going to take it one shot at a time and try not to press myself too hard."

Other matches in the winners bracket Sunday include Brad Miller of Raytown, Missouri, against Ireland's Christopher Sloan, Jake Peters of Henderson, Nevada, taking on Jonathan Van Hees of Charlestown, Rhode Island, and Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, versus Rhino Page of Orlando, Florida.

Anthony Simonsen of Princeton, Texas, is the only remaining Masters champion in the field. The 2016 champion, who became the youngest to win a major with his Masters win at age 19, will face PJ Haggerty of Roseville, California, on Sunday in the elimination bracket.

Simonsen avoided elimination in an elimination bracket match against Justin Dunn when he was down by more than 90 pin after the first game of the three-game match but came back to win with a narrow 731-729 victory

The bracket at the 2019 Masters was determined by 15 qualifying games over three days at Gold Coast. The top 63 players from the 450-player field joined defending champion Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, in the double-elimination bracket.

Anderson's title defense came to an end Saturday after finishing tied for 17th place. He won his first two matches before falling to Miller, 687-605, and Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri, 717-562.

Jakob Butturff Goes 6-0 in Match Play to Earn Top Seed for USBC Masters Finals by Jerry Schneider | Sunday, March 31, 7:58 PM

Jakob Butturff Goes 6-0 in Match Play to Earn Top Seed for USBC Masters Finals By Aaron Smith, USBC Communication

LAS VEGAS - Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, will be bowling in the title match of a major championship for the third time since October after staying undefeated in match play at the 2019 USBC Masters.

The 24-year-old left-hander won six consecutive matches over Saturday and Sunday at the Gold Coast Hotel and Casino to claim the top seed for Monday's stepladder finals, including a 673-665 victory over fellow southpaw Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tennessee, in the final of the winners bracket. Holliman, 26, will be the No. 2 seed Monday.

033119-Masters-Top-5[1]Butturff and Holliman will be joined on FS1 by Jake Peters of Henderson, Nevada, Canada's Mitch Hupé and Ireland's Christopher Sloan, who advanced from a four-player elimination match to earn the final spots in the stepladder finals.

The finals of the 2019 USBC Masters will be broadcast live at 9 p.m. Eastern on FS1. The champion will claim the \$30,000 top prize and coveted major title on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour schedule.

Butturff still is looking for his first victory at a major championship after runner-up finishes at the U.S. Open (2017 and 2018) and PBA World Championship (2019). He also was the top seed at the U.S. Open in 2017 and 2018.

His run to the top seed proved to be challenging as he struggled with a back injury, but he was able to keep his focus through his nine games Sunday, averaging better than 225 in his three wins.

"I had a lot of pain in my upper back, near my left shoulder," said Butturff, a five-time PBA Tour titlist. "This morning, it was bad enough to where I had to get up and just kind of move around my muscles. I had a lot of pain when I went up to bowl, but I've learned to put pain aside. I just tried to focus on the bowling, not the pain."

Butturff admitted he began to notice some discomfort in the same area during qualifying earlier this week, but he did not experience the same type of pain he felt Sunday and plans to visit a chiropractor prior to Monday's finals.

Despite the pain, Butturff was able to get comfortable this week in a familiar part of the lane on the 39-foot lane condition being used at Gold Coast.

He's also comfortable at the 70-lane venue, having regularly competed at Gold Coast throughout the years. Butturff now hopes to add one more memory to his collection at the center.

"My A game definitely is getting out near the gutter, and I was able to do that all week," said Butturff, a three-time Team USA member. "Gold Coast was one of the centers I grew up in as well, since I used to live in Las Vegas, so I'm comfortable here. Tomorrow, I need to just go out there and bowl my own game. With Mykel on the show, I'll have another left-hander to watch, so I'll keep an eye on his game prior to mine, but I'm going to go out there and give it all I got."

Holliman, who made his debut this week at the Masters, posted the biggest scores throughout match play, averaging more than 230 in his six matches. He's making his first championship-round appearance after just missing the show at the PBA Cheetah Championship earlier this month, finishing in fifth place. Peters is the only other PBA Tour champion in the finals. He claimed his title at the 2013 PBA Badger Open.

Hupé and Sloan will be making the first championship-round appearances of their careers. Peters, Hupé and Sloan advanced to Monday's stepladder finals after making it through the shootout match that included the final four players in the elimination bracket.

Peters jumped into the top spot in the final game after rolling 226 to secure the No. 3 seed with a 668 series. Hupé followed with 648 to claim the No. 4 seed and will face Sloan (603) in Monday's opening match. Kenny Ryan of Farmingdale, New Jersey, finished with 576 and was eliminated in sixth place.

The 2019 Masters consisted of three five-game qualifying blocks for the 450-player field to determine the 63 bowlers joining defending champion Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, in the tournament's doubleelimination bracket. Anderson finished tied for 17th place.

\$100,000 first prize awaits the winner in live FOX telecast on Sunday, June 2

LAS VEGAS (April 1, 2019) – After a stunning start to the 2019 Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour season, Australia's Jason Belmonte ran away with the competition points race that served as the prelude to the inaugural PBA Playoffs, an historic event that will get underway on April 8 at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

The players who qualified ninth through 24th will bowl one-game single-elimination matches in the Round of 24 beginning with live coverage of the first four matches on FS1 on April 8. The next four single-game Round of 24 matches will air on FS1 on Monday, April 15.

Jakob Butturff Wins USBC Masters for First Major Title by Bill Vint | Monday, April 01, 9:45 PM

Jakob Butturff Wins USBC Masters for First Major Title By Aaron Smith, USBC Communications

LAS VEGAS – Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, captured his first career major championship after winning the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Masters on Monday at the Gold Coast Hotel and Casino.

The 24-year-old left-hander defeated fellow southpaw Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tennessee, 228-196, to win his sixth career Professional Bowlers Association Tour title and \$30,000 top prize. Holliman received \$25,000 for the runner-up finish.

Monday's stepladder finals were broadcast live on FS1.

Butturff had finished as the runner-up in his three previous appearances on television in major championships. He lost as the top seed at both the 2017 and 2018 U.S. Open and fell to Australia's Jason Belmonte in the title match of the 2019 PBA World Championship in March.

After waking up Sunday with a terrible pain in his upper back prior to match play, Butturff's perseverance paid off as the top seed Monday to claim the biggest win of his career.

"Honestly, I don't even know what to say," Butturff said. "Two days ago, I was in unbearable pain, but I had so many people help me out. I was able to adjust my game even though I was in pain, but here I am. I just won my first major."

Butturff gained the early lead in the title match, starting with three consecutive strikes, while Holliman recorded an open in the second frame after missing the 6-7 split.

Butturff continued to fill frames to maintain his advantage, but Holliman responded with strikes in the fifth, sixth and seventh frames to cut the deficit to 13 pins. With a chance to add a fourth consecutive strike in the eighth, Holliman left a 9 pin to derail his momentum.

Holliman was unable to strike again until his fill ball, allowing Butturff to coast in the final frame, needing just four pins for the victory. He struck on his first shot of the 10th to secure the win.

Butturff admitted the left lane had gotten tougher for him through practice prior to the title match, but he was able to rely on what he had learned throughout the week at Gold Coast to quickly make the adjustment.

"During practice, the left lane ended up getting pretty tricky," Butturff said. "I felt more comfortable on the right lane, and the first shot I threw on the left lane hooked almost immediately. My move this week when I got it a little slow and saw that much hook was to move right, and I was able to make the shots I needed to towards the end of the match."

Holliman, 26, made his USBC Masters debut this week at Gold Coast and advanced to his first championship round after nearly making the finals at the PBA Cheetah Championship in March. The left lane ended up transitioning quite a bit for Holliman against Butturff, but he's happy with his performance in his television debut.

"I was nervous and the adrenaline kicked in a lot," Holliman said. "No matter how much you prepare, it's different when the lights come on. The first few shots on the left lane hooked, so I moved three boards with my feet, one with my eyes and lofted it farther down the lane to trip the 6 pin in the sixth frame. I moved another board off that in the eighth and left that brutal 9 pin, which kind of sealed it from my point. It was the best shot I threw, but I have nothing to be disappointed about. This was my second major and first TV show, and I finished second. I have nothing to be ashamed of."

Holliman made his way to the title match by defeating Jake Peters of Henderson, Nevada, 217-199. Peters started with strikes in four of his first five frames but gave Holliman the chance to take the lead after missing the 3-6-9-10 combination in the sixth frame. Holliman took advantage, rolling three consecutive strikes, to outdistance Peters.

Peters advanced to the semifinals by defeating Ireland's Christopher Sloan, 254-226. Needing a strike to have the opportunity to shut out Sloan, Peters first shot of the 10th frame rolled high into the pocket but was able to trip out the 4-9 split at the last moment.

The opening match Monday came down to a roll-off as Sloan and Canada's Mitch Hupé tied at 214. Hupé had the opportunity to win the match by knocking down at least nine pins on his first delivery in the 10th frame but left the 3-6 combination. After converting the spare, he struck to force the tie.

Hupé, the No. 4 seed, elected to start the roll-off and left a 4 pin. Sloan struck to advance, 10-9. The 2019 Masters welcomed 450 competitors to Gold Coast this week. All bowlers participated in 15 qualifying games over three days to determine the 63 competitors joining defending champion Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan, in the tournament's double-elimination bracket. Anderson finished tied for 17th place in his title defense.

Each team protected three players from the previous season heading into the draft except the Brooklyn Styles which protected two players.

The draft was conducted in reverse order of how teams finished in 2018, beginning with the No. 8 Portland Lumberjacks, followed by L.A. X, Brooklyn Styles, New York City Kingpins, Motown Muscle, Dallas Strikers, Philadelphia Hitmen, and defending champion Silver Lake Atom-Splitters. The serpentine draft order then required the Atom Splitters to make the first pick in the second round.

Following Prather, Jason Belmonte, selecting for L.A. X team manager Andrew Cain, chose 2015 and 2018 Elias Cup winner and two-time 2019 tour winner Dick Allen with the second pick and Brooklyn Styles Manager Johnny Petraglia selected six-time tour winner and 2017 Elias Cup winner Rhino Page with the third pick. Other first round picks were Marshall Kent, selecting for New York City Kingpins manager Carolyn Dorin-Ballard picking Kyle Sherman; EJ Tackett, selecting for Motown Muscle manager Del Ballard, picking AJ Chapman; Dallas Strikers player-manager Norm Duke choosing 2018 PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson; Philadelphia Hitmen manager Jason Couch, selecting 2016 Elias Cup winner Shawn Maldonado and defending Elias Cup champion Silver Lake Atom Splitters manager Mark Baker selecting DJ Archer.

The PBA Playoffs continue Monday, April 15 at 8 p.m. ET on FS1 with the completion of Round of 24 single-game elimination action. The second half of the Round of 24 will feature Wes Malott vs. Josh Blanchard; Marshall Kent, vs. Jesper Svensson; Dom Barrett vs. Brad Miller and Kyle Sherman vs. DJ Archer

Round of 16 and Round of 8 matches will be contested April 9 and 10 at Bayside Bowl – which will be televised by FS1 on consecutive Monday nights at 9 p.m. ET beginning April 22 – to reduce the field to four survivors who will return to Portland for the semifinal and final rounds June 1-2, with both shows airing live on FOX at noon Eastern.

Francois Lavoie Wins PBA FireLake/Grand Casino Resort Southwest Open

CHICAGO (April 10, 2019) -- The 2019 PBA50 Tour season gets underway April 14-17 when a full field of 160 players ages 50 and older compete in the Johnny Petraglia BVL Open presented by Lucas Magazine and Brunswick at Maple Countryside Lanes in Clearwater, Florida, followed by the season's first major championship, the PBA50 National Championship at Spanish Springs Lanes in The Villages, Florida.

Michael Haugen Jr.'s win in the 2018 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open, when it was held at Farmingdale Lanes in New York, was the launching point for PBA50 Player of the Year honors in a season in which he was the only multiple champion with two wins. The three-time PBA50 Tour winner defeated PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr., 277-195, for his second career PBA50 tour title before going on to win the River City Extreme Open later in the year.

Bowling legend Johnny Petraglia, 72, who is still competing on the PBA50 Tour more than a half-century after making his debut on the regular PBA Tour in 1965, also will compete in the tournament named in his honor. With 14 PBA Tour titles and eight PBA50 Tour titles, Petraglia is the only player in PBA history to win national titles in six different decades. FREAK ACCIDENT HINDERS JASON BELMONTE'S DOMINANT SEASON

• A freak accident during a youth bowling event prior to the USBC Masters has played a hand – no pun attended – in slowing **Jason Belmonte**'s dominating season in 2019, including his bid for a 12th major championship in the Masters, an event he had previously won a record four times.

As told to FloBowling senior editor **Lucas Wiseman**, the 35-year-old Australian twohanded player explained his injury:

"I had my hand in a ball, and I was giving some of the kids a tip," Belmonte said. "As I swung the ball back with one hand, one of the fellas was holding his ball, and he had moved a little bit. So, when I swung it back, my finger in the ball got jammed into the ball the young fella was holding. As soon as I did it, it split open and started bleeding and the bruising and swelling came up pretty quick."

The cut, across the crease below his fingertip on his index finger, and the bruising and swelling accompanying the injury, forced Belmonte to bowl using only his ring and little fingers to grip the ball – something he said he had "never done before." The result was a 194.73 average for his 15 qualifying games in the Masters and a 169th-place finish – well below the cut line.

Belmonte was hoping for rapid healing before his next major test – a Round of 16 match against fellow two-hander **Kyle Troup** in the inaugural PBA Playoffs. Belmonte was the runaway top qualifier for the Playoffs, earning a first-round bye, and will face Troup – who eliminated PBA Hall of Famer **Chris Barnes** in his opening Round of 24 match – in a Round of 16 match that will air on Monday, April 22, at 9 p.m. EDT on FS1.

TEXAN THOMAS SIMMONS WINS PBA BOWLING CHALLENGE WSOB X ANNIVERSARY GAME

Auto Accident Claims PBA50 Double Lung Transplant Recipient David Williams Jr.

Omaha competitor was on his way to PBA50 Tour's first tournament in Clearwater, Florida

IOWA CITY, Iowa (April 12, 2019) – The Professional Bowlers Association today learned that David Williams Jr., 53, of Omaha has died of injuries sustained in an automobile accident Thursday while on his way to compete in the opening tournament of the PBA50 Tour season in Clearwater, Florida.

Williams, a double lung transplant recipient, was a 27-year member of the PBA who had won two PBA Regional tournament titles and a PBA50 Regional title in Council Bluffs, lowa, in 2016. After being diagnosed with sarcoidosis, an incurable hereditary form of lung cancer, Williams continued to bowl – commonly with an oxygen tank at his side to assist his breathing between shots.

Williams underwent his double lung transplant at the University of Iowa hospital in Iowa City on March 29, 2018, and less than a year later – on March 10, 2019 – he finished third in a Pre-Tournament Qualifier to earn a berth in the PBA's 10th anniversary World Series of Bowling in suburban Detroit.

Details regarding the accident were not immediately available although Williams' wife Sheri had announced on her Facebook page Thursday that he was hospitalized in a coma in Iowa City where he died later in the day. Information regarding services will be announced later.

Brian LeClair Tops Qualifying After

Johnny Petraglia BVL Open First Round

CLEARWATER, Fla. (April 15, 2019) – Hampered by a lingering knee injury, 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair of Delmar, N.Y., averaged 247 to take the first round lead in the PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open presented by Lucas Magazine and Brunswick Monday at Maple Countryside Lanes.

After starting the round with games of 207 and 212, LeClair, who uses a brace on his left knee, followed up with games of 256, 279, 238, 280 and 259 to finish with a 1,731 seven-game pinfall total.

Rounding out the top five after the first round were Joe Scarborough, Charlotte, N.C., 1,690; PBA Hall of Famer Bryan Goebel, Shawnee, Kan., 1,685, and Gary Faulkner, Norfolk, Va., 1,672.

Reigning PBA50 Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix, finished in a tie for eighth with PBA Hall of Famer Ron Mohr of Las Vegas with a 1,647 pinfall. Haugen won the 2018 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open when it was held at Farmingdale Lanes in Farmingdale, N.Y.

Norm Duke Turns His Attention to PBA50 Tour Where He Takes

Johnny Petraglia BVL Open Top Qualifier Honors

CLEARWATER, Fla. (April 16, 2019) – If Norm Duke isn't busy enough challenging for Player of the Year honors on the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour, the 55-year-old hall of famer has turned his attention to the PBA50 Tour this week where he finds himself as the qualifying leader after the second round of the Johnny Petraglia BVL Open presented by Lucas Magazine and Brunswick.

After finishing the first round in 11th, Duke surged to the top spot finishing with a 3,370 14-game qualifying pinfall total (240 average) Tuesday at Maple Country Lanes after bowling games of 268, 254, 255, 247, 225, 227 and 258 in the second round.

"The center and the lanes are in great condition which is making it easy to get a good read right away," Duke said. "Nothing is confusing me and I'm able to get lined up quick, so pair to pair there's a consistency that I'm able to take advantage of."

On the PBA Tour, Duke won his 39th and 40th titles back-to-back in February to become the oldest player to accomplish the feat.

"I'm getting better at managing the nagging little injuries in recent years and I'm committed to not over-hooking the ball which puts me in a better place from a physical standpoint," said Duke, who is in his 37th season on the PBA Tour and sixth season on the tour for players 50 and over. "The kids tour is still the priority for me but I'm going to

bowl the PBA50 Tour as much as I can. Managing my schedule going forward is also something I'm going to have to do."

After qualifying, the top 24 players advanced to Wednesday's match play with an additional eight players that will be determined through a casher's round that begins at 8:30 a.m. ET.

Duke held a 47-pin lead over fellow hall of famers Bryan Goebel of Shawnee, Kan., in second with a 3,323 pinfall and a 53-pin lead over Amleto Monacelli of Venezuela in third with 3,317. Robert Leonard of Lockwood, N.Y., finished fourth with 3,307 and Joe Scarborough of Charlotte, N.C. rounded out the top five with 3,288.

Reigning PBA50 Player of the Year and 2018 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open winner Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix, finished qualifying in sixth with 3,274 followed by Gary Faulkner of Norfolk, Va., in seventh with 3,264. First round leader Brian LeClair of Albany, N.Y., the winner of the 2017 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open, rounded out the top eight with 3,258. The top eight players will be seeded into Wednesday's second match play round.

PBA Hall of Famer Johnny Petraglia advanced to the casher's round by finishing sixth among the PBA60 players (ages 60 and over) out of the regular prize fund. The 72-year-old left-hander finished qualifying with a 2,970 14-game pinfall.

After match play the top five players will advance to the stepladder finals scheduled for 7 p.m.

Hall of Famer beats Sammy Ventura 288-205 in title match to move into tie for second on PBA50 all-time win list

CLEARWATER, Fla. (April 17, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, won the PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open Wednesday for his 12th career title on PBA's tour for players 50 and over, moving him into a tie for second on the all-time titles list with three other players.

In the first tournament of the 2019 season, the 59-year-old Williams beat finals top qualifier Sammy Ventura of Syracuse, N.Y., 288-205, in the title match at Maple Country Lanes to tie Tom Baker, Gary Dickinson and Dale Eagle on the all-time list. John Handegard holds the record of 14 PBA50 Tour titles.

Technical difficulties prevented the finals from airing live on FloBowling but the stream will be archived for later viewing on <u>www.flobowling.com</u>.

"I wasn't really bowling well in qualifying until I made some ball changes later in the tournament where I could play outside and go straighter to the pocket," said Williams, who had to battle all the way from the cashers round. "I started getting a much better ball reaction as the tournament went on. I was finally able to get to the pocket and then it was just a matter of getting all the pins to go down."

In the semi-final match, Williams, who qualified second for the finals, also dominated by beating 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair of Albany, New York, 277-225.

LeClair, the 2017 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open winner, started the finals by beating No. 4 qualifier PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, 10-9, in a one-ball roll-off after tying the match 237-237. LeClair then went on to beat No. 3 qualifier Brian Kretzer of Dayton, Ohio, 238-213, to advance to the semifinal against Williams. Duke was trying for his sixth career PBA50 Tour title and Kretzer his second.

With his win, Williams, the PBA Tour's all-time titles leader with 47 wins, moved a step closer to becoming the all-time leader on both of PBA's national tours.

"If I'm going to challenge that record I'm going to need to get going," said Williams. "The senior tour keeps getting better and better which means it's going to be much harder to get the wins."

Williams' last win on the PBA50 Tour came in the 2017 USBC Senior Masters. He finished second three times in 2018 including the Johnny Petraglia BVL Open which was held at Farmingdale Lanes in Farmingdale, N.Y.

Ventura's second-place finish was his career best on the PBA50 Tour eclipsing his previous best of third in the 2017 Race City Open.

The PBA50 Tour heads to The Villages, Florida for the first major of the season when Spanish Springs Lanes hosts the PBA50 National Championship April 22-26.

PORTLAND, Maine (April 22, 2019) – In a Round of 16 PBA Playoffs match that featured two of the Go Bowling! PBA Tour's premier two-handers, No. 1 seed Jason Belmonte of Australia beat No. 17 Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina, in a Race to Two Points match at Bayside Bowled that aired on FS1 Monday to advance to the Round of 8.

Also advancing to the Round of 8 was No. 9 Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, who won his first PBA Tour title in the Scorpion Championship at World Series of Bowling X, beating two-time tour winner No. 8 Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, 2-0, in the second Round of 16 match.

For the Race to 2 Points format, each game won in the match is worth one point. If the players split the first two games, a ninth and 10th frame tie-breaker is used to award the deciding point. As the Playoffs reached the Round of 16, the eight winners who advanced from the Round of 24 take on the top eight Playoffs seeds – Belmonte, Jakob Butturff, Norm Duke, Anthony Simonsen, EJ Tackett, Sean Rash, Bill O'Neill and Daugherty – who earned a bye to the Round of 16.

The winner of the Playoffs, which features the top 24 players in competition points after the first 13 Go Bowling! PBA Tour tournaments of the season, will earn a \$100,000 first prize.

In front of the raucous Bayside Bowl crowd, Belmonte, who won the PBA World Championship for a record 11th PBA major in February, beat Troup soundly 245-186 in the first game. Troup, a three-time tour winner with two third-place finishes this season, rebounded in the second game after a slow start with a run of six strikes from the fourth to the ninth frame, beating Belmonte 223-217 to force the 9th and 10th frame roll-off. Belmonte won the roll-off 49-40 benefitting from Troup leaving a solid nine pin on his first ball of the 10th.

"The crowd is so infectious here if I let them in to my head I'll explode," said Belmonte of the Bayside Bowl fans. "I have to balance the electricity generated from the fans with the focus that's necessary to get the job done.

"Some guys feed on being more animated with the crowd and can get their energy that way," the fourtime PBA Player of the Year added. "We all like the energy from the fans, but for me, if I come out of my zone it will be a distraction so I have to stay in a bubble."

Prather beat a struggling Daugherty 222-137 in the first game of the second match and then held off Daugherty, who got back on track in the second game, winning 228-222 to advance to the Round of 8.

"After the first game I obviously knew he (Daugherty) was going to bowl a better game but I felt pretty confident that if I could bowl something in the 220s or 230s I liked my chances," Prather said. "After the first game, I made a good decision by switching to a ball that went further down the lane before it hooked and that enabled me to control the pocket. I didn't want to leave the match in the hands of a roll-off so I was glad I could get it done in the second game."

Round of 16 action continues on FS1 April 29, May 6, and May 13 at 9 p.m. ET, which will determine the top eight for Round of 8 competition May 20 and May 27 that will reduce the field to four survivors who will return to Portland for the semifinal and final rounds June 1-2, with both shows airing live on FOX at noon Eastern.

Norm Duke, WRW Lead PBA50 National Championship After First Round

Two of PBA's all-time greats tie for lead with a 1,479 six-game pinfall total

THE VILLAGES, Fla. (April 23, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famers Walter Ray Williams Jr. and Norm Duke averaged 246 for six games to tie for the first-round lead Tuesday in the PBA50 National Championship presented by Spanish Springs Lanes and Radical.

Williams, who is coming off his 12th career PBA50 Tour title after winning the season-opening Johnny Petraglia BVL Open, and Duke, finished the first round with a 1,479 pinfall total. Williams had games of 279, 222, 258, 247, 247 and 226.

"The scoring pace was pretty good but getting the ball to the right spot on the lane and then getting a good ball reaction was a little tricky," said the 59-year-old Williams, who leads the PBA Tour's all-time titles list with 47 wins. "For the first two games I started playing outside around the three board and then moved as far inside as nine, but even toward the end of the round I was able to play outside again so you really had to pay attention to what was happening out there."

Duke, who finished second in the 2018 PBA50 National Championship, bowled games of 206, 237 238, 249, 300 and 249, found the going a bit more predictable.

"I was able to play the second arrow pretty consistently which is gave me a good angle to the pocket and good pin carry," said Duke, the winner of five PBA50 Tour titles. As good as it was, I'm not that excited about it because I might have left some pins out there. The important thing at this point is to get as many pins as possible to make sure you have enough to make the cuts."

Earlier this season the 55-year-old Duke won the Go Bowling! Indianapolis Open and Go Bowling! Jonesboro Open for his 39th and 40th PBA Tour titles to become the oldest to win back-to-back tour titles. He ranks third on the all-time PBA Tour titles list behind Williams and the late Earl Anthony with 43 titles.

Rounding out the top five after the first round were Darryl Bower of Middletown, Pennsylvania., 1,424; PBA Hall of Famer Tom Baker, King, North Carolina, 1,412; defending champion Lennie Boresch Jr., Kenosha, Wisconsin., and Sammy Ventura, Syracuse, New York, who finished second in the Johnny Petraglia BVL open, tied for fifth with 1,404.

Boresch, a four-time PBA50 Tour winner is trying for his third consecutive win at Spanish Springs Lanes having also won the Sun Bowl In The Villages in 2017.

Williams, and Baker, also a 12-time PBA50 Tour winner, are tied with fellow hall of famers Gary Dickinson and Dale Eagle for second on the all-time PBA50 Tour titles list. John Handegard leads the list with 14 wins.

Competition in the first PBA50 Tour major of the season continues Wednesday and Thursday with sixgame qualifying rounds beginning at 9 a.m. ET, with the top 32 players advancing to match play Friday morning at 9 a.m. After the first match play round the top 16 players will advance to the second match play round which will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals at 7 p.m.

Johnny Petraglia Closes With 274 in Second Round

to Take PBA50 National Championship Lead

Field returns for final qualifying round Thursday

to determine cut to top 32 for match play

THE VILLAGES, Fla. (April 24, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Johnny Petraglia bowled a 1,491 six-game pinfall total in the second round to move into the PBA50 National Championship presented by Spanish Springs Lanes and Radical lead Wednesday.

The 72-year-old Petraglia, who owns 14 PBA Tour and eight PBA50 Tour titles, bowled a 274 in his final game of the second round to finish with a 2,853 12-game overall pinfall (237 average) to hold a six-pin lead over Mark Sullivan of Indianapolis in second with 2,847.

Petraglia, who won the Fort Smith (Arkansas) Open for his first PBA Tour title in 1966, is the only player to have won a national PBA title in six different decades.

Bowling a 15th-place 1,362 six-game pinfall after the first round, Petraglia bowled games of 216, 227, 259, 268 and 247 before his 274 in the second round. In the 274 game Petraglia opened in the first frame but then threw 10 strikes in a row to take the lead.

"Well, I'll say it feels like a step back in time, at least for one block," Petraglia said. "The one advantage of getting older is that you can't throw the ball hard and with a slower ball speed and the good look I had on the lanes, it was just the right combination.

"I had the same look the first game that I had in the last game which allowed me to get comfortable from the start," Petraglia added. "Even in the last game I felt I could get to the pocket every shot. It was a matter of getting all 10 pins down."

Petraglia won the 2009 Sun Bowl In The Villages at Spanish Springs Lanes and set the PBA50 Tour six-game block record of 1,557 in qualifying for the event.

"It's been a good center for me," said Petraglia, whose last PBA50 Tour title came in the 2012 Senior Dayton Classic. "But with that in mind I'm not even thinking past tomorrow's qualifying round. I've been around long enough to know not to do that. I'll

come in tomorrow and watch some of the lefties bowl and see how their (ball) reaction is and maybe use that as a baseline for any changes I might need to make, if any."

Competition in the first PBA50 Tour major of the season continues Thursday with the final six-game qualifying round beginning at 9 a.m. ET. The top 32 players will advance to match play Friday morning at 9 a.m. After the first match play round the top 16 players will advance to the second match play round which will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals Friday at 7 p.m.

Sullivan, whose best previous PBA50 Tour finish is 10th, bowled games of 243, 194, 300, 258, 237 and 218 in his second round after bowling for 1,397 for six games in the first round to move from seventh to second.

First-round co-leader PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke dropped to third finishing with a 2,790 pinfall. Reigning PBA50 Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr. vaulted from 49th after the first round to fourth thanks to a 1,480 pinfall in the second round finishing with 2,782. Rounding out the top five was PBA Hall of Famer and PBA50 Tour rookie Danny Wiseman with 2,772.

PBA Hall of Famer and 12-time PBA50 Tour winner Tom Baker finished the day in sixth with 2,759 followed by defending champion Lennie Boresch Jr. in seventh with 2,753.

Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr., who shared the first-round lead with Duke, dropped to ninth after the second round finishing with a 2,746 pinfall. Williams won the season-opening Johnny Petraglia BVL Open for his 12th career PBA50 Tour title.

Norm Duke Edges Walter Ray Williams Jr. For PBA50 National Championship Top Qualifier Honors

Field cut to top 32 for Friday's first match play round

THE VILLAGES, Fla. (April 25, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famers Norm Duke and Walter Ray Williams Jr. continued their battle for the PBA50 National Championship presented by Spanish Springs Lanes and Radical lead, but after Thursday's final round of qualifying, it was Duke who earned top qualifier honors with a 4,264 pinfall total (237 average) for 18 games to lead 32 players who advanced to Friday's first round of match play.

Duke, a five-time PBA50 Tour winner including two majors, bowled 1,474 for six games with games of 242, 225, 267, 235, 238 and 267 in the third round which was enough to give him a 23-pin lead over Williams who finished qualifying in second with 4,214. Both players tied for the lead after the first round.

"Obviously, you're always trying to do your best, but when you see guys like Walter Ray and the other great bowlers I've bowled with during my PBA Tour career who are out here now on the PBA50 Tour, it's definitely a motivating factor," said Duke. "You still want to let them know you're there.

"In today's game, there are so many ways to play the lanes you have to find a way to strike or you won't keep up," Duke added. "Any adjustments and decisions you make with your equipment, or the way you play the lanes, have to be based on your ability to strike and not just being able to get to the pocket."

Williams, who won the season-opening Johnny Petraglia BVL Open for his 12th career PBA50 Tour title last week, is trying for his third PBA50 major title having won USBC Senior Masters titles in 2014 and 2017.

Finishing the day in third was defending champion Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin with a 4,166 pinfall total for 18 games. Boresch, a four-time PBA50 Tour winner, is trying to make it three wins in a row at Spanish Springs Lanes having also won the Sun Bowl In the Villages in 2017.

"The crowds are great and it's just one of those centers where I match up real well with the lanes," Boresch said of his success at Spanish Springs Lanes. "Other than that, I can't put my finger on exactly why I do so well here. It's going to be tough in match play, but I have the confidence I can do it again."

Second-round leader hall of famer Johnny Petraglia finished qualifying in fourth with 4,160. The 72-yearold eight-time PBA50 Tour winner bowled a 1,307 six-game pinfall in the third round.

Rounding out the top five was one-time PBA50 Tour winner Kevin Croucher of Grants Pass, Ore., bowling a 1,442 pinfall in the third round to jump from 14th after the second round to finish qualifying with a 4,148 pinfall.

After Friday's first match play round at 9 a.m. ET, the field will be cut to the top 16 players for the second match play round at 2 p.m. that will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals at 7 p.m.

PBA Spare Shots

EVERY TOURNAMENT MEANS A NEW PBA RECORD FOR WALTER RAY WILLIAMS JR.

It's not a secret, but every time **Walter Ray Williams Jr.** picks up a bowling ball and steps onto the approach at a PBA tournament – no matter what level of tournament it may be – he sets another record.

The "GOAT" – Greatest Of All Time – as many of his peers refer to him is approaching his 60th birthday (on October 6). He has been a PBA member since 1980 (39 years). His most recent record of note was winning the 110th PBA title of his lengthy and colorful career. His victory in the PBA50 Tour's season-opening Johnny Petraglia BVL Open last week was his 12th in PBA50 Tour competition to go along with his record 47 PBA Tour titles, 33 standard PBA Regional wins and 18 PBA50 Regional titles.

His portfolio of PBA records would take pages to summarize, but here are some astonishing statistics that put Williams' career in PBA competition into perspective compared to an "average" league bowler:

• As of last Sunday, Williams had bowled 24,135 games in PBA Tour competition, 2,328 in PBA Regionals, 2,625 in PBA50 Tour events and another 694 in PBA50 Regionals for a combined total of 29,782 games in PBA tournaments at all levels.

- That total doesn't include games bowled in practice, pro-ams or exhibitions.
- If an average league bowler rolls three games a week over a typical 32-week league season, he or she will bowl 96 games in a year.
- At the average league bowler rate, it would take that bowler 310.2 years to bowl as many games as Williams has bowled in PBA competition.

• If you were able to live 310.2 years and match Williams' games bowled total, take note that he also has knocked down 6,558,110 pins over that span. That converts to a 220.20 average for all PBA games bowled.

• Keep in mind, Walter Ray is still actively competing at all levels of PBA competition.

PBA Regional Challenge tournaments are open to players who have not previously won a PBA title.

• Grants Pass, Ore., proprietor and veteran PBA50 competitor **Kevin Croucher** knew he had to give it his best effort in the championship match against red hot PBA Hall of Famer **Walter Ray Williams Jr.**, the winningest bowling in PBA history, and he did just that by defeating Williams, 268-197, to win the fourth annual PBA50 Sarasota Ford South Open at Sarasota Lanes in Sarasota, Fla., on Saturday.

Croucher, who picked up his ninth overall PBA Regional title, won easily after starting with a spare and then stringing seven strikes. The Oxford, Fla., superstar gave Croucher a head start when he had an open in the first frame and was never able to catch up. Croucher earned the \$2,000 first prize while Williams earned \$1,000 as the runner-up.

In the semifinal round, Croucher eliminated **Ryan Shafer** of Horseheads, N.Y., 196-170, while Williams took out **Brian Kretzer** of Dayton, Ohio, 205-183.

That put him in a tie for third place for earning \$1 million in the fewest number of tournaments with **Tommy Jones.** O'Neill's long-time doubles partner, **Jason Belmonte**, set the standard by reaching the million-dollar milestone in 131 tournaments. The runner-up is **Chris Barnes** who hit the milestone in 220 events.

• PBA Hall of Famers **Chris Barnes, Mika Koivuniemi, Jim St. John**, meritorious service honorees **Bob Johnson** and **Larry Lichstein**, and the only woman ever to win a PBA major title – **Kelly Kulick** – will be inducted into the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame along with the late Kegel founder **John Davis** during the USBC Annual Meeting on Wednesday, May 1, at The Orleans in Las Vegas.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Takes PBA50 National Championship Title to Start Season with Back-to-Back Wins

Hall of Famer beats reigning PBA50 Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr. 278-243 in title match for 13th career and third PBA50 Tour major title

THE VILLAGES, Fla. (April 26, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. defeated reigning PBA50 Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr. 278-243 in the title match to win the PBA50 National Championship presented by Spanish Springs Lanes and Radical Friday for his second consecutive PBA50 Tour title of the season and third career PBA50 Tour major title.

Down by nine pins in the fourth frame, Williams reeled off eight strikes in a row to win the match. After starting with four strikes in a row, Haugen ran into trouble in the fifth frame when he left the 3-10 split, made the spare, but then opened in the sixth after leaving the 3-6 which gave Williams the opening he needed.

"I was a little concerned because he (Haugen) had such a good ball reaction," said Williams, who is the all-time PBA Tour titles leader with 47 wins. "We both play a similar angle to the pocket, so I was watching him pretty closely in the first three matches. We both got off to a good start, but he ran into trouble in the middle of the match and fortunately I was able to keep striking."

Williams dominated Friday's match play rounds to earn the top seed for the finals posting a 12-4 record and 8,479 34-game pinfall total (including bonus pins) outdistancing fellow hall of famer No. 2 qualifier Norm Duke by 337 pins.

The win also was Williams' 13th of his career on the tour for players 50 and over which moved him into sole possession of second on the all-time list behind John Handegard who tops the list with 14 wins.

"After this win I feel like the record is definitely in sight," said Williams, who won the 2014 and 2017 USBC Senior Masters for his other PBA50 major titles. "Over the past year I've been feeling like I'm bowling decent but just not getting the results. Now I feel like I'm at the top of my game and can get the job done when I need to, but you never know when you'll win again."

Williams' first win of the season came in last week's season-opening Johnny Petraglia BVL Open presented by Lucas Magazine and Brunswick where he beat finals top qualifier Sammy Ventura of Syracuse, New York, 288-205, in the title match.

As the No. 4 qualifier for the finals, Haugen, trying for his second major and fourth career PBA50 Tour win, came out of the gate strong with a 287-251 win over No. 5 qualifier, 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair of Albany, New York, and then beat hall of famer and eight-time PBA50 Tour winner Amleto Monacelli, who qualified third for the finals, 277-237, to advance to the semifinal match against Duke.

Haugen then managed to beat Duke, who was trying for his third major and sixth career title, in a hard-fought semifinal match, 214-206, to advance to the title match.

The PBA50 Tour heads to Mooresville, North Carolina for the PBA50 Mooresville Open presented by the Mooresville Convention & Visitors Bureau and Storm at Victory Lanes and Entertainment Center April 28-May 1.

Australia's Jason Belmonte Wins DHC PBA Japan Invitational

Two-handed star wins fourth title of 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season

TOKYO, Japan (April 28, 2019) – Australia's two-handed star, Jason Belmonte, defeated top qualifier Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, 224-213, to win the DHC PBA Japan Invitational at Tokyo Port Bowl on Sunday for his fourth title of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season and the 22nd of his career.

With the win, the 35-year-old Belmonte moved into a tie for 10th place on the PBA all-time titles list with PBA Hall of Famer Marshall Holman.

After qualifying third for the stepladder finals, Belmonte eliminated Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, 245-220, and Japan's Takuya Miyazawa, 227-189, to advance to the title match. Barnes defeated defending DHC champion Dom Barrett of England, 253-222, in the first match.

"I've traveled to Japan to bowl for fifteen years and I've never won," Belmonte said. "Winning in front of the Japanese crowd means a lot; I'm very honored.

"Jakob bowled incredible all week. I feel for the leaders," he continued. "It's unfortunate to dominate a tournament and then lose it all in one game. It took me fifteen years but I feel quite certain Jakob will do it much sooner than that."

The difference in the tightly-contested championship match was Butturff's failure to convert the 3-5-6-9 "bucket" in the second frame. The loss prevented Butturff from claiming his third title of the year, which would have put him in a title-tie with Belmonte. Instead, Belmonte further enhanced his bid for 2019 PBA Player of the Year honors.

"At 2:30 this morning, Tim Mack (his bowling ball rep) called me and said he had an idea to drill me a different ball and I bowled amazing with it today," Belmonte said.

Anthony Simonsen, Andres Gomez Advance to PBA Playoffs Round of 8

Two more Round of 16 matches to air on May 6 at 9 p.m. ET p.m. on FS1

PORTLAND, Maine (April 29, 2019) – Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas and Colombia's Andres Gomez filled two more spots in the PBA Playoffs Round of 8 after winning their Round of 16 Race to 2 Points matches that aired Monday on FS1 from Bayside Bowl.

Simonsen and Gomez joined Jason Belmonte of Australia, who leads the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season with four wins, and 2019 PBA Scorpion Championship winner Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, who advanced by winning their Round of 16 matches that aired April 22 on FS1 and will meet in the Round of 8 on May 20.

Simonsen, who became the youngest to win two majors at 22 with his win in the PBA Players Championship in February, beat Page in the first game of their Race to 2 Points match, 237-214, but Page, a six-time tour winner with four top-five finishes this season, came back to win the second game, 226-214, to send the match to a ninth and 10th frame roll-off. Simonsen won the roll-off, 49-39, to advance to the Round of 8.

"The adrenaline was really flowing after the first game and I was a little too pumped up heading into the second game," said Simonsen of dealing with the energy from the boisterous Bayside Bowl crowd. "When we got to the second game the crowd got a little quiet for some reason and that actually threw me off a little bit.

"Rhino got off to a good start in the second game, but I knew with one game in the bank I still had an opportunity in the roll-off," Simonsen added. "I looked at the roll-off as another game – just make the best shots I can."

In the second Round of 16 match, Gomez, a three-time tour winner, beat 2016 PBA Player of the Year EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana in both games – 231-228 and 245-193 – to advance.

Gomez put together a string of five strikes heading into the 10th frame of the first game to overtake Tackett after being down 37 pins in the fifth frame.

"In the first half of the first game I was still trying to figure it out," said Gomez. "I needed to do what I do best and that was slow down. I don't have the power that these guys have out here on tour so having the right hand position and ball speed are critical for me to get a good ball reaction."

Gomez found the right combination in the second game, striking in seven of the first nine frames to breeze past a struggling Tackett.

The winner of the Playoffs, which features the top 24 players in competition points after the first 13 Go Bowling! PBA Tour tournaments of the 2019 season, will earn a \$100,000 first prize.

Round of 16 action continues on FS1 on May 6 and May 13 with both two-match telecasts airing at 9 p.m. EDT. The eight survivors will bowl Round of 8 Race to 2 Points matches on May 20 and May 27, reducing the field to the four survivors who will return to Portland for the semifinal and final rounds June 1-2. Both of those rounds will air live on FOX at noon Eastern.

Joe Findling Wins PBA Planet Bowl Oklahoma City Southwest Open Title

Oklahoma City, Okla. (April 30, 2019) – Joe Findling from Mesquite, Texas, survived a tense final match to win his eighth Professional Bowlers Association Regional title in the PBA Oklahoma City Planet Bowl Southwest Open, presented by Roto Grip, Sunday.

Findling led after eight and 13 games of qualifying, and maintained his lead through the modified eightgame round robin match play finals heading into the final position round match. Holding a 64-pin lead over Sean Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, Lavery-Spahr needed to win the match by 35 pins and pick up the 30 match play bonus pins to deny Findling the title. Bohn, a 35-time PBA Tour and four-time PBA50 Tour titlist, bowled games of 192, 255, 206, 236, 246, 237, 212 and 248 in Tuesday's final round to tie Horn for the lead.

"So far, everything is going pretty well but I'm having trouble in the 10th frame for some reason," said the 55-year-old Bohn, whose last PBA50 Tour win came in the 2017 Dave Small's Championship Lanes Classic. "I'm putting together nine solid frames but I'm finishing with a lot of splits and opens at the end and I'm going to have to fix that.

"When it comes time for when we start match play, it becomes a sprint to the finish," Bohn added. "I can guarantee you that I'm going to have to finish games better than I did today to make it to the finals."

Horn, bowling in his first PBA50 Tour tournament, bowled games of 246, 209, 215, 268, 205, 254, 202 and 248 after Tuesday's first second-round block.

"It was a different block for me today than the first round," said Horn, who works full-time as an ATM technician. "Today, I was able to use one ball and just make the adjustments with my speed and angles to the pocket. I'm just trying to not look too far ahead and keep focused on what I need to do each frame."

Bohn and Horn led eight players who earned two-round byes into match play. Rounding out the top eight were Todd Kjell, Roscoe, Illinois and Scott Greiner, Sunrise Beach, Missouri, who tied for third with 3,692; first-round leader Rick Graham, Lancaster, Pennsylvania, 3,683; Ricky Schissler, Brighton, Colorado, 3,681; John Marsala, St. Louis, Missouri, 3,660 and PBA Hall of Famer Bryan Goebel, Shawnee, Kansas, 3,644.

The top 24 players advanced to Wednesday's match play who will be joined by an additional eight players that will be determined through a casher's round that begins at 8:30 a.m. ET.

PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr., the winner of the first two tournaments of the season, climbed from 55th after the first round to finish qualifying in 33rd with a 3,529 pinfall advancing to the cashers round.

Defending champion 60-year-old PBA Hall of Famer Brian Voss also advanced to the cashers round by placing second among the eight PBA60 Players finishing out of the regular prize fund. Voss finished with a 3,453 pinfall.

John Dudak of Orland Park, Illinois earned the last PBA60 spot (eighth) for the cashers round by beating James Storts of Westfield, Indiana in a one-game roll-off 182-176 after tying with 3,415.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Wins PBA50 Mooresville Open for

Third Consecutive Title and Record-Tying 14th of His Career

Williams defeats fellow hall of famer Danny Wiseman 229-227 after comeback in title match

MOORESVILLE, N.C. (May 1, 2019) – Walter Ray Williams Jr., the Professional Bowlers Association's all-time PBA Tour career titles leader, won the PBA50 Mooresville Open presented by the Mooresville Convention & Visitors Bureau and Storm Wednesday to start the 2019 season with three consecutive wins and record his 14th career title, tying him for the all-time career titles record in PBA's tour for players 50 and over.

Williams, the Go Bowling! PBA Tour's all-time career titles leader with 47 wins, tied John Handegard for most career PBA50 Tour titles.

In a dramatic comeback effort in the title match, the 59-year-old Williams, who was the top qualifier for the finals, threw the last five strikes of the match to beat fellow hall of famer Danny Wiseman 229-227. Wiseman, a 12-time PBA Tour winner bowling in his second PBA50 Tour tournament, had an opportunity to win the match with a strike on the first ball in the 10th frame but left a 10 pin.

"I came out of practice all lined up on both lanes, but things got a little tricky in the middle of the game," said Williams, who left the 3-6-10 in the fifth frame and 3-6 in the seventh frame. "The right lane was a little tighter for me, so I thought I needed to hit the ball a little more at release but the reaction I got was totally unexpected.

"In the ninth frame I moved one board left and that was the right move," Williams added, after being down as much as 28 pins in the match. "You've got to bowl well and get the

breaks to win. I was able to finish strong and caught a break when Danny left the 10 pin in the 10th frame."

The win also marked the second time this season that Williams advanced all the way from the cashers round to reach the finals. He won the season-opening PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open by advancing from the cashers round.

"Even though I'm bowling pretty well, I've been a little frustrated in qualifying," Williams admitted. "In general, it seems like I'm not getting good pin carry until I get to match play for whatever reason."

Williams, who won the 2010 Senior Miller High Life Classic at Victory Lanes for his first PBA50 Tour title, was especially fortunate to advance to match play earlier Wednesday bowling a 256 in the final game of the cashers round to earn a spot in the first match play round.

"All I can say is it's crazy," Williams said about his journey to the Mooresville Open title. "I didn't expect to win the first three titles of the season, but it feels awesome."

Williams' second win of the season came in last week's PBA50 National Championship for his third career major title.

The stepladder final, streamed live on FloBowling, began with No. 5 qualifier hall of famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey beating No. 4 qualifier Todd Kjell of Roscoe, Illinois, 196-181.

Bohn, trying for his fifth PBA50 Tour title, then beat No. 3 qualifier Scott Greiner of Sunrise Beach, Missouri, 258-229, to advance to the semifinal match against Wiseman.

Wiseman, who finished 10th in last week's PBA50 National Championship, then beat Bohn 258-223 to advance to the title match against Williams. Greiner and Kjell were both trying for their first PBA50 Tour titles.

PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: FINDLING WINS INTENSE FINALE IN OKLAHOMA CITY

Joe Findling from Mesquite, Texas, survived a tense final match to win his eighth PBA Regional title in the PBA Oklahoma City Planet Bowl Southwest Open, presented by Roto Grip, Sunday.

Findling led throughout qualifying and held a 64-pin lead over Sean Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, going into the final position round match. Lavery-Spahr needed to win the match by 35 pins and pick up the 30 match play bonus pins to deny Findling the title. After both players opened in the first frame, Lavery-Spahr strung seven strikes before leaving a 10 pin in the ninth frame, eventually finishing with a 244 game.

It wasn't enough. Findling threw two strikes in his 10th frame to finish with 227 and a 4,965 pinfall total, topping Lavery-Spahr's 4,948 to claim the \$2,500 winner's check.

• Kyle Cook of Centerville, Ohio defeated Mike Eaton Jr. of Wyoming, Mich., 201-180, to win the PBA's Greater Richmond Central Open at Richmond 40 Bowl in Richmond, Ind., Sunday.

Cook, who earned his second regional title and \$2,000 for the one-day, reduced entry fee event, downed **Chris Via** of Springfield, Ohio, 244-212, while Eaton eliminated **Kyle Mayberry** of Mechanicsburg, Ohio, 241-183, to set up the championship match.

• **Brandon Curtis** of Manson, N.C. wins his second PBA Regional title Sunday, defeating **Chris Polizzi** of Spring Hill, Fla., 222-178, to win the fourth annual PBA Brighton Construction Myrtle Beach South Open at Myrtle Beach Lanes in South Carolina.

Curtis, who qualified in the number one position for the stepladder finals with a 17-game pinfall of 3,875, led the event wire-to-wire. In the opening match, Polizzi eliminated **Sean Connolly** of Apopka, Fla., 211-191, and then easily defeated **Mike Coffey** of Melbourne, Fla., 246-189, in the semifinal contest to advance to the championship match.

In the title match Curtis started with three strikes while Polizzi had two opens in the first three frames. Curtis then coasted to the \$2,600 first prize.

Thomas Leads, Baker Second After PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open First Round

Greg Thomas starts with 300 game while PBA Hall of Famer Tom Baker finishes strong with 269 and 268

TRENTON, N.J. (May 3, 2019) – Greg Thomas of Irmo, South Carolina, opened with a 300 and averaged 251 for seven games Friday to take the first-round lead in the PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open presented by Columbia 300.

Thomas, whose best PBA50 Tour finish was fourth in last season's PBA50 South Shore Open, fired a 1,760 pinfall total with games of 300, 225, 270, 256, 249, 245 and 215 to lead PBA Hall of Famer and four-time PBA50 Player of the Year Tom Baker of King, North Carolina, who finished the round in second 38 pins behind with a 1,722 pinfall.

"I didn't have a lot of confidence coming into the season, but that's been steadily improving" said Thomas. "I feel like I'm bowling pretty well but I'm leaving a lot of nine counts. I think bowling on the shorter (PBA Del Ballard 34-foot) lane condition is helping me get the hook I need on the back end to get the carry—I just hope I can keep it going."

The 64-year-old Baker, a 10-time PBA Tour and 12-time PBA50 Tour winner, bowled games of 234, 268, 235, 200, 248, 269 and 268 to make a late-round surge to finish second.

Brian Boghosian of Agawam, Massachusetts, the 1999 USBC Masters champion, finished the round in third with 1,716 followed by Gary Shultis of Levittown, New York, in fourth with 1,684.

Reigning PBA50 Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix, rounded out the top five with a 1,670 pinfall.

"I got caught out in the transition in the third game but I'm not disappointed," said Haugen, who was runner-up to PBA50 National Championship winner hall of famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. "I probably lost my focus a little bit in that game, but the important thing is I adjusted and got back on track."

In his pursuit of a record 15th career title on PBA's tour for players 50 and over and a record-tying fourth in a row, Williams, the PBA Tour's all-time titles leader with 47 wins, finished the first round in 10th with 1,623.

Competition continues Saturday with another seven-game qualifying round with squads at 8 a.m. and 11:45 a.m. ET. Match play rounds get underway Sunday at 10 a.m. which will determine the five players for the stepladder finals schedule 5:30 p.m.

Viale, Boresch Take Top Spots After PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open Qualifying

Top 32 players advance to Sunday's match play that will determine top five for stepladder finals

TRENTON, N.J. (May 4, 2019) – Chris Viale of Westfield, Massachusetts earned top qualifier honors for the PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open presented by Columbia 300 Saturday with a 3,375 14-game pinfall total (241 average) adding his name to the growing list of newcomers making their presence felt at the top of PBA50 Tour leaderboards this season.

Bowling as a non-member, the 51-year-old Viale bowled a 1,745 pinfall in the second round with games of 287, 222, 234, 277, 248, 246 and 231 moving from seventh after Friday's first round to lead 32 players who advanced to Sunday's first match play round which begins at 10 a.m. ET.

"I had a couple of bad starts today but basically finished strong in every game which meant I was making the right adjustments," said the 51-year-old Viale. "I stayed patient and trusted what I was seeing on the lanes and made the changes I needed to make.

"I'm starting my target at around the seven to nine board, throwing it out almost to the gutter and that has resulted in great pin carry," Viale added. "I think in all but one or two games I finished with a string of five or six strikes and it's making it a lot fun."

Viale, a former collegiate All-American and member of the 1992 William Patterson Intercollegiate Team Championship winning men's team, is bowling in his second PBA50 Tour event. He finished 15th in the 2018 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open.

After finishing 14th after the first round, four-time PBA50 Tour winner Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin, bowled a 1,761 pinfall in the second round to finish qualifying with a 3,363 pinfall just 12 pins behind Viale.

Rounding out the top five were PBA Hall of Famers Ron Mohr of Las Vegas in third with 3,300 and Tom Baker of King, North Carolina in fourth with 3,269. Mohr is a 10-time PBA50 Tour winner and two-time PBA50 Player of the Year and Baker is a 12-time PBA50 Tour winner and four-time PBA50 Player of the Year.

Rounding out the top five was Keith Doran of Pomona, N.Y., who finished with 3,261.

In his pursuit of a record 15th PBA50 Tour title and record-tying fourth in a row, PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. will start match play from 16th after posting a 3,182 pinfall.

After Sunday's second match play round, scheduled for 1:45 p.m., the top five players will be determined for the stepladder finals set for 5:30 p.m.

Joel Carlson Beats Ron Mohr in Roll-Off to Win

PBA50 Hamilton Lanes Open for First PBA50 Tour Title

After a 279-279 tie in title match, Carlson wins one-ball roll-off 10-8

TRENTON, N.J. (May 5, 2019) – After a 279-279 title match tie, PBA50 Tour veteran Joel Carlson of Omaha, Nebraska, defeated PBA Hall of Famer Ron Mohr of Las Vegas, in a one-ball roll-off 10-8 to win the PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open presented by Columbia 300 Sunday for his first title on PBA's tour for players 50 and over. Carlson and Mohr went strike for strike through the first seven frames of the title match until Carlson left a 7 pin in the eighth. After making the spare, he finished the match with four strikes to force the roll-off. Finishing the match first, Mohr, the stepladder finals top qualifier, threw the first nine strikes before leaving a 10 pin on his first ball in the 10th, made the spare, and then struck on his final ball of the 10th frame. Mohr, trying for his 11th PBA50 Tour title, started the roll-off with an eight-count when his ball went high leaving the 4-7. Carlson took advantage of the opportunity by throwing a strike for the win. "I didn't watch," said Carlson, when Mohr threw his shot in the roll-off. "When it was my turn, I just concentrated on keeping the ball on line and throw the best shot I possibly could. I could never have imagined winning my first title this way." Carlson's previous high PBA50 Tour finishes were third in the 2016 Sun Bowl In The Villages and fourth in the 2018 PBA50 Lucas Magazine Classic. "I always felt that I could win out here but winning like this was beyond expectations," the 57-year-old Carlson added. "It's awesome to win with the ball in your hand and then coming through with a strike to do it. It's how you dream of winning, but right now I'm having a hard time believing my good fortune." Carlson, who entered the position round match in sixth, beat non-member Chris Viale of Westfield, Massachusetts 288-245 to make the finals and earn the No. 3 gualifying position for the finals. Ironically, earlier in the week, Carlson seemed to have a spot in the finals locked up for the PBA50 Mooresville Open, but dropped from second to sixth when he lost in the position round to eventual winner Walter Ray Williams Jr. after bowling a 185 game. To get to the title match, Carlson beat PBA Hall of Famer and four-time PBA50 Tour winner Parker Bohn III, who qualified fifth for the finals, 227-182, in the second stepladder match and then beat No. 2 gualifier reigning PBA50 Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr., 268-248, in the semifinal to advance to the title match against Mohr. In the opening stepladder match, Bohn defeated Viale, who qualified fourth for the finals, 268-173. PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr.'s bid for a record-tying fourth consecutive PBA50 Tour title to also become the sole all-time PBA50 Tour titles leader with 15 wins, ended with an eight-place finish. He remains tied with John Handegard at 14. The PBA50 Tour takes a three-week break before it heads west to Brentwood, California for the PBA50 Northern California Classic presented by MOTIV May 25-28.

O'Neill and Malott Survive Roll-offs in Round of 16 Matches to Advance in PBA Playoffs

PORTLAND, Maine (May 6, 2019) – No. 7 seed Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania and No. 15 seed Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, survived PBA Playoffs Round of 16 Race to 2 Points matches that both required a ninth and 10th frame roll-off, to advance to the Round of 8 after FS1's telecast Monday from Bayside Bowl.

O'Neill and Malott join No. 4 seed Anthony Simonsen, No. 21 Andres Gomez, No. 1 Jason Belmonte and No. 9 Kris Prather who have already advanced to the Round of 8 after winning Round of 16 matches.

In the first match, No. 2 seed Jakob Butturff of Mesa, Arizona, defeated Malott in the first game, 268-210, but the USBC Masters champion couldn't keep the momentum going in the second game, losing to Malott, 226-193, to send their match into a roll-off.

With both players starting with a strike and spare, Malott, a 10-time tour winner, struck on his final ball and advanced when Butturff left a solid 7 pin on his fill ball, handing Malott a 40-39 win. It was the second time that Malott won a Playoffs match sitting on the bench. He also won his Round of 24 matchup against Josh Blanchard when Blanchard left the 1-2-4 on his final ball of the 10th frame.

"I felt like I was running out of lives when I was watching Jakob," said Malott, the 2009 PBA Player of the Year. "I didn't think either one of us had a really good look to start the second game. Jakob was struggling and I was still trying to get comfortable. It looked like it was going to be one of those matches where filling frames any way you can was going to get the job done.

"In the middle of the second game I was finally getting comfortable enough where I was getting the ball reaction I wanted so I could repeat good shots."

No. 23 seed Sweden's Jesper Svensson, a seven-time tour winner, jumped out to an early lead with a 222-211 win in the first game of the second match, but O'Neill capitalized on the struggling Svensson in the second game coming back to win, 247-164, to send the match into the roll-off. O'Neill, who won his 10th PBA Tour title in the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic, struck in the ninth and the first two shots in the 10th to eliminate Svensson, 57-39.

"To start the first game, I really didn't feel like I knew what I was doing," said O'Neill. "In practice everything felt good but I think I started to rush because the adrenaline was pumping. I felt lucky to get 211.

"Fortunately, I was able to settle down and I made really good shots down the stretch," O'Neill continued. "With Jesper struggling I felt like the ball was in my court and was pretty confident going into the roll-off. I made a ball change and threw three really good shots when I needed them."

The Round of 16 concludes on May 13 at 9 p.m. ET on FS1 with two matches to determine the last two positions for the Round of 8 matches which will air on May 20 and May 27. The four Round of 8 winners will return to Portland for the semifinal and final rounds live on FOX on Saturday and Sunday, June 1-2.

The winner of the Playoffs, which features the top 24 players in competition points after the first 13 Go Bowling! PBA Tour tournaments of the 2019 season, will earn a \$100,000 first prize.

PETE WEBER JOINS PBA'S ELITE "100 TITLES" CLUB WITH 47TH REGIONAL WIN

PBA Hall of Famer **Pete Weber** has now won 37 PBA Tour, 47 standard PBA Regional, 11 PBA50 Tour and five PBA50 Regional titles, joining **Walter Ray Williams Jr.** as the only players to win a combined total of 100 PBA titles.

The 56-year-old St. Ann, Mo., resident joined the exclusive "100 PBA Titles" club after defeating **Kyle Sherman** of O'Fallon, Mo., by 75 pins to win the BowlersMart/Bowlero Midwest Open presented by Brunswick at Brunswick Zone Lakeside in Valley Park, Mo., Sunday.

Weber, who won his 99th title almost two years ago in the 2017 PBA50 DeHayes Insurance Group Championship in Fort Wayne, Ind., won nine of his 12 matches and posted a 20-game total of 4,643 pins Sunday, including match play bonus pins, to win his 100th combined PBA title.

Williams is the record-holder, with a total of 112 titles at all levels of PBA competition (47 PBA Tour, 33 PBA Regional, 14 PBA50 Tour and 18 PBA50 Regional). Weber also joined Williams late in 2018 as the second player in PBA history to surpass \$4 million in career earnings. Williams is the all-time PBA earnings leader with just over \$4.8 million.

By winning his 47th standard Regional title and his 52nd including his five PBA50 Regional wins, Weber is one title behind **Chris Warren** of Grants Pass, Ore., in both of those categories.

Sherman finished the Valley Park tournament with a 7-5 match play record and 4,568 pins, 70 ahead of 2018 PBA Rookie of the Year **Kamron Doyle** of Brentwood, Tenn. Weber earned \$2,500, Sherman \$1,500 and Doyle \$1,250.

YOUNG CANCER SURVIVOR HONORED AT PBA REGIONAL IN MYRTLE BEACH

Now in remission, Titus has been able to fulfill his dream by joining a local youth bowling league and he got to take part in the Myrtle Beach PBA event, including rolling the ceremonial first ball.

"If he can beat cancer, he can become a pro. I'm sure he has his dreams and his goals set high," said seven-time PBA Tour titlist **Ryan Ciminelli.**

"We just hope that our story can be a glimmer of hope for anyone in Myrtle Beach who is facing a giant like we faced," said Rob Radosti.

Barrett, Rash Win in Round of 16 to Complete PBA Playoffs Round of 8 Matchups

PORTLAND, Maine (May 13, 2019) – Seven-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Dom Barrett of England, and 13-time tour winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, won their PBA Playoffs Round of 16 Race to 2 Points matches that aired on FS1 Monday from Bayside Bowl to complete the lineup of players who advanced to the Round of 8.

Barrett, the No. 14 seed, won the first game of the Round of 16 match 236-222 over No. 3 seed Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, who won his 39th and 40th career tour titles back-to-back earlier this season, but the PBA Hall of Famer came back in the second game by starting with the first five strikes to beat Barrett 236-174 forcing a ninth and 10th frame roll-off.

"I still wasn't real comfortable in the two-frame roll-off but managed to hang in there. When Norm got nine in the one-ball roll-off, I thought that was my opportunity and I had better take advantage of it."

In the second Round of 16 match, the No. 6-seeded Rash defeated No. 11 Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri in both games – 227-175 and 237-214 – to advance to the Round of 8.

"I had a good ball reaction in both games and was fortunate to take advantage of the opportunity I was given," said Rash, who won the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship with Matt Ogle for his 13th PBA Tour title earlier this season. "You need to fill frames anyway you can, but in the end, I felt like I only threw one bad shot.

"I was pretty much in control and Kyle was struggling in the first game," Rash added. "It came down to strong finishes in both games. Kyle's an excellent player and I didn't want to give him too much hope."

Prather, Simonsen Win to Advance to PBA Playoffs Semifinal Round

O'Neill vs. Malott, Rash vs. Barrett Round of 8 matches May 27 on FS1

will finalize semifinal round pairings

PORTLAND, Maine (May 20, 2019) – No. 4 seed Anthony Simonsen and No. 9 seed Kris Prather have clinched semifinal round berths in the inaugural PBA Playoffs and will continue their bids to win the \$100,000 top prize after winning their Round of 8 matches at Bayside Bowl. The first of two Round of 8 matches aired Monday on FS1.

Prather and Simonsen will be joined in the semifinals by the winners of the No. 7 Bill O'Neill vs. No. 15 Wes Malott and No. 6 Sean Rash vs. No. 14 Dom Barrett Round of 8 matches which will air May 27 on FS1 at 9 p.m. ET. The four remaining players will battle in the Race to 2 Points format semifinals Saturday, June 1 live at noon ET on FOX with the winners returning for the live finals on June 2 that will determine the inaugural PBA Playoffs champion who will celebrate the largest payday of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

Prather, who won the PBA Scorpion Championship at World Series of Bowling X earlier this year for his first PBA Tour title, beat No. 1 seed Jason Belmonte in both games of the Race to 2 Points format match – 197-165 and 224-214 – to advance to the semifinals.

In the second game, Prather finished with four strikes in a row to eliminate Belmonte, who left a 3 pin as result of a high hit on his second shot of the 10th frame to end his bid for the win.

Belmonte, who led the PBA Playoffs points race to earn the No. 1 seed, won three titles including the PBA Tournament of Champions and PBA World Championship for his 10th and record 11th major titles leading up to the Playoffs.

"I went into the match determined not to get comfortable," said the 27-year-old Prather. "I know that if I let up, he's (Belmonte) going to take advantage of that. That's why he's the best bowler in the world.

"I wanted to use the momentum from the first game to put as much pressure on him as I could," Prather said of the second game. "Even though he's the best in the world I didn't want that thought to creep into my mind where I would lose focus. I don't think those last four shots were the best I could throw but they got the job done.

"I don't think I've ever been a crowd favorite, but I sure feel like it here," Prather said of the support he was getting from the raucous Bayside Bowl crowd. "I hope I can continue to use that energy to my advantage."

As the No. 9 seed, Prather advanced to the Round of 8 by winning a single-game Round of 24 match against No. 24 seed Darren Tang and a Round of 16 Race to 2 Points match against No. 8 seed Tom Daugherty.

In the second match, Gomez, a three-time tour winner, beat Simonsen, 234-207, but Simonsen rallied in the second game to defeat Gomez, 243-215, to force a ninth and 10th frame roll-off.

Despite a slow start by Simonsen in the second game with two spares after leaving seven counts, the two-hander came back with five consecutive strikes and took advantage of a missed 10 pin by Gomez in the fifth frame.

The 22-year-old Simonsen, who won the PBA Players Championship in February for his second career major, struck on his first three shots of the roll-off to win, 56-39.

"One good thing about this format is that if you're struggling you have some time to figure it out," said Simonsen, who advanced to the Round of 8 by beating Rhino Page in the Round of 16 after earning a first-round bye. "The turning point probably came when he missed the 10 pin, but I could see he was struggling with ball reaction. I was finally getting the ball reaction I needed and felt I could probably put some pressure on him. Everything seemed to be going my way at that point.

"It's very rewarding to make it this far but there's a lot of work left to do," Simonsen said of his return trip to Portland. "One thing I know is, it's going to be fun to watch. I'm going to do the bowling and let the crowd do the rest."

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Takes Commanding Points Lead as PBA50 Tour Resumes Competition

PBA50 Northern California Classic to be followed by USBC Senior Masters and Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open

BRENTWOOD, Calif. (May 21, 2019) -- With three consecutive wins and an eighth-place finish to start the season, PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. takes a huge 10,000-point lead in the PBA50 Tour points race over reigning Player of the Year Michael Haugen Jr., as the tour for players 50 years and over begins its western swing with the PBA50 Northern California Classic presented by MOTIV at Harvest Park Bowl in Brentwood May 25-28.

The 59-year-old Williams, who owns the PBA Tour all-time career titles mark of 47, will try again for a record 15th career PBA50 Tour title, and if successful, will hold the all-time titles lead for both of PBA's national tours. Williams is currently tied with fellow Hall of Famer John Handegard for most PBA50 Tour titles at 14.

Williams started the 2019 season with wins in the season-opening PBA50 Johnny Petraglia BVL Open and PBA50 National Championship for his third career PBA50 major title, before his streak ended with a win in the PBA50 Mooresville Open. He fell short of a record-tying fourth consecutive PBA50 Tour title with an eighth-place finish in the PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open.

"It's a matter of everything coming together, especially because the PBA50 Tour continues to get better and better," said Williams, who won the Northern California Classic in 2012 and 2013. "When I started the season, I certainly couldn't have predicted getting the crazy start that I did.

"Last season I was in a good position to win but finished second three times," the seven-time PBA Tour and two-time PBA50 Tour Player of the Year continued. "Before the start of this season, I didn't think winning a 15th title was within reach but now it's certainly possible. You never know when the next win will come."

Williams currently leads the PBA50 Tour points list with 18,930 points, 10,270 ahead of Haugen in second with 8,660.

PBA Hall of Famer and two-time PBA50 Player of the Year Ron Mohr will defend his Northern California Classic title at Harvest Park Bowl. The 63-year-old Mohr, who also won in 2011, handed Williams one of his three runner-up finishes in 2018 with a come-from-behind 237-218 title match victory for his 10th career PBA50 Tour title.

The fifth stop of the 2019 season starts with eight-game qualifying Sunday, May 26 with squads at 8 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. to be followed by a second round of qualifying on May 27. Cashers and match play rounds begin at 8 a.m. on May 28 which will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals at 6:30 p.m.

Following the Northern California Classic the PBA50 Tour heads to Las Vegas for back-to-back majors – the USBC Senior Masters at Sam's Town June 2-9 and the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm June 10-14.

Chris Warren won the 2018 USBC Senior Masters to become the third player to win both the USBC Masters and USBC Senior Masters when he defeated Duke in the double-elimination format title match when Duke left the devasting 3-4-6-7-9-10 in the 10th frame of the second game of the match.

PBA Hall of Famer Mika Koivuniemi won the 2018 Senior U.S. Open for his first PBA50 Tour title by beating Brian Kretzer 259-237 in the title match at the Suncoast Bowling Center.

Prior to the USBC Senior Masters, Sam's Town will also host the first tournament of the season solely for players 60 and over when the USBC Super Senior Classic gets underway May 29-June 2. Mike Dias is the defending champion.

Williams, who bowled much of his career as a resident of nearby Stockton, California, averaged a blistering 243.63 for his first eight-game round that included games of 195, 237, 237, 300, 238, 226, 237 and 279. With a 1,949 pinfall total, the Oxford, Florida resident barely held off fellow PBA Hall of Famer Bryan Goebel of Shawnee, Kansas, who had 1,938 pins. Bob Rosenau of Redding, California, was in third place with 1,936 followed by Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, with a 1,932 total and Tony Rodriguez Jr. of Rancho Cucamonga, California, with 1,896 pins. Defending champion Ron Mohr of Las Vegas was in 23rd place after the first eight games with a 1,786 total.

Williams, 59, won the first three tournaments of the year to boost his career total of 14 PBA Tour titles, tying him with John Handegard for the "senior tour" titles record. He also holds the PBA Tour titles record with 47 and has won a combined total of 115 titles at all levels of PBA competition.

The entire field returns for another eight-game qualifying round Monday which begins at 8 a.m. PT. Wednesday's cashers and match play rounds will also begin at 8 a.m. After match play the top five players will be determined for the stepladder finals at 6:30 p.m. The fifth stop of the 2019 PBA50 Tour season continues with a second round of qualifying on Monday. Cashers and match play rounds then begin at 8 a.m. on Tuesday which will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals at 6:30 p.m.

Norm Duke Takes PBA50 Northern California Classic Lead

Former major league pitcher John Burkett trails by 45 pins in bid for his PBA50 Tour title

BRENTWOOD, Calif. (May 27, 2019) – Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, seeking his first PBA50 Tour title of the 2019 season, advanced from fourth place into the lead in the PBA50 Northern California Classic presented by MOTIV title Monday at Harvest Park Bowl.

Duke, a five-time PBA Tour titlist, rolled games of 243, 168, 248, 229, 254, 279 and 248 Monday for an eight-game total of 1,904 and a 16-game total of 3,836 pins – a 239.75 average – to take a 45-pin lead over former major league baseball pitcher John Burkett of Fort Worth, Texas.

Bob Rosenau of Redding, California, retained third place with 3,778 pins. He was followed by Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, with a 3,769 total and Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey, with 3,734 pins.

O'Neill, Rash Win Round of 8 Matches to Complete PBA Playoffs Semifinal Matchups

Simonsen vs. Prather, O'Neill vs. Rash matches to air live at noon ET on FOX on June 1 from Bayside Bowl

PORTLAND, Maine (May 27, 2019) – With wins by No. 6 seed Sean Rash and No. 7 seed Bill O'Neill in their Round of 8 matches that aired Monday on FS1, the stage has been set for the historic PBA Playoffs semifinal round matches that will be televised live on FOX on Saturday, June 1, leading into Sunday's championship finals at Bayside Bowl.

O'Neill and Rash will join No. 4 seed Anthony Simonsen and No. 9 seed Kris Prather in the Race to 2 Points format semifinal matches at Noon ET with the winners advancing to the championship match on Sunday at 12:30 p.m. The winner will take home \$100,000, the richest prize of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

In Monday's first Round of 8 contest, O'Neill, the winner of the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic, beat fellow 10-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner No. 15 seed Wes Malott in both games of the Race to 2 Points match – 229-217 and 246-202 – to advance to the semifinals.

In the first game, the 37-year-old O'Neill recovered from a 4-6-7-10 split and an open in the third frame to defeat Malott.

"I could feel myself rushing and was having a little trouble trying to calm down," said O'Neill. "I was confident in my ball reaction but had to keep telling myself to settle down so I could focus on making good shots. In the Round of 16 against Jesper (Svensson) I learned that lesson. The crowd and atmosphere here just get you so amped up which adds to the normal pressure you experience to win the match.

"It been a super season so far," O'Neill said of his journey to the semifinals. "With the help of my dad I've put in a lot of work in the offseason and it's obviously paid off. I've had a great support system all around to get to this point so I'm confident I'll be as prepared as I can be when we come back."

In the second match, No. 14 seed Dom Barrett won the first game over Rash 226-205, and seemed to be in control in the second game after starting with a spare and six straight strikes, but an eight count and spare in the eighth frame provided a hard-charging Rash with an opportunity to come back for the win. Down by 21 in the fourth frame, Rash reeled off seven strikes to take the second game 268-253 to force the ninth and 10th frame roll-off. Rash completed the comeback victory in the roll-off with four strikes and the maximum 60 pins to Barrett's 40 to advance to the semifinals.

"I was just concentrating on filling frames and hoped it was enough to beat a great player," said Rash, who won the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Classic with Matt Ogle for his 13th tour win earlier this season. "If I hit the pocket and didn't strike, I had to re-group and make sure I made the spares.

"I had two bad shots in the first game and I paid the penalty for both of them," Rash continued. "In the second game I made a decision to move right and could have bowled a 180 or 280. Fortunately, I was closer to 280 and was able to carry that momentum into the roll-off.

"The season's been a little frustrating with some highs and lows, but right now things are good and I'm looking forward to coming back to Bayside Bowl to make some history."

Rash, who earned a first-round by eadvanced to the Round of 8 with a win against No. 11 Kyle Sherman in the Round of 16. O'Neill, who also earned a bye, advanced by beating No. 23 Jesper Svensson in the Round of 16.

The journey to the PBA Playoffs semifinals started in January with the PBA Hall of Fame Classic. After 13 Go Bowling! PBA Tour tournaments – including three majors – the top 24 players on the PBA Playoffs points list earned berths in the Playoffs and a trip to Bayside Bowl for Round of 24, 16 and 8 matches that aired on FS1 over the past eight weeks.

"Final Four" Set for Historic Battles as Inaugural PBA Playoffs Concludes

Semifinal, championship rounds set for live coverage on FOX Saturday and Sunday

PORTLAND, Maine – Two players who have already locked up their futures as Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famers and two others who represent the elite among the rising young stars of the PBA will return to center stage at Bayside Bowl this weekend as the inaugural PBA Playoffs concludes with live telecasts Saturday at noon and Sunday at 12:30 p.m. EDT on FOX.

The PBA Playoffs, a showcase competition that began with 13 Go Bowling! PBA Tour events just to qualify for its elite 24-player field, is the spotlight event in the PBA's first year of broadcast and cable television coverage by FOX Sports on its FS1 and FOX networks. It will conclude Sunday when the two

winners from Saturday's semifinal round matches meet on FOX in a "race to 2 points" finale with a \$100,000 first prize at stake.

The weekend script goes like this:

On Saturday at noon, the semifinals will begin with 27-year-old Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, taking on 22-year-old Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, in the opening "race to 2 points" match.

Kris Prather: a native of Milton, Florida and a former Wichita State University star, used his new-found confidence to win his first PBA Tour title in the PBA Scorpion Championship during the 2019 PBA World Series of Bowling. Six championship round appearances in 2018 without a title suggested that Prather was on the final lap of his title chase, and he finally took the checkered flag in Detroit. He barely missed earning a first-round bye for the Playoffs (qualifying as the No. 9 seed), but he made his presence known quickly by knocking off Darren Tang of San Francisco, 207-183, in the one-game Round of 24. He then eliminated Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, 2-0, in his Round of 16 "race to 2 points" match; and pulled off the biggest upset of the Playoffs when he sent No. 1 seed Jason Belmonte of Australia to the sidelines with a 197-165, 224-214 sweep in the quarterfinal round. The enthusiastic fans in Portland, Maine, call Prather "the Shark."

Anthony Simonsen: Simonsen, a six-time PBA Tour title winner, is the youngest player ever to win two PBA major titles (2016 USBC Masters at age 19 and the 2019 PBA Players Championship at age 22). He won the Players Championship title by defeating fellow two-hander Jason Belmonte, 232-212. Simonsen enters Saturday's match as the highest-seeded survivor in the Playoffs, seeded No. 4, after eliminating Rhino Page of Orlando, Florida, 2-1 in a match decided by his 49-39 win in a two-frame roll-off in the Round of 16 followed by a similar 56-39 two-frame roll-off victory over Colombia's Andres Gomez in the Round of 8. Simonsen, a fan favorite in Portland, has been nicknamed "Juiceboxx" in reference to his tender age.

The winner of the match between the two young 20-something stars will bowl for the Playoffs championship on Sunday against the winner of the second semifinal match between a pair of future PBA Hall of Famers, 37-year-old Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, and 36-year-old Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois:

Bill O'Neill: the former Saginaw Valley State collegiate star punched his future election into the PBA Hall of Fame in the 2019 season-opener when he won his 10th career title in the PBA Hall of Fame Classic. A 14-year PBA member, O'Neill was PBA's 2006 Rookie of the Year and won his only major title in the 2010 U.S. Open. Four championship round finishes in 2019 helped him earn the No. 7 seed and a first-round bye in the PBA Playoffs. He then rolled his way into the semifinals with a 57-39 two-frame roll-off victory over Sweden's Jesper Svensson in the Round of 16 followed by a 229-217, 246-202 sweep of Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas in the Round of 8. His fans call him "The Real Deal."

Sean Rash: an Alaska native and former Wichita State star, Rash also is PBA Hall of Fame title-eligible based upon his 13 career titles including two majors (2007 USBC Masters and 2012 PBA Tournament of Champions), plus 2012 PBA Player of the Year honors. He won his 13th title in partnership with Matt Ogle of Louisville, Kentucky, in the 2019 Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship, and earned the No. 6 seed for the Playoffs to also earn a first-round bye. In the Round of 16, he dispatched young Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri, 227-175, 237-214, and then earned his berth in the semifinals with a come-from-behind battle with England's Dom Barrett. After losing the first game, 268-205, Rash outlasted Barrett, 268-253, to send the match into overtime where Rash won the two-frame roll-off with a perfect four-strike performance, 60-40. The Bayside Bowl faithful know Rash as "Rash."

In keeping with the format used throughout the PBA Playoffs finals (except for the single-game Round of 24), the semifinal and championship rounds will be decided in "race to 2 points" matches. Each game is worth one point. If the match is tied at 1-1 after two regulation games, the final point will be determined in a ninth-and-10th frame roll-off. In the Rounds of 16 and 8, seven of the 12 matches were decided by roll-offs.

Sunday's championship telecast will be a 90-minute telecast beginning at 12:30 p.m. EDT. In addition to the championship match, the special live FOX telecast will include the traditional broadcast team of announcer Rob Stone, analyst Randy Pedersen and sideline reporter Kimberly Pressler, plus input by PBA Tour competitors Jason Belmonte and Kyle Troup as bonus commentators. The telecast also will include the special analytics introduced by FOX for the 2019 season plus the addition of a second super slow-motion camera, and a "jib" camera that will provide unique perspective shots inside Bayside Bowl.

Mike Dias Beats Parker Bohn III to Win PBA50 Northern California Classic for Third PBA50 Tour title

Dias beats Bohn 227-217 in title match battle that goes down to 10th frame

BRENTWOOD, Calif. (May 28, 2019) – Mike Dias of Lafayette, Colorado, defeated PBA Hall of Famer and fellow left-hander Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey, 227-217, in the title match to win the PBA50 Northern California Classic presented by MOTIV at Harvest Park Bowl Tuesday for his third career PBA50 Tour title.

Dias, who was the top qualifier for the stepladder finals, had trouble with pin carry in the first half of the match leaving four nine counts in the first five frames, but after making what he called a minor adjustment, struck on the next four shots.

"I was getting to the pocket fine but needed to make a small adjustment with my hand position," said the 62-year-old Dias. "I started getting a little more aggressive by getting my hand around the ball more at release and just moved one board to the left to get a better angle and that helped solve the carry problem."

After striking on his first shot of the 10th frame, Bohn, trying for his fifth career PBA50 Tour title, had an opportunity to win the match with another strike on the second shot of the frame but left a solid 7 pin which gave Dias the victory.

Bohn, who qualified second for the finals, beat No. 3 qualifier Skip Pavone of San Jose, California, 280-256, in the semifinal to advance to the title match.

"You know you're going to have your hands full trying to beat a great bowler like Parker," said Dias, who advanced all the way from the cashers round earlier in the day to take the top qualifying spot. "Even though he was coming off a big game, I knew he was going to have to adjust to some transition. I thought it might take something like 220 or 230 to win and it turned out to be close to that."

Dias' last PBA50 Tour win came in the 2014 PBA50 Grants Pass Open but he did win the USBC Super Senior Classic for players 60 and over in 2018 for his first PBA60 title.

"I always thought I could win on the PBA50 Tour again," Dias added. "You just never know how many opportunities you'll get but you try to make the most of every opportunity like I was able to do today."

In a match between two hall of famers, five-time PBA50 Tour winner Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, beat 2017 PBA50 Miller Lite Players Championship winner Bryan Goebel of Shawnee, Kansas, in the opening stepladder match 268-212. In the second match, Pavone, making his first championship round appearance, beat Duke 245-228 to advance to the semifinal against Bohn.

The PBA50 Tour heads to Las Vegas for the USBC Super Senior Classic May 29-June 2, where Dias will defend his title, to be followed by the USBC Senior Masters June 3-9. Both events are hosted by Sam's Town and will be streamed live on <u>bowltv.com</u>.

The Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm, the season's third major, follows the Senior Masters June 10-14 and will be streamed live by FloBowling. Visit <u>www.flobowling.com</u> for subscription and schedule information.

Kris Prather, Anthony Simonsen Ready to Kick Off PBA Playoffs Finale

Future stars bowl opening semifinal round match live on FOX Saturday

PORTLAND, Maine – After 13 tournaments and nearly six months of competition, Kris Prather and Anthony Simonsen are ready to do battle at Bayside Bowl Saturday at noon EDT, live on FOX, as the inaugural Professional Bowlers Association Playoffs heads into Sunday's finale at 12:30 p.m. EDT, also live on FOX. The PBA Playoffs began with the PBA Hall of Fame Classic in January in Arlington, Texas. After 13 Go Bowling! PBA Tour events, the elite field of 24 qualifiers is now down to four contenders for the \$100,000 first prize that will be decided in Sunday's "race to 2 points" match. The contestants will be the winners of Saturday's semifinal round matches, beginning with the showdown between Prather, a 27-year-old right-hander from Plainfield, Illinois, and Simonsen, a 22-year-old two-hander who resides in Little Elm, Texas. Whomever wins will bowl for the championship against the winner of the Bill O'Neill-Sean Rash semifinal match that follows.

Prather, the dark horse in the final four, qualified for the Playoffs as the lowest remaining seed – No. 9. Simonsen is the highest surviving seed, qualifying No. 4. Prather enters the semifinal round after winning all three preliminary matches without losing a single game. Simonsen, who was exempt from the Round of 24, had to win two-frame roll-offs in both of his preliminary matches in order to advance.

But both are ready for Saturday's showdown.

"I feel like I'm as prepared as I can be," Prather said. "I don't feel like I'm missing anything. I think it's important not to over emphasize the job at hand and get overhyped.

"It will be an opportunity to put a stamp on the year and it will set the tone for the second half of the season," he continued. "Obviously, it's been very satisfying to get to this point, but I don't want to be overwhelmed by the thought of the possibility of being the first Playoffs champion. Hopefully I'll have the opportunity to reflect on that when it's over."

Prather has had plenty of opportunities to bowl in "pressure" matches, both as a collegiate star at Wichita State University and in five years of PBA competition.

"There were a lot of close matches that went into the roll-off (in Portland), and with the quality of players who made the finals, I anticipate that happening again," Prather added. "Beating Belmo (top seed Jason Belmonte of Australia) was a big confidence booster and showed that if I I'm ever in that position again, I have the potential of doing it again. I know if I get into that position again where I need a clutch performance in the 10th frame or in a roll-off, I'll feel more relaxed because I've been there before."

Advancing to the PBA Playoffs also has given Prather his first chance to bowl in front of the always loud, always enthusiastic crowd inside Portland's Bayside Bowl.

"It may sound strange, but having the crowd behind you is much more of a stress-reliever than it is a distraction," Prather said. "There's actually more pressure feeling that if I don't win, I'll let them down, so I want to be sure that I channel their support and energy in a way that enhances my performance on the lanes."

Prather and Simonsen have bowled against each other only one previous time on television, and that win went to Simonsen, 247-203, in the stepladder finals of the Go Bowling! Greater Jonesboro Open earlier in the 2019 season.

Simonsen also is ready to go, but he isn't heading to Portland with any more emotion than any other tournament.

"I've been following my normal routine," he said. "I'm really looking at it like it's another event. I tend to not practice a lot, except for the past couple of weeks because we haven't been bowling in competition lately. I took a couple of weeks off just to refresh myself and then I got back at it."

Simonsen admits he isn't much for practice under any circumstances.

"No sir. I'm more of a feel type of bowler," he said. "For me it's a matter of getting comfortable on the lanes. I'll practice if we haven't bowled tour events in a while. Otherwise I don't practice too much."

And he hasn't given the \$100,000 first prize much thought either.

"There's a whole lot of bowling left before you get to the title. I haven't given it too much thought," he said. "The money's there, of course, but I'm trying to keep it as simple as possible. You have to win first before you can worry about the rest of it."

What about Bayside's fans?

"I love 'em," Simonsen said. "There's probably only one other place that has fans like that. The Swedish League is pretty incredible, from videos I've seen. I'm not involved with it, but I'd like to go, just to experience it.

"One of the things I tell people about experiencing Portland is that it's indescribable. You can't know what it's like until you make a trip out there."

Prather and Simonsen both expect the Bayside Bowl fans to be at their best this weekend.

O'Neill or Rash: Who Will Win the Final Berth in PBA Playoffs Finale?

Future PBA Hall of Famers to meet in second semifinal round match live on FOX Saturday

PORTLAND, Maine – Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, and Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, will both be elected to the Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame at some point in the future, but a victory in the inaugural PBA Playoffs would provide another accomplishment each player would love to have on his resumé.

One of the two will get his shot at that prestigious victory when they meet in the final semifinal round showdown at Bayside Bowl Saturday at noon EDT, live on FOX. Whomever wins will advance to the PBA Playoffs championship match Sunday at 12:30 p.m. EDT, also live on FOX, against the winner of the first semifinal match between Kris Prather-Anthony Simonsen.

O'Neill, 37, began his march to the PBA Playoffs in January when he won the PBA Hall of Fame Classic in Arlington, Texas, for his 10th career PBA Tour title. That win security his eligibility for the PBA Hall of Fame ballot when he enters his 20th year of PBA membership. O'Neill earned the No. 7 seed for the Playoffs.

Rash, 36, won his only 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour title in the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship with partner Matt Ogle of Louisville, Kentucky. Rash, now a 13-time PBA Tour title winner, also is PBA Hall of Fame title-eligible. Rash earned the No. 6 seed for the Playoffs.

There are a number of similarities between the two:

• Both joined the PBA in 2005 which means they will both be "participation-eligible" for election to the PBA Hall of Fame in the same year: 2025.

• Both are currently in their 14th years of PBA Tour competition.

• Both are members of the "PBA Millionaires Club" (exceeding \$1 million in career earnings).

• Both are former collegiate stars (O'Neill at Saginaw Valley State in Michigan, Rash at Wichita State in Kansas).

• Both are married with two young children.

• Both have competed internationally as members of Team USA.

• Both have served the sport as athlete representatives on the United States Bowling Congress board of directors.

One interesting distinction about the pair? They have never bowled against each other on television, so in addition to all of the other issues, bragging rights are at stake Saturday.

"I don't have any experience bowling against Sean in a tour telecast but I've faced him in match play many times," O'Neill said. "I think Sean's strong suit is his versatility and when he's locked in he's able to maintain that momentum which makes him hard to beat."

Said Rash, "You've got four very deserving and versatile players in the finals so it could easily come down to whomever catches the good break at a key point in the match and takes advantage of it."

O'Neill isn't over-thinking Saturday's matchup, nor is he letting the magnitude of the weekend get in his head.

"I know this event can be a career-defining moment for me, but that's something I can think about after this weekend," O'Neill said. "Once I get there, my preparation will be the same as it is for every tournament. I'll be concentrating on making sure my mental and physical game are synched up which I do for every event. It will be a matter of trying to develop a routine where I can make the best possible shots."

The Bayside Bowl crowd, O'Neill said, provides the kind of atmosphere he has always dreamed about as a professional bowler.

"This environment is what we should be bowling in every tournament," he said. "In fact, it's more comfortable for me to bowl in front of a crowd like we have at Bayside than when we bowl when it's quiet because any little sound can be a distraction. You can use the energy to your advantage, but you also have to avoid getting too pumped up."

Rash has had some physical and mental issues to deal with during the 2019 season, but he feels like he's physically refreshed and emotionally ready to go for the weekend.

"It's been a more grueling season for me to this point; it's had its ups and downs, but overall I think I've bowled pretty well, so I think from a physical and mental standpoint I'll be where I need to be when the lights go on.

"If you look at the Playoffs to this point, there haven't been many really high scores," he added. "It's been more of a grind with a lot of close matches that have gone into roll-offs. If that holds true for the finals, like I've said before, it's as simple as making the best shot you can and if you don't strike, you need to fill the frames. If history is any indication, you're also going to need to catch some breaks and take advantage of opportunities when they present themselves."

One thing Rash is certain about is bowling in front of the Bayside Bowl faithful is going to be fun.

"I know we're all looking forward to the 'sporting event' atmosphere at Bayside Bowl," he said. "(All four of us) are going to give the Portland fans and the fans watching on FOX a show they're going to remember."

PORTLAND, Maine (May 31, 2019) -- Another chapter in PBA history will be written when Anthony Simonsen, Kris Prather, Bill O'Neill and Sean Rash return to Bayside Bowl Saturday and Sunday for the live semifinal and final rounds of the inaugural PBA Playoffs on FOX. In addition to becoming the first PBA Playoffs champion, the winner takes home a \$100,000 first prize, the biggest payday of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season.

After seven consecutive top five finishes over the past two seasons, the 27-year-old Prather finally broke through for his first PBA Tour title by winning the PBA Scorpion Championship at World Series of Bowling X.

Saturday's second stepladder match will feature a pair of PBA Tour veterans and future Hall of Fame candidates. O'Neill won the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic for his 10th PBA Tour title and Rash won the PBA Mark Roth-Marshall Holman Doubles Championship with Matt Ogle for his 13th PBA Tour title. The pair of 14-year PBA Tour veterans will bowl in a head-to-head match on national television for the first time.

Competition will once again feature the unique Race to 2 Points format where each game won in the match is worth one point. If the players split the first two games, a ninth and 10th frame tie-breaker is used to award the deciding point.

Sunday's 90-minute finals telecast will feature the broadcast team of announcer Rob Stone, analyst Randy Pedersen and sideline reporter Kimberly Pressler, plus input by PBA Tour competitors Jason Belmonte and Kyle Troup as bonus commentators. The telecast also will include the special analytics introduced by FOX for the 2019 season plus the addition of a second super slow-motion camera, and a "jib" camera that will provide unique perspective shots inside Bayside Bowl.

Dark Horse Kris Prather, Veteran Bill O'Neill Advance to PBA Playoffs Finale

Championship match live on FOX Sunday at 12:30 p.m. Eastern

PORTLAND, Maine (June 1, 2019) – Dark horse contender Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois and veteran Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, will bowl for the inaugural Professional Bowlers Association Playoffs Championship Sunday after emotional victories in the semifinal round Saturday at Bayside Bowl.

Sunday's championship match between Prather and O'Neill for a \$100,000 first prize will air live on FOX at 12:30 p.m. EDT.

Prather, the lowest seeded player in the finals at No. 9, needed a win in the two-frame roll-off to eliminate No. 4 seed Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, while the No. 7-seeded O'Neill was nearly perfect in sweeping his "race to 2 points" match against No. 6 Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 258-214 and 289-266.

In the opening match, Prather spotted Simonsen a 19-pin lead after two frames when he fouled in the second frame. But he rebounded with a string of five strikes, taking advantage of Simonson's inability to put any strikes together, to run away with the first game, 217-179.

"My feet got quick (on the foul) because I was trying to throw the ball a little too hard," Prather said, "but I'm kinda glad I did that because it helped me refocus. I was throwing the wrong ball, so I made a ball change and I was fine."

Simonsen made a big move to the inside of the lane in game two, and threw a string of six strikes of his own for a 247-216 win to send the match into the two-frame roll-off, which Prather won, 49-40, when he struck on his first two shots while Simonsen struck, but then left a 7 pin on a weak pocket hit on his second attempt.

"I was nervous as hell," Prather said. "Normally I take a couple of deep breaths to release the energy and calm down, but down the stretch, I was kind of out of it. I'm honestly surprised I threw a double in the roll-off. My hand was shaking when I tried to grip the ball.

"I didn't think I was going to win after I didn't strike (on my third shot) because his look was so good. I'm kinda mind-blown about that. When he started striking, I knew the (Bayside fans) we're going to ring that bell (signaling a roll-off was going to decide the match). I'm thinking it's going to come down to four more shots and then you realize it's going to come down to one shot for a shot at \$100,000.

"It's almost impossible not to think about (the money)," Prather continued, "but now that I'm in the final two, life for my wife and I is going to be different, no matter what happens." O'Neill and Rash, two future PBA Hall of Famers with very similar credentials, engaged in a strikefest that was much closer than the scores might indicate. O'Neill threw 10 strikes to win the first game, 258-214, but after throwing a 4-9 split and failing to convert in the first frame, Rash rallied behind a string of five strikes and had a chance to tie the match with another strike in the ninth frame. He left a 10 pin and missed, and O'Neill threw four more strikes to close the match and win by 44 pins.

"Sean's shot in the ninth frame was probably his worst in the whole match, and it wasn't that bad," O'Neill said.

In the second game, neither player missed the pocket until the match was decided. The difference was an 8 pin Rash left on a perfect pocket hit in the fourth frame while O'Neill flirted with perfection, throwing the first 10 strikes before leaving a 10 pin on his 11th attempt.

"My mental approach for this event, and my past few times on TV, has really helped me out," O'Neill said. "It keeps me grounded, keeps my tempo under control. It was especially important with as great as Sean was bowling.

"I almost feel bad for him, but I've been on the other side of it, too," O'Neill said.

His bid for a nationally-televised 300 game wasn't a factor until after he had thrown his first strike in the 10th frame to clinch the win.

"I wasn't focusing on 300; I was focusing on the match," O'Neill said. "I didn't make that great of a shot in the 11th, but I knew I had the match won and then I got a little excited because I've never been in that situation before. At that moment, I wasn't thinking about 300. I didn't care."

Sunday, Prather and O'Neill will bowl for the richest prize either of them has ever won. Prather's incentive? After the 2018 season, he was seriously pondering putting his bowling balls in the closest and calling it a career. But after clinching a chance to win \$100,000 Sunday, he's no longer thinking about giving up on the PBA. "Bowling is going to be my job for as long as I can make it," he said.

For O'Neill, vastly more experienced and the winner of 10 Go Bowling! PBA Tour titles, Sunday's match is going to be another day at the office.

"I'm looking forward to it," O'Neill said, "but I'm going to try to do what I did today – not change a thing."

Kris Prather Wins Inaugural PBA Playoffs, \$100,000 First Prize

Fifth-year PBA member sweeps "race to two points" duel with Pennsylvania's Bill O'Neill

PORTLAND, Maine (June 2, 2019) – Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, made critical shot after critical shot in defeating Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, 226-215 and 216-185, to win the inaugural Professional Bowlers Association Playoffs Championship and its \$100,000 first prize Sunday at Bayside Bowl.

The championship match aired live on FOX, concluding a 13-tournament qualifying series leading into a 24-player match play elimination competition. A calm and confident Prather, who entered the Playoffs as the No. 9 seed, was in complete control in claiming the championship.

"It was a lot easier thinking that no matter what happened, I was going to help my family financially," Prather said after the biggest win of his career. "I told myself last night I couldn't be disappointed no matter what. But after watching Bill's ball motion not being that great, and me throwing a few good shots that loosened my arm swing really helped.

"When I came out on tour, I didn't treat it as a job and it showed," he added. "I hope people can see how much I've matured over the past five years, and it's really having an impact on the success I'm having."

Prather, a 27-year-old five-year PBA Tour veteran, used a string of four strikes to build a lead over the struggling O'Neill in the first game but had to convert a 3-4-6-7-10 split in the 10th frame to win the first in the "race to two points" match.

"I threw the ball about as bad as I could in that situation, and it showed," Prather said. "On the spare I told myself I make that split all the time, so I just wanted to hit the pin in front and if I made it, it was meant to be."

O'Neill, who didn't throw back-to-back strikes until the sixth and seventh frames, had a chance to win by a pin with three strikes in his 10th frame but left the 2-8 on his second shot.

"I was unsure of what I was doing," O'Neill admitted. "In hindsight I should have played the lanes a lot straighter. It was more a tactical error on my part. That second shot in the 10th frame I thought was pretty good, but that's what happens when you're not playing the lanes properly."

Prather, who won his only PBA Tour title earlier in the season in the PBA Scorpion Championship during the PBA World Series of Bowling X, retained control in game two with a string of three strikes after O'Neill failed to convert the 4-9 split in the first frame and again struggled to put together consecutive strikes. When O'Neill finally put together a double, he left the 3-6-9-10 in the eighth frame and failed to convert, basically sealing the victory for Prather.

"This was the first time, in the whole playoffs, I had the lead early. In every other match, except one, I had to come from behind," Prather said, noting he was surprised by how well the Bayside Bowl fans

embraced him considering he'd never bowled in Maine before this year. "These fans are incredible. I never thought I'd be accepted into a place I'm not from, like I have been in Portland. You hear about how enthusiastic these fans are, but you don't really know until you experience this place."

The 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour will resume competition June 28-30 when the Lubbock Sports Shootout presented by Ebonite at South Plains Lanes in Lubbock, Texas, kicks off the PBA Summer Tour and USBC Cup points competition. The PBA Summer Tour will be livestreamed in its entirety by the PBA's online streaming partner, FloBowling.

STEVE SMITH LEADS FIRST ROUND AT 2019 USBC SENIOR MASTERS

LAS VEGAS – San Diego's Steve Smith finished his opening round of qualifying at the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters with games of 279 and 266 on Tuesday to lead the 300-player field at Sam's Town Bowling Center.

The 51-year-old right-hander started his block with games of 235, 256 and 202 to finish with a five-game total of 1,238, a 247.6 average.

John Dudak of Orland Park, Illinois, sits in second place with 1,212, and Oklahoma City's Pete Thomas is third with 1,204. Stoney Baker of Canton, Georgia, and Canada's Joe Ciach round out the top five with scores of 1,187 and 1,184, respectively.

BowlTV.com is providing wire-to-wire livestream coverage of the event for USBC members age 50 and older.

Smith bowled on the burn variation of this week's 40-foot oil pattern Tuesday, meaning one squad already had bowled its five-game block on the condition. Ciach posted the highest score on the fresh, while Thomas paced his squad on the double-burn.

The three-time Team USA member started his block playing farther to the right. A zone change to his left, however, let him find the look to move to the top of the standings.

"I didn't have any expectations today, other than to try and bowl well," Smith said. "I tried to play the lanes to the right between the first and second arrows. It looked OK, but when I moved left between the second and third arrows, things really opened up for me. I had a pretty good look there."

Smith will bowl on the fresh during Wednesday's second round, and he feels he has a good game plan based on his experiences during Monday's official practice session.

If things don't go as planned, he has a few additional bowling balls in mind to combat the conditions. Smith also knows he's afforded himself the opportunity to not worry about a bad game or two based on Tuesday's strong performance.

"They'll probably be tighter tomorrow, so I'll probably be about five boards right compared to today," Smith said. "But, we'll see what happens tomorrow. Starting this well means if I have a bad game or two, it shouldn't impact me too much."

Qualifying will continue Wednesday, starting at 11 a.m. Eastern. After three days of qualifying, 15-game pinfall totals will determine the 63 bowlers who will join defending champion Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, in the double-elimination bracket.

Warren is tied for 50th place after the opening round with a 1,094 total. He is guaranteed the No. 64 seed in the bracket if he falls out of the cut, but he can improve his seeding for match play during qualifying.

After five games, Henry Dawson of Elma, Washington, is in 64th place with a 1,085 total, a 217 average.

Bowlers advancing to bracket play will compete in three-game total-pinfall matches until the top five bowlers are determined for Sunday's stepladder finals, which will take place at 1 p.m. Eastern. The winner will take home the \$20,000 top prize.

HALL OF FAMER DOUG KENT TAKES LEAD AT 2019 USBC SENIOR MASTERS

LAS VEGAS – United States Bowling Congress and Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Doug Kent of Newark, New York, took over the top spot after two rounds of qualifying at the 2019 USBC Senior Masters on Wednesday.

The 52-year-old right-hander leads the 300-player field with a 10-game score of 2,337, a 233.7 average.

Gary Faulkner of Norfolk, Virginia, is second with 2,320, and 2012 champion Mike Edwards of Tulsa, Oklahoma, is third with 2,314. Denver's Ricky Schissler (2,312) and Blaine Weninger of Clackamas, Oregon (2,310), round out the top five.

BowlTV.com is providing wire-to-wire livestream coverage of the event for USBC members age 50 and older.

Kent's first two rounds have been on the double-burn and burn variations of this week's 40-foot oil pattern, and he's found that controlling his speed has been the key to creating the proper motion through the pins. He rolled 1,157 for his five games on the double-burn Tuesday and followed up with 1,180 on the burn Wednesday to get to the overall lead.

"I think the biggest key has been speed control," said Kent, the 1991 and 2006 USBC Masters champion. "I'm still trying to hit it, but I'm also keeping my speed softer, which helps it read the midlane. I've just been trying to keep my speed under control through the midlane so the ball still sees the end of the lane pattern."

Kent controls his ball speed by altering his tempo, and he expects he'll have to soften his speed and tighten his angles Thursday while bowling on the fresh during his final round of qualifying.

As many competitors note, the format at Senior Masters functions as two tournaments in one - qualifying and match play.

Kent is familiar in managing both aspects, and he hopes to use Thursday's final round to continue to prepare for the tournament's double-elimination bracket.

"This tournament begins with match play," Kent said. "There are so many smart and great players, which generally causes the scoring environment to go up. You need to have a good plan and have your equipment prepped, but it really comes down to being able to execute and limit your bad shots."

The biggest mover on Wednesday was 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair of Delmar, New York, who moved from 212th place to 15th with a five-game score of 1,293 on the double-burn. LeClair rolled games of 248, 277, 255, 278 and 235 and now has an overall score of 2,267.

Qualifying will conclude Thursday, starting with the first squad at 11 a.m. Eastern. After three days of qualifying, 15-game pinfall totals will determine the 63 bowlers who will join defending champion Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, in the double-elimination bracket.

Warren is tied for 40th place after two rounds with a 2,188 total. He is guaranteed the No. 64 seed in the bracket if he falls out of the cut, but he can improve his seeding for match play during qualifying.

After 10 games, Hugh Miller of Mercer Island, Washington, is in 64th place with a 2,153 total, a 215.3 average. Miller was the runner-up at the 2019 Super Senior Classic, which also was held at Sam's Town last week.

Bowlers advancing to bracket play will compete in three-game total-pinfall matches until the top five bowlers are determined for Sunday's stepladder finals, which will take place at 1 p.m. Eastern. The winner will take home the \$20,000 top prize.

2019 Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open Storylines

LAS VEGAS (June 6, 2019) – As the most demanding stretch of the PBA50 Tour season continues with the USBC Senior Masters this week in Las Vegas, players will once again have to dig deep when the second half of the major doubleheader continues with the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm wraps up the western swing June 10-14.

The Senior U.S. Open marks the halfway point of the season which, thus far, has been dominated by PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. in what could already be considered a "Player of the Year" worthy season.

The Senior U.S. Open will be streamed live in its entirety via FloBowling beginning with first-round qualifying June 10. Visit <u>www.flobowling.com</u> for subscription and schedule information.

Here's a look at a few of the storylines for the third and final major of the 2019 season:

Walter Ray Williams Jr. continues his PBA50 Player of the Year march: In the first five tournaments of the season, PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. started with three consecutive wins that included the PBA50 National Championship, followed by eighth and seventh-place finishes heading into the Senior Masters, an event he has won twice.

The seven-time PBA Tour and two-time PBA50 Tour Player of the Year holds a huge 10,000-point lead in the PBA50 Tour points race over reigning PBA50 Player of the Year and 2017 Senior U.S. Open winner Michael Haugen Jr. Williams, the career leader on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour titles list with 47 wins, continues his pursuit of a 15th PBA50 Tour title which would give him the career titles lead for both of PBA's national tours. He is currently tied for first on the PBA50 all-time titles list with fellow Hall of Famer John Handegard with 14 wins.

Mika Koivuniemi returns to defend Senior U.S. Open title: The PBA Hall of Famer earned the moniker of "Major Mika" after winning two majors for his first two titles early in his PBA Tour career before winning his first PBA Tour standard title. The 14-time tour winner, who is the head coach for the United Arab Emirates national bowling team, hopes that history will repeat itself on the PBA50 Tour after winning the 2018 Senior U.S. Open with a 259-237 title-match victory over Brian Kretzer for his first PBA50 Tour win. With his win, Koivuniemi – who won the 2001 U.S. Open on the PBA Tour – joined Amleto Monacelli as the only international Senior U.S. Open champions.

Will the Senior U.S. Open see its first three-time winner? Hall of Famers Pete Weber, Amleto Monacelli and Tom Baker will be trying to become the first three-time winner of the Senior U.S. Open since it began in 2003. All three players have won it in consecutive seasons – Weber (2015, '16), Monacelli (2012, '13) and Baker (2005,'06). The other two-time winner is retired hall of famer Wayne Webb who also won in back-to-back years in 2008 and '09.

Can Pete Weber bounce back? Weber, who is tied for sixth on the career PBA50 Tour titles list with 11 wins, took some time off from the PBA50 Tour earlier this season, but after winning a PBA regional in early May, hopes that tune-up will provide some momentum for the rest of the PBA50 Tour season.

Local favorite Ron Mohr looks for second Senior U.S. Open win: Among other notables entered in the Senior U.S. Open is 2011 champion and two-time runner-up Ron Mohr of Las Vegas who owns 10 PBA50 Tour titles and is a two-time PBA50 Player of the Year. The 63-year-old Mohr was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame in 2018 for his accomplishments on the senior tour.

The PBA has added \$10,500 to the top five positions of the Senior U.S. Open prize fund with first place increased by \$5,000 to \$15,000.

The entire field will bowl six-game qualifying rounds June 10-13 with squads at 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. PT. The top 25 percent of the field will then advance to match play which gets underway June 14 at 8 a.m. after which the top five will be determined for the stepladder finals at 4 p.m.

MCCUNE LEADS QUALIFYING AT 2019 USBC SENIOR MASTERS

LAS VEGAS – Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana, used the momentum of a perfect game Thursday to lead qualifying at the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters.

The 50-year-old right-hander finished qualifying at Sam's Town Bowling Center with a 15-game total of 3,510, a 234 average over three days, to pace the 300-player field.

Professional Bowlers Association and USBC Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, is second with 3,484, and defending champion Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, jumped into third place after posting the biggest five-game block Thursday (1,292) to finish with 3,480.

Warren defeated Duke twice in the stepladder finals of the 2018 Senior Masters to claim the title.

Blaine Weninger of Clackamas, Oregon, and USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey, round out the top five with 3,440 and 3,410, respectively.

BowlTV.com is providing wire-to-wire livestream coverage of the event for USBC members age 50 and older.

McCune's block on the burn variation of this week's 40-foot lane condition Thursday started with a 268 game, but he quickly found his second pair playing drastically different.

He waited until his fill ball to make a move to the right, increase his ball speed and tighten his angle to the pocket to finish with 191.

Throughout his PBA Tour career, McCune has thrived on conditions that allow him to take advantage of his ball speed, and he was able to do so again Thursday, finishing with games of 300, 226 and 223 for a 1,208 total.

He added sets of 1,175 on the double-burn and 1,127 on the fresh. All bowlers in this year's field bowled one-five game set on each variation of the oil pattern.

"On the first pair, I was able to stand about two left and throw it anywhere to shoot 260," said McCune, a three-time PBA Tour champion. "On the next pair, I ended up moving 10 boards and also had the left lane playing weird. I figured if they were going to be that way, I'd try a fill ball out. It looked good, so I tried it on the next pair and never missed the pocket."

McCune retired from the PBA Tour after the 2016 season, but his time on the lanes has been picking up since he turned 50 last June. He won the 2018 PBA50 South Shore Open in his PBA50 debut as a non-member, and he's added a handful of regional events to his schedule in 2019.

Looking ahead to match play, McCune hopes his mindset throughout the week at Sam's Town will allow him to make quick moves during his three-game matches.

"I tried to not get caught up in playing one shot because a lot of pairs are different," McCune said. "If you go into match play thinking you're only going to play them one way, and they're not that way, you need to find something else really quick."

All bowlers at the 2019 Senior Masters competed in three five-game sets over three days to determine the 63 bowlers joining Warren in the double-elimination bracket. Match play will feature three-game total-pinfall contests to determine which players advance.

McCune will face Alvin Lou of El Cajon, California, in Friday's opening round, which will start at noon Eastern.

The left side of the bracket will hit the lanes first, while the right side of the bracket will get underway Friday at 2:30 p.m. Eastern.

Lou finished tied for 63rd place with Las Vegas' Alan Frederick to earn the final spots in the bracket with matching 3,218 totals, a 214.53 average. Frederick will face Duke in the first round.

Match play will take place Friday and Saturday at Sam's Town until the top five bowlers are determined for Sunday's stepladder finals, which will take place at 1 p.m. Eastern. The winner will take home the \$20,000 top prize.

SIXTEEN PLAYERS UNDEFEATED AT 2019 USBC SENIOR MASTERS

LAS VEGAS - Since turning 50 in January, Blaine Weninger of Clackamas, Oregon, has been working hard, both on the lanes and in the gym, to get ready for the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters and Suncoast Professional Bowlers Association Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm, but a back injury nearly derailed his summer plans.

After a couple trips to the doctor and a half-dozen visits to the chiropractor, Weninger felt well enough to compete this week at the Sam's Town Bowling Center, and he's now one of 16 undefeated players at the 2019 USBC Senior Masters.

Also among the undefeated competitors are last year's runner-up Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, top seed Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana, two-time USBC Masters champion Doug Kent of Newark, New York, 2015 Senior Masters winner Amleto Monacelli of Venezuela and 2012 champion Mike Edwards of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

On the way to a 2-0 record Friday, Weninger found himself in the highest-scoring match of the day, an 820-729 victory over USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida.

Ironically, while his back might've been a little bit tight due to a bad sacroiliac joint, caused by overdoing his preparation, Weninger said his arm swing was looser than he expected while taking on the winningest player in PBA history. Weninger closed the three-game match with the tournament's eighth perfect game.

"Even though I qualified fourth, I had streaks where I bowled well and other times where I just didn't, or maybe my spare game was off," Weninger said. "I bowled pretty well this morning, and I think the best thing that could've happened was getting to bowl Walter because my expectations were zero. I knew I probably wasn't supposed to win. He's arguably the best player ever, and I'm just me. I just went out and bowled, and something clicked. I wasn't even nervous because I had no expectations."

Having scouted the pair they'd be bowling on, Weninger said he and Williams expected their match to be high-scoring based on the way Edwards and Peter Knopp of Columbus, Ohio, attacked the lanes the match before.

By playing straighter, toward the outside part of the lane and using bowling balls with more surface, Edwards and Knopp helped open up the lanes, ultimately making them very scorable for Weninger and Williams.

That's simply the nature of the Senior Masters, where some rounds are contested on a fresh oil pattern, and others are bowled on the burn, meaning a match already had taken place.

"We talked before we started and knew that pair was going to be good, and then in practice, you could tell there was going to be some room," Weninger said. "Ultimately, though, it's not about the score, it's about winning the match. You can shoot 770 and lose, or you can shoot 520 and win. It's a unique format, where gutting out a win is all that matters. You don't have to worry about the field or pinfall or bonus pins. You just have to focus on the one opponent at a time."

While he rests his body Friday night, Weninger also plans to give his mind a rest, too, at least when it comes to bowling.

One of the stipulations of his time in Las Vegas, is that he keep up with his responsibilities as a full-time accountant, meaning there's plenty of work to distract him from thinking about ball selections and how the 40-foot oil pattern will transition on the second day of match play.

"I'm fortunate to have an employer that allows me come out and bowl as long as I get all my work done, and, luckily, I have a ton of work to keep me busy and distracted when I'm not bowling," Weninger said. "So far, this has been a great experience, and it's all gravy from here. I've had a great time, and no matter how it goes, this is something I'll never forget."

All 32 remaining competitors will be back on the lanes Saturday at noon Eastern, and competition will continue throughout the day, until only five remain in contention for the \$20,000 top prize.

The final five bowlers will advance to Sunday's championship round, a traditional stepladder, that will be broadcast live at BowlTV.com at 1 p.m. Eastern.

BowITV.com is providing wire-to-wire livestream coverage of the event.

Among the 16 bowlers left in the Elimination Bracket are Williams, the only player to win both the Senior Masters and Masters twice each, fellow hall of famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey, PBA Tour champion Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, New York, and international standouts Tore Torgersen (Norway) and Ray Vervynck (Canada).

Defending champion Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, will not make another record run at Sam's Town this year after losing back-to-back matches to Mark Williams of Beaumont, Texas, and Shafer.

Warren's opening-round match against Williams ended in a 643 tie, when Warren left a 4-10 split after starting his final frame with a strike. Nine pins would've been enough to advance. Instead, Williams was able to move on after two one-ball roll-offs (10-10, 10-9).

In 2018, Warren lost his first match and then rattled off a record 13 consecutive wins to claim the title, including defeating the top-seeded Duke twice in the traditional double-elimination format.

A total of 300 USBC members age 50 and older took to the lanes this week at the 2019 Senior Masters for three five-game sets over three days to determine the 63 bowlers who joined Warren in the double-elimination bracket. Match play features three-game total-pinfall contests to determine which players advance.

GEORGIA'S STONEY BAKER EARNS TOP SEED FOR FINALS AT 2019 USBC SENIOR MASTERS

LAS VEGAS - Early in his career, Stoney Baker of Canton, Georgia, decided he was going to be a part-time bowler and full-time businessman.

The 56-year-old right-hander was all business Saturday at the Sam's Town Bowling Center as he rolled undefeated through match play to earn the No. 1 seed for the stepladder finals of the 2019 United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters.

Baker, the owner of Canton's Cherokee Lanes, defeated USBC and Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, 717-672, in the match to determine the top seed.

The championship round will be broadcast live on BowITV on Sunday, beginning at 1 p.m. Eastern, with the winner taking home a \$20,000 top prize and the second major title of the 2019 PBA50 Tour season.

Duke will make his third consecutive appearance in the USBC Senior Masters stepladder, this time as the No. 2 seed, and he'll look to improve on last year's runnerup finish, which was the result of a final-frame miscue that has haunted him on the PBA50 Tour ever since.

Baker and Duke will be joined in the championship round by No. 3 Gary Faulkner of Norfolk, Virginia, No. 4 Tom Adcock of Decatur, Illinois, and No. 5 Amleto Monacelli of Venezuela, who all advanced to the stepladder from an exciting four-player shootout Saturday evening.

Adcock and Monacelli will face off in the opening match, and the winner will meet Faulkner.

"My first line of business is my bowling center, which is my baby, but I like to get out and bowl whenever I can, and I've kind of been a part-time bowler my whole life," Baker said. "I'm 56 years old, and I just enjoy the game. To be on the lanes with guys like Walter (Ray Williams Jr.) and Norm is an incredible thing. They're the best. All these guys, I look up to them, and it's an honor to bowl with and against them. Norm, he's my idol, and to beat him is an amazing feeling."

Total pinfall for three games determined the winner of each match in the doubleelimination match-play bracket, while the championship round will be single-game matches. As the undefeated top seed, Baker must be defeated twice to be denied his first PBA50 Tour title.

Baker averaged more than 231 in his six match-play wins this week at Sam's Town but saved his two biggest sets for last.

To guarantee himself a spot in the stepladder, he rolled the event's 13th perfect game and downed PBA Hall of Famer Ron Mohr of Las Vegas, 772-680. That set up the meeting with Duke, and a 290 in the second game propelled Baker to the top seed.

"Being in this position feels amazing," Baker said. "I plan to go out there and give it my best and make the 10 best shots I can. To win this event would mean everything. I have bowled a decent amount of PBA50 events, and being able to win one would be incredibly special."

To earn their spots in Sunday's stepladder, Faulkner, Adcock and Monacelli made their way through the Elimination Bracket and survived the three-game shootout round.

Faulkner posted the highest score, a 719 series, to take the third spot, while Adcock and Monacelli had 711 and 691, respectively. Ron Mohr of Las Vegas shot 594 and was eliminated, finishing sixth overall. Monacelli is the 2015 Senior Masters champion and is looking to become the eighth two-time winner.

As a PBA member since 1986, Baker has collected 31 PBA regional titles and is the reigning Senior Player of the Year in the PBA South Region. Nationally, his best finish on the PBA50 Tour prior to this week was fourth.

"I went out on the PBA Tour for a while and just didn't love all the travel and being gone all the time," Baker said. "I decided to go into the bowling business, which started with a pro shop, and then I got the bowling center. I chose to be a part-time bowler, and I sometimes wonder 'what if,' but I'm ultimately very happy with the direction I chose."

Duke, a 55-year-old right-hander, has made his career on the lanes, collecting 40 PBA Tour titles and five PBA50 Tour wins along the way.

After finishing fourth at the 2017 Senior Masters, Duke turned in another solid performance in 2018, earning the No. 1 seed for the finals, but was defeated by Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, 269-220 and 246-241.

In the deciding game of the title tilt, Duke stepped up in his final frame needing to strike on the first shot and get at least eight and a spare to win by a single pin. After delivering the strike he needed, Duke left the 3-4-6-7-9-10 combination to fall short, a moment that has stuck with him for a year and stalled his success on the PBA50 Tour.

As a competitor on both the Go Bowling! PBA Tour and the PBA50 Tour, Duke essentially is living two separate lives.

Earlier this year, he proved he still can strike and win against the up-and-coming stars of the PBA Tour, winning a pair of titles in back-to-back weeks, but he has been winless on the PBA50 Tour this year, despite making the stepladder of all three events he's entered. He has collected finishes of fifth, third and fourth.

"I've had more trouble on this tour than I have on the regular tour for two years now, but as easily as you can lose yourself out of a roll you're on, you also can win your way out of a funk," Duke said. "I feel like I've been bowling well out here, but I just haven't taken anything home as far as hardware. I know it's up to me to step up and perform, if I'm going to get out of this thing. Right now, there's the mental battle, along with the physical requirement to out-bowl people. It's not anything I haven't experienced before, but unless I can rise to the occasion, it's going to be prolonged."

A win at the 2019 Senior Masters would make Duke the fourth player in history to win both the USBC Masters and the senior version. Dave Soutar, Williams and Warren are the other three, with Williams winning each twice. Duke's Masters title came in 1993.

"I think the way last year's Senior Masters ended is the major contributing factor in what I'm dealing with mentally right now," Duke said. "I let that one get away, and if I get that one, maybe that's the start of a serious roll. But, I didn't. Honestly, it's agonizing at times, and the longer it takes, the more pressure there is. There's a lot of talent on the show, but I'm grateful for the chance. If I'm going to get it done, I've got a lot of work to do."

Duke, who owns two PBA50 major titles, joins fellow hall of famer Pete Weber of St. Ann, Missouri, as the only bowlers to win both the U.S. Open and PBA Senior U.S. Open.

A total of 300 USBC members age 50 and older took to the lanes this week at the 2019 Senior Masters for three five-game sets over three days to determine the 63 bowlers who joined Warren in the double-elimination bracket. Match play features three-game total-pinfall contests to determine which players advance.

As the defending champion, Warren was guaranteed the No. 64 spot in the bracket, but he averaged 232 through 15 games to improve his seeding to No. 3. He then lost to Mark Williams of Beaumont, Texas, and Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, New York, in consecutive matches to end his hopes of becoming the first repeat winner since USBC Hall of Famer Tom Baker in 2007. MONACELLI WINS 2019 USBC SENIOR MASTERS

LAS VEGAS - For the second time in his career, Venezuela's Amleto Monacelli hoisted the trophy at the United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters, this time averaging more than 246 while climbing the stepladder at the Sam's Town Bowling Center.

The 57-year-old right-hander entered Sunday's championship round as the No. 5 seed and won five games to secure the coveted major title and \$20,000 top prize. His run included a pair of wins over top seed Stoney Baker of Canton, Georgia, and made him the eighth bowler in history to win the USBC Senior Masters twice.

Monacelli, a USBC and Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer, struck at least eight times in each match and closed the finale against Baker with five strikes for a 237-200 victory.

Because Baker had made it through the event's 64-player double-elimination matchplay bracket without being beaten, he needed to be defeated twice to be denied the title. Monacelli topped Baker 255-243 to force the second game.

"It's a great feeling, and running through the stepladder, which is the hardest way, is even more special," said Monacelli, now a nine-time PBA50 Tour winner and 20-time PBA Tour titlist. "I think when I have to run the stepladder, it makes me a little more relaxed and more focused about how I'm going to play the lanes. I tried to come in without any expectations and just bowl my best. Luckily, things went my way today."

Baker, a 56-year-old right-hander and 31-time PBA regional champion, started the opening game with seven consecutive strikes, before a 10 pin ended his run at

perfection. An unconverted 1-2-10 washout in the ninth frame gave Monacelli a chance to lock up the game, and the 2015 Senior Masters champion took advantage of the opportunity.

Monacelli, who defeated fellow hall of famer Pete Weber of St. Ann, Missouri, two times to win the 2015 event, kept pace with Baker, slowed only briefly by a 7-10 split in the third frame. He followed the open frame with seven consecutive strikes and a single-pin spare to shut out Baker.

"I was two good shots away from winning this thing," Baker said. "I kind of rolled the thumb in the eighth frame. In the ninth, I didn't quite roll it off my hand. It didn't see any early friction at all, and that's why it just kept going on that shot."

Even as a part-timer on the PBA50 Tour, Baker has found success, including a previous-best finish of fourth. He's also the reigning PBA South Region Senior Player of the Year.

Since joining the PBA in 1986, the bowling center proprietor has enjoyed competing with and against the Tour's top stars, two of whom joined him in the finals Sunday - Monacelli and Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida.

"Amleto had great reaction and is a fabulous bowler, so you have to bring it when you bowl him, especially when he's got a few games on the pair and knows what's going on," Baker said. "It was my first time in a title match in a national event. I don't care who you are, you're going to have some nerves. I just didn't make enough good shots.

"If I could have thrown those two shots in the first game a little better, it might have been a different story. But, I'm not blaming anybody but myself. Overall, though, I'm happy to do what I did."

To earn his meeting with Baker, Monacelli remained unrattled after an eighth-frame gutter ball against Duke and closed with four strikes to escape with a 239-222 victory. Sunday marked Duke's third consecutive appearances in the Senior Masters stepladder, where he has collected finishes of fourth, second and third, respectively.

"The key today was just to get within myself and my process and try to keep my heart rate down, because I needed to be really relaxed before throwing the ball," Monacelli said. "My game is a game where I need to be careful about getting too fast. Overcoming a mistake like throwing it in the gutter is more of a mental test, but you have to remember, it was just a mistake. If anything, it reminded me to stay more behind it and throw good shots, and that's what I did the rest of the time."

Monacelli was one of the three players who advanced to Sunday's stepladder through a four-player shootout that included the last competitors in the Elimination Bracket. Having the third-highest score in the shootout earned him the No. 5 spot.

In the opening match of the championship round, Monacelli struck six times on his first seven shots on the way to a 258-188 win over Tom Adcock of Decatur, Illinois. He then overcame a missed single pin to defeat Gary Faulkner of Norfolk, Virginia, 245-223.

"It was a long road, but winning this title means a lot," said Monacelli, who now will head across town to compete in the 2019 Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm. "It's always special when you win, but this is another major title, and it's a tough tournament with 300 bowlers. I am going to enjoy today and think about tomorrow's event tomorrow."

Walter Ray Williams Jr., the only player to win both the USBC Masters and Seniors Masters twice each, was the last No. 1 seed to win the senior edition, doing so in 2017.

In 2018, Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, defeated the top-seeded Duke twice to join Williams and Dave Soutar as the only players to win both the Masters and Senior Masters.

Warren's title defense this week at Sam's Town was short-lived. After qualifying third for match play, he lost his first two matches and was eliminated.

The Senior Masters is the premier event for USBC members age 50 and older, and the 2019 edition featured 300 entries.

All competitors bowled 15 games over three days to determine the 63 bowlers who joined Warren in the bracket.

Mika Koivuniemi Begins Title Defense with

Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open First-Round Lead

LAS VEGAS (June 10, 2019) – Boosted by a 300 game, defending champion Mika Koivuniemi of Finland, began his Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm title defense Monday at the Suncoast Bowling Center with the first-round lead in the season's third major for players 50 and over.

The PBA Hall of Famer, who was inducted into the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame in May, bowled a 1,465 six-game pinfall total (244 average) with games of 203, 253, 300, 229, 234 and 246 to hold a 63-pin lead over fellow countryman Kimmo Lehtonen in second with 1,402.

"I don't think I bowled 10 bad shots the whole round and when you do that it makes everything else easier," said the 52-year-old Koivuniemi, who owns three Go Bowling! PBA Tour major titles including the 2001 U.S. Open. "I was able to use the same ball and the main adjustment I had to make was in the middle of the first game when I started putting more forward roll on the ball which helped me carry the 10 pins.

"I could tell by the third or fourth frame of the third game I had a really good shot and it was probably going to be a matter of just kicking out the 10 pins and a 300 was certainly going to be possible," the 14-time PBA Tour winner added.

As top qualifier for the stepladder finals, Koivuniemi won the 2018 Senior U.S. Open by defeating Brian Kretzer of Dayton, Ohio, 259-237, in the title match for his first PBA50 Tour win.

Because of his commitments as the head bowling coach for the United Arab Emirates national bowling team, the Senior U.S. Open is the only PBA event Koivuniemi plans to bowl this year.

"For the past two months I started practicing regularly about three or four games a day, five or six games a week to get ready," he said. "Nothing very strenuous – just enough to stay in good playing shape."

Rounding out the top five after the first round were Jeff Johnson, Freeport, Illinois, 1,358; Don Moser, Menifee, California, 1,347, and PBA Hall of Famer and 2011 Senior U.S. Open winner Ron Mohr, Las Vegas, 1,327.

A day after winning the USBC Senior Masters for his fifth PBA50 major and ninth career title, PBA Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli is in 20th place after the first round with a 1,276 pinfall bowling games of 211, 198, 224, 193, 222 and 228.

The 57-year-old Monacelli, who is trying to become the Senior U.S. Open's first threetime champion after winning back-to-back in 2012 and 2013, says he has had to put the Senior Masters win out of his mind in preparation for the U.S. Open.

"I need to refocus my mental concentration and keep my emotions stable," said Monacelli, a 20-time PBA Tour winner. "There's a lot of talent and experience out here (on the PBA50 Tour) so for me it comes down to the mental game, trusting my instincts and just figuring out how to win. Sometimes I'm so focused, I don't even know what frame I'm in." Former Major League All-Star pitcher John Burkett, who has a best finish of ninth this season that came in the Northern California Classic, withdrew after the second game with a knee injury.

The Senior U.S. Open – the season's final major – is streamed live in its entirety by PBA's streaming partner FloBowling. For subscription and schedule information visit www.flobowling.com.

Qualifying continues Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday with six-game rounds beginning at 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. PT. The field will then be cut to the top 38 players for match play which will begins Friday at 8 a.m. After Friday's second match play round at noon, the top five players will be determined for the stepladder finals scheduled to begin at 4 p.m.

• The inaugural PBA China Tiger Cup will award the top eight PBA Summer Tour points leaders with expenses-paid trips to Shanghai, Nov. 19-21, for a 16-player singles event including eight Chinese bowlers, and a separate USA vs. China team match. All players will cash in the PBA Tiger Cup singles event which offers a \$20,000 first prize, and in the team event the winning five-player team will divide \$15,000.

The PBA Summer Tour events will be open to non-PBA members as well as members, but non-members will not be eligible for any of the special events or bonus prizes.

Points earned during the PBA Summer Tour will also count toward 2020 DHC PBA Japan Invitational and 2020 PBA Tour Finals eligibility, as well as figuring into consideration for the end-of-season Player and Rookie of the Year awards.

For PBA Tour rookies, the Summer Tour also means a resumption of the 2019 Bowl4life PBA Rookie Watch points competition, which will strongly influence Rookie of the Year voting at year's end. USBC Masters runner-up Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tenn., is the competition points leader among rookies followed by Kenneth Ryan of Farmingdale, N.J., and Patrick Hanrahan of Wichita, Kan. The 2019 PBA Rookie of the Year will receive a \$2,500 bonus from Chuck Gardner's Bowl4Life Foundation and the foundation will donate an additional \$2,500 to a youth bowler scholarship in the ROY's name.

All Summer Tour tournaments except the Aurora Open and the end-ofseason FloBowling PBA ATX Invite will be Tier 3 events under the PBA's Tier 1-2-3 points system. The Aurora Open will be a Tier 2 event. The PBA ATX Invite will be a non-points, non-title special event.

Koivuniemi Extends Lead After Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open Second Round

Defending champion extends lead despite 174 and 190 games in second round

LAS VEGAS (June 11, 2019) – No matter how good of a run a player is on in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm, the specter of bowling a bad game – or more than one – is always looming.

Defending champion Mika Koivuniemi managed to overcome 174 and 190 games in the second round of the 2019 Senior U.S. Open at the Suncoast Bowling Center Tuesday to extend his lead finishing with a 2,781 12-game pinfall (231 average).

The Hall of Famer holds a commanding 166-pin lead over last year's Senior U.S. Open runner-up Brian Kretzer in second with a 2,615 pinfall.

Koivuniemi, a 14-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour titlist who won the 2018 Senior U.S. Open for his first title on the tour for players 50 and over, salvaged a 1,316 pinfall in the second round with games of 243, 223, 174, 210, 276 and 190.

"When you are making good shots, you must take advantage by bowling the big game because you can lose so much ground with a bad game," said Koivuniemi, who owns three PBA Tour major titles including the 2001 U.S. Open. "You want to be able to control the pocket and I wasn't able to do that in the 174 game.

"I was hitting the pocket consistently in the 276 and 190 game but the results weren't the same," the 52year-old Koivuniemi continued. "You just keep calm and stay adjustable to the situation.

"For me, it comes down to if I'm throwing the ball well, I feel confident that I can control the pocket," he added. "Getting the ball to the pocket is something you can control – what happens once the ball hits the pins is something you can't control. If I'm not throwing the ball well, it can go anywhere."

Kretzer, the 2018 PBA50 Cup winner, bowled 1,331 in the second round with games of 249, 252, 205, 222, 199 and 204 to jump from 16th after the first round to second.

"I'm kind of in conservative mode when it comes to the Senior U.S. Open," said the 53-year-old Kretzer, who lost to Koivuniemi 259-237 in last year's title match. "I don't plan on big numbers – I look at 215 as my goal every game and if I can string some strikes for a big game that's great."

PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber vaulted from 31st after the first round to tie for third thanks to a 1,361 pinfall with games of 187, 258, 221, 259, 200 and 236 in the second round finishing 13-pins behind Kretzer with 2,602. Weber is tied with Norway's Tore Torgersen.

Weber, a two-time Senior U.S. Open winner, along with fellow Hall of Famers and two-time winners Amleto Monacelli and Tom Baker are trying to become the first three-time Senior U.S. Open champion.

Monacelli, the winner of the recent USBC Senior Masters for his fifth PBA50 major title, finished the day in 11th with 2,549 and Baker is in 22nd with 2,511.

Koivuniemi Holds Off Charge by Torgersen to Retain Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open Lead After Third Round

Thursday's fourth qualifying round to determine top 38 players for match play

LAS VEGAS (June 12, 2019) – Defending champion Mika Koivuniemi retained his Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm lead after Wednesday's third round, but another northern European native, Tore Torgersen of Norway, made some news of his own as the season's third and final major for players 50 and over reached the halfway mark.

After three rounds, Koivuniemi, a native of Finland, holds the lead with a 3,980 18-game pinfall total (221 average), just 21 pins ahead of Torgersen in second with 3,959.

A lackluster third round in which Koivuniemi could only manage games of 202, 196, 183, 199, 216 and 203, enabled Torgersen to close the gap after he bowled games of 257, 240, 214, 207, 183 and 256.

"I didn't bowl good, but I didn't bowl bad either," said Koivuniemi, a PBA Hall of Famer and two-time PBA Player of the Year. "I guess you could call it a good bad block.

"It was one of those blocks where I couldn't get the perfect ball reaction," the 14-time PBA Tour and three-time major winner added. "I felt like I was getting to the pocket consistently but just wasn't striking. I think the most strikes I had in a row was three."

Torgersen, the 2000 World Amateur Bowler of the Year and a member of the World Bowling Writers Hall of Fame, is a former PBA member who owns a best tour finish of third which came in the 2005 PBA Birmingham Open.

"This is the first time I've been nervous about bowling in a long time, said the 50-year-old Torgersen, who is bowling in the Senior U.S. Open as a non-member. "This is a special opportunity to bowl at this level of competition at my age. I like the challenge of having to think your way out of trouble. Hopefully, I can continue to focus on what I'm doing and be up there to give myself a chance."

PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber retained his position in third with a 3,923 pinfall after bowling games of 200, 194, 220, 237, 224 and 246 in the third round.

Weber, a two-time Senior U.S. Open winner, along with fellow two-time winners Amleto Monacelli and Tom Baker, are trying to become the first to win the Senior U.S. Open three times. Monacelli finished the day in 11th with 3,781 while Baker finished 26th with 3,688.

Finishing 88th after the first round, former Team USA member Steven Smith of San Diego, surged to fourth after the third round with a 3,876 pinfall.

Also bowling as a non-member, the multi-medalist in international competition, made a big comeback in the third round with games of 231, 234, 223, 229 and 244 after starting with 146 in the first game.

Rounding out the top five was 2018 PBA50 Rookie of the Year Rolando Sebelen of the Dominican Republic who posted a 3,874 pinfall for three rounds.

Finishing 59th after the second round, PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. surged to 22nd with a 3,707 pinfall after bowling games of 208, 255, 195, 222, 226 and 229 in the third round. Williams, the all-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour titles leader with 47 wins, is trying for his fourth win of the season and a record 15th career PBA50 Tour title. He is currently tied with John Handegard on the all-time PBA50 titles list with 14.

Thursday's final six-game qualifying round gets underway with squads at 9 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. PT. The field will then be cut to the top 38 players for match play which begins Friday at 8 a.m. After Friday's second match play round at noon, the top five players will be determined for the stepladder finals scheduled to begin at 4 p.m.

Torgersen Recovers from Slow Start in Fourth Round to Top Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open Qualifying

Field cut to top 38 players for Friday's match play rounds

LAS VEGAS (June 13, 2019) – Norway's Tore Torgersen bounced back from a 166 in the first game of Thursday's fourth round to top qualifying in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm heading into Friday's match play rounds at the Suncoast Bowling Center.

Torgersen, the 2000 World Amateur Bowler of the Year and a member of the World Bowling Writers Hall of Fame, came back from the slow start with games of 213, 246, 256, 208 and 209 to finish the qualifying portion of the season's third major with a 5,257 24-game pinfall total (219 average).

"Some of the guys were moving to the outside of the lane so I thought I would try it, but I never got comfortable and didn't get results," Torgersen said of the first game. "It was probably a strategic miss on my part. I went back to bowling from the inside part of the lane, where I was yesterday, and I found a good comfort level.

"Except for the first game I had good games bowling across the center which was encouraging," he added. "With two rounds of match play before the finals there's still a long way to go but I'm gaining confidence all the time."

The 50-year-old Torgersen holds a 15-pin lead over PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber in second who finished with 5,242.

Weber, a two-time Senior U.S. Open winner who is trying to end a two-year drought without a PBA50 Tour title, bowled 1,319 in Thursday's round with games of 203, 217, 245, 205, 232 and 217 to move into second heading into match play.

"I'm feeling great and throwing the ball good," said the 56-year-old Weber, who is trying to become the Senior U.S. Open's first three-time winner. "I'm hitting the pocket eight or nine times a game and if I can keep doing that, I'll be in good shape the rest of the way."

Hall of Famer Norm Duke, who is trying for his second Senior U.S. Open title, finished qualifying in third just one pin behind Weber with 5,241. Duke bowled 1,393 in the final qualifying round with games of 201, 234, 259, 205, 259 and 235.

Trying for his first PBA50 Tour title of the season, the 55-year-old Duke won the Go Bowling! Indianapolis and Go Bowling! Jonesboro Opens in February for the 39th and 40th PBA Tour titles of his career becoming the oldest player to win back-to-back tour titles.

After leading the first three rounds, Senior U.S. Open defending champion Mika Koivuniemi of Finland, dropped to fourth finishing with a 5,228 pinfall, followed by former Team USA member Steven Smith of San Diego who qualified fifth with 5,210.

Two other two-time winners, Hall of Famers Amleto Monacelli and Tom Baker, also made the cut to match play. Monacelli finished qualifying in 18th with 4,971 and Baker took the 38th and final match play spot with 4,863.

The intensity will ramp up for Friday's match play rounds where 30 bonus pins are awarded for each match win. The 38 players will bowl six-game match play rounds at 8 a.m. and noon PT which will determine the top five for the stepladder finals scheduled to begin at 4 p.m.

PBA'S MERMAID LANES MIDWEST OPEN FEATURES A BIZARRE ENDING Brady Stearns of Saint Augusta, Minn., won his first PBA Regional title Sunday in Mounds View, Minn., in what might have been the most bizarre ending in PBA Regional

tournament history.

In Sunday's PBA Mermaid Lanes Midwest Open presented by Columbia 300 in Mounds View, Stearns defeated **Nick Pate** of Inver Grove Heights, Minn., 240-239, to win the title and \$2,500 first prize after Pate, needing two pins on his fill ball after converting a 10 pin spare in the 10th frame, saw his final shot drift right into the gutter.

Ironically, Stearns had opened the door for Pate in similar fashion just moments earlier. Working on a string of six strikes including the first two in his 10th frame, Stearns also threw his final shot into the gutter to give Pate an easier chance to win. Had Stearns struck on his fill ball, he would have forced Pate to also strike on his first shot in the 10th for the title, but his gutterball meant Pate only had to spare and get two pins.

Adding to the irony, the Mermaid Lanes Midwest Open was contested on the **Del Ballard Jr.** lane oiling pattern. The lane conditioning pattern was named in honor of the PBA Hall of Famer who infamously rolled a gutter ball on his final shot to lose the 1991 PBA Fair Lanes Open title to **Pete Weber**.

"It was the most bizarre finish I've ever seen, and I've been involved with the PBA since 1976 – 43 years. And I bowled a few years before that," said veteran PBA East Region Manager **Russ Mills**, who served as tournament director for the event. "I thought Nick was going to throw it right down the middle, but he didn't. I don't think he was aware of the situation, but hopefully he'll learn from it."

In Saturday's PBA River City Extreme Midwest Open presented by Hammer in Monticello, Minn., non-PBA member **John Kreyer Jr.** of Mounds View defeated Stearns, 213-202, to win in Monticello. Kreyer earned \$2,500 but doesn't get credited with a PBA regional title since he is a non-member.

Kreyer defeated **Mike Fagan** of Las Vegas, 209-179, to advance to the championship match after Kreyer edged **Blake Demore** of Springfield, Mo., 214-212, in the first stepladder match.

000Norway's Torgersen Defeats Finland's Koivuniemi in Title Match to Win Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open

Torgersen thwarts Koivuniemi's bid for a second consecutive Senior U.S. Open Title with 184-178 title match win

LAS VEGAS (June 14, 2019) – Tore Torgersen of Norway, a highly-decorated bowler on the international stage, thwarted PBA Hall of Famer Mika Koivuniemi's bid for a second consecutive Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open presented by Storm title Friday by winning the low-scoring title match 184-178 at the Suncoast Bowling Center.

In a title match where strikes were hard to come by, the 50-year-old Torgersen, bowling as a non-PBA member, was able to take an early lead in the match when Finland native Koivuniemi, who was top qualifier for the stepladder finals for the second consecutive year, failed to convert the 1-2-10 washout in the fourth frame. Torgersen missed a 10 pin in the seventh frame, but the 52-year-old Koivuniemi who won last year's Senior U.S. Open for his first PBA50 Tour title couldn't take advantage of the opportunity, giving the win in the season's third and final major for players 50 and over to the Norwegian.

"I made the mistake about thinking about the 10 pin," said Torgersen, the 2000 World Amateur Bowler of the Year and a member of the World Bowling Writers Hall of Fame. "I was thinking that I hadn't missed a 10 pin in a while, no problem – and what happened? I missed it. I was very fortunate to get away with winning after missing that."

Torgersen joined 2007 Senior U.S. Open winner Rick Minier as the only non-members to win the major.

Torgersen, who lists the 1994 Qubica/AMF World Cup title and the 1999 World Championships all-events gold medal among his many accomplishments in international competition, qualified second for the stepladder finals.

In the semifinal match he beat No. 3 qualifier PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke who was trying for his second Senior U.S. Open win and sixth career PBA50 Tour title, 196-180, to advance to the title match.

"I could tell it wasn't going to be a strikefest but I like the challenge of thinking your way out of trouble and that's the way it was the whole tournament," Torgersen said. "Once you get in that mindset that's how the tournament is going to be, you just adjust to it. Don't get me wrong, I'll join in on a strikefest party, but if it's not, I'm not afraid of making the big changes you need to make on a challenging condition." Torgersen also had a two-season stint on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour 15 years ago when he had a career high third-place finish in the 2005 Birmingham Open.

In the opening stepladder match, No. 5 seed 2018 PBA50 Rookie of the Year Rolando Sebelen of the Dominican Republic, defeated No. 4 seed three-time Team USA member Steven Smith of San Diego, 246-200, to advance to the second stepladder match against Duke. Sebelen, who finished fourth, improved on his 10th-place finish in his Senior U.S. Open debut in 2018. Smith, also bowling as a non-member, finished fifth improving on his eighth-place finish in 2018.

In the second match, Duke defeated Sebelen 245-193 to advance to the semifinal against Torgersen.

Earlier this season the 55-year-old Duke won the Go Bowling! Indianapolis and Go Bowling! Jonesboro Opens for the 39th and 40th PBA Tour titles of his career becoming the oldest player to win back-to-back PBA Tour titles.

The 2019 PBA50 Tour season will take a four-week break before starting up again with the PBA50 River City Extreme Open presented by Hammer July 9-12. Fans can catch all the action on FloBowling.com. Visit <u>www.flobowling.com</u> for subscription and schedule information.

Corey Umbrello wins PBA Homefield Bowl Eastern Open for 1st Title

Yonkers, N.Y. (June 16, 2019) – Corey Umbrello of Westminster, Mass. rolled a clutch double in the 10th frame to defeat Ryan Graywacz of Canastota, N.Y., 227-224, to win the PBA Homefield Bowl Eastern Open presented by MOTIV at Homefield Bowl Sunday.

Umbrello compiled an 8-4 match play record and 4,591 pins for 20 games, including match play bonus pins, to qualify first for the stepladder finals by 65 pins over Graywacz. Umbrello then started the championship match with four strikes, while Graywacz started with a spare and three strikes to stay close. When Umbrello opened in the ninth frame, Graywacz had an opportunity to close him out, but after throwing strikes in the ninth and 10th frames, Graywacz failed to throw the cliniching third strike in a row. Umbrello then doubled to secure his first PBA title and the \$3,000 first place prize.

Graywacz almost missed the stepladder finals when Michael Markis of Scranton, Pa., failed to convert a 10 pin in the 10th frame of his final qualifying game, creating a 4,388-4,3888 tie. Graywacz won the one-game roll-off, 206-176, to advance.

Graywacz, also looking for his first PBA title, advanced to the championship match by defeating Jonathan Van Hees of Charlestown, R.I., 213-190, and defending champion Anthony Pepe of Elmhurst, N.Y., 201-189. Graywacz earned \$1,700 as the runner-up while Pepe received \$1,300 and Van Hees \$1,000.

AMERICAN PBA STARS WIN 20TH WEBER CUP, EVEN SERIES AT 10-10

PBA stars Anthony Simonsen, Kyle Troup, Jakob Butturff and team captain Chris Barnes successfully defended the Weber Cup against a quartet of European PBA stars – Osku Palermaa, Jesper Svensson, Stuart Williams and captain Dom Barrett – in the 20th anniversary of the Ryder-Cup-style bowling event, but the first held on American soil.

Simonsen's 287-278 win over Williams in the 32nd match finished off the 18-14 win by the U.S. One point was awarded in each singles, doubles and Baker team match bowled using the World Bowling "current frame" scoring system. The U.S. win evened the series at 10-10. The invitational event will return to Europe in 2020.

The Weber Cup was conducted over a span of four days on a single lane in a stadiumstyle setting at Mandalay Bay in Las Vegas.

JAKOB BUTTURFF, LIZ JOHNSON TOP 2019 WORLD BOWLING TOUR POINTS LISTS

Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., and Liz Johnson of Palatine, III., are the early men's and women's leaders in World Bowling Tour points in the races for three berths in the 2019 World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals. The finals will take place for the first time in Kuwait at the conclusion of the World Bowling-PBA International Tour's Kuwait Open, Oct. 31-Nov. 6.

Janawicz, a 2018 USBC Hall of Fame inductee, qualified in the top position for the stepladder finals with a 17-game pinfall total of 4,238, and easily won the championship match after starting with four strikes while Sergejevas opened in the third frame and failed to throw consecutive strikes until the eighth and ninth frames.

In the opening match Anthony DeStasio of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., defeated Shawn Naumann of Orlando, Fla., 248-235. Sergejevas then defeated DeStasio, 257-224, to advance to the final match.

Janawicz earned \$2,300 for the win but doesn't get credit for a PBA title because he is not a PBA member.

Jakob Butturff Defeats Stuart Williams to Win PBA Lubbock Sports Shootout

Arizona left-hander earns seventh PBA tour title in first event of Go Bowling! Summer Tour series

LUBBOCK, Texas (June 30, 2019) – Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, returned to the site of his first PBA Tour victory Sunday and defeated top qualifier Stuart Williams of England, 194-188, to win his seventh career title in the PBA Lubbock Sports Shootout presented by Ebonite at South Plains Lanes Sunday.

In winning the kickoff event in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Summer Tour series, Butturff automatically became the early leader in the USBC Cup points race that is part of the summer series.

Butturff, who won his first PBA Tour title in Lubbock in 2016 and had a second-place finish in 2018, said the secret to his success was his comfort in bowling at South Plains Lanes.

"I think it's the fact that when you win your first PBA title here, it makes you more comfortable," the 25year-old left-hander said.

Williams, who made a key ball change after a sluggish start in the title match, threw three strikes to take a four-pin lead into the 10th frame, but left the 2-4-6-10 split when a strike could have closed the door on Butturff. Butturff failed to throw consecutive strikes, but filled every frame and needed only a mark in his final frame. He left the 6 pin on a high hit, converted the spare and knocked down seven pins on his fill ball to lock up the title.

"The hope was to not throw a split," Butturff said with a grin, "and fortunately I didn't."

The win was Butturff's third in 2019. He previously won the PBA Oklahoma Open and his first major in the USBC Masters. He also has three second-place finishes.

In Sunday's first four-player stepladder finals match, Tackett started with seven strikes in denying Anthony Lavery-Spahr of Pasadena, Texas, his chance for a first PBA Tour title, 279-204. In the semifinal match, Butturff turned the tables on Tackett, starting with six strikes while Tackett lost his strike carry. Despite leaving a 4-7-10 split in the seventh frame and failing to convert, Butturff cruised to a 235-185 win, ending Tackett's hopes for his first title of 2019.

After a break in the schedule for three days of PBA League Elias Cup competition at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine, July 16-18, and the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals presented by Red Rock Casino Resort & Spa July 20-21 in Las Vegas, the PBA Summer Tour and USBC Cup points competition resumes July 25-28

in Houston, Texas when Copperfield Bowl will host the Storm PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles. Tackett and Liz Johnson of Palatine, Illinois, are defending champions.

Williams, Mohr Take Commanding PBA50/60 Points Leads Into Season's Homestretch Beginning with River City Extreme Open July 9-12

MONTICELLO, Minn. (July 3, 2019) -- As the 2019 PBA50 Tour season travels back to the Midwest, Walter Ray Williams Jr. takes his more than 9,000-point lead in the PBA50 Player of the Year points race into the PBA50 River City Extreme Open presented by Hammer July 9-12 in Monticello, Minnesota.

After a rollercoaster ride in qualifying, and a big surge in match play, the two-time PBA50 Player of the Year salvaged a sixth-place finish in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open to lead with 24,800 points, 9,400 points more than USBC Senior Masters winner Amleto Monacelli who sits in second with 15,405 points and Norm Duke in third place with 13,950.

In pursuit of his fourth win of the season and a 15th career PBA50 Tour title that will give him sole possession of the titles record on the tour for players 50 and over, Williams started the season with three consecutive wins – including the PBA50 National Championship – followed by a seventh-, eighth- and a ninth-place finish in the USBC Senior Masters leading up to the Senior U.S. Open.

Reigning PBA50 Player of the Year and River City Extreme Open defending champion Michael Haugen Jr. became last season's only multiple winner when he defeated Bob Learn Jr., 247-246, in the title match of the 2018 event for his second PBA50 Tour title of the year and third of his career. Haugen is currently fifth with 10,735 points 615 behind Parker Bohn III in fourth with 11,350.

Leading the 2019 PBA50 Rookie of the Year points race is Hall of Famer Danny Wiseman in 13th place overall with 5,975 points. Wiseman has a best finish of second this season which came in the PBA50 Mooresville Open. Following Wiseman in the ROY race is Eugene McCune in 28th with 3,750 points. With his fifth ESPY win, Duke moved into sole possession of second place on the alltime ESPY Best Bowler Award list, breaking a tie with Belmonte and Pete Weber who have both won the honor four times. Walter Ray Williams Jr. is the all-time ESPY award winner with seven.

Monacelli Tops PBA50 River City Extreme Open Qualifying After Strong Finish in Second Round

Hall of Famer leads 24 players who advance to Friday's match play rounds

MONTICELLO, Minn. (July 11, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli finished with games of 290, 234 and 247 in Thursday's second round to top qualifying and lead 24 players who advanced to match play in the PBA50 River City Extreme Open presented by Hammer.

The 2019 USBC Senior Masters winner finished qualifying in the eighth stop of the season with a 3,666 16-game pinfall total (229 average). His strong finish in the second round came after strong start with 246 before falling into a slump with games of 197, 201, 195, and 204.

"It seems like I have had a lot of tournaments recently where I'm having trouble reading the lanes in the middle of the round," said the 57-year-old Monacelli who his trying for his 10th career PBA50 Tour title and second of the season. "I was probably getting a little frustrated by what I expected the lanes should be doing rather than adjusting to what was actually happening.

"When I got to the sixth game I just looked at it like I was starting a new round, moved left and went to a ball that would skid farther down the lane," the 20-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner added. "I'm just a little disappointed I didn't refocus sooner."

Monacelli holds a 14-pin lead over James Campbell of Clearwater, Florida, who finished qualifying in second with a 3,652 pinfall and Hall of Famer Pete Weber in third with 3,630.

Weber, an 11-time PBA50 Tour winner, is trying for his first PBA50 Tour win since winning the DeHayes Insurance Group Championship in August of 2017. He has a best finish of 10th this season which came in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open.

Rounding out the top five were Hall of Famers Steve Hoskins in fourth with 3,580 and Ron Mohr in fifth with 3,539. Best bowler ESPY winner Norm Duke finished qualifying in sixth with 3,497.

First-round leader Don Herrington of Ballston Lake, New York, dropped to 12th finishing with a 3,539 pinfall. Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr., who was in second after the first round, dropped to eighth finishing with 3,483. Williams is trying for his fourth win of the season and 15th of his career which would top the all-time list on the tour for players 50 and over.

Friday's match play rounds get underway at 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. CT. The top five players will advance to the stepladder finals at 5 p.m.

Also qualifying for the 2019 Tour Finals are 2019 USBC Masters champion Jakob Butturff (40,267 points); 2019 PBA Players Championship winner Anthony Simonsen (38,919); Tackett (37,692); 2019 PBA Playoffs winner Kris Prather (31,266); reigning PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson (30,983); Marshall Kent (29,447), and 2019 PBA Hall of Fame Classic champion Bill O'Neill (28,937).

In another PBA landmark televised event, CBS Sports Network will air four live two-hour shows and the one-hour finale from the Red Rock Casino Resort & Spa (two shows on Saturday, July 20 and three on Sunday, July 21).

The Barbasol PBA Tour Finals will incorporate the same format as 2018 with the eightplayer field divided into two four-player groups. The field will bowl four games of qualifying in their respective groups. The four-game pinfall totals for each player will be used to determine the seeding for a separate stepladder finals in each group. The final match of each group's stepladder will be a Race to Two Points match with each game worth one point and, if the two games are split, the final point is awarded via a 9th and 10th frame roll off. The two group winners will then meet in another "Race to Two Points" championship match that will also use a 9th and 10th frame roll-off should there be a tie after two games.

Here's a look at some of the highlights for the eight finalists:

Jason Belmonte, Australia: The two-handed PBA Tour Finals defending champion won the 2019 PBA Tournament of Champions and PBA World Championship earlier

this year for his 10th and 11th PBA Tour major victories to top the all-time majors list. He also won the Chameleon Championship and Japan Cup. In 2018 he won the PBA Tour Finals and Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship with Bill O'Neill. He also concluded the 2017 season by winning the PBA World Championship.

Jakob Butturff, Tempe, Arizona: The left-hander won the PBA Oklahoma Open, PBA Lubbock Sports Shootout and the USBC Masters this season for his first major title. He was runner-up in the 2019 PBA Hall of Fame Classic, the DHC PBA Japan Invitational and PBA World Championship. In 2018 he won two PBA Tour titles.

Anthony Simonsen, Little Elm, Texas: The 22-year-old two-hander won the 2019 PBA Players Championship to become the youngest player to win two majors. He had a runner-up finish in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open and won two titles in 2018.

EJ Tackett, Bluffton, Indiana: Was the 2018 season's only three-time winner. Finished second in the 2019 PBA Tournament of Champions, third in the Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open and fifth in the PBA Players Championship. He won the inaugural PBA Tour Finals in 2017 and finished second to Belmonte in 2018.

Kris Prather, Plainfield, Illinois: Won the PBA Scorpion Championship in 2019 for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title, ending a streak of seven top-five and four third-place finishes over the past two seasons. Won the inaugural PBA Playoffs earlier in 2019.

Andrew Anderson, Holly, Michigan: Earned PBA Player of the Year honors in 2018 with the help of two wins including the USBC Masters. Finished third in the 2018 PBA Tournament of Champions.

Marshall Kent, Yakima, Washington: Finished third in the 2019 PBA Tournament of Champions. In 2018 had five championship round appearances including third in the PBA Players Championship and fifth in the U.S. Open. Also had two wins in the second half of the 2017 season.

Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pennsylvania: PBA Playoffs runner-up won the 2019 seasonopening PBA Hall of Fame Classic for his 10th career tour win. Finished third in the PBA Scorpion Championship and fourth in the PBA World Championship. In 2018 he won the Roth-Holman Doubles Classic with Jason Belmonte and finished second in the Xtra Frame Parkside Lanes Open.

LeClair Defeats Weber to Win PBA50 River City Extreme Open

or Fourth Career PBA50 Tour Title

LeClair overcomes slow start in title match to beat Weber 225-200 for his first win of the season

MONTICELLO, Minn. (July 12, 2019) – Wearing a brace to shore up his ailing left knee, Brian LeClair of Albany, New York recovered from a slow start to beat PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber 225-200 in the title match to win the PBA50 River City Extreme Open presented by Hammer Friday for his first win of the season and fourth of his career.

Leading by five pins in the ninth frame and finishing the title match first, LeClair threw two strikes and eight in the 10th frame which was enough to eliminate any chance for Weber to come back for the win. It was LeClair's first PBA50 Tour win since winning the PBA50 Johnny Petraglia Open in May of 2017 and it was later that season that he began wearing the brace.

"I never thought I'd be in this position again," said the 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year. "It's been a long road and a constant work in progress for the last year and a half to get to a point where I can trust my leg and be confident that I can be competitive again."

LeClair, who only needs to wear his brace when he bowls, started the title match with an open and a spare before striking on the next five of seven frames heading into the 10th frame.

"I was too amped up and just threw it too hard in the first frame and didn't get settled down until the third frame," the 54-year-old LeClair said. "I told myself to just slow down and throw it better like I had been doing the last two days."

LeClair earned the top qualifier position for the stepladder finals thanks to a 11-1 match play record earlier in the day at River City Extreme.

"I was fortunate in match play," said an emotional LeClair who dedicated the win to Eric Race, an employee at his pro shop who has cancer. "I won a few matches with 180s and 190s but then in the second match play round I was able to put the hammer down and I don't think I bowled anything less than 230."

Despite finishing second, it was also somewhat of a comeback result for Weber who hadn't made a PBA50 championship round appearance for more than a year. His best finish this season was 10th in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open and his last PBA50 Tour win came in the DeHayes Insurance Group Classic in August of 2017.

Weber, who qualified second for the finals, was able to survive the semifinal match against newcomer No. 3 qualifier James Campbell of Clearwater, Florida, winning 215-214. After striking on the first ball in the 10th frame Campbell could have won the match with a double – or tie with a spare – but threw the ball slightly wide leaving the 2-10 split which he failed to convert.

Campbell, a seven-time PBA regional winner bowling in his sixth PBA50 Tour event, defeated No. 5 qualifier Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli 247-199 in the second match to advance to the semifinal.

In the opening match, Monacelli beat No. 4 qualifier fellow Hall of Famer Ron Mohr 233-200 to open the finals. Monacelli, who won the 2019 USBC Senior Masters for his fifth PBA50 major title, was trying for his second win of the season and Mohr was trying for his first.

Motown Muscle Earns No. 1 Seed as PBA League Play Begins Tuesday on FS1

Silver Lake Atom Splitters begin bid for fourth Elias Cup as No. 5 seeded team

PORTLAND, Maine (July 15, 2019) – The Motown Muscle averaged 241.63 during Monday's eightgame Baker format seeding tournament at Bayside Bowl to earn the No. 1 seed for the quarterfinal elimination round of the seventh annual PBA League Elias Cup competition that begins Tuesday at 7 p.m. ET live on FS1.

The Motown team, managed by PBA Hall of Famer Del Ballard Jr., outscored the No. 2 Brooklyn Styles by 85 pins to open its bid for its first PBA League title. Monday's seeding round also gave Ballard an opportunity to move players around in his lineup for the Baker format competition, which requires each of the five players to bowl two frames in each game, and he decided his lineup for the opening match against No. 8 New York City KingPins will include PBA Tour veteran Josh Blanchard bowling leadoff followed by AJ Chapman, rookie Mykel Holliman, two-hander Anthony Simonsen and former PBA Player of the Year EJ Tackett.

The three-time Elias Cup winning Go Bowling! Silver Lake Atom Splitters will open their bid to defend their title from the No. 5 seeding position against the No. 4 L.A. X when the annual five-player team tournament gets underway Tuesday.

The Atom Splitters, led by two-time Mark Roth MVP Chris Barnes, will try to become the first four-time Elias Cup champions. Barnes' teammates will include Sweden's Jesper Svensson, Tom Daugherty, AJ Johnson and DJ Archer.

In the first six years of PBA League competition, the Atom Splitters (three titles), Dallas Strikers (two titles) and New York City KingPins are the only teams to hoist the Elias Cup. That means the hometown favorite Portland Lumberjacks along with L.A. X, the Philadelphia Hitmen, Brooklyn Styles and Motown Muscle all will be trying to win the event for the first time.

In an unfortunate first for the PBA League, the Philadelphia Hitmen's Shawn Maldonado was forced to withdraw due to injury. The team bowled the seeding round with four players, taking "nine-spare" in Maldonado's slot in the lineup, while PBA Tour titlist Jake Peters of Henderson, Nevada, was flying to Portland to replace Maldonado for the start of competition Tuesday.

The PBA League, for the first time, will air live for three consecutive nights in prime time on FS1 as part of the PBA's inaugural season of FOX Sports coverage. PBAL coverage begins on Tuesday with coverage of all four quarterfinal round matches, beginning at 7 p.m. ET. Tuesday's winners will advance to the semifinal round on Wednesday at 9 p.m., with the two finalists bowling for the Elias Cup Thursday at 9 p.m.

Brian LeClair Closes with 296 to Take PBA50 South Shore Open Lead After First Round

HAMMOND, Ind. (July 16, 2019) – Last week's PBA50 River City Extreme Open winner Brian LeClair of Albany, New York, closed with a 296 to surge into the first-round lead in the PBA50 South Shore Open presented by Ebonite Tuesday at Olympia Lanes.

The 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year bowled an 1,882 eight-game pinfall with games of 191, 255, 227, 240, 234, 214 and 225 before his big finish. On the final shot in the 10th of the 296 game his ball went high leaving the 3-6-9-10.

"Ride it while it's hot and hopefully keep the momentum going," said LeClair whose win in the River City Extreme Open was his first of the season and fourth of his career on the tour for players 50 and over. "I started the round with two opens and spent the rest of the first game making adjustments. My first adjustment was moving right on the lane but that wasn't working so moving left and eventually going to a ball that had a more smooth track to the pocket was the answer.

"The round was actually kind of ugly for me," LeClair added. "I think I only had three clean games and there was a stretch of three games in a row when I opened in the 10th frame. Overall, I'm satisfied with how I bowled, but obviously I'm going to have to work on fixing those mistakes."

LeClair edged Paul Fleming of Fort Worth, Texas, who finished four pins behind in second with 1,878. Rounding out the top eight were Brian Kretzer, Dayton, Ohio, 1,857; Ryan Shafer, Horseheads, New York, 1,856; Dean Billings, Rootstown, Ohio, 1,825; Bob Learn Jr., Erie, Pennsylvania, 1,808; PBA Hall of Famer Amleto Monacelli, Venezuela, 1,788, and Harry Sullins, Chesterfield Twp., Michigan, 1,783.

Three-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner and last season's South Shore Open winner Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana, got off to a slow start finishing the round in 31st with 1,671.

The field returns for another eight-game qualifying round Wednesday which begins at 10 a.m. CT. After a cashers round Thursday morning at 8:30 a.m., match play rounds are scheduled for noon and 3 p.m. which will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals at 7 p.m.

L.A. X, Hometown Lumberjacks Advance to PBA League Semifinal Round

New York City KingPins, Dallas Strikers complete field for Wednesday's semifinal matches

PORTLAND, Maine (July 16, 2019) – L.A. X, one of five teams that has never won a PBA League Elias Cup title, needed an overtime frame to eliminate the three-time Elias Cup winning Silver Lake Atom Splitters to headline Tuesday's quarterfinal elimination round of the seventh annual PBA League Elias Cup competition at Bayside Bowl.

The defending champion Atom Splitters rolled past L.A. X in the first game of Tuesday's second quarterfinal round match, 228-186, helped by four strikes by anchor bowler Chris Barnes, including all three in the 10th frame, and helped by a pair of open frames by L.A. X. But L.A. X, the No. 4 seeded team based on Monday's eight-game seeding round, exploded for a 287-187 rout in game two to force the first one-ball sudden death roll-off of the 2019 championships.

L.A. X's two-handed star, Australian Jason Belmonte, crumpled his rack of pins for a strike. Barnes then left a 2-10 split, ending the Atom Splitters' hopes for a fourth Elias Cup.

In Tuesday's first quarterfinal round match, the No. 8 seeded New York City KingPins knocked out the No. 1 qualifying team, Motown Muscle, 245-235 and 238-205 in the "race to 2 points" format. KingPins anchor Kyle Sherman struck out in the 10th frame to give New York City the 245-235 victory over the Motown Muscle in the first game, four strikes in four attempts across the two games by BJ Moore and Marshall Kent were key shots in completing the sweep.

Sherman, a non-PBA Tour title winner, was KingPins manager Carolyn Dorin-Ballard's surprise choice to anchor her team over 56-year-old PBA Hall of Famer and 37-time champion Pete Weber.

"(Kyle) had the best look (on the lane oiling pattern), he's younger and it doesn't take him long to get loose," Dorin-Ballard said.

The KingPins, who won the inaugural Elias Cup in 2013, will meet L.A. X in Wednesday's first semifinal round match.

In the third quarterfinal match, between two teams that have yet to win the Elias Cup, the No. 7 seeded Portland Lumberjacks jumped into the lead with a 233-219 win over the No. 2 Brooklyn Styles on the strength of a mid-game string of four strikes. The hometown favorites then cruised to a 257-195 victory in game two to clinch their berth in the semifinals.

The more experienced Dallas Strikers polished off the Philadelphia Hitmen in two games to claim the fourth berth in the semifinals. The No. 3 seeded Strikers, winners of two Elias Cups, started game one with three strikes and ended with five in a row in rolling to an easy 258-224 win over the No. 6 Hitmen. The Strikers then started game two with seven consecutive strikes in cruising to a 246-161 win and complete the sweep.

In the first six years of PBA League competition, the Atom Splitters (three titles), Dallas Strikers (two titles) and NYC KingPins are the only teams to hoist the Elias Cup. L.A. X and the hometown-favorite Portland Lumberjacks are the only teams remaining alive who have a chance to win the Elias Cup for the first time.

The PBA League's live coverage on FS1 continues Wednesday at 9 p.m. ET when Tuesday's winners advance to the semifinal round. The two finalists will bowl for the Elias Cup Thursday at 9 p.m.

Ryan Shafer Tops PBA50 South Shore Open Qualifying Heading Into Match Play

HAMMOND, Indiana (July 17, 2019) – In pursuit of his first PBA50 Tour title, five-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, New York, averaged 232 for 16 games to top qualifying for the PBA50 South Shore Open presented by Ebonite at Olympia Lanes.

Finishing fourth after Tuesday's first round with an 1,856 eight-game pinfall total, Shafer returned Wednesday to post a nearly identical 1,858 in the second round to top qualifying with a 3,714 16-game pinfall, 32 pins ahead of Paul Fleming of Fort Worth, Texas in second with 3,682.

In 2018 Shafer had five top-10 finishes with a career best of second in the PBA50 Security Federal Savings Bank Championship.

"The hard part is that there can be a lot of expectations and you have to remember this isn't a tour of old people," said Shafer. "Some of PBA's all-time greats are out here and still bowling at a very high level. It's hard to win but I feel that if I continue to execute, good things will happen."

As a result of finishing in the top eight, Shafer and Fleming advanced directly into Thursday's second match play round.

Last season's South Shore Open winner Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana, surged from 31st after the first round to qualify 10th with a 3,536 pinfall to earn a spot in Thursday's first match play round.

PORTLAND, Maine (July 17, 2019) --- The PBA League will have a new Elias Cup champion Thursday night when L.A. X and the hometown-favorite Portland Lumberjacks will face off in the seventh annual team championship round at Bayside Bowl.

No. 4 seeded L.A. X, led by Australian two-handed star Jason Belmonte, eliminated the No. 8 New York City KingPins in a two-game sweep in Wednesday's semifinal round while the No. 7 Lumberjacks, anchored by former PBA Player of the Year Wes Malott, needed three extra frames to oust the 2016 and '17 Elias Cup champion and No. 3 seeded Dallas Strikers in the second match.

The semifinal round got off to fingernail-biting start when L.A. X seemingly had game one of the "race to 2 points" Baker team match locked up. Working on a string of four strikes heading into the 10th frame, L.A. X anchor bowler Dick Allen left a 10 pin and missed the spare, giving New York City KingPins' anchor Kyle Sherman a chance to roll three strikes for a tie and force a one-ball roll-off. After getting the first strike, however, Sherman left the 3-6 on his next attempt, giving L.A. X a 225-213 win and the first point in the match. Jason Belmonte and friends then sewed up L.A. X's first trip to the Elias Cup championship game with a 224-221 win over the inaugural Elias Cup champions to complete the two-game sweep. England's Stuart Williams, bowling third in the L.A. X lineup, struck on all four of his chances across the two games and in each case, his strike resulted in at least a double to keep L.A. X's momentum going.

Williams, a 38-year-old two-time PBA Tour title winner, also was four-for-four in his strike opportunities in Tuesday's quarterfinal round win over the defending champion Silver Lake Atom Splitters.

Portland also took the upper hand with a 226-213 win in game one of their semifinal match against the two-time Elias Cup champion Dallas Strikers. A string of three strikes in the middle of the game kept the Lumberjacks close and two strikes in the 10th frame by anchor Wes Malott, following Ryan Ciminelli's strike in the ninth frame, clinched the first point.

The experience-heavy Strikers answered the challenge, winning the second game, 249-201, to force a one-ball roll-off to decide the second point. Bill O'Neill struck for Dallas and Malott answered. On the second roll-off attempt, Strikers player-manager Norm Duke struck, and Portland's Ryan Ciminelli forced a third roll-off attempt. Brian LeClair Wins PBA50 South Shore Open For Second Consecutive PBA50 Tour Title

LeClair beats fellow New Yorker Sammy Ventura 214-203 in title match for fifth career PBA50 Tour title

HAMMOND, Ind. (July 18, 2019) – Brian LeClair joined Walter Ray Williams Jr. as the only multiple winners on the PBA50 Tour this season by capturing the PBA50 South Shore Open presented by Ebonite title Thursday at Olympia Lanes for his second consecutive title of the season.

LeClair, also the top seed for the stepladder finals for the second consecutive week, defeated fellow New Yorker Sammy Ventura of Syracuse in the title match 214-203 for his fifth career PBA50 Tour title. LeClair also won last week's PBA50 River City Extreme Open as top seed.

"I'm in a place now where I have confidence that I'm making all the right decisions," said the 54-year-old LeClair. "When you have that confidence and don't have to second guess yourself, you can really build some momentum."

The title match was a good example of how the 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year had to make the right adjustments on each lane of the championship pair.

Ventura, trying for his first PBA50 Tour title, got off to an early lead in the title match leading by seven pins in the fifth frame but the momentum shifted when LeClair struck in the seventh, eighth and ninth frames and Ventura left a 2-10 split in the ninth frame which he failed to convert ending his bid for the win.

"Making the right adjustments was really crucial in the title match," said LeClair, who went undefeated in match play earlier in the day which helped vault him to the top seed for the finals "I was throwing two totally different shots, playing the left lane throwing the ball faster and more direct to the pocket and the right lane having to throw the ball slower and hook it more. It can be a disaster if you don't have the confidence to play two totally different shots on each lane and expect to win."

Williams, who didn't bowl in Hammond because he was competing in PBA League competition in Portland, Maine, started the season with wins in the first three tournaments.

Ventura, trying for his first PBA50 Tour win, notched his second runner-up finish of the season, also finishing second in the Johnny Petraglia BVL Open.

Ventura, the No. 4 seed started the stepladder with a 227-198 win over No. 5 seed five-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, New York, who was also trying for his first PBA50 Tour win.

Ventura then defeated PBA Hall of Famer and 10-time PBA50 Tour winner Ron Mohr of Las Vegas, 223-177, in the second match to advance to the semifinal match against three-time PBA50 Tour titlist Harry Sullins of Chesterfield Twp., Michigan. In a high-scoring match, Ventura started with the first eight strikes which was enough to hold off Sullins to win 268-245.

Mohr survived a long road to the finals advancing through the cashers' round and two match play rounds to make it to the championship round. Sullins was trying to end an eight-year title drought with his last win coming in the 2011 Senior Lake County Open at Olympia Lanes.

Portland Lumberjacks Dominate L.A. X to Win PBA League Elias Cup

Wes Malott throws 20 strikes in anchor role to earn Mark Roth Most Valuable Player Award

PORTLAND, Maine (July 18, 2019) -- The Portland Lumberjacks overwhelmed L.A. X in four consecutive games Wednesday night at Bayside Bowl to win its first PBA League Elias Cup in the event's seven-year history.

Led by anchor bowler and Mark Roth PBA League Most Valuable Player Wes Malott, the hometown favorites trailed only once – in the first two frames of the second game – in dominating the PBA's team competition. Malott's supporting cast included PBA League newcomer Kris Prather, who won the inaugural PBA Playoffs at Bayside Bowl in early June; two-hander Kyle Troup, left-hander Ryan Ciminelli and Canadian Mitch Hupé.

That was awesome," Malott, a 42-year-old 10-time PBA Tour titlist and former PBA Player of the Year, said. He threw 20 strikes in 22 meaningful attempts to pace all 40 bowlers in the PBA League competition.

"Wow; 20 strikes? I knew I threw a few," he said.

"For whatever reason in the past, I felt so much pressure because I wanted to give Portland a championship," Malott continued. "I haven't been able to practice a lot lately, but I felt good this week and my ball just did what it needed to do. And I had five guys behind me, so it gave me all the confidence in the world."

The PBA League's championship was decided by two "race to 2 points" Baker team matches. The Baker format requires each of the teams' players to bowl two frames to complete each game. Ties in games or matches were broken by a one-ball sudden death roll-off.

"That was fun. That's what it's all about," said Lumberjacks manager Tim Mack, who earlier this year was inducted into the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame. "I felt comfortable with the guys. We had a really good practice session beforehand, but do you ever think you're going to sweep a team with the kind of firepower L.A. X had? No way. We made some key ball changes, made some key moves and, man, did my guys bowl good."

Regarding Malott's performance, Mack said, "It might have been the greatest performance by an anchor bowler I've ever seen. I call him 'The Franchise' for a reason."

Portland, behind a string of four strikes in the middle of any otherwise error-free game, won the first point with a 228-206 decision over L.A. The Lumberjacks quickly surrendered their advantage with two splits and open frames to start game two, but rebounded behind five consecutive strikes and L.A. X's inability to throw back-to-back strikes to win the game, 214-188, and sweep the first "race to 2 points" match.

The Lumberjacks carried their momentum into the second match, putting together two strings of four strikes – including three in the 10th frame by Malott – to win their third point, 221-197, and completed the four-point rout of L.A. X with a 247-208 win in game four, starting the decisive final game with five strikes while L.A. couldn't overcome a barrage of single-pin spares.

The PBA Tour's next event is the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals presented by Red Rock Resort, Casino and Spa in Las Vegas. The tour's eight points leaders over the past two seasons will compete in a series of qualifying and stepladder matches Saturday and Sunday at Red Rock Bowling Center in Las Vegas. The entire competition will be televised live by CBS Sports beginning at 3 p.m. ET both days.

LAS VEGAS (July 20, 2019) – Ten-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Bill O'Neill and seven-time tour winner Jakob Butturff led their respective groups after the qualifying rounds of the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals presented by Red Rock Casino Resort & Spa Saturday to earn the top seeds for Sunday's stepladder rounds at Red Rock Lanes. Both qualifying rounds aired live on the CBS Sports Network.

In the two two-game total pinfall rounds that used a round-robin format conducted over four lanes on the PBA 42-foot Mark Roth lane condition pattern, O'Neill, the 2019 PBA Playoffs runner-up, led the Group 1 round with a 983 four-game pinfall total to earn the top seed for Sunday's Group 1 stepladder. He will be joined in the Group 2 stepladder by No. 2 seed Anthony Simonsen, 862; Marshall Kent, 823, and 2018 PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson, 813.

"You just take what is given you," said the 25-year-old Butturff. "I was fortunate that I was able to stay focused and really able to bowl my game today. Harry Sullins Leads PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic

Brian LeClair sits in third place after first round in bid for third consecutive title

EJ Tackett Wins His Second Barbasol PBA Tour Finals for 13th Career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

Tackett defeats Jakob Butturff 2-1 in "race-to-2-points" format title match aired on CBS Sports Network for first win of the season

LAS VEGAS (July 21, 2019) – EJ Tackett defeated Jakob Butturff 2-1 in the "race-to-2 points" format title match to win his second Barbasol PBA Tour Finals presented by Red Rock Casino Resort & Spa title in three years for his 13th career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title Sunday. The title match wrapped up nine hours of CBS Sports Network live coverage of the tournament at Red Rock Lanes over two days.

The 25-year-old Butturff, who was trying for his fourth win of the season, got off to the early lead with a 247-225 win in the first game of the title match but Tackett, the 2016 PBA Player of the Year, rebounded in game two winning 238-220 to force a 9th and 10th frame roll-off for the deciding point.

In the roll-off, Butturff started with a spare after leaving a 7 pin and Tackett with a strike in the ninth frame but on his first ball in the 10th frame, Butturff left the 4-6-10 split which opened the door for Tackett. Tackett took advantage of the opportunity by striking on his first ball in the 10th to clinch the win.

"As well as Jakob has been bowling you certainly don't expect him to throw a bad shot in that situation," said the 26-year-old Tackett, who also won his first title of the 2019 season. "At that point it was up to me not to do anything stupid in the 10th frame and stay behind the (foul) line.

"Winning big tournaments in the 10th frame like this against the all-time greats is something I've dreamed of since I was a kid," Tackett added. "I've built up a lot of confidence because of my experience in these situations over the years and today it paid off."

Tackett, making his third consecutive PBA50 Tour Finals title match appearance, won the inaugural PBA Tour Finals in 2017 against PBA Tour Finals defending champion Jason Belmonte of Australia but Belmonte came back to beat Tackett in 2018.

The PBA Tour Finals featured the top eight Go Bowling! PBA Tour players in points during the past two seasons ending with the 2019 USBC Masters in April. The eight finalists were split into to two four-player groups with competition consisting of two rounds of total pinfall positioning rounds Saturday followed by Sunday's semifinal stepladder round for each group. The winner of each semifinal stepladder advanced to the title match. The final match of each stepladder also used the race-to-2-points format.

"It's almost like winning a major which makes it very rewarding to win," said Tackett, who also owns two major titles. "You're bowling against eight of the top players on tour not just over a regular season but for nearly two seasons. If you're bowling well and you're making the right decisions, in a way it doesn't necessarily have to be especially difficult to win because you're only bowling against seven other players, but on the other hand it can be very hard to win because of the talent that makes it here."

In the Group 1 semifinal stepladder round, Tackett advanced to the championship match by beating 10time tour winner Bill O'Neill 2-0 in the race-to-2 points final match, winning the first game 265-237 and the second game 210-198.

Butturff advanced to the title match by beating two-hander six-time tour winner Anthony Simonsen in the Group 2 stepladder final 2-1. Butturff won the first game 249-157 but Simonsen came back in game 2, winning 259-234 to force the 9th and 10th frame roll-off which was won by Butturff, 39-38.

In the Group 1 semifinal opening stepladder match Kris Prather, trying for his second tour title, defeated Belmonte, trying for his 23rd tour title, 254-248, to meet Tackett in the second match. Tackett then beat Prather, who won the 2019 Scorpion Championship for his first tour win, 237-224, in the second match to face O'Neill in the Group 1 final.

In the Group 2 opening stepladder match four-time tour winner Marshall Kent beat 2018 PBA Player of the Andrew Anderson 224-189 to advance to the second match against six-time tour winner Anthony Simonsen. Simonsen beat Kent in the second match 246-214 to advance to the Group 2 final against Butturff.

The eight players earned their positions in the stepladder semifinal rounds in four-game qualifying rounds bowled on Saturday.

Mohr Defeats Walter Ray to Win David Small's Championship Lanes Classic for 11th PBA50 Tour Title

Mohr denies Williams his 15th PBA50 Tour win with 279-215 title match victory

ANDERSON, Ind. (July 23, 2019) – Making his third consecutive championship round appearance of the season, Ron Mohr defeated Walter Ray Williams Jr. 279-215 in a battle of PBA Hall of Famers in the title match to win the PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic presented by Roto Grip Tuesday for his first win of the season and 11th of his career.

Mohr, who was top qualifier for the stepladder finals, threw 11 strikes in the title match starting with the first five before leaving a 10 pin in the sixth frame. He then struck the rest of the way to handily win the match.

Williams, the Go Bowling! PBA Tour all-time titles leader with 47 wins, was trying for his fourth win of the season and the 15th of his career to take sole possession of the all-time titles lead on PBA's tour for players 50 and over. He left six 10 pins in the title match including a missed 10 pin in the fifth frame.

"The way Walter Ray was bowling in the previous match I thought I might be the answer to a trivia question, but things went my way today, said the 63-year-old Mohr, whose last PBA50 win came in the 2018 Northern California Classic. "I got off to a slow start in the tournament qualifying 23rd so I really didn't expect to win. There have been a lot of amazing things happen out here (on tour) so I should probably know better than to count myself out."

Mohr, a native of Fort Wayne, finished fourth in last week's PBA50 South Shore Open and fifth in the PBA50 River City Extreme Open two weeks ago.

"The important thing for me was to slow everything down," said Mohr, crediting his wife Lita who noticed he was rushing his shots in the previous championship rounds. "I really had to focus on not making a shot until I'm ready and that was especially true when Walter Ray missed his 10 pin because I didn't want to do the same thing to possibly let him back in the match."

Williams qualified second for the stepladder after coming all the way from sixth in the final position round of the second match play round.

In the semifinal match, Williams, whose runner-up finish all but wraps up his third PBA50 Player of the Year honor, beat hall of famer Doug Kent 247-209 in the semifinal to advance to the title match.

In pain from a back injury suffered in the first game of match play earlier in the day, Kent soldiered on to qualify fifth for the stepladder. Trying for his first PBA50 Tour win, he beat fellow New Yorker Ryan Shafer 228-211 in the first stepladder match before defeating four-time PBA50 Tour winner Lennie Boresch Jr. 278-185 in the second match. It was Shafer's second consecutive fifth-place finish after finishing fifth in last week's South Shore Open.

The PBA50 Tour travels to Wyoming, Mich., for the PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open presented by DV8 July 25-28 before wrapping up with the PBA50 David Small's Jax60 Classic presented by Track in Jackson, Mich., July 30-Aug. 2. Zaffino Regains Consistency After Erratic Start to Take PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open Lead After First Round

WYOMING, Mich. (July 26, 2019) – After starting with games of 296 and 185, Jeff Zaffino of Warren, Pennsylvania managed to regain some consistency for the rest of his first round Friday to lead the PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open presented by DV8.

"I think the key so far is that I'm able to play my "A" game here," said the 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year, who finished 22nd in last week's PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic. "Last week it was kind of frustrating because I couldn't get the ball to do what I wanted and I didn't have the ability to fix the problem. This week I'm able to stand left and throw the ball out to the right and it comes back strong which is where I'm most effective."

Walter Ray Williams Jr. closed his second round with a 268 game to finish qualifying in second with a 3,751 pinfall for 16 games.

With three consecutive PBA50 Tour wins to start the season and no finishes worse than ninth including a runner-up finish in last week's David Small's Championship Lanes Classic, the PBA Hall of Famer has put together a dominant season. His work isn't done however, as he still needs to finish 15th to clinch his third PBA50 Player of the Year honor. Williams also will be trying for a PBA50 Tour record 15th career win.

Sunday's six-game match play rounds are scheduled for 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. ET after which the top five players will be determined for the stepladder finals at 7 p.m.

Trying for his second consecutive win of the season, PBA Hall of Famer and David Small's Championship Lanes Classic winner Ron Mohr was able to continue his momentum finishing qualifying in third with 3,688.

Rounding out the top five were Bo Goergen of Sanford, Michigan with 3,664, and Warren Eales of Chandler, Arizona with 3,653.

Kyle Sherman, Amanda Greene Win 20th PBA-PWBA Storm Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles Thriller

HOUSTON, Texas (July 28, 2019) – Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri and partner Amanda Green of Romney, West Virginia, advanced from third place to first in the final match to win the 20th anniversary PBA-PWBA Storm Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles title in a thrilling finish at Copperfield Bowl Sunday.

The win gave Sherman his first Professional Bowlers Association Tour title. Greene won her only PWBA title in the 2015 PWBA Lincoln Open, but has suspended her professional career to attend law school.

Battling what PBA competitor and FloBowling analyst Brad Miller called "an insane amount of hook," the final game of match play involved a nerve-wracking contest of strikes and splits among the top four teams. In the end, it was a 248 game by Sherman and a 192 by Greene that overtook the first- and second-place teams with an 8,873 pinfall total for 20 games to claim the \$20,000 first prize.

AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois and Eric McCarthy of Omaha finished second with 8,862 pins; tournament leaders Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois and Sydney Brummett of Fort Wayne, Indiana, finished third with 8,848 pins and Michigan partners Andrew Anderson of Holly and Jordan Richard of Tipton finished fourth with 8,846 pins as a total of 27 pins separated the top four teams.

"We thought we had to win our match (against Anderson and Richard) to win the title," Sherman said. "(When we lost - by 14 pins), we thought we were out of it. But you just have to keep fighting until the end.

"This is such a shock. It's something you dream about."

Greene echoed her partner. "We had no idea we were even in it. I had to keep moving left, but I missed making a couple of moves. Fortunately, I had a good partner who held me up."

The tournament, known within the bowling industry as "The Luci," is a fundraiser to combat breast cancer and assist those affected by the disease. It was founded by Donna Conners as a memorial to her friend, Luci Bonneau, who died of breast cancer.

Eugene McCune Wins PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open; Walter Ray Williams Jr. Earns PBA50 Player of the Year

McCune beats Lennie Boresch Jr. 230-178 in title match; Williams finishes third to clinch third PBA50 Player of the Year honor

WYOMING, Mich. (July 28, 2019) – Three-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana, beat Lennie Boresch Jr. of Kenosha, Wisconsin, 230-178 in the title match Sunday to win the PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open presented by DV8 for his first PBA50 Tour title as a professional.

A third-place finish by PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Ocala, Florida, was enough for Williams to clinch his third Player of the Year honor on the tour for players 50 and over.

"I don't think I've ever bowled so bad in my life and won," McCune said. "I didn't have a lot of problems with the right lane but no matter where or how I threw it on the left lane I couldn't find a shot. I was fortunate to get some breaks and was able to take advantage of them."

In the semifinal match against Williams, McCune recovered from a gutter ball and open in the seventh frame by throwing strikes in the ninth frame and all three in the 10th to beat Williams 215-201 after Williams opened the door by missing a 3-10 split in the 10th. One of McCune's breaks was a crossover strike in the 10th frame.

In the title match, Boresch, who was trying for his first win of the season and the fifth of his career, got off to an early lead but opened in the sixth and eighth frames after leaving splits while McCune was able to string together five strikes in the middle of the match using his trademark hard-throwing delivery from the corner to clinch the win.

"I was using a 15-pound ball earlier in the tournament but I wasn't able to carry with it," the 51-year-old McCune said. "I went to a 16-pound ball in the second round which enabled me to throw a straighter line to the pocket. It's more work to throw 16, and I didn't throw it the best tonight, but it was the right choice to deal with the changing lane conditions."

With three consecutive PBA50 Tour wins to start the season and no finishes worse than ninth, Williams has put together a dominant season. He will have one more opportunity to win his 15th career PBA50 Tour title to take sole possession of the all-time titles lead on the PBA50 Tour when he competes in the PBA50 Jax60 Classic presented by Track July 30-Aug. 2 in Jackson, Mich. which will conclude the PBA50 season.

"Overall I've been very happy with the way I bowled this season," said Williams, who holds the all-time titles lead on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour with 47 wins. "I don't think I was always the best bowler in the field every week but you can't argue with three wins and a lot of other good finishes. Hopefully I can get that 15th win in Jackson."

In the opening stepladder match, last week's PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic winner, Ron Mohr of Las Vegas beat Brian LeClair of Albany, New York, a two-time winner this season, 268-213. Williams, who was seeded third for the finals, started the second stepladder match with eight strikes to beat Mohr 266-237 to advance to the semifinal match against McCune.

Mohr beat Williams in last week's David Small's Championship Lanes Classic title match 279-215 for his first win of the season and 11th of his career.

Two PBA60 events – for players 60 and over – will conclude the "senior" season. The PBA60 Jax 60 National Championship in memory of Mel Wolfe will be conducted Aug. 3-5 and the PBA60 Dick Weber

Championship presented by the DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global in Fort Wayne is scheduled for Aug. 7-9.

Parker Bohn III Rides Clean Second Round To PBA50 David Small's JAX 60 Classic Qualifying Lead

JACKSON, Mich. (Aug. 1, 2019) – Hoping to end a two-year drought without a win on the PBA50 Tour, PBA Hall of Famer Parker Bohn III of Jackson, New Jersey averaged 237 for 16 games to emerge as the qualifying leader for the PBA50 David Small's JAX 60 Classic presented by Track.

The four-time PBA50 Tour titlist started Thursday's second eight-game round at JAX 60 Lanes with a 205 game and then caught fire bowling games of 258, 258, 278, 245, 248, 246 and 235 bringing his two-round qualifying pinfall total to 3,803. He had no open frames in his second round.

"The good shots resulted in strikes and the bad shots resulted in nothing worse than a makeable spare," said Bohn, who also has won 35 times on the Go Bowling! PBA Tour. "After the first game I just needed to tighten up my line to the pocket a little bit and more often than not I knocked them all down. I didn't have to shoot at anything worse than a three-pin spare."

Bohn, who notched his second top-qualifier honor in the last three tournaments, last won on the tour for players 50 and over in August of 2017 when he won the David Small's Championship Lanes Classic. This season he has three top-five finishes with a best of second in the PBA50 Northern California Classic.

"I don't mind telling you I'm tired of making shows and not winning," said the 56-year-old left-hander. "There's something to be learned from every tournament so hopefully I can put all that experience to use and win this one."

As a result of finishing in the top eight, Bohn earned a bye into Friday's second match play round. The other seven players earning a bye were: Joel Carlson, Omaha, Nebraska, 3,730; Brian Menini, Brookfield, Missouri., 3,700; Steve Jaros, Yorkville, Illinois, 3,686; Harry Sullins, Chesterfield Twp., Michigan., 3,682, followed by three Hall of Famers – Mark Williams, Beaumont, Texas, 3,671; 2019 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic winner Ron Mohr, Las Vegas, 3,667, and Brian Voss, Centennial, Colorado, 3,644.

If PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida is going to win his fourth tournament of the season and 15th of his career to take sole possession of the all-time PBA50 Tour titles lead, he'll have to advance through Friday's cashers round to earn a spot in the first match play round which is something he's done in two of his wins that came early in the season.

Williams narrowly advanced to the cashers round finishing tied for 31st with 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair, of Albany, New York. LeClair, who also advanced to the cashers round will be trying for his third win of the season.

Friday's competition begins with the cashers round at 8:30 a.m. ET with match play rounds at noon and 3 p.m. After match play is completed the top five players will advance to the stepladder finals at 7 p.m. ET.

BUTTURFF SHINES IN PAN AM GAMES; PATE, PUERTO RICAN PARTNERS WIN GOLD

Jakob Butturff, who is in the midst of a career year in Go Bowling! PBA Tour competition, kept his momentum rolling as a member of Team USA in the Pan American Games that concluded Tuesday in Lima, Peru.

The 25-year-old lefthander from Tempe, Ariz., broke the Pan Am Games six-game scoring record in his first round of doubles qualifying, and then broke his own record by 22 pins the next day for a 12-game total of 3,054 pins (a 254.5 avereage). The effort got Butturff and fellow PBA-member **Nick Pate** of Inver Grove Heights, Minn., into the medal round, but they had to settle for silver when they lost to a team of Puerto Rican PBA members, **Cristian Azcona** and **Jean Perez**, who broke the 12-game doubles team record with a 5,816 total, more than 200 pins better than the record total by Canada's **Dan MacLelland** and **Francois Lavoie** in 2015 in Argentina. Butturff and Pate finished with a 5,545 total for second place.

Butturff, who has won three PBA Tour titles in 2019 including his first major in the USBC Masters, continued his torrid pace in men's singles, out-distancing the field by more than 400 pins after 12 games of qualifying and eight games of match play, but in the end, he fell short of gold in the medal round, losing to Pate, 279-268, in the semifinal

round. Pate then captured the gold for Team USA, defeating defending Pan Am singles champion **Marcelo Suartz** of Brazil, 190-189, in the title match.

"BEAUTIES" DEFEAT "BEASTS" IN "LUCI MIXED DOUBLES" SPECIAL EVENT The "Beauties vs. Beasts" special-event team competition to kick off the 20th anniversary Storm PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles (commonly called "The Luci" in memory of the late Luci Bonneau) at Copperfield Bowl in Houston belonged to the women.

The teams, featuring the leading men's and women's qualifiers from the 2018 tournament, bowled a five-game total pinfall Baker format team duel in which Erin McCarthy, Missy Parkin, Shannon Pluhowsky, Verity Crawley and Diandra Asbaty out-scored the men's team of EJ Tackett, Tommy Jones, Darren Tang, AJ Johnson and Brad Miller by 19 pins. The winning team split a \$5,000 prize pool; the losers earned shares of \$1,000.

The Beauties topped the men in three of the first four games – 204-181, 192-201, 215-203 and 231-168 – before the "Beasts" shaved 71 pins off the women's lead by taking game five, 216-145.

Race to 2020 PBA Playoffs Begins in January in Arlington, Texas

Four-city tour for PBA Playoffs among major changes for second season of FOX Sports telecasts

CHICAGO (Aug. 2, 2019) – The Professional Bowlers Association today announced its 2020 schedule of PBA Tour on FOX Sports events leading toward an expanded PBA Playoffs featuring more venues.

Five major championships, including the U.S. Open for the first time on FOX, highlight the series of 13 tournaments taking place in nine different cities from January-March in which players will earn points toward qualifying for the PBA Playoffs.

The 2020 PBA Playoffs will again feature the top 24 from the points list in an elimination bracket with all matches televised, expanding to multiple locations as the tournament progresses. As part of a PBA partnership with Bowlero bowling centers, the first round will begin April 6 in Norco, California; the Round of 16 in Westminster, Colorado, April 20-21, and the Round of 8 May 10-11, in Euless, Texas. The Playoffs will conclude with the Final Four and Championship matches on May 16-17 in North Brunswick, New Jersey, live on FOX.

Breakout star Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, won this year's inaugural PBA Playoffs in Portland, Maine, defeating Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, and earning \$100,000 in the process.

"Launching our partnership with FOX made 2019 a special year for the PBA, and it could not have delivered more drama and history to our fans," said PBA Tour Commissioner Tom Clark. "Sellout crowds in special venues across the country watched the greatest bowlers in the world put on tremendous shows week-after-week, and in 2020 we are excited to bring the action to even more locations."

The inaugural 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season netted more than 22 million viewers including re-airs across FOX, FS1 and FS2, a 100% viewership increase over 2018.

The 2020 schedule and PBA Playoffs points race begins Jan. 14-19 in Arlington, Texas, at the International Bowling Campus for the PBA Hall of Fame Classic, followed by stops in Shawnee, Oklahoma, and Jonesboro, Arkansas, before a string of majors in February (PBA Tournament of Champions at historic AMF Riviera Lanes in Fairlawn, Ohio, Feb. 4-9; the PBA Players Championship at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl in Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 11-15; and the U.S. Open at Sun Valley Lanes in Lincoln, Nebraska, Feb. 18-23). Big February concludes with two events in Indianapolis at iconic Woodland Bowl, including the Mark Roth/Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship.

The Tour will then shift to the west for two of the most anticipated events of the year, beginning with the PBA World Series of Bowling XI at South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas, March 6-19. WSOB XI will feature four title events including the PBA World Championship, where Australia's Jason Belmonte will defend after winning his record 11th major championship in that event in 2019. The WSOB will again feature five consecutive days of TV on FS1, including live telecasts of all four title events.

Following WSOB XI will be the fifth major of the year, the USBC Masters in Reno, Nevada, March 23-29. The Masters, airing live on FOX, will be the final event for players to earn points toward the 24 berths in the 2020 PBA Playoffs.

Also part of the to-be-announced 2020 PBA schedule on FOX Sports' family of networks will be three special events with no PBA Playoffs implications in three different locations, including Chris Paul's annual CP3 PBA Celebrity Invitational.

The PBA League team event series will return to Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine, July 20-23, live on FS1. PBAL details will be released soon.

All early rounds of all events on the national schedule, and international coverage of the finals, will again be livestreamed on FloBowling.com.

Full television schedule and times are also to be announced.

Joel Carlson Throws Three Strikes in 10th Frame

to Win PBA50 David Small's JAX 60 Classic

Missed spare in 10th by Brian Kretzer leaves door open for Carlson

to take home second PBA50 Tour title in final PBA50 event of the season

JACKSON, Mich. (Aug. 2, 2019) – Joel Carlson of Omaha, Nebraska threw three pressure-filled strikes in the 10th frame of the title match to beat top seed Brian Kretzer of Dayton, Ohio, 259-255, to win the PBA50 David Small's JAX 60 Classic presented by Track Friday for his second PBA50 Tour title of the season.

Carlson, who won the PBA50 Hamilton Lanes & Entertainment Center Open earlier in the season for his first career PBA50 Tour title, also took advantage of a missed 3-6-10 spare by Kretzer in the 10th who had started the match by converting the 3-6-10 spare in the first frame and then threw eight strikes in a row before missing the spare in the 10th.

"That's one thing I've learned and that is never give up," said Carlson, who watched as Kretzer finished the match first by missing the spare and leaving him the opportunity to win with a double and seven count. "Once he got the strike in the ninth, I thought it was over and even in the 10th I fully expected him to make that spare. But when something happens and you get the opportunity you have to take it and prove you can win."

Carlson, who was seeded fourth for the finals, won the three previous stepladder matches to advance to the title match against Kretzer who was also trying for his second career PBA50 Tour title.

Carlson opened with a 236-213 win over 11-time PBA50 Tour winner Ron Mohr of Las Vegas who was making his fifth consecutive championship round appearance and was trying for his second win of the season.

Carlson then advanced to meet Hall of Famer Doug Kent of Newark, New York, in the second stepladder match also winning 236-213.

In the semifinal, Carlson beat No. 2 seed 68-year-old Charlie Tapp of Kalamazoo, Michigan, 216-175, to advance to the title match. Tapp a three-time PBA Tour winner was trying for his third PBA50 Tour title and first since 2006.

It was another eventful title match for Carlson as he won the Hamilton Lanes Open in a roll-off with Mohr after tying in the title match 279-279.

"It was unbelievable to win the first one and just as remarkable to win the second one," said the 57-year-old Carlson. "I've always felt I could win out here and I have the confidence. I don't know if there's anything like a normal way to win a match but it seems like every match I've bowled (in a stepladder) has had more than its share of excitement."

After winning the recent PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open, Eugene McCune of Munster, Indiana finished ninth in the JAX 60 Classic which was good enough to lock up 2019 PBA50 Rookie of the Year honors.

PBA Hall of Fame Walter Ray Williams Jr. had already clinched his third PBA50 Player of the Year honor but his quest for a record 15th career PBA50 Tour title will have to wait until the 2020 season after he just missed advancing out of the first match play round finishing the tournament in 17th. Williams started the season with three consecutive wins, including the PBA50 National Championship, and never finished out of the top 10 in any other event until his 17th-place finish in Jackson.

Two PBA60 events (for players 60 and over) will conclude the "senior" season. The PBA60 Jax 60 National Championship in memory of Mel Wolf will be conducted Aug. 3-5 at JAX 60 Lanes and the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by The DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global in Fort Wayne is scheduled for Aug. 7-9. Hall of Famer Johnny Petraglia Leads PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship After First Round

JACKSON, Mich. (Aug. 3, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Johnny Petraglia averaged 247 for seven games Saturday to lead the first round of the PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship in memory of Mel Wolf at JAX 60 Lanes.

The 72-year-old left-hander, who owns 14 Go Bowling! PBA Tour and eight PBA50 Tour titles, bowled a 1,734 seven-game pinfall total with games of 214, 258, 278, 237, 246, 279 and 222 to lead the field of 105 players ages 60 and older.

"With the longer (lane conditioning) pattern I'm able to throw the ball slower and that's to my advantage," Petraglia said. "It's when I have to throw hard is when I get into trouble.

"I started practice with two balls that were pretty similar, but I went with the one that was a little stronger because it allowed me to move inside if I needed to and gave me some more room for error," Petraglia added.

Petraglia's first senior title came at JAX 60 Lanes (then Airport Lanes) when he won the 1998 PBA Senior National Championship and then won there a second time when he captured the 2008 Senior Jackson Open title.

"This has been a good center for me and I have a lot of good memories of bowling here as you can imagine," Petraglia said. "So, I'm hoping for good things to happen as the tournament continues."

Petraglia's last "senior" tour event win came in the 2012 PBA50 Senior Dayton Classic. He has yet to win a PBA60 event but has two runner-up finishes to his credit.

Petraglia leads fellow left-hander, three-time PBA50 Tour titlist and 2018 USBC Super Senior Classic winner Mike Dias of Lafayette, Colorado and Gary Reh of Fort Mohave, Arizona, tied for second with 1,653. Rounding out the top five are Mike Mineman, St. Louis, Missouri, 1,643 and Kevin Foley, Reno, Nevada, 1,633.

The entire field returns for another seven-game qualifying round Sunday at 11 a.m. ET after which the top 24 players will advance to the first match play round at 4 p.m. Match play continues with rounds Monday at 11 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to determine the top five for the stepladder finals at 6 p.m.

The tournament is named in honor of longtime PBA50 competitor Mel Wolf who passed away in 2011. The one-time PBA50 Tour titlist was the driving force in bringing the senior tour to Jackson in 1992.

Petraglia Posts 4-1 Record in First Match Play Round to Retain Lead

in PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship

JACKSON, Mich. (Aug. 4, 2019) – After advancing as the top qualifier from the second round, PBA Hall of Famer Johnny Petraglia compiled a 4-1 record in the first match play round Sunday to retain his lead in the PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship in memory of Mel Wolf at JAX 60 Lanes.

The 72-year-old left-hander, who owns 14 Go Bowling! PBA Tour and eight PBA50 Tour titles, finished the day with a 4,662 19-game pinfall total, including match play bonus pins, to lead the match play field of 24 players ages 60 and older. He bowled games of 202, 234, 246, 249 and 245 in Sunday's match play round. His only loss came in a second match defeat at the hands of Dave Axon of Bellevue, Nebraska, 235-234.

"At this stage of the tournament the one thing I have to worry about is running out of gas and if you start to get tired that's when you start to lose focus," said Petraglia, who is trying for his first win in a PBA60 event. "I just keep reminding myself that I'm 72 and not 32. Everything is great at this point with my ball choices and my adjustments – I just need to concentrate on keeping my game together."

There is still a lot of work for Petraglia and the other 23 players in the match play field to do with a five-game match play round at 11 a.m. ET and a six-game round at 2:30 p.m. Monday that will determine the top five players for the stepladder finals at 6 p.m. Each match play win awards 30 bonus pins.

Petraglia's first senior title came at JAX 60 Lanes (then Airport Lanes) when he won the 1998 PBA Senior National Championship and then won there a second time when he captured the 2008 Senior Jackson Open. He is trying for his first win in PBA60 competition (established in 2014) but has two runner-up finishes to his credit.

Petraglia leads Jerry Sikora of Huron, South Dakota in second finishing the day with a 3-2 record and 4,601 pinfall. Hall of Famer Ron Mohr of Las Vegas, who has already

locked up his fourth consecutive PBA60 Player of the Year honor, finished the day in third with a 3-2 record and 4,577 pinfall.

Rounding out the top five were two-time PBA50 Tour winner Hall of Famer Brian Voss, Centennial, Colorado (4-1), 4,558, and Toby Contreras, Lees Summit, Missouri (3-2), 4,526.

Voss Beats Sullins in Title Match Thriller to Win PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship

Voss defeats Sullins 264-256 in title match decided in 10th frame for first PBA60 title

JACKSON, Mich. (Aug. 5, 2019) – PBA Hall of Famer Brian Voss, a 25-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour and two-time PBA50 Tour titlist, defeated Harry Sullins 264-256 in the title match to capture the PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship in memory of Mel Wolf title Monday at JAX 60 Lanes for his first PBA60 win.

Competing in the tournament exclusively for players 60 years of age and older, Voss started the match with eight strikes before he opened in the ninth frame after leaving the 4-6-7 split. Sullins, who also was trying for his first PBA60 title, was able to stay in the match with a string of eight strikes of his own after a 7-10 split in the second frame. The USBC Hall of Famer, who is a five-time PBA Tour and three-time PBA50 Tour winner, had a chance to win the match with a strike on the second ball of the 10th frame but left a solid 10 pin which gave the win to Voss.

"That's why I bowl right there," the 61-year-old Voss said of his victory. "I wanted the 300 game but it probably turned out more exiting the way it ended. It doesn't matter how old you are or how many times you've done it, winning never gets old.

"I was really into it and Harry was too," Voss added. "We were really pushing each other. I got a little slow with that shot in the ninth frame but fortunately I learned from it."

Voss had a 13-3 overall match play record including a 6-0 run in the final round which contributed to his surge to earn the top seed for the stepladder finals.

"I didn't feel I was bowling that great early in the tournament but when I got to match play I figured out I was just arcing the ball too much," Voss said. "As it turned out I could just move a little further to the right and not put so much arc on the ball."

Sullins, the no. 2 seed, won the semifinal match thriller 235-234 over No. 3 seed former Team USA member Jerry Sikora who left the 3-9 on his final shot of the 10th frame to give Sullins the win and a berth in the title match.

In the first stepladder match, three-time PBA50 Tour and one-time PBA60 titlist Mike Dias beat No. 5 seed and newly-crowned PBA60 Player of the Year Ron Mohr 211-200. In the second match Sikora beat Dias 227-190 to meet Sullins in the semifinal.

PBA Hall of Famer Johnny Petraglia, 72, led the first four rounds of the tournament but eventually finished sixth, losing to Mohr in the position round match in the final match play round to miss the finals.

The tournament was named in honor of longtime PBA50 competitor Mel Wolf who passed away in 2011. The one-time PBA50 Tour titlist was the driving force in bringing the senior tour to Jackson in 1992.

The PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by The DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global at Pro Bowl West in Fort Wayne, Indiana concludes the 2019 PBA50/60 season Aug. 7-9. Mohr, an 11-time PBA50 Tour and two-time PBA60 titlist, is the defending champion.

Defending Champion Ron Mohr Takes

PBA60 Dick Weber Championship Lead After First Round

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (Aug. 7, 2019) – Defending champion Ron Mohr bowled a 1,628 pinfall total for seven games to take the first-round lead Wednesday in the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global at Pro Bowl West.

The Fort Wayne native, who now lives in Las Vegas, bowled games of 246, 249, 204, 268, 245, 194 and 222 averaging 232 for the round.

"I missed the (lane condition) transition in the 204 and 190 game," said the PBA Hall of Famer who has already clinched his fourth consecutive PBA60 Player of the Year Award. "I wasn't too worried about it because if you can grind out a 190 or 200 when you're not able to make the right adjustment that's not too bad."

The 63-year-old Mohr, who also owns two PBA50 Player of the Year honors, is currently on a string of six top-five finishes in PBA50/60 competition. Most recently he finished fifth in the PBA60 David Small's JAX 60 National Championship which ended Monday in Jackson, Michigan.

"It's been an unbelievable run and hopefully I can keep it going for a good finish to the season in my hometown," said Mohr, a two-time PBA60 titlist. "I don't recall ever being on a stretch where I've bowled this consistently well."

In July Mohr won the PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic for his 11th career PBA50 Tour title.

Mohr holds a nine-pin lead over 2017 Dick Weber Championship runner-up Dave Axon of Bellevue, Nebraska finishing the round with 1,619. In third is 2017 winner Darryl Bower of Middletown, Pennsylvania with 1,599.

Rounding out the top five were JAX 60 National Championship and 2018 Dick Weber Championship runner-up Harry Sullins, Chesterfield Twp., Michigan in fourth with 1,583 and PBA Hall of Famer Mark Williams of Beaumont, Texas in fifth with 1,556.

JAX 60 National Championship winner PBA Hall of Famer Brian Voss got off to a slow start finishing the round in 51st with 1,421.

The field returns for another seven-game qualifying round Thursday morning at 11 a.m. ET after which the top 32 players will advance to the first match play round at 5 p.m. After the second match play round at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, the top five players will be determined for the stepladder finals scheduled for noon.

Mark Williams Goes 5-1 in First Match Play Round to

Take PBA60 Dick Weber Championship Lead

32 players return for Friday morning's second match play round

to determine top five for stepladder finals

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (Aug. 8, 2019) – Seven-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour and three-time PBA50 Tour titlist Mark Williams of Beaumont, Texas, compiled a 5-1 match play record and averaged 230 for two rounds to take the lead in the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global Thursday at Pro Bowl West.

PBA50 STARS TO BOWL FOR U.S. IN WORLD SENIOR CHAMPIONSHIPS Four PBA50 superstars – **Walter Ray Williams Jr., Parker Bohn III, Lennie Boresch Jr.** and **Ron Mohr** – will represent the United States in the 2019 World Bowling Senior Championships Sept. 3-9 at South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas along with four equally talented 50-and-older women stars.

Nearly 260 senior bowlers representing 41 countries are expected to compete for medals in singles, doubles, four-player team, all-events and masters compet0itions.

Williams has just completed a three-title PBA50 Tour season in which he earned Player of the Year honors for the third time after tying the record for career PBA50 Tour titles with 14. Bohn is a 35-time PBA Tour winner and a four-time PBA50 Tour titlist. Mohr has just earned PBA60 Player of the Year honors for the fourth consecutive year. All three are PBA Hall of Famers while Boresch, a four-time PBA50 Tour winner, is a member of the USBC Hall of Fame.

Pepe, a two-time Bowlers Supply Open champion, qualified third and defeated **Tim Foy Jr.** of Seaford, Del., 2-0, and **Paul Bajorski** of Islip, N.Y., 223-216, in the semifinal round to advance to the final match. Pepe earned \$1,300 as the runner-up. Bajorski and Shafer earned \$1,000 apiece as semifinal round losers.

Mark Williams Wins PBA60 Dick Weber Championship for First PBA60 Title

PBA Hall of Famer outlasts Rick Minier with 177-175 title match win

FORT WAYNE, Ind. (Aug. 9, 2019) – Seven-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour and three-time PBA50 Tour titlist Mark Williams defeated Rick Minier 177-175 in the title match to win the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship presented by DeHayes Insurance Group and 900 Global Friday at Pro Bowl West for his first PBA60 title.

In the final tournament of the 2019 PBA50/60 season and third event for players 60 and over, both Williams and Minier struggled in the title match with three open frames each. Minier's most costly open came in the ninth when he left a 7-10 split.

Williams, who was the top seed for the stepladder finals, was working on a double heading into the 10th frame but got a scare when he left the 2-10 split after a light hit on his first shot of the frame. The resulting eight-count turned out to be enough to win the match.

"I knew I needed eight to be safe but it turned out I was lucky to get it," the 61-year-old PBA Hall of Famer said. "I got the ball a little wide and it didn't hook back like I thought it would. Sometimes you need breaks to win and I guess that was the one I needed."

The low-scoring title match came as a surprise to Williams after a relatively high-scoring semifinal match in which Minier, the No. 2 seed for the finals, beat No. 5 seed Hall of Famer Brian Voss 279-228.

"I think the conditions really changed and caught both of us by surprise," Williams said of the title match. "The way those guys were bowling I thought it would take 220 or 230 at least to win. I would have never thought that the (title) match would have been below 200."

The stepladder finals started with Voss, trying for his second consecutive PBA60 title after winning the David Small's JAX 60 National Championship Monday, beating No. 4 seed Jerry Sikora, coming off a third-place finish in the JAX 60 National Championship, 246-226. Voss then went on to beat Emilio Mora 246-169 in the second stepladder match to advance to the semifinal.

Mora, trying for his first "senior" title, made a remarkable run to earn the No. 3 seed for the finals posting an 11-1 record in match play.

Defending champion and Fort Wayne native Ron Mohr, who was trying for his third PBA60 title, finished sixth ending his streak of six consecutive PBA50/60 tournament top-five finishes. The four-time and reigning PBA60 Player of the Year missed the stepladder final after losing his position round match to Mora 191-177.

Hall of Famer Chris Barnes trails by two pins heading into Sunday's cashers round

CHESAPEAKE, Va. (Aug. 10, 2019) – England's Dom Barrett, in pursuit of his eighth Professional Bowlers Association Tour title, averaged 227 Saturday at AMF North Branch to take the qualifying lead in the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open.

Bill O'Neill Wins PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open for 11th Career Title Top qualifier closes with four strikes to turn back AJ Chapman's bid for his first PBA Tour title

CHESAPEAKE, Va. (Aug. 11, 2019) – Top qualifier Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, finished with four strikes to turn back a rally by AJ Chapman of Manchester, Iowa, and win the Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour's Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open Sunday at AMF Western Branch.

O'Neill, who earned his 11th career PBA Tour title and second of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season, jumped into an early lead with five strikes to start the title match while Chapman left a 3-6-7-10 split and failed to convert in his third frame. Chapman, the No. 2 qualifier, rallied behind a string of four strikes to close his deficit to three pins, but O'Neill struck out to end Chapman's bid for his first PBA Tour title.

"Everything this week, with the urethane equipment I was using, was about staying slow," O'Neill said. "Just to win an event when you're not playing your 'A' game means a lot.

"I've worked on my game a lot this year, mainly on ball speed," he continued. "I throw it too hard when I'm doing bad, but I'm bowling a lot smarter and I think the end of the game showed that."

In the midst of arguably his best season in his 14-year career, the 37-year-old O'Neill has had third, fourth and fifth place finishes in addition to winning the PBA Hall of Fame Classic to start the year and later finishing second in the inaugural PBA Playoffs.

Greg Young Jr. of Viera, Florida, a 23-year-old rookie who had not finished higher than 30th in any previous PBA Tour appearance, eliminated 10-time PBA Tour champion Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, 216-192, in the first match of the four-player stepladder finals. But Young ran into immediate trouble in the semifinal match against Chapman, leaving splits that resulted in three unconverted spares in the first five frames as Chapman coasted to a 233-160 victory.

The Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open, named in honor of the long-time PBA South Region manager who was inducted into the PBA Hall of Fame in 2016, was the third of 10 events that are part of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour. The FloBowling PBA Summer Tour resumes Tuesday at Ten Pin Alley Family Fun Center in Wilmington, North Carolina, with an eight-game qualifying round in the PBA Wilmington Open.

Sweden's Martin Larsen Struck by Car, Injured in Virginia Beach

European PBA veteran "really fortunate that I'm alive"

CHESAPEAKE, Va. – PBA Tour veteran Martin Larsen of Sweden was seriously injured when he was struck by a car last Thursday in Virginia Beach, Virginia, prior to the start of the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open. The news was first reported by FloBowling senior editor Lucas Wiseman.

Larsen, 40, was walking with fellow bowler Fran Louw of South Africa when he was struck in the middle of an intersection while attempting to cross the street. Larsen said he was thrown 40 feet down the road as a result of the accident.

Larsen told FloBowling he was hospitalized for two nights with a broken left wrist, 59 stitches in his upper left arm, a broken rib and other various injuries. Fortunately, none of the injuries were life-threatening, but his 2019 season is over.

"I feel really fortunate looking back on it," Larsen told Wiseman. "I just can't understand how my legs are not broken, and how I don't have a real bad headache. It's really fortunate that I'm alive, and I'm not more hurt than I am."

Larsen said he and Louw drove to the tourist district along the beach to see the sights and enjoy dinner. When they returned to their rental car, they found it had been towed because it was illegally parked. The impound lot was just over a mile away, Larsen said, so they decided to walk to retrieve their vehicle. Along the way, Larsen said they reached an intersection where they waited "a long time" for a crossing signal.

"When the cars stopped, we thought it was our turn," Larsen said. "Stupid enough, we didn't pay attention to the lights. There was a car coming from the third lane. We didn't see it and they didn't see us."

Larsen said he was slowed down because he was carrying a case of bottled water on his shoulder, while Louw was in front of him, which is why Louw wasn't hit.

"It's a lifetime lesson learned," Larsen said. "You have to do what you say to the kids and wait until it's your turn to cross. Next time I'm going to be a little more careful."

Larsen, who flew home to Sweden, said he was thankful most of the injuries were to his left arm and not his bowling arm.

"My right arm is totally fine except for some bruises," Larsen said. "The left wrist is going to be in a cast for five weeks. I don't know how long it takes for the rest of the body to heal up."

Larsen, long considered one of Europe's premier players, has bowled in PBA Tour competition since 2009 with a second-place finish in the 2014 PBA Scorpion Championship his best among six top-five finishes. He was the recipient of the 2012 Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award, selected by his fellow competitors.

Butturff, Sherman Retain Top Spots in FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points

BJ Moore Wins First PBA Tour Title in Wilmington Open

Late string of four strikes locks up victory to end seven-year quest for a title

WILMINGTON, N.C. (Aug. 14, 2019) – BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pennsylvania defeated 13-time Professional Bowlers Association titlist Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 243=215, to win his first PBA Tour title in the Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour's Wilmington Open Wednesday at Ten Pin Alley Family Fun Center.

Moore, a 30-year-old right-hander, ended a seven-year quest for his first title in his 50th PBA Tour tournament. Moore's previous best finish was second place in both the 2016 and 2019 PBA Scorpion Championships.

"I don't know what to say; it's awesome," Moore said. "I'm a process guy and that's definitely what I was focused on this week. Sometimes you have to take your lumps before you can win, but it's all been worth it."

Rash praised Moore for his performance. "He threw it great when he needed to," Rash, the top qualifier, said. "It was a great effort."

Moore gained the upper hand in the final match, throwing strikes on his first four shots while Rash left a 7-10 split and opened in his fourth frame. Moore, however, failed to convert the 3-6-10 in his fifth frame to slow his momentum. Nursing a modest lead and taking advance of Rash's inability to carry strikes on the right lane, Moore put together another string of four strikes to win going away.

In the first match of the four-man stepladder finals, Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington flirted with the first perfect game in FloBowling's inaugural season of PBA Tour livestreaming coverage, rolling strikes in the first nine frames of a 274-179 victory over reigning PBA Player of the Year Andrew Anderson of Holly, Michigan. Kent lost his bid for a 300 game when he left the 3-6 on his first shot in the 10th frame.

In the semifinal match, Kent failed to convert a 2-5-7 split in the fourth frame, but Moore returned the favor, leaving the 4-6-10 split for an open in his sixth frame. Kent doubled to regain the lead, but made another mistake, leaving the 2-8-10 for another open frame. Moore responded with three strikes to lock up a 214-181 win to advance to the title match.

The Wilmington Open was the fourth of 10 events that are part of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour. The FloBowling PBA Summer Tour resumes Saturday when the PBA Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic qualifying gets underway at Mid-County Bowling and Entertainment in Middletown, Delaware.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Returns to Winning Form on Way to Third PBA50 Player of the Year Award

Eugene McCune wins 2019 PBA50 Rookie of the Year, Ron Mohr wins fourth consecutive PBA60 Player of the Year honor

CHICAGO (Aug. 15, 2019) – After winning his third PBA50 Player of the Year Award in his 10th season competing on the tour for players 50 and over, 59-year-old PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. sent a message that he will be a major force for some time to come competing in the "senior" ranks.

Williams, who also earned the PBA50 Player of the Year crown in 2012 and 2013, opened the 2019 season with three consecutive wins including the PBA50 National Championship for his third career PBA50 Tour major, and never had a finish worse than ninth until a 17th-place finish in the PBA50 David Small's JAX 60 Classic, the final PBA50 event of the season.

The all-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour titles leader with 47 wins brought his career PBA50 Tour titles count to 14 which tied him for the all-time PBA50 Tour titles lead with retired Hall of Famer John Handegard.

"Obviously, it was a really good, encouraging season," said Williams, who owns seven Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year honors on the PBA Tour. "I wasn't always the best bowler in the field (this season) but you can't argue with three wins and the other top finishes I had."

Williams is among a handful of players who continue to compete on both the PBA Tour and PBA50 Tour including fellow Hall of Famers and rivals for more than three decades, Norm Duke, Pete Weber, Parker Bohn III and Amleto Monacelli. Williams' PBA50 Player of the Year award came at what could be a crossroads for his career on the PBA Tour.

"I wasn't pleased with how I bowled on the regular tour this season so the PBA50 Tour gave me a lift," he said. "Bowling on the regular tour has always been enjoyable for me but last season wasn't enjoyable. I'm not ready to retire from bowling on the PBA Tour but that's a tough tour with all those young guys."

So tough, in fact, that Williams has added the two-handed delivery – made famous by tour stars Jason Belmonte, Anthony Simonsen and Jesper Svensson among a growing number of others – to his arsenal. He employs the technique to be more effective primarily when he has to play an "inside" shot."

"Basically, if I have to move way inside and throw it right, that's when I'll use it," Williams said. "It's still a work in progress but it has become a useful tool for me when the (lane) conditions warrant it. I like the results I've had with it, so I'll continue to develop it."

One example of the effectiveness of his two-handed technique was his performance in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open where he eventually finished sixth after starting the tournament in 53rd after the first round of qualifying. He used the two-handed delivery often in qualifying and match play to negotiate the challenging Senior U.S. Open lane condition eventually finishing sixth. The fruits of his labor with the two-handed delivery paid off again when he bowled a 300 game in qualifying for the PBA50 River Extreme Open to become the first player to bowl a 300 game using a traditional and two-handed delivery in national PBA competition.

Williams led the PBA50 season with 32,480 points, more than 10,000 ahead of 2017 PBA50 Player of the Year Brian LeClair, who finished second with 22,320. Williams also led in earnings with \$42,525 and was third in average with 227.48.

Three-time PBA Tour titlist Eugene McCune won the PBA50 Spectrum Lanes Open which served as a springboard to winning PBA50 Rookie of the Year honors. Bowling in just six tournaments, the 51-year-old hard-throwing right-hander, also had ninth-place finishes in the Suncoast PBA Senior U.S. Open and the JAX 60 Classic and 13th in the USBC Senior Masters that contributed to his 11,070 point total leading rookie contenders.

PBA Hall of Famer Ron Mohr once again dominated competition among players 60 years of age and older to win his fourth consecutive PBA60 Player of the Year Award.

The 63-year-old right-hander won the PBA50 David Small's Championship Lanes Classic for his 11th career PBA50 Tour title and had a string of six top-five finishes in PBA50/60 tournaments plus a sixth-place finish in the PBA60 Dick Weber Championship to end the season.

"It's been an unbelievable year, "said Mohr, a two-time PBA60 titlist who is the only player to win more than one PBA60 tournament since the category began in 2014. "I don't recall ever being on a stretch where I've bowled that consistently well.

"I believe I have some good years left but what does concern me – like every athlete – is the time when you're no longer competitive and you have a decision to make. But for now, I'm still seeing the lane (condition) well and throwing the ball with confidence. Hopefully if I continue to focus on good execution the outcome will take care of itself."

Mohr finished the PBA50 season third in points overall behind Williams and LeClair with 20,575, ranked fifth in average with 222.53 and second in earnings with \$33,440.

PBA50 Tour players will have the opportunity to vote on the PBA50 Dick Weber Sportsmanship award that will be announced later.

Kyle Sherman Claims Lead in FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points Race Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open winner Bill O'Neill moves into second place

CHICAGO – Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri has established himself as the steadiest player on the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour, winning his first PBA Tour title in the PBA-PWBA Storm Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles, finishing 17th in the Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open and adding a fifth-place finish in last weekend's Wilmington Open to take sole possession of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour competition points lead heading into this weekend's Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic in Middletown, Delaware.

Right on Sherman's heels is Chesapeake Open winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, who followed his win in Virginia with an 11th-place finish in Wilmington. For the third week in a row, AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, was in third place. Last week's leader, Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, slipped to fourth and Chesapeake runner-up AJ Chapman of Manchester, Iowa, moved up one spot to fifth.

The biggest moves made earlier this week in Wilmington were by first-time PBA Tour titlist BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pennsylvania, who jumped from 108th to seventh after picking up 2,500 points, and runner-up Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, who climbed into ninth place after ranking 28th the previous week.

The FloBowling PBA Summer Tour points race involves incentives including bonus cash to the top five in the USBC Cup points standings, eight berths in the end-of-summer FloBowling ATX Invite and eight expenses-paid trips to China for the inaugural PBA China Tiger Cup in November. All are part of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour schedule.

The third and final stop on the eastern swing – the Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic – will take place Saturday and Sunday at Mid-County Bowling & Entertainment Center in Middletown, Delaware. Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, is defending champion.

link: <u>https://www.pba.com/SeasonStats/PointsList/132?list=10</u>. Points also play a key role in selection of PBA's 2019 Player and Rookie of the Year, and for entry priority consideration for selected 2020 PBA Tour events.

After the Delaware stop, the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour heads to Coldwater, Ohio, for the PBA Bowlerstore.com Classic presented by Moxy's Xtra Pair at Pla-Mor Lanes. Coldwater will be followed by the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International at Parkside Lanes in Aurora, Illinois, where the PBA Wolf, PBA Bear and Illinois Open titles will be at stake.

The Aurora tripleheader will be the final points event in the Summer Tour leading into the FloBowling ATX Invite at Dart Bowl in Austin, Texas, on Sept. 21. All PBA Summer Tour events except the Illinois Open are Tier 3 events (2,500 points for first place) while the Illinois Open is a Tier 2 event (double the Tier 3 points including 5,000 points for first).

PBA Spare Shots

GO BOWLING! PBA TOUR ROOKIES CONTINUE TO CHASE MYKEL HOLLIMAN Thanks to his runner-up finishing in the USBC Masters, **Mykel Holliman** of Collierville, Tenn., took a comfortable lead in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour's rookie competition points and retained his edge after the first four events of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour.

Holliman, a 26-year-old left-hander, ranked 31st on the overall 2019 PBA Points list, 4,565 points ahead of **Kenneth Ryan** of Farmingdale, N.J., on the list of 2019 Bowl4life PBA Rookie Watch candidates. Wichita's **Patrick Hanrahan** is third among rookies. Also in position to make a challenge are former Teen Masters winners **Mike Coffey** of Melbourne, Fla., and **Greg Young** of Viera, Fla., along with **Jake Rollins** of Glen Rock, N.J. With five title events in the Summer Tour and the U.S. Open remaining, a big finish or two by the leading rookies could re-shape the race.

Competition points won't decide who wins the Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year Award, but that's a key category for consideration in voting to be conducted at the end of the 2019 season. The Rookie of the Year will receive a \$2,500 bonus from **Chuck Gardner**'s Bowl4Life Foundation and the foundation will donate an additional \$2,500 to a youth bowler scholarship in the ROY's name.

WILL THE REAL ZAC/ZACH TACKETT PLEASE STAND UP?

Professional bowling has had a few players over the years who are sometimes mistaken for one another because they share the same name: Walter Ray (and Walter) Williams; Gary Jr. (and Gary) Faulkner; Don (and Don) Johnson among others. The latest additions to the list arose during the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open when Zac and Zach Tackett competed in the same event for the first time. They are not related to each other, but are similar in stature if not in other ways:

• Zac Tackett without an "h" is formally Zachery Tackett, brother of 13-time PBA Tour champion and former Player of the Year EJ Tackett. This Zac turns 23 on Aug. 27. He's 5-foot-10, weighs 165 pounds and is a right-hander player who lives in Huntington, Ind. He is a fourth-year PBA member who won his only title in a PBA Central Region "Challenge" Tournament in Monroe, Mich., in 2019. Zac's bowling hero, he noted, is "probably (Norm) Duke."

• **Zach Tackett** is formally Zachary Tackett who will turn 22 in December. He's 5-foot-9, weighs 165 pounds and is a left-handed two-hander who lives in Virginia Beach, Va. This Zach is a PBA rookie who bowled in the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open, his first tournament as a member. His bowling hero is Jason Belmonte.

BUTTURFF, PATE WIN PAN AM DOUBLES GOLD MEDAL AFTER DISQUALIFICATION

The United States duo of **Jakob Butturff** and **Nick Pate**, both PBA members, were awarded Pan American Games gold medals for men's doubles in the wake of the disqualification of Puerto Rico's **Jean Francisco Perez** after he tested positive for chlorthalidone, a drug on the World Anti-Doping Agency's list of banned substances.

The drug in question is a diuretic frequently used to treat high blood pressure, but one that also can serve as a masking agent, according to WADA. It has no performance-enhancing benefits. Puerto Rico's national bowling team has filed a protest, seeking to overturn the ruling. Perez and partner **Cristian Azcona** had posted a combined 12-game total of 5,816 pins to top Butturff and Pate's 5,545 total.

In the wake of the disqualification, in addition to awarding the gold medals to the Team USA players, Colombia's **Manuel Otalora** and **Alfredo Quintana** moved into second place and Mexico (**Jose Llergo** and **Arturo Quintero**) was awarded the bronze.

PBA REGIONAL UPDATE: MARSALA WINS PBA50 EVENT IN BOWLING GREEN

John Marsala of St. Louis defeated **Ron Profitt** of Brookfield, Ohio, 256-191, to win the 22nd PBA50 Progressive/Gerdeman Insurance-Al Smith Chrysler/Dodge/Jeep Central/Midwest Classic at Al-Mar Lanes in Bowling Green, Ohio, Sunday.

The title was Marsala's first of the year in the PBA Central Region and his second career PBA Regional title. He earned \$3,500 along with his title.

Profitt defeated **Brian LeClair** of Albany, N.Y., 213-202, to advance to the championship match after eliminating **Brad Snell** of Mount Prospect, Ill., 218-203, in the first stepladder match.

• Mark Myers of Phoenix and his non-member partner Greg Thompson Jr. of Tempe, Ariz. posted a 9-3 match play record and a combined 20-game total of 9,543 pins Sunday to win the PBA Tony Reyes Memorial Member/Non-Member Doubles at 4th Street Bowl in San Jose, Calif.

Myers won his first PBA Regional while Thompson, a four-time PBA Regional winner, doesn't get credit for a fifth title because he is no longer a member. The winning team shared the \$4,000 first prize.

Myers and Thompson defeated **Robbie Porter** of Rancho Cordova, Calif. and nonmember **Gary Lenox** of Hillsboro, Ore., who had a 4-8 match play record and 9,455 pins.

The Tony Reyes Memorial is named in honor of the late PBA Tour champion who died in 2012.

• College student **Noah Gallegos** of Golden, Colo.., defeated fellow non-PBA member **Brandon Knowles** from Westminster, Colo., 239-235, to claim his first PBA win and the \$2,500 first prize in the seventh annual PBA Lakewood Storm Southwest Open, presented by New American Funding, at Holiday Lanes in Lakewood, Colo., Sunday.

Gallegos, who has completed two years of study toward a pharmacy degree at McKendree University, finished the qualifying rounds in fourth place, earning a bye until the Round of Eight in the single-elimination match play finals. The son of two-time PBA Regional champion **Steve Gallegos**, Noah started the best-of-three-game match play with a 2-0 win over PWBA player **Jennifer Russo** of Monmouth Junction, N.J., to advance to the semifinal round where he recorded a 241-235 victory over top seed **Kris Koeltzow** from Wheat Ridge, Colo., set up the final match. Knowles overcame former Lakewood winner **Francois Lavoie** of Canada, 221-215, in the other semifinal match.

Newest Titlist BJ Moore Leads PBA Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic Qualifying

Three days after winning his first PBA Tour title, Moore takes aim at back-to-back victories

MIDDLETOWN, Del. (Aug. 17, 2019) – Three days after winning his first Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour title, BJ Moore of Greensburg, Pennsylvania averaged 242.43 Saturday to lead the field of 150 competitors after qualifying in the PBA Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic at Mid-County Bowling and Entertainment Center.

Moore, a 30-year-old seventh-year PBA Tour veteran, rolled games of 225, 229, 298, 267, 215, 259 and 204 for a seven-game total of 1,697 pins for a 72-pin lead over AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, and an 86-pin lead over third-place Zacharay Wilkins, a two-handed player from Canada. Moore won the PBA Wilmington Open Wednesday in North Carolina. Johnson and Wilkins are both trying for their first PBA Tour title.

The Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic is the fifth of 10 events that are part of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour.

Heading into Sunday's final day of action at Mid-County Bowling and Entertainment Center, Denmark's Thomas Larsen was in fourth place with 1,609 pins – two behind Wilkins – and Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, was fifth, two pins behind Larsen.

The Delaware tournament's Sunday schedule begins with the four-game cashers round for the top 50 qualifiers at 9 a.m. The top 12 after 11 games will bowl a 12-game head-to-head match play round at 12:30 p.m. leading into the four-player stepladder finals at 5 p.m. All times are Eastern. Ryan Ciminelli Wins PBA Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic for Eighth Title

Two strikes in 10th frame ends three-year title drought

MIDDLETOWN, Del. (Aug. 18, 2019) – Ryan Ciminelli of Lancaster, South Carolina, defeated top qualifier Tom Daugherty of Riverview, Florida, 217-209, to win his eighth Go Bowling! Professional Bowlers Association Tour title Sunday in the Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic at Mid-County Bowling and Entertainment Center.

Ciminelli, ending a three-year title slump, took an early lead against Daugherty, starting with three strikes and getting help when Daugherty left the 3-6-7-10 split and opened in the fourth frame. But Ciminelli returned the favor, leaving the 4-6-7-9-10 "Greek church" in his ninth frame to give Daugherty a chance to shut him out. When Daugherty failed to strike out, Ciminelli locked up the title with strikes on his first two shots in the 10th frame.

"I really don't know what to say," the 33-year-old left-hander said. "There's a few different reasons why this one means so much to me. What really matters is all the people here watching me win. There were a lot of people who helped me out. I can't thank them enough."

Daugherty, a 44-year-old two-time PBA Tour title winner, took the lead in Sunday's five-game cashers round and systematically won every match he needed to win in the 12-game match play round to secure the top berth for the stepladder finals. But he fell one match shy of picking up his third PBA Tour title.

"Maybe I'll get (Ciminelli) next week in Coldwater (Ohio)," Daugherty said.

In the first stepladder match, Ciminelli threw strikes on his first two shots in the 10th frame to lock out Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Michigan, 224-214. Ciminelli, pursuing his first title since winning the 2016 Parkside Lanes Open in Aurora, Illinois, was nearly perfect in eliminating Canadian two-hander Zacharay Wilkins of Barrie, Ontario, 266-223, in the semifinal match. After a spare in the first frame, Ciminelli threw eight consecutive strikes to deny Wilkins' bid for his first PBA Tour title.

The Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic was the fifth of 10 events that are part of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour.

Ex-Major League Star John Burkett Wins Houston Emerald Bowl Southwest Challenge for First PBA Title

Houston, Texas, (Aug. 20, 2019) – Former Major League Baseball All-Star John Burkett of Southlake, Texas, shot 247 in his final position round match Sunday to win his first PBA Regional title and become the first former Major Leaguer to win a PBA title at any level.

Burkett, 54, won the PBA Houston Emerald Bowl Southwest Challenge, presented by Bowling Dynamix, out-dueled non-PBA member Tyler Wright of Gonzales, La., by 94 pins for the victory after swapping the lead with Wright throughout the match play finals. PBA Challenge tournaments are open to players who have not previously won a PBA title. Burkett, a lifelong bowler dating back to his formative years in the Pittsburgh area, has bowled in PBA Tour and PBA Regional competition for several years, and has been a regular on the PBA50 Tour over the past five years. His best finish in a national tournament was fourth place in the 2015 PBA50 Northern California Classic.

Burkett compiled 166 wins with 1,766 strikeouts and a 4.31 earned run average, pitching from 1987 to 2003 with the San Francisco Giants, Florida Marlins, Texas Rangers, Atlanta Braves and Boston Red Sox. His best season came in 1993 when he went 22–7 with a 3.65 ERA for the Giants. Burkett was selected to the Major League All-Star game twice, in 1993 and 2001.

In the Houston tournament, Burkett held the lead heading into the final match, 64 pins ahead of Jordan Malott, the 15-year-old son of PBA star Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas. Burkett started the final game with four strikes as Malott managed early spares before opening in the third frame. Burkett then coasted to a 247-203 win while Wright regained second place with a 224-203 win over non-member Kaden Rogillio of Deer Park, Texas. Burkett finished the tournament with 4,946 total pins for 21 games, including match play bonus pins, while Wright totaled 4,852, and Malott 4,808.

Next on the PBA Southwest Region schedule will be the PBA Grand Casino/Hotel/Resort Southwest Invitational on September 6 at FireLake Lanes in Shawnee, Okla. Also on tap, a \$4,000 first place prize will be offered at Ayres Lanes in Liberal, Kan., at Ayres' Lanes, September 13-15, followed by an event at Diamond Lanes in Odessa, Texas, that will offer a projected \$5,000 winners check September 20-22.

Kris Prather Paces PBA BowlerStore.com Classic First Round

PBA Playoffs winner rolls 279 final game to top FloBowling PBA Summer Tour qualifiers

COLDWATER, Ohio (Aug. 22, 2019) – Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, continued his torrid pace in a breakout year, rolling a 279 final game Thursday to lead the sold-out field of 96 competitors after the eight-game qualifying round in the PBA BowlerStore.com Classic, presented by Moxy's Xtra Pair, at Pla-Mor Lanes.

Prather, who won his first Go Bowling! EX-MLB ALL-STAR JOHN BURKETT WINS FIRST PBA TITLE IN TEXAS REGIONAL EVENT

Former Major League Baseball All-Star pitcher **John Burkett** of Southlake, Texas, shot 247 in his final position round match Sunday to win his first PBA Regional title and become the first former Major Leaguer to win a PBA title at any level.

Burkett, 54, won the PBA Houston Emerald Bowl Southwest Challenge, presented by Bowling Dynamix, in Houston, Texas, where he out-dueled non-PBA member **Tyler Wright** of Gonzales, La., by 94 pins for the victory after swapping the lead with Wright throughout the match play finals.

PBA Challenge tournaments are open to players who have not previously won a PBA title. Burkett, a lifelong bowler dating back to his formative years in the Pittsburgh area, has bowled in PBA competition for several years, and has been a regular on the PBA50 Tour over the past five years. His best finish in a national tournament was fourth place in the 2015 PBA50 Northern California Classic.

During his 16-year MLB career, Burkett compiled 166 wins with 1,766 strikeouts and a 4.31 earned run average, pitching from 1987 to 2003 with the San Francisco Giants, Florida Marlins, Texas Rangers, Atlanta Braves and Boston Red Sox. His best season came in 1993 when he went 22–7 with a 3.65 ERA for the Giants. Burkett was selected to the Major League All-Star game twice, in 1993 and 2001.

In the Houston tournament, Burkett held a 64-pin lead over **Jordan Malott**, the 15-yearold son of PBA star **Wes Malott** of Pflugerville, Texas. Burkett started the final game with four strikes as Malott managed early spares before opening in the third frame. Burkett then rolled to a 247-203 win while Wright regained second place with a 224-203 win over **Kaden Rogillio** of Deer Park, Texas. Burkett finished the tournament with 4,946 total pins for 21 games, including match play bonus pins, while Wright totaled 4,852, and Malott 4,808.

"The kid's unbelievable," Burkett said of the young Malott. "He looks just like (semiretired PBA Tour titlist) Michael Fagan. He made it tough on me.

"My opponents averaged over 230 in match play, but I still won enough matches to win the event. I don't care what it is; to win something with the PBA name on it makes me very proud," he added.

"Maybe one of these days I'll get a PBA50 Tour title. I've been close, but, man, when I get a good look on the lanes there are also a few PBA Hall of Famers who also have a good look. It's very difficult, but this is something to build on. At least now I know I can do it."

TIMELESS PBA HALL OF FAMER CARMEN SALVINO TO SET PARTICIPATION RECORD - AGAIN

When 85-year-old PBA Hall of Famer **Carmen Salvino** throws his first ball in the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing, presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, Monday at Parkside Lanes in Aurora, Illinois, he'll set the PBA record as the oldest player ever to bowl in a PBA Tour event.

He'll break his own record, set in 2018 when he competed in the PBA Tournament of Champions earlier in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. A founding member of the PBA in 1958, Salvino has bowled in 732 PBA Tour events since competing in the first PBA tournament ever held – the 1959 Empire State Open at Schade's Academy in Albany, N.Y.

The Chicago native won 17 PBA Tour titles and two PBA50 Tour titles during his lengthy career. He will celebrate his 86th birthday on November 23.

MYKEL HOLLIMAN MAINTAINS GO BOWLING! PBA TOUR ROOKIES POINTS LEAD

Despite his 129th place finish in the PBA Gene Carter's Pro Shop Classic over the weekend in Middletown, Del., **Mykel Holliman** of Collierville, Tenn., maintained his comfortable lead in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour's rookie competition points race.

Holliman, a 26-year-old left-hander, didn't move from his 31st position on the overall 2019 PBA Points list. Among players on the 2019 Bowl4life PBA Rookie Watch list, **Kenneth Ryan** of Farmingdale, N.J., is second in 59th place followed by Wichita's **Patrick Hanrahan** (62nd); **Mike Coffey** of Melbourne, Fla. (74th); **Jake Rollins** of Glen Rock, N.J. (76th) and **Greg Young** of Viera, Fla. (78th) on the overall 2019 PBA Tour points list. It's All or Nothing as Tommy Jones Wins PBA BowlerStore.Com Classic

Nineteen-time PBA Tour title winner survives two gutter balls in defeating Sean Rash

COLDWATER, Ohio (Aug. 23, 2019) – For Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, South Carolina, the title match in the PBA BowlerStore.com Classic presented by Moxy's Xtra Pair at Pla-Mor Lanes Friday was an all or nothing affair.

Jones defeated top qualifier Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 215-179, bowling a game that featured eight strikes on his first 10 shots – and gutter balls on the other two attempts. Playing a severe angle that called for throwing the ball to the edge of the gutter in order to strike, Jones twice threw the ball a bit too far.

"I believe I'm the first one to win a title with two gutter balls because I don't think anyone else was dumb enough to do it a second time," Jones said. "There's nothing you can do about it; you just move on to your next shot."

After his first error, Jones converted his spare. On the second, he got nine pins, but the two errant shots cost him enough pins that Rash still had an outside chance to win – despite leaving a 7-10 split on a light pocket hit on his side of the match.

"Tommy bowled a good game. I bowled a good game, but I left a 7-10," Rash said, adding, "Thanks Coldwater" in a good-natured jab at the host center's reputation for being a demanding scoring environment.

"Any time you have a chance to win, it's special," Rash said, "but at the end of the day there's only one winner. I put myself in a position to win. That's all you can ask for. Hats off to Tommy."

In appraising his overall performance in winning his 19th career PBA Tour title, Jones said, "I like to throw it hard and I got to throw it hard this week. We all know Coldwater is a tough place to score, so I think my mindset was right to come in here and throw quality shots."

Jones, a 40-year-old 20-year PBA Tour veteran, has now made it into the championship round at least once in 17 of the past 18 years.

In the first match of the four-man stepladder finals, defending Coldwater champion Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, and Dick Allen of Lancaster, South Carolina, both had their share of struggles to find the strike pocket, but Butturff found it in time, striking on his last four shots to pull out a 205-200 victory.

In the semifinal match, Butturff quickly lost his strike touch, failing to throw consecutive strikes the entire game while Jones threw a double in the fifth and sixth frames, and locked up a 231-184 victory with a string of four strikes starting in the eighth frame.

The FloBowling PBA Summer Tour will complete its nine-event schedule of competition points events with the three-event FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International next Monday through Saturday at Parkside Lanes in Aurora, Illinois. The PBA Wolf, Bear and Illinois Opens, all of which will be live streamed from start to finish on FloBowling, will be the last three events for players to earn points toward the USBC Cup, FloBowling ATX Invite in September and inaugural PBA China Tiger Cup in Shanghai in November. Six Down, Three to Go in FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points Race Non-titlist AJ Johnson moves past Kyler Sherman as PBA Tour heads to Aurora, Illinois

CHICAGO – With six tournaments in the books, the final three tournaments of the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour are set to begin Monday at Parkside Lanes in Aurora, Illinois, just a few miles from new Summer Tour points leader AJ Johnson's hometown of Plainfield. It is shaping up as a dramatic finale to a competition points race loaded with incentives.

Johnson, a 26-year-old fourth-year touring player, has yet to win his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title, but he has had an outstanding summer season, cashing in all six FloBowling PBA Summer Tour events with three top 10 finishes in overtaking previous points leader Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri as the world's best bowlers head into the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International.

With 2,500 points at stake for the winners of the PBA Wolf and PBA Bear Opens in Aurora, and 5,000 points for the Illinois Open titlist to conclude the Summer Swing – plus points of descending value at stake for all other players – the top eight positions are wide open.

To illustrate how important strong performances in each event will be coming down the home stretch, note that Tommy Jones, winner of the PBA BowlerStore.com Classic in Coldwater, Ohio, Friday, advanced from 27th place to sixth place on the Summer Tour points list.

Finishing in the top eight in points means significant rewards:

• The top five will share in a \$40,000 bonus prize fund, with \$20,000 to the points leader;

Anthony Simonsen Gets Boost from 300 Game to Take PBA Wolf Open Lead after First Round

Rash, Belmonte, Duke and Allen round out top five heading into Tuesday's second round

AURORA, Ill. - (Aug. 26, 2019) – Six-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour winner Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, bowled a 300 game and averaged 235.8 on the Professional Bowlers Association's 32-foot Wolf Lane condition Monday to lead the PBA Wolf Open after the first round at Parkside Lanes.

In the first event of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, Simonsen, the 2018 Wolf Open winner, bowled an 1,887 pinfall total with games of 200, 247, 243, 176, 300, 259, 225 and 237 to hold a 21-pin lead over 13-time tour winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, in second with 1,866.

"Three years ago, I wouldn't be looking forward to bowling on this condition," said the 22-year-old Simonsen. "Fortunately, I've been able to learn from my experiences bowling on the shorter lane conditions which has resulted in better equipment choices and adjustments and just more confidence overall."

Rash, who his coming off a runner-up finish in the PBA BowlerStore.com Classic, bowled games of 223, 191, 269, 246, 277, 220, 201 and 239.

Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte finished the round in third with an 1,858 pinfall. The four-time PBA Player of the Year, who is in pursuit of his fifth title of the season, had games of 216, 202, 268, 223, 239, 243, 259 and 208.

Rounding out the top five were PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, in fourth with 1,841 and Dick Allen of Lexington, South Carolina in fifth with 1,840. Both players are trying for a third win this season. The 55-year-old Duke won the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis and Jonesboro Opens earlier this season to become the oldest player to win back-to-back tour titles.

The entire field returns for a six-game qualifying round Tuesday at Noon that will determine the top 18 players who will advance to a cashers round at 5 p.m. The top five players after the cashers round will advance to the stepladder finals at 8:30 p.m. CT.

After Tuesday's Wolf Open stepladder finals, the Summer Swing continues with Bear Open qualifying on Wednesday beginning at 3:30 p.m. The Bear Open will use the same format as the Wolf Open but will be conducted on the 41-foot PBA Bear lane condition.

Based on the combined 28-game qualifying totals from the Wolf and Bear events, the top 24 players will advance to Illinois Open match play, consisting of two eight-game round robin match play rounds on Friday, and the final eight-game round on Saturday morning that will determine the top five players for the Illinois Open stepladder finals at 3:30 p.m.

In addition to titles in each event, the Wolf, Bear and Illinois Open tournaments will award competition points that will decide the five players who will earn bonus cash in the USBC Cup series (\$20,000 first place), the eight players who will receive invitations to participate in the inaugural FloBowling ATX Invite at Dart Bowl in FloBowling's home city, Austin, Texas, on Sept. 21, and the eight bowlers who will win expenses-paid trips to participate in the PBA China Tiger Cup, Nov. 19-21, in Shanghai.

Rash Defeats Simonsen to Win PBA Wolf Open for 14th career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

Rash beats Simonsen 257-193 in title match of first tournament of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing

AURORA, Ill. (Aug. 27, 2019) – In front of a hometown crowd, Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, beat Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, 257-193, in the title match to win the PBA Wolf Open Tuesday at Parkside Lanes for his second Go Bowling! PBA Tour title of the season and the 14th of his career.

In the opening tournament of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, Rash, the No. 3 seed for the finals was able to jump out to the early lead after Simonsen, the No. 1 seed, threw a gutter ball and opened in the third frame. After two spares in the fourth and fifth frames, Rash threw five consecutive strikes which sealed the match win.

Simonsen, who won the 2018 Wolf Open, was trying for his second title of the season after winning the PBA Players Championship in February for his sixth career title and second major.

"Anthony had a couple bad frames and I thought now is my chance to put it away," Rash said. "I just took some deep breaths, refocused and made the good shots I needed to make."

Rash advanced to the title match by beating No. 2 seed PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke in the semifinal 257-227.

"This is the third year we've hosted a tournament (at Parkside Lanes) and I've never made a show," said Rash, who teamed with Matt Ogle to win the PBA Roth-Holman Doubles Championship in January for his first title of the season. "All I can say is it's unbelievable to win here in front of my friends and family – it means a lot."

Rash was coming off a runner-up finish in the PBA BowlerStore.com Classic last week where he lost to Tommy Jones 215-179 in the title match of that tournament.

"There have been some ups and downs but overall it's been a solid season," Rash said. "I've always felt that if I just continued to work hard and believe in myself, good things will happen."

The 55-year-old Duke was trying for his third win of the season and the 41st of his career. He won the Go Bowling! Indianapolis and Jonesboro Opens earlier in the year to become the oldest player to win tour titles back to back.

In the opening stepladder match, Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina beat Greg Young of Viera, Florida, 264-206, to advance to the second stepladder match where he lost to Rash 217-180. Troup was trying for his fourth career title and Young his first.

The FloBowling PBA Summer Swing continues with the first round of qualifying for the PBA Bear Open Wednesday which will be followed by second-round qualifying and cashers rounds Thursday to determine the top five players for the Bear Open stepladder finals at 8:30 p.m. CT.

After the combined 28-game qualifying totals from the Wolf and Bear events, the top 24 players will advance to Illinois Open match play consisting of two eight-game round robin match play rounds on Friday and the final eight-game round Saturday morning. The top five players after 52 games, will advance to the PBA Illinois Open stepladder finals at 3:30 p.m. Saturday.

to Take PBA Bear Open Lead After First Round

Simonsen holds commanding lead in PBA Illinois Open qualifying heading

into Thursday's second Bear Open qualifying round

AURORA, III. (Aug. 28, 2019) – Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri, made the necessary adjustments to a different PBA lane condition averaging nearly 240 for eight games Wednesday to take the PBA Bear Open first-round lead in the second of three events that make up the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International at Parkside Lanes.

Bowling on the 41-foot PBA Bear lane conditioning pattern, the 25-year-old Sherman finished the day with a 1,918 pinfall total with games of 223, 237, 236, 244, 222, 279, 230 and 247 to edge out PBA Wolf Open runner-up Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, finishing the round in second just one pin behind with 1,917.

Sherman, who is in pursuit of his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour individual title, rebounded after a 45th-place finish in the Wolf Open which was conducted on PBA's 32-foot Wolf lane condition.

"I just had to forget about the last two days and clear my mind going into this (Bear Open) tournament," said Sherman who teamed with Amanda Greene to win the Storm PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles in July for his first tour title. "The 230 and 240 games could have been 250 or 260 but I didn't have good finishes in those games, so I left some pins on the table. But overall, I've regained my confidence mentally and with the adjustments I need to make so hopefully this will be a very different tournament for me."

Rounding out the top five were Wolf Open fourth-place finisher Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina in third with 1,886 followed by 2018 Bear Open winner EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, in fourth with 1,835 and four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia in fifth with 1,831.

Wolf Open winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois finished the first round of the Bear Open in 22nd with a 1,750 eight-game pinfall.

The entire field returns for a six-game qualifying round Thursday at Noon CT that will determine the top 18 players who will advance to a six-game cashers round at 5 p.m. The top five players after the cashers round will advance to the Bear Open stepladder finals at 8:30 p.m. CT.

The players are also competing to make the cut to the top 24 for the match play rounds of the PBA Illinois Open.

Based on the combined 28-game qualifying totals from the Wolf and Bear events, the top 24 will advance to Illinois Open match play, consisting of two eight-game match play rounds on Friday beginning at 11 a.m., and the final eight-game round Saturday morning at 11 a.m. that will determine the top five players for the Illinois Open stepladder finals at 3:30 p.m.

Simonsen holds a commanding lead in the Illinois Open standings with a 5,155 pinfall (234 average) for 22 games, 188 pins ahead of Rash in second with 4,967.

Rounding out the top five in Illinois Open qualifying are Troup, 4,961; Francois Lavoie of Canada, 4,921 and Belmonte and Wolf Open third-place finisher PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke tied for fifth with 4,914.

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Simonsen Beats Tackett in Roll-off to Win PBA Bear Open For Seventh Career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

Simonsen beats Tackett in second one-ball roll-off 10-9 after tying 267-267 in title match

AURORA, Ill. (Aug. 29, 2019) – After tying 267-267 in the title match, Anthony Simonsen defeated stepladder finals top seed EJ Tackett 10-9 in a second one-ball roll-off to win the PBA Bear Open Thursday at Parkside Lanes for his second Go Bowling! PBA Tour title of the season and seventh of his career.

In the second tournament of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, Simonsen's win came after a runner-up finish to winner Sean Rash in the PBA Wolf Open Tuesday, the first tournament of the Summer Swing.

Tackett, who finished the title match first, missed a 2 pin on his fill ball in the 10th frame which opened the door for Simonsen who needed two strikes and a nine count on his fill ball to win. Simonsen couldn't take advantage of the opportunity after he got the two strikes leaving the 3-10 split on his fill ball sending the match into overtime. Both players struck on the first roll-off ball forcing another tiebreaker which Simonsen won with a strike after Tackett left a four pin on his shot.

"I was fortunate to get into a roll-off but I didn't get it done on that last shot," said the 22-year-old Simonsen who uses the two-handed delivery. "I threw two good shots in the 10th but I rushed the last shot and it got away from me a little bit. Looking back, I probably should have backed off and taken more time to refocus.

"Once we both struck on the first ball (of the rolloff) I felt I had to get it done the second time because EJ was throwing the ball well too and you're not going to get many chances against a player of his ability, said Simonsen, who was the No. 2 seed for the finals.

Simonsen won the PBA Players Championship in February for his first title of the season to become the youngest player to win two majors.

"When I first started my dream was to win one title by this time in my career but to have seven is unbelievable," Simonsen added."

Tackett was trying for his second title of the season and 14th of his career after winning the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals in July.

The stepladder finals started with No. 5 seed Kyle Sherman, trying for a second tour title, beating No. 4 seed 10-time tour winner Wes Malott 207-191 in the opening match. In the second match, Sherman beat No. 3 seed four-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte 247-237 who was trying for his fifth win of the season and 23rd of his career. Simonsen then went on to beat Sherman 278-225 in the semifinal to advance to the title match.

With the conclusion of Bear Open qualifying earlier in the day, Simonsen led 24 players who advanced to PBA Illinois Open match play with a 6,532 28-game pinfall total (233 average). The Illinois Open is the third and final event of the week-long Summer Swing at Parkside Lanes.

The first of two Illinois Open eight-game round robin match play rounds begin Friday at 11 a.m. CT with the second round at 5 p.m. The final match play round gets underway Saturday morning 11 a.m. which will determine the top five players for the Illinois Open stepladder finals at 3:30 p.m.

The 24 players who advanced to match play will have the added challenge of bowling on the PBA Bear 41-foot lane condition on the left lane and the Wolf 32-foot lane condition on the right lane in each match.

Bear Open Finalists Close in on FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points Lead Two tournaments remain to decide "winners" in race for incentive competition points incentives

AURORA, III. (Aug. 30, 2019) – Sean Rash won the PBA Wolf Open Tuesday to kick off the series of three FloBowling PBA Summer Swing finals, presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, to take the lead in the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour competition points race and he held on despite an assault Thursday by the finalists in the Bear Open.

Rash, who collected his 14th career PBA Tour title and 2,500 points at Parkside Lanes Tuesday, retained first place in points thanks to a 14th-place finish in the Bear Open, but Bear Open winner Anthony Simonsen jumped for 10th to second; previous Summer Tour points leader Kyle Sherman advanced one spot to third and Bear runner-up EJ Tackett advanced from seventh to fourth while AJ Johnson dropped from second to fifth.

With 5,000 points at stake for Saturday's Illinois Open titlist (plus points of descending value at stake for all other players), a significant shakeup in the final FloBowling PBA Summer Tour points rankings is still possible.

The rewards at stake for the competition points leaders include:

• The top five will share in a \$40,000 USBC Cup prize fund, with \$20,000 to the points leader;

• The top eight will be invited to compete for shares of a \$67,000 bonus prize fund in the inaugural FloBowling ATX Invite at Dart Bowl in Austin, Texas, on Sept. 21, where the winner will receive \$25,000;

• The top eight will win expenses-paid trips to Shanghai, China for the inaugural PBA China Tiger Cup. A \$20,000 first prize will be paid to the China Tiger Cup winner. Added money will be at stake in a special challenge match against a team of Chinese players.

Illinois Open prize money also is important because the top eight money-winners for the full 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season through Thursday will earn berths in the second PBA Clash that will take place at the Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales, Florida, on

October 21 for airing on FOX on Nov. 3. Australia's Jason Belmonte can't be caught in the earnings race, but there is plenty of competition for the next seven spots. Fans can follow the 2019 earnings race at this

PBA Spare Shots

AT AGE 22, SIMONSEN BECOMES YOUNGEST TO QUALIFY FOR PBA HALL OF FAME BALLOT...IN 2033

With his victory Thursday in the PBA Bear Open, the second event in the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing, **Anthony Simonsen** of Little Elm, Texas, became the youngest player in PBA history to qualify for eventual placement on the PBA Hall of Fame ballot. The thing is, he has a considerable wait ahead of him.

There are two key qualifiers to become PBA HOF-eligible. First is "title eligibility," which calls for winning a minimum of 10 "standard" PBA Tour titles or five "standard" titles plus two majors. The Bear Open was Simonsen's fifth standard title, won at age 22 years, 235 days. He also has won two majors: the 2016 USBC Masters and the PBA Players Championship earlier this year.

The second qualifier to get on the PBA HOF ballot is 20 years of PBA membership. Assuming he will remain a member, Simonsen will reach his 20-year requirement in 2033.

In that unusual record category, Simonsen displaced **EJ Tackett** of Bluffton, Ind., his victim in Thursday's Bear Open title match. Tackett became HOF "title eligible" when he won the 2017 PBA Tournament of Champions in Shawnee, Okla., at the age of 24 years, 191 days. Tackett, who now owns a total of 13 PBA Tour titles, also is on the wait list for participation eligibility. He'll be on the HOF ballot a year ahead of Simonsen, in 2032.

MYKEL HOLLIMAN TOPS PBA TOUR ROOKIES IN COMPETITION POINTS

Thanks to his runner-up finish in the USBC Masters, 26-year-old **Mykel Holliman** of Collierville, Tenn., continues to pace rookies on the overall 2019 PBA Points list, which is a barometer of how players on the 2019 Bowl4life PBA Rookie Watch list are faring in their first year of PBA Tour competition. The points list will be one of the factors voters consider when they select the 2019 Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year. Other rookies on the watch list are **Kenneth Ryan** of Farmingdale, N.J.; Wichita's **Patrick Hanrahan; Mike Coffey** of Melbourne, Fla.; **Jake Rollins** of Glen Rock, N.J. and **Greg Young** of Viera, Fla. 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Simonsen Retains Slim Lead in FloBowling PBA Illinois Open After Second Round of Match Play

Top five for stepladder finals to be determined after final eight-game match play round Saturday at 11 a.m. CT on FloBowling

AURORA, Ill. (Aug. 30, 2019) – PBA Bear Open winner Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, compiled an 8-7-1 match play record and averaged 220 for 16 games Friday which was good enough to retain a narrow lead after the first two rounds of match play in the FloBowling PBA Illinois Open at Parkside Lanes.

In the pinnacle event of the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, the two-hander finished the day with a 10,306 44-game pinfall total (including 30 bonus pins for each match win) to hold a six-pin lead over 13-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour titlist and Bear Open runner-up EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, in second with a 9-6-1 match play record and 10,300 pinfall. Simonsen beat Tackett in Thursday's dramatic Bear Open title match 10-9 in the second one-ball roll-off after tying 267-267.

The 24 players in the Illinois Open match play field have the added challenge of competing on a mixed lane condition pattern – the Bear 41-foot lane condition on the left lane and the Wolf 32-foot condition on the right lane in each match which puts a premium on the players' ability to adjust, including often using a different ball on each lane.

"Everybody out here on tour has the physical ability but the players who can deal with the mental grind, especially in a tournament like this, are going to have the advantage," said the 22-year-old Simonsen who won the Bear Open for his seventh career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title. "You're using different equipment and playing totally different lines so it kind of multiplies the variables you might normally have to deal with."

In Friday's second match play round Simonsen started strong with games of 279 and 235 but then fell off with games of 193, 177 and 170 before finishing strong with games of 246, 259 and 268.

"It seems like I go through streaks where I'm either bowling well in the middle of the round and not so well at the beginning and end, or like I did tonight, where I'm bowling well at the beginning and end but not in the middle," Simonsen said. "Tomorrow I'll need to string together at least a few good games so I make the show."

The final match play round gets underway Saturday at 11 a.m. CT and will determine the top five players for the Illinois Open stepladder finals at 3:30 p.m.

Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte climbed to third with a 10,238 pinfall helped by an 11-5 record in match play. The 36-year-old four-time PBA Player of the Year is trying for his fifth win of the season and the 23rd of his career.

Rounding out the top five heading into tomorrow's final match play round are 11-time tour winner Bill O'Neill who jumped from 12th after the first match play round finishing with a 11-4-1 record and 10,222 pinfall. Hometown favorite Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, who defeated Simonsen in the title match to win the Wolf Open on Tuesday for his 14th tour title, put together a 10-6 record and finished with a 10,200 pinfall.

Sean Rash Tops USBC Cup, FloBowling PBA Summer Tour Points Races

Jason Sterner advances from 34th place to earn berths in FloBowling ATX Invite, trip to China

AURORA, III. (Aug. 31, 2019) – Jason Sterner's victory in the PBA Illinois Open, the concluding event in the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International, at Parkside Lanes Saturday was not only the most memorable of his 13-year PBA Tour career, but resulted in rewards far beyond his third career title and a \$20,000 payday.

The 35-year-old right-hander, newly-relocated to Rochester, New York, knocked off four future PBA Hall of Fame candidates – Anthony Simonsen, Little Elm, Texas; Sean Rash, Montgomery, Illinois; Jason Belmonte, Australia, and EJ Tackett, Bluffton, Indiana – to also earn 5,000 competition points that allowed him to share in three incentive programs tied to the FloBowling Summer Tour.

For starters, he advanced from 34th place to fourth in the USBC Cup point standings to earn a \$3,000 bonus. By defeating Tackett for the Illinois Open title, Sterner denied Tackett the points he needed to overtake Rash for first place in the USBC Cup points competition. Rash won the USBC Cup, earning a \$20,000 bonus. Tackett finished second for \$10,000, Simonsen was third for \$5,000 and AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, took home the \$2,000 bonus for fifth place.

By qualifying fourth in Summer Tour points, Sterner also earned a berth in the FloBowling ATX Invite that will take place on September 21 at Dart Bowl in Austin, Texas, and pay \$25,000 to the winner along with guaranteed money to all eight qualifiers. Sterner also qualified for an expenses-paid trip to China for the first PBA China Tiger Cup that will take place in suburban Shanghai November 19-21 where another \$20,000 tops the guaranteed money all eight will earn.

There were no major changes among the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour's top eight money-winners who will participate in the second PBA Clash at the Kegel Training Center in Lake Wales, Florida, on October 21. The Clash will air on FOX on Nov. 3. With only money won in the ATX Invite remaining to influence the earnings list, Australia's Jason Belmonte is No. 1 and can't be caught.

Belmonte leads the PBA Tour with \$275,290 in official earnings. He is followed by Jakob Butturff, Tempe, Ariz., \$185,780; Kris Prather, Plainfield, Ill., \$173,990; EJ Tackett, Bluffton, Ind., \$166,695; Anthony Simonsen, Little Elm, Texas, \$155,690; Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa., \$152,148, and Sean Rash, Montgomery, Ill., \$119,170, in seventh place. Norm Duke, Clermont, Fla., is eighth with \$97,415, and could be knocked out of the top eight if Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Mo. (in ninth place with \$78,968) wins the \$20,000 top prize in Austin.

Jason Sterner Wins FloBowling PBA Illinois Open For Third Career Go Bowling! PBA Tour Title

Sterner wins all four stepladder matches and defeats top seed EJ Tackett 243-212 in title match

AURORA, III. (Aug. 31, 2019) – Jason Sterner of Rochester, New York, won all four stepladder final matches, including a 243-212 title match victory over top seed EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, to win the FloBowling PBA Illinois Open Saturday for his third career Go Bowling! PBA Tour title. The Illinois Open was the pinnacle event of the three-tournament FloBowling PBA Summer Swing presented by the Brands of Ebonite International at Parkside Lanes.

In a stepladder final that featured a dual lane condition pattern – PBA 41-foot Bear condition on the left lane and 32-foot Wolf condition on the right lane – both players started the title match with a spare and two strikes but Sterner was able to pull away when Tackett missed a 3-6-10 spare in the fourth frame. Sterner put together four more strikes that ultimately proved too much for Tackett to overcome.

As the No. 5 seed for the finals, Sterner won his position round match in the final match play round against 11-time tour winner Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, 256-199, to make it into the finals.

"I think that (position round) win really relaxed me and put me in a good mindset for the finals," said the 35-year-old Sterner. "I felt fortunate to make the finals, so my attitude was let's throw a lot of strikes and go have some fun."

The win ended a two-year drought for Sterner whose last title came in the PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles (with Birgit Poppler) in July of 2017.

"I had been struggling for a long time, but I made a (ball) grip change about four months ago and made some other physical changes," Sterner said. "My game wasn't evolving the way it should to keep up with the younger guys so I had to make some changes and just committed to them. There was some trial and error but now I'm really confident my game's moving in the right direction."

Sterner opened the stepladder finals with a 248-184 win over No. 4 seed Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, who won the PBA Bear Open on Thursday for his seventh career title.

In the second match, Sterner then beat PBA Wolf Open winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 259-225, to advance to the semifinal match where he beat No. 2 seed two-hander Jason Belmonte of Australia, 236-208, to advance to the title match against Tackett. Tackett was trying for his second win of the season and 14th of his career.

"The win against Jason (Belmonte) gave me a lot of confidence heading into the title match," Sterner said. "I had my share of ugly strikes, but I was thinking just knock 10 pins down, fill the frames and hope the breaks would go my way."

Belmonte, a four-time PBA Player of the Year, was trying for his fifth win of the season and 23rd of his career.

As the points leader for the nine-tournament FloBowling PBA Summer Tour, Rash, whose Wolf Open win was the 14th of his career and second of the season, won the USBC Cup and \$20,000 first prize.

To make the Illinois Open stepladder finals, the five finalists advanced from the 14 games of qualifying in both the PBA Wolf and Bear Opens earlier in the week and then competed in 24 games of match play which also used the dual Wolf and Bear lane conditions.

Denmark's Carsten Hansen Wins PBA-WBT Storm Lucky Larsen Masters Title

Seventh-year PBA member nearly perfect in earning his first PBA Tour title

HELSINGBORG, Sweden (Sept. 8, 2019) – Denmark's Carsten Hansen, a 26-year-old seventh-year Professional Bowlers Association member, was nearly perfect Sunday in defeating American two-handed player Chris Via of Springfield, Ohio, 289-247, to win the PBA International-World Bowling Tour Storm Lucky Larsen Masters at Olympia Bowling for his first PBA Tour title.

Hansen, a PBA member since 2012 and a veteran of several PBA World Series of Bowling since then, dominated the Lucky Larsen Masters. He was the qualifying leader, earned the top berth in the four-man stepladder finals and then threw 10 strikes to start the championship match before missing his chance for a 300 game when he left the 3 pin on his 11th shot.

Hansen won a title in a PBA Regional doubles event in Las Vegas in 2013 but had never finished higher than ninth place in a PBA Tour event (2014 PBA Cheetah Championship).

Via, who also was bowling for his first PBA Tour title, recorded his best career finish after eliminating fellow American players Jake Peters of Henderson, Nevada, in the first stepladder match, 245-238, and Michael Tang of San Francisco, 247-200, in the semifinal match.

The Helsingborg tournament – named in honor of Swedish PBA star Martin Larsen – involved multiple sixgame qualifying squads to arrive at 52 finalists. Qualifiers 17-40 plus 12 other special qualifiers bowled the four-game Step One, with the top 16 advancing to Step Two along with qualifiers 1-18. The 34 players in Step Two bowled a six-game block, with the top 18 advancing to Step Three for another sixgame round. The top four based on 12-game totals from Steps 2 and 3 determined the stepladder finalists.

Anthony Lavery-Spahr Wins Sixth PBA Regional Title in Odessa Southwest Open

Sweden's Jesper Svensson Wins PBA International-WBT Thailand Open Title

Swedish two-hander defeats Sean Rash to end two-year title drought

BANGKOK, Thailand (Sept. 28, 2019) – Sweden's Jesper Svensson defeated Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 211-181, to win the PBA International-WBT Thailand Open at Blu-O Paragon Saturday for his first PBA Tour title since 2017.

Behind a near-perfect start to the final qualifying round to earn the top berth for the Thailand stepladder finals, Svensson, a left-handed two-handed player, picked up his eighth career PBA Tour title along with a \$32,258 first prize.

The 24-year-old Swedish star rolled games of 289, 300, 290, 218, 279 and 195 for a 1,571 pinfall total in the final six-game qualifying round to win the top spot in the stepladder finals by a stunning 217 pins over Rash.

PBA Star Tommy Jones, Former Ownership Partners Mike Slade, Rob Glaser Elected to PBA Hall of Fame

Class of 2020 induction ceremonies set for January 18 in Arlington, Texas

CHICAGO (Oct. 17, 2019) – Nineteen-time title winner Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, South Carolina, and former ownership partners Mike Slade and Rob Glaser have been elected to the Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Fame, PBA Commissioner Tom Clark announced today.

Jones was unanimously elected for superior performance by an elite panel of veteran bowling writers and PBA Hall of Famers. Slade and Glaser were elected for meritorious service by the PBA Hall of Fame Board.

Induction ceremonies of the 2020 Hall of Fame Class will take place on Saturday, Jan. 18, at the International Bowling Museum and Hall of Fame, and the Arlington Hilton, in Arlington, Texas, as part of the PBA Hall of Fame Classic tournament weekend.

Jones, one of five PBA players to win both PBA Rookie (2001-02) and Player of the Year (2005-06) honors, has earned more than \$1.7 million in his 20-year PBA career. The 41-year-old power player owns 17 standard PBA Tour titles plus two majors: the 2006 U.S. Open and 2007 PBA Tournament of Champions. He has finished in the top 10 in annual PBA Tour earnings nine times and has finished in the top five in 47 of the 326 PBA Tour tournaments he entered, cashing in a remarkable 80.3 percent of those events.

An 11-time member of Team USA, Jones also has been on winning teams in PBA League Elias Cup competition three times and was the recipient of the PBA League Mark Roth Most Valuable Player Award in 2017.

"It's one of those things I probably wouldn't have known was coming if I hadn't seen an article about being on the ballot," Jones said of his election to the Hall. "It's a huge honor to be among all of those players who are in the Hall. It's something you dream about all of your life. It'll probably hit me when I'm standing up in front of the crowd to accept."

Defining moments in Jones' career? "For me, it's a combination of things. The U.S. Open title was big and being selected No. 30 among the top 50 players in PBA history (in 2009) as the youngest one (age 30) also was pretty cool for me," Jones said. "The U.S. Open was defining because I bowled so bad the previous year. The Tournament of Champions at Mohegan Sun also was a great win because that's the one title every PBA member wants to win. It's really special to be on that list of winners."

Jones admits his career isn't over; his ultimate goal is to reach 25 PBA Tour titles and that goal is still alive.

"It's not unrealistic," Jones said. "My body is finally healthy again. My back was bad for a while, but now it seems to be good.

"We have a lot more events now, in a lot of different centers, which makes a difference," he continued. "At this point in my career, there isn't a whole lot I haven't seen. One of the reasons this game is so great is that you can never master it. But I figure, with my experience, I may be better prepared than some of the younger guys."

Slade and Glaser will join their original PBA ownership partner, Chris Peters, in the PBA Hall of Fame. All three were former Microsoft executives who combined resources to purchase the PBA in 2000, pulling the organization back from the brink of bankruptcy, and providing the organization with leadership from their board of directors positions and the financial support to remain viable until its recent sale to Bowlero Corp.

Slade's creativity and contacts at ESPN and with leaders in sports media were key assets in advancing the PBA brand and opening doors with new partners including FOX Sports.

Slade began his career at Microsoft in 1983 and spent seven years there in a variety of product marketing roles. In 1993 he was hired as CEO of Starwave, Paul Allen's trailblazing venture into the Internet and multimedia where he launched ESPN.com, NBA.com, NFL.com, NASCAR.com, ABCNews.com and the Go.com network. He retired as Chairman and CEO of Starwave following its sale to the Walt Disney Corp. in 1998.

Slade then served as strategic advisor for Apple Computer CEO Steve Jobs, and as a strategic consultant for ESPN, NBA.com, NFL.com, Starbucks, Real Networks, Disney, and various Paul Allen companies. In 2000, he co-founded the venture capital firm Second Avenue Partners and he became a co-owner and board member of the PBA.

"It's a real honor to be elected," Slade said. "I kind of got involved with the PBA by accident and I wound up being the owner.

"When we left Microsoft, Chris Peters got into bowling instead of golf, and he was really excited about it," Slade reflected. "Then he found out the PBA was about to go out of business, so he approached Rob and me about buying the Tour. I had a sports background; I was once a sportswriter and the company I was affiliated with at the time was involved with a number of sports.

"I had a lot of experience at the intersection of sports and tech(nology), so I was excited to get involved. When we did the deal with ESPN way back when, that was me getting involved.

"We hired good people and we ran the PBA like a real professional sport," Slade added. "We always felt (the PBA) was going to advance in the sports world, but ultimately it needed a bigger plan, so that's why the deal with Bowlero made sense."

Glaser, a New York City native, was the PBA's principle investor financially, largely funding the early 2000's efforts to boost prize funds, regulate TV exposure and further explore arena settings. After a 10-year career in a variety of positions with Microsoft, Glaser founded <u>RealNetworks</u> in 1994, a company that produces <u>RealAudio</u>, <u>RealVideo</u>, <u>RealPlayer</u>, and <u>Helix</u>, among other products and services. A Yale graduate with degrees in Computer Science and Economics, Glaser has been a major donor supporting a wide range of humanitarian causes throughout his career.

"In 1999, my good friend Chris Peters approached me with the opportunity to get involved in what he called "saving the PBA," Glaser said. "I was a lifelong bowler and PBA bowling fan, so I happily said yes.

"It's a true honor (to be elected)," he added. "I have so much respect for the incredible athletes who make up the core of the PBA Hall of Fame. Other than Mike Slade, I am certainly the worst bowler ever elected to the PBA. But the last time I bowled I rolled a 217, so that's something."

In addition to the inductions in Arlington on Jan. 18, the PBA also will present the 2019 Chris Schenkel Player of the Year; Harry Golden Rookie of the Year; Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award winner and PBA Tony Reyes Memorial Community Service Award winner. The winners of those annual awards will be announced later this year.

BELMONTE, O'NEILL SET PACE AT 2019 U.S. OPEN

MOORESVILLE, N.C. - Australia's Jason Belmonte and Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, are longtime friends and like to travel and stay together while competing on the Professional Bowlers Association Tour.

Both scored exceptionally well during the opening round of qualifying at the 2019 U.S. Open, but that's likely not what they talked about at their house Friday afternoon.

Despite being first and second in the first-round standings, they each missed a few spares during the eight-game block at Victory Lanes that left them teetering between satisfaction and frustration.

The two bowled on the first of the day's three squads, and O'Neill was the front-runner heading into the final game. He closed with a 180 game for a 1,771 total, while Belmonte's 192 was enough to land in the lead with 1,777, a 222.13 average.

Their scores were challenged late in the day by past Junior Gold Championships winner Zachary Doty of Nassau, New York, who tossed games of 257 and 265 late in the block, before finishing with 211 to fall just short.

Doty finished the day in third place with a 1,762 total, and he was followed by 2005 U.S. Open champion Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas (1,727), and Shawn Maldonado of Houston and Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, who are tied with 1,722.

Defending champion Dom Barrett of England is tied for 11th place with 1,669.

O'Neill and Belmonte both are happy with how they bowled overall on a challenging 45foot oil pattern, but they're also both experienced enough to know you can't give away pins while competing against the best bowlers in the world, especially at an event like the U.S. Open, where strikes are much harder to come by.

"Getting off to a good start is really important at this tournament, but there is a little bit of a sour taste in my mouth for today to end the way it did," said O'Neill, who owns 11 PBA

Tour titles, including the 2010 U.S. Open for his only major victory. "I missed way too many spares. I missed two 10 pins and a 3-6-10, and that's what I'm thinking about, not how I bowled overall. I'll definitely be shooting some spares on the practice range tomorrow."

The miscues are something they intend to address as they warm up Saturday for their second block of qualifying, but the roommates also know better than to linger too long on such a small piece of the marathon event.

"I'm really happy with a lot of the shots I threw today, but I'm also really frustrated making four really simple errors," said Belmonte, a 22-time PBA Tour champion, including a record 11 major titles. "I missed four spares, and those are the kinds of errors that when I turned up here, I didn't want to make. I was adamant in my practice and leading up to this event and worked really hard to make sure my spare game was sharp. In that regard, I'm a little disappointed in myself, but I'm focused on it not happening again."

All competitors must endure 24 games of qualifying over three days, with each day featuring a different lane condition. Round 2 will take place on a 41-foot oil pattern, and Sunday's third-round challenge will be 37 feet.

By the time O'Neill and Belmonte take the lanes Saturday night, they will have moved on from the things that went wrong Friday and aim to build on what went right.

"Physically, I bowled really, really well, and my picture of the lane was really clear," O'Neill said. "I just couldn't get my ball to go through the pins the right way the last two, and I couldn't really strike. There were a lot of 4 pins and 10 pins, but it was a good day overall and something to build off of."

Each round of the 2019 U.S. Open, leading up to the championship round, is being broadcast live on BowITV.com and simulcast on FloBowling.

After 24 games, the field will be cut to the top 36 for an eight-game cashers' round on a fourth oil pattern, after which, the top 24 will advance to round-robin match play. The 56-game pinfall totals, including bonus pins for each win in match play, will determine the five finalists.

CBS Sports Network will have live coverage of the stepladder finals on Wednesday, Oct. 30 at 8 p.m. Eastern. The winner will take home the coveted green jacket and a \$30,000 top prize.

Having Belmonte as an ally and a few lanes away during qualifying are things O'Neill has learned to use to his advantage. They've found success as doubles partners and they have a friendly rivalry that pushes O'Neill just a little bit harder.

O'Neill is looking for his third Tour title in 2019, while Belmonte is eying a fifth win this season and fifth PBA Player of the Year Award. The U.S. Open is the one major that has eluded Belmonte.

"It really helps to be around someone like Jason, because if you're around someone who's constantly successful, it makes you bowl better and makes you push harder to be successful, too," O'Neill said. "It can work the opposite way, too, so that's something you want to be aware of. We have a good time together and have a great rivalry. He definitely pushes me, and I wouldn't want to travel with anyone else."

The U.S. Open is the final major championship on the 2019 PBA Tour schedule and is conducted jointly by the United States Bowling Congress and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America.

PAST CHAMPION LAVOIE SURGES INTO LEAD AT 2019 U.S. OPEN

MOORESVILLE, N.C. - Bowling's U.S. Open is a test of patience, endurance and versatility.

As a past champion at the event, Canada's Francois Lavoie already has proven himself on one of the most prestigious stages in sports, so it was no surprise to see his rise to the top of the leaderboard Saturday at Victory Lanes.

The 26-year-old right-hander entered the day in a three-way tie for 32nd place, more than 160 pins behind first-round leader Jason Belmonte of Australia, but made light work of the day's 41-foot oil pattern to surge up the standings.

Lavoie rolled games of 225, 265, 290, 258, 251, 227, 207 and 245 on the day's opening squad and set the bar for the rest of the talented 144-player field. His 1,968 total, a 246 average, was 122 pins better than the day's next-closest player and secured him the top overall spot with a 16-game total of 3,579, a 223.69 average.

Seven-time Professional Bowlers Association Tour champion Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, is second with 3,414 and followed by Belmonte (3,395) and Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois (3,392). Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana, and Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, are tied for fifth place with 3,391.

Defending champion Dom Barrett of England is eighth with 3,378, and Verity Crawley, also from England, is the cut number after two rounds with 3,249, an average of 203.06.

"I thought this pattern was the softest of the three and would be my best one, but I couldn't have known I'd have that kind of number on it," Lavoie said. "I didn't really know how people would break it down, but I did expect higher scores, which we saw throughout the house."

Saturday's outstanding performance left Lavoie in a favorable position for a spot among the 36 players who will advance to Monday's cashers' round, but he knows how important it is to focus only on the task at hand.

The final round of qualifying will feature a 37-foot oil pattern, and Lavoie thinks it will be his biggest test of the week. Competition at Victory Lanes will resume Sunday at 8 a.m. Eastern, and Lavoie's final eight-game block will begin at 6 p.m. EDT.

"I'm incredibly happy with today's block, and it puts me in a great position overall for the tournament, but I also understand it's time to move on and prepare for the next pattern, which I think might be the trickiest of the three," Lavoie said. "I've learned a lot from the few times I've bowled in this event, and that includes staying in the moment and taking each day and each pattern one at a time. I think I've done a good job of staying level-headed so far, and I hope to carry that on to the next pattern."

All competitors must endure 24 games of qualifying over three days, with each day featuring a different lane condition.

The basic strategy for navigating the challenging oil patterns at the U.S. Open is to minimize mistakes, keep the ball in the pocket, so anything left is makeable, grind on the patterns that might not suit your style and take full advantage of the ones that do.

Lavoie has epitomized that through two days at Victory Lanes.

On the 45-foot oil pattern in Friday's first round, the three-time PBA Tour champion had four games under 195 and only one game over 230 on the way to a 1,611 total.

For perspective, however, only 38 of the 144 competitors averaged more than 200 for their eight games.

"I felt pretty good about yesterday's block, but there's definitely some shots I'd like to have back," Lavoie said. "I had a couple of low games, but, overall, I think it was a decent score, especially on the first day. That early, you don't necessarily have to lead,

but you want to put yourself in a good spot and do what you need to do to stay in it. I tried not to score watch too much, but I felt like I was in a good spot when it was done."

At the conclusion of Sunday's round, the field will be cut to the top 36 for an eight-game cashers' round on a fourth oil pattern, after which, the top 24 will advance to round-robin match play. The 56-game pinfall totals, including bonus pins for each win in match play, will determine the five finalists.

Each round of the 2019 U.S. Open, leading up to the championship round, is being broadcast live on BowITV.com and simulcast on FloBowling.

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Lavoie's first run at U.S. Open history came at the 2016 event in Las Vegas, where his success over 56 games earned him the No. 2 seed for the stepladder finals.

Despite his rookie status on the PBA Tour at the time, Lavoie was far from green, having enjoyed countless successes, both collegiately at Wichita State University and as a member of Team Canada.

He made history in the semifinal match, becoming the 26th player in PBA competition to roll a televised perfect game. It was the sixth time it happened during a major but was the first at the U.S. Open, which dates back more than seven decades.

His momentum continued into the championship match, and he defeated top-seeded Marshall Kent, 228-194, for his first PBA Tour title. He went on to become the 2016 PBA Rookie of the Year, as well as 2016 PBA Southwest Region Rookie of the Year.

With the few years that have passed since his memorable victory, Lavoie's appreciation for what he accomplished has grown.

"I think the more tournaments I bowl, the more I realize how historic this event is and how special it is to have won it," Lavoie said. "There's something to be said for having quick success, and I think you appreciate it the more you bowl. It has been a while since I've won, and the more events I bowl in, the more I understand how difficult it really is. I've just been really fortunate to have a good start to my career."

SVENSSON, BARRETT AMONG ADVANCERS AT 2019 U.S. OPEN

MOORESVILLE, N.C. - Jesper Svensson of Sweden owns eight Professional Bowlers Association Tour titles, including one major victory, but he's never made the first cut at the U.S. Open.

All of that changed this week at Victory Lanes as he averaged 212 over 24 games to cruise into the cashers' round at the 2019 event.

The 24-year-old left-hander is one of 36 players from the field of 144 competitors to advance, and he'll enter Monday's eight-game cashers' round in fifth place with a 5,088 total.

Canada's Francois Lavoie, the 2016 U.S. Open champion, maintained his lead for the second consecutive day and tops the standings after three rounds with a 5,246 total, a 218.58 average.

Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, is second with 5,154 and followed by Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois (5,128), and Houston's Shawn Maldonado (5,096).

Professional Women's Bowling Association champion Maria José Rodriguez of Colombia held on for the final spot in the cashers' round with a 4,871 total, a 202.96 average. Rodriguez was one of three women in the field this week. England's Verity Crawley also made the cut, finishing in 14th place with a 4,983 effort.

Competition will resume Monday at 10 a.m. Eastern, and the top 24 players after the cashers' round will move on to round-robin match play, which will get underway Monday at 5 p.m. EDT.

Each round of the 2019 U.S. Open, leading up to the championship round, is being broadcast live on BowITV.com and simulcast on FloBowling.

CBS Sports Network will have live coverage of the stepladder finals on Wednesday, Oct. 30 at 8 p.m. Eastern. The winner will take home the coveted green jacket and a \$30,000 top prize.

Defending champion Dom Barrett of England also survived the three-day test and will continue his quest for a second consecutive green jacket.

Barrett qualified 18th overall with a 4,978 total but left Sunday's third round a little frustrated with his performance on the day's 37foot oil pattern.

The 1,600 total was his lowest performance of the week by 69 pins and didn't give him the momentum he was hoping for, but he knows the next portion of the 56-game event will be a fresh start that requires a clear mind and new game plan.

"The tournament really starts with the cashers' round because you bowl the rest of the way on one pattern," Barrett said. "We survived eight games each day on three different patterns, and now we'll have 32 games on one pattern, so the person who figures that one out will be the one who wins."

The 34-year-old right-hander and seven-time PBA Tour champion posted scores of 1,669 on the event-opening 45-foot oil pattern and 1,709 on the 41-foot condition in the second round.

Their invisible opponent the rest of the way will be 40 feet long, and having made the marathon march on multiple occasions - he also was the runner-up in 2015 - he knows what kind of preparation is required.

"I bowled early today, so I'm going to unwind a bit and take it all in," Barrett said. "I battled and came away with pretty good scores the first couple of days, but today was a bit frustrating. It's over, though, and now it's time to focus on what's next. I've got all day to think about my ball selections for the next part of the event, which is helpful."

Svensson is a much different player than he was when he made his U.S. Open debut during his rookie year on the PBA Tour in 2015, and a focus on improving his versatility paid off this week in North Carolina as he successfully handled the three challenging oil patterns.

"The lanes obviously are pretty tough out there, and I feel like I've been bowling really well physically," said Svensson, who is making his fifth U.S. Open appearance. "When you feel like you're throwing a lot of good shots, it's easy to stay in shape mentally as well. I've had a good week so far, but there's still a long way to go. Right now, just to be able to make it through for the first time at the U.S. Open is a big step forward for me."

Svensson admits he has struggled in the past when the lanes were a little more challenging, but failing at times along the way showed him the things he needed to work on.

Rather than be defeated, he worked harder, and it showed this week at Victory Lanes, where he improved each day.

In Friday's opening round, Svensson's 1,571 total left him well below the cutline, but he rebounded with consistent sets of 1,758 and 1,759 on Saturday and Sunday, respectively, to climb the standings.

"I've always been such a terrible grinder, so to be bowling well when the lanes are tough makes me very happy, and I feel good for tomorrow," said Svensson, who won the 2016 PBA Tournament of Champions for his first major title. "After a couple of defeats, you realize what you need to work harder on, and versatility definitely is a key here. The different patterns require different strategies and lane play, and I've been focused on getting more versatile. I think if you work hard, it pays off."

Svensson and Barrett are two of 11 international players who made the first cut Sunday, while Svensson is one of three lefthanders.

Last year, Barrett became the third foreign-born player to win the U.S. Open, joining Finland's Mika Koivuniemi (2001) and Lavoie (2016). The last southpaw to win the event was Rhino Page of Orlando, Florida, in 2017.

For those who survive the cashers' round and advance to match play at the 2019 U.S. Open, competition will continue through Tuesday night, after which the 56-game pinfall totals, including bonus pins for each win in match play, will determine the five TV finalists.

The U.S. Open is the final major championship on the 2019 PBA Tour schedule and is conducted jointly by the United States Bowling Congress and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America.

LAVOIE LEADS AFTER FIRST ROUND OF MATCH PLAY AT 2019 U.S. OPEN

MOORESVILLE, N.C. - The initial roster at the 2019 U.S. Open was pretty stout, filled with the sport's top performers and many upand-coming young standouts.

What's left, now that the field has been cut to the top 24 for round-robin match play, could be mistaken for the first draft of a publication celebrating the greatest players of the Professional Bowlers Association's second 50 years.

Among those remaining in contention for the \$30,000 top prize, coveted green jacket and final major championship on the 2019 PBA Tour schedule are 17 PBA Tour titlists, 12 PBA major champions, including seven past U.S. Open winners, and eight players who have reached the television finals at the prestigious event since it returned from a one-year hiatus in 2015.

The overall lead changed hands a few times during the eight games of match play Monday night at Victory Lanes, and 2016 U.S. Open winner Francois Lavoie of Canada finished the day atop the standings with an 8,729 total. His score includes pinfall for 40 games and 30 bonus pins for each of his six wins in match play.

Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, is second with 8,694 and followed by Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania (8,668), lefthander Jesper Svensson of Sweden (8,588) and Houston's Shawn Maldonado (8,574).

"Keeping the momentum going tomorrow will be about staying smart and patient," Lavoie said. "I think I have a good process and routine, and sticking to what I've been doing is key. It's kind of repetitive, but that's what it is. You don't want to get ahead of yourself. You want to take every frame separately, one at a time, especially with a pattern this tough."

The biggest move of the day came from Brandon Novak of Chillicothe, Ohio, who averaged more than 220 on the way to a 6-2 record. He started match play in 21st place and now is sixth in the standings, just 37 pins below the cutline.

The 31-year-old right-hander is one of the seven remaining players without a PBA Tour title. Monday night's performance left him comfortable and confident on the 40-foot oil pattern being used for the cashers' round, match play and championship round.

"I'm feeling pretty confident with the pattern, and even though the initial idea was to start a little straighter, that wasn't really the right place for me, so I moved in and played the dry most of the eight games and was able to stay with the same ball," said Novak, the Regular All-Events champion at the 2016 United States Bowling Congress Open Championships. "I did make a few small mistakes, otherwise I could've bowled better some of the games, but I definitely feel good going into tomorrow. Hopefully, I can make something happen."

Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, was the qualifying leader after Monday's eight-game cashers' round, averaging nearly 214 over the event's first 32 games. He closed the cashers' round with games of 253 and 268 to surge into the lead for the first time this week.

Despite only going 1-7 in his first eight matches, the two-time major champion is in ninth place and just 61 pins outside of the top five. With 16 games remaining, there's only 95 pins between fifth and 10th place.

Defending champion Dom Barrett of England also advanced to match play. He posted a 2-6 match-play record and currently is 21st in the standings with an 8,316 total. He's looking to make his third U.S. Open telecast since 2015. He was the runner-up that year, falling to left-hander Ryan Ciminelli in the title match.

Competition at the 2019 U.S. Open will resume Tuesday with two additional rounds of matches, beginning at 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. Eastern.

At the conclusion of the evening block, 56-game pinfall totals, including bonus pins, will determine the five players for the stepladder finals, which will be broadcast live on CBS Sports Network on Wednesday at 8 p.m. EDT.

The field this week started with 144 players, all of whom bowled 24 games of qualifying over three days (eight games each day). Each round featured a different oil pattern, and a fourth lane condition was introduced for the cashers' round, match play and championship round.

All rounds leading up to the TV show are being broadcast live at BowITV.com and simulcast on FloBowling.

The U.S. Open is conducted jointly by the USBC and Bowling Proprietors' Association of America.

RASH EARNS TOP SEED FOR STEPLADDER AT 2019 U.S. OPEN

MOORESVILLE, N.C. - After 56 games over five days, five competitors have advanced to the championship round of the 2019 U.S. Open.

The quintet conquered four challenging oil patterns at Victory Lanes and now will battle for the \$30,000 top prize, coveted green jacket and final major championship on the 2019 Professional Bowlers Association Tour schedule live on CBS Sports Network on Wednesday at 8 p.m. Eastern.

The standings seemed to be on a continuous spin cycle throughout the final round of match play Tuesday evening, with three different people topping the leaderboard during the eight-game block.

Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, a 14-time PBA Tour champion, spent the most time out in front and held a 60-pin advantage over 2016 U.S. Open champion Francois Lavoie of Canada heading into the day-ending position round.

Though Lavoie was able to win the position-round matchup, 217-211, Rash had enough of a lead to claim the top seed for the TV stepladder by 24 pins.

Lavoie held on for the No. 2 spot, which is the same place he qualified the year he won. He and Rash will be joined on the show by Australia's Jason Belmonte, Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, and Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas. All five are major champions.

"I have one game to bowl for a title, which is something I've done six, seven or eight times this year, and it's a great feeling," said Rash, who was the No. 1 seed for both of his major titles - the 2007 United States Bowling Congress Masters and 2012 PBA Tournament of Champions. "There's four unbelievable players on the show with me, all major champions, so it's going to be an amazing show. I'm extremely happy right now, but there's still so much left to do."

Rash, who set the pace through 32 games of qualifying and led the final 24 players into the match-play portion of the event, finished with a 56-game pinfall total of 12,379, which included 30 bonus pins for each of his 12 wins in match play. He started match play with seven consecutive losses.

Lavoie finished with a 12,355 total, Belmonte closed with a 266-233 win over Houston's Shawn Maldonado to jump from fifth place to third (12,312), O'Neill finished with 12,303 and Simonsen held on to the final spot with 12,261, just 27 pins ahead of Maldonado.

"Tonight was very much needed and something I felt was coming," said Belmonte, a 22time PBA Tour champion. "I finished the second round with 279 and realized that game put me back in contention. I was about 100 out of the show and thought I could get there with a couple good games in a row. Through the middle of the last block, I did some of the best bowling I've done in a really long time."

The star-studded stepladder includes some amazing storylines.

Rash is looking for his third title of 2019 and third career major. A win would make Lavoie the first foreign-born player to win the event twice, while he and O'Neill, the 2010 winner, both have a chance to become the 12th bowler in history to win multiple times.

Belmonte and Simonsen both have found the winner's circle in majors this season. Belmonte won the PBA Tournament of Champions and PBA World Series of Bowling X PBA World Championship, and he was the runner-up to Simonsen at the 2019 PBA Players Championship.

Belmonte's win at the 2019 PBA World Championship was the 11th major victory of his career and moved him past PBA Hall of Famers Earl Anthony and Pete Weber on the all-time list. They each own 10 major titles.

Simonsen, who along with O'Neill has won twice this year, is looking to become the youngest player with three majors - he also won the 2016 Masters - and Belmonte is hoping to extend his record. The U.S. Open is the major that has eluded him. The Australian's best finish at the event was a second-place effort in 2013.

"This has put me in a position to have a crack at No. 12, and I'm excited and nervous and can't wait to get out there and leave it all on the lanes," said Belmonte, a four-time champion in 2019. "I'll give it everything I've got, and if the pins want to fall, it'll be my year. I know there will be plenty more U.S. Opens, but I'm kind of hoping they fall for me this time."

Defending champion Dom Barrett of England also made match play this week and finished 14th, one spot ahead of 2017 champion Rhino Page of Orlando, Florida.

The field this week started with 144 players, all of whom bowled 24 games of qualifying over three days (eight games each day). Each round featured a different oil pattern, and a fourth lane condition was introduced for the cashers' round, match play and championship round.

CANADA'S LAVOIE WINS 2019 U.S. OPEN

MOORESVILLE, N.C. - For the second time in his short professional career, Canada's Francois Lavoie donned the coveted green jacket at the U.S. Open.

The 26-year-old right-hander defeated 14-time Professional Bowlers Association Tour champion and top seed Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, 221-172, on Wednesday night to become the 12th bowler in history to win the prestigious title multiple times.

His first time hoisting the U.S. Open trophy was in 2016 on the way to PBA Rookie of the Year honors.

The latest win gave Lavoie his fourth PBA Tour title and made the fourth-year professional the first foreign-born player to win the U.S. Open more than once. Finland's Mika Koivuniemi (2001) and Dom Barrett of England (2018) also have won the event.

Wednesday's star-studded stepladder at Victory Lanes was broadcast live on CBS Sports Network.

Along with the iconic outerwear, Lavoie also earned a \$30,000 top prize. The U.S. Open was the fifth, and final, major of the 2019 PBA Tour season. The win was Lavoie's first since 2017.

"This is so surreal, and I don't even know where to begin," Lavoie said. "To win the first one was unbelievable and a dream come true. Winning the second one, wow. Especially with the way the season started, I never could've expected this. It's not something you think will happen again, and definitely not this year of all years. I feel so fortunate."

Lavoie started the final match with five consecutive strikes and cruised to the title. Rash opened with a strike but did not throw another until the ninth frame when his third major title already was out of reach.

Rash was in a familiar position as the No. 1 seed, having won the 2007 United States Bowling Congress Masters and 2012 PBA Tournament of Champions from there.

"I'm great, honestly," Rash said. "I led the U.S. Open, which is a dream come true. I've always wanted to make this show. Frankie bowled unbelievable. He started with the front five on a pair that was extremely brutal. He's a two-time champion at this event for a reason. It was a great performance, and he out-bowled me. I'm happy with my preparation and thought process and everything that was going on. I have no regrets from today, and I feel like this still was one of my best seasons overall."

Despite the loss, Rash indeed is winding down one of his best seasons in a career that began in 2005. His 2019 campaign includes two titles and more than \$145,000 in earnings. He took home \$15,000 for Wednesday's runner-up finish.

In the night's four matches, there only were three strings of strikes longer than a double, and Lavoie had two of them on what he considered the most challenging of the week's four oil patterns.

His keys to success on all the patterns were surface management and different hand positions.

"I wasn't ever really comfortable on this pattern for the 32 games we bowled on it, and going into match play, I was pretty nervous about holding onto a spot on the show for another 24 games," said Lavoie, who averaged less than 200 for his first eight games on the week's final oil pattern. "I had a hard time getting my hand to do what I wanted to get the right ball motion, but we stuck with it and stayed in it. Throwing the front five in the final game was huge, especially since our plan was just to try to hit the 1-3 every time. That pair was really hard."

On the way to his first U.S. Open title in Las Vegas, Lavoie also managed to string strikes in what is considered one of the sport's toughest environments. That year, he also was the second seed and advanced to the title match by becoming the first bowler in history to roll a perfect game on a U.S. Open television show.

Lavoie rolled into this year's championship match simply by filling frames, another key to success on the demanding conditions at the U.S. Open.

The Team Canada member posted a clean 214-164 win against two-time major champion Anthony Simonsen, 22, of Little Elm, Texas, who was looking to earn his eighth PBA Tour title and become the youngest player to win three majors.

Simonsen, who won the 2016 USBC Masters and 2019 PBA Players Championship, advanced to Wednesday's semifinal with a 187-148 win against 11-time major champion and 2019 PBA Player of the Year front-runner Jason Belmonte of Australia.

After three solid shots to start the match, Belmonte failed to get more than six pins on four of his next five first balls. The 36-year-old two-hander tried everything to get back in the match, including a switch to a urethane ball in the seventh frame and moving from the left side of the lane to the right.

The move worked on the right lane, but the 22-time PBA Tour champion split twice on the left lane, including the 2-8-10 combination in his final frame. A missed 10 pin from Simonsen in the ninth frame gave Belmonte an opportunity to at least force Simonsen to mark, but the final split ended his chances for a fifth title in 2019.

A win Wednesday would've given Belmonte his first U.S. Open title, and he would've joined USBC and PBA Hall of Famer Mike Aulby as the only players to win the Super Slam.

Belmonte has four wins at the USBC Masters, three PBA Tournament of Champions titles, two victories at the PBA World Championship and two wins at the PBA Players Championship.

His 148 game was the lowest he has bowled on TV. His previous low came in a 214-156 loss to Wes Malott in the title match of the 2013 U.S. Open.

In Wednesday's opening match, neither Simonsen nor Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania, looked immediately comfortable on the fresh 40-foot oil pattern, but two rolled 10 pins early in the game gave Simonsen a small advantage over O'Neill, who didn't deliver his first strike until the fifth frame.

A 2-8-10 split from O'Neill in the sixth frame widened the deficit, and Simonsen followed the first commercial break with four consecutive strikes to pull away for a 226-193 victory.

O'Neill, the 2010 U.S. Open winner, also was looking to become the 12th bowler in history to win the event multiple times. The 38-year-old right-hander owns 11 PBA Tour titles, including two this season.

Belmonte, Butturff, O'Neill, Prather, Tackett, Simonsen, Rash and Duke compete for \$50,000 winner-take-all first prize in second eliminator showdown

LAKE WALES, Fla. (Oct. 31, 2019) – The top eight money earners from the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season will battle for a \$50,000 winner-take-all first prize when the second edition of the PBA Clash airs on FOX Sunday from the renowned Kegel Training Center.

Four-time PBA Player of the Year and 22-time Go Bowling! PBA Tour titlist Jason Belmonte of Australia leads an elite field that also includes 2019 standouts Jakob Butturff, Bill O'Neill, Kris Prather, EJ Tackett, Anthony Simonsen, Sean Rash and PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke.

As a preamble to the 2020 season on FOX Sports, competition begins Sunday with "eliminator" rounds leading up to a full-game championship match between the two survivors. In the first round, all eight players beginning with the No. 8 qualifier will bowl a 10th frame. The player with the lowest pinfall will be eliminated. The non-title special event converts to a one-ball format for rounds 2-6 with the player rolling the lowest pinfall eliminated until the surviving two players are determined for the championship match.

All competition will be conducted on a mixed (or dual) lane condition – 44-foot PBA Billy Hardwick lane condition on the left lane and 37-foot Johnny Petraglia lane condition on the right lane.

The PBA Clash airs on FOX adjacent to the NFL Singleheader on Sunday, Nov. 3 (2:30 p.m. ET or 4:30 p.m. ET) depending on region. Viewers should check their local listings for air times in their areas.

Here's a look at the eight competitors along with their season highlights:

Jason Belmonte, Australia – Making his second Clash appearance, the two-hander from Australia and four-time PBA Player of the Year, won the 2019 PBA Tournament of Champions and PBA World Championship earlier this year for his 10th and 11th PBA Tour major victories to top the all-time major titles list. With nine television appearances in 2019 that also included a runner-up finish in the PBA Players Championship, the only four-time winner this season also won the Chameleon Championship and DHC Japan Invitational to bring his career titles total to 22.

Jakob Butturff, Tempe, Arizona – With three wins and eight television appearances in 2019, the seven-time tour champion won the PBA Oklahoma Open, Lubbock Sports Shootout and USBC Masters for his first major title. Making his second Clash appearance, the 25-year-old left-hander also was runner-up in the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic, the DHC PBA Japan Invitational and PBA World Championship.

Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pennsylvania – With six television appearances, the inaugural PBA Playoffs runner-up won the season-opening PBA Hall of Fame Classic and the Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open for his 10th and 11th career titles. He won the \$25,000 first prize in the FloBowling PBA ATX Invite, a non-title event, and finished third in the PBA Scorpion Championship and fourth in the PBA World Championship.

Kris Prather, Plainfield, Illinois – Won the inaugural PBA Playoffs and a \$100,000 first prize in July. Also won the PBA Scorpion Championship for his first Go Bowling! PBA Tour title. Had eight top-10 finishes in 2019 including a third in the Storm PBA/PWBA Striking Against Breast Cancer Mixed Doubles, fourth in the Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open and fifth in the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals.

EJ Tackett, Bluffton, Indiana – Won his second Barbasol PBA Tour Finals in 2019 for his 13th career tour title. Making his second Clash appearance, he has five television appearances this season which also included runner-up finishes in the PBA Tournament of Champions, Bear Open and FloBowling PBA Illinois Open.

Anthony Simonsen, Little Elm, Texas – Also qualifying for his second Clash, the 22-year-old twohander won the 2019 PBA Players Championship to become the youngest player ever to win two majors. He also won the PBA Bear Open for his seventh career tour title. Among his five other television appearances were a runner-up finish in the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Open and a tie for third in the Barbasol PBA Tour Finals. **Sean Rash, Montgomery, Illinois** – Won the Mark Roth-Marshall Holman PBA Doubles Championship with Matt Ogle and the PBA Wolf Open for his second win of the season and 14th of his career. The 2011-12 PBA Player of the Year also had runner-up finishes in the PBA Wilmington Open, Lubbock Sports Open and PBA Bowlerstore.com Classic. He also won the USBC Cup as the FloBowling PBA Summer Swing points winner, which netted him \$20,000.

Norm Duke, Clermont, Florida – Landmark season for the 55-year-old PBA Hall of Famer included winning the Go Bowling! PBA Indianapolis and Go Bowling! PBA Jonesboro Opens to become the oldest player to win back-to-back PBA Tour titles. The Jonesboro win was the 40th of his career as he joined all-time PBA Tour title winners and fellow Hall of Famers Walter Ray Williams Jr. (47) and Earl Anthony (43) as the third player to win 40 or more PBA Tour titles.

Marshall Kent won the 2018 PBA Clash at the Kegel Training Center with a 218-215 championship match win over Dom Barrett to win the \$25,000 first prize. Neither player qualified for the 2019 PBA Clash.

The 2020 PBA Tour season begins with the PBA Hall of Fame Classic Jan. 14-19 at the Bowling International Training Center in Arlington, Texas. The stepladder finals will air live on FS1 Sunday, Jan. 19 at 1 p.m. ET.

Jakob Butturff Shrugs Off Errant Shot to Win \$50,000 Winner-Take-All Prize in 2019 PBA Clash

Arizona left-hander defeats EJ Tackett, six other top earners from 2019 season in FOX Sports telecast

LAKE WALES, Fla. (Nov. 3, 2019) – Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, outlasted seven other top money earners from the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season and defeated EJ Tackett of Bluffton, Indiana, in the championship match to win the \$50,000 winner-take-all prize in the second PBA Clash which aired Sunday on FOX Sports from the Kegel Training Center.

The 25-year-old left-hander, who has won three titles in 2019 including the USBC Masters for his first major, got off to an inauspicious start in the championship match, throwing a gutter in the first frame. He learned from his mistake, converted the spare, and threw strikes in nine of his next 11 shots to beat Tackett, the 2019 Barbasol PBA Tour Finals winner, 258-244, for the win.

"If I'm executing the way I should, throwing the ball out to the gutter is my best look and where I get the best results," said Butturff. "Obviously you don't want to throw it (into the gutter) in a critical situation but if it's going to happen that's the place to do it because you have time to recover."

The eliminator format event showcased the season's top eight money earners from the 2019 season concluding with the FloBowling ATX Invite in September. In addition to Butturff and Tackett, other players earning berths in the non-title special event were Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte, Sean Rash, Anthony Simonsen, Kris Prather, Bill O'Neill and 55-year-old PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke.

Competition began with all eight bowlers completing a 10th frame opening round with the low score eliminated. The seven remaining players then bowled subsequent rounds which consisted of a one-ball, low-man-out format. The two survivors advanced to the complete-game winner-take-all finale.

After the 10th frame round, Prather, the winner of the \$100,000 first prize in the inaugural PBA Playoffs in June, was eliminated with a nine-count for the frame after leaving the 2-8 and failing to convert the spare.

Butturff faced early elimination in the 10th frame round after leaving 2-4-6-7-10 split on his first ball, but he converted the spare and struck on the final ball to advance to the second elimination round.

"It was a bad shot; I thought it was the end of the tournament for me," said Butturff, who was eliminated late in the one-ball elimination round of the inaugural Clash in 2018. "If I make the spare, it's probably going to be the most difficult spare I've made on TV so I told Kris (Prather) it would be awesome for the TV show if I can make it. You have nothing to lose at that point so the pressure's off – just take your best shot and hope for the best." In the one-ball elimination that made up rounds 2-6, Tackett and Butturff were the last two players left standing with a strike and nine-count, respectively. They outscored 2019 PBA Players Championship winner Anthony Simonsen in the sixth round after he could only manage seven pins, leaving the 3-6-10.

Duke was eliminated in Round 2 with a seven-count after four roll-offs. O'Neill was eliminated in Round 3, which also required four roll-offs, with nine. Rash was eliminated in Round 4 with eight, and Belmonte was eliminated in Round 5 after two roll-off frames, with nine.

"A format like this really tests your ability to think on the fly so you can give yourself the best opportunity to perform in the clutch," said Butturff, who has had issues missing easy spares at critical times in matches in the past. "In the early rounds your mindset is 'don't do worse than they did' but eventually that changes to putting pressure on your opponent when you bowl head-to-head in a title match."

"You had eight guys who got here because of their ability to come through in clutch situations," Butturff added. "It can be nerve-racking but this is what I love to do so you just get into competitive mode and get the job done."

The 2020 PBA Tour season begins with the PBA Hall of Fame Classic Jan. 14-19 at the International Training and Research Center on the International Bowling Campus in Arlington, Texas. The stepladder finals will air live on FS1 on Sunday, Jan. 19 at 1 p.m. ET.

JAKOB BUTTURFF NEWS: A UNIQUE TROPHY AND AN UNEXPECTED SETBACK Unorthodox left-hander **Jakob Butturff** of Tempe, Ariz., made PBA news for a couple of different reasons over the past couple of weeks.

25 Years Later, Joe Firpo Wins PBA50 Gastonia Southern Open

Gastonia, N.C. (November 10, 2019) – A quarter of a century later, Joe Firpo of Tucker, Ga., defeated Gary Shultis of Levittown, N.Y., 258-214, to win a PBA Regional tournament for the fourth time when he won the PBA50 Gastonia Southern Open presented by Brunswick at George Pappas Liberty Lanes Sunday.

Firpo, who won \$2,000, recorded his fourth PBA Regional victory 25 years after winning in Tallahassee, Fla., in 1994. Firpo also owns a PBA Tour title, teaming with Del Warren to win the 1987 Showboat PBA Doubles Classic in Las Vegas, but because the now 54-year-old dropped his PBA membership 15 years ago, he doesn't get credit for another PBA title for his Gastonia win.

In the semifinal round Firpo easily disposed of Ken Shealy of Myrtle Beach, S.C., 227-190, while Shultis made it to the championship match for a third consecutive year by defeating Bill Vannoy of Lexington, S.C., 275-248. Shultis, who had won at Liberty Lanes three times in the past, pocketed 1,000 as the runner-up.

VISA DELAY FORCES EJ TACKETT OUT OF TRIP TO COMPETE IN PBA CHINA TIGER CUP

Former PBA Rookie and Player of the Year **EJ Tackett** has been forced to cancel plans to compete in next week's PBA China Tiger Cup in suburban Shanghai, China, because of a delay in obtaining a visa in time to make the trip.

Tackett was scheduled to be part of an eight-player PBA contingent competing in the PBA's first-ever competition in mainland China. The invitational China Cup field, based on competition points earned during the FloBowling PBA Summer Tour, will include **Sean Rash, Jason Sterner, AJ Johnson, Bill O'Neill, Kyle Sherman,** newly-elected PBA Hall of Famer **Tommy Jones** and **Kyle Troup**, who will replace **Anthony Simonsen.** Simonsen declined his invitation due to a prior commitment, but Tackett's spot in the field won't be filled due to time constraints.

The tournament will now include seven PBA Tour players who have earned expenses-paid trips to China. The PBA qualifiers will join a contingent of bowlers from China, Korean, Japan and other Asian countries in a singles tournament with a \$20,000 first prize. A special USA vs. China team event will conclude the event.

WESLEY LOW TO BEGIN CHASING PBA DREAMS

The widely anticipated arrival of **Wesley Low Jr.** to the PBA ranks will begin in January when the highly decorated two-handed left-hander begins his quest for 2020 PBA Rookie of the Year honors.

Low, now 22 and a graduate of the famous Wichita State University collegiate program, was the youngest bowler ever to win a PBA Regional tournament when he won a PBA West Region "challenge" event for non-title winners in Las Vegas in 2013 at the age of 15 years, 336 days. He didn't get credit for an official title because he was not a PBA member at the time.

He also was the second-youngest player ever to "cash" in a PBA Regional when he finished third in the same non-champions event in Las Vegas the previous year at age 14. The youngest casher record is held by 2018 PBA Rookie of the Year **Kamron Doyle** who was 12 when he "cashed" in a PBA Regional in Canton, Ga., in 2010. In both cases, Low and Doyle competed as youth bowlers and accepted prize money in the form of contributions to their SMART scholarship funds.

Low, who has achieved success at virtually every level of youth and collegiate bowling leading up to his PBA debut, announced he will begin chasing his PBA dreams in an interview with FloBowling Senior Editor Lucas Wiseman (https://www.flobowling.com/video/6598050-wesley-low-talks-about-chasing-his-pba-dreams).

The Palmdale, Calif., resident said, "I'm nervous but excited. I'll probably be humbled for a bit. I'd like to go on to great success, but there's no guarantee."

Sean Rash Wins Historic PBA China Tiger Cup in 2019 PBA Tour Season Finale

Fourteen-time PBA Tour champion sweeps fellow American AJ Johnson in best-ofthree-game title match

SUZHOU, China– Sean Rash, a 14-time Professional Bowlers Association Tour title winner, added another unique accomplishment to his portfolio when he swept fellow American PBA member AJ Johnson in a best-of-three-game title match to win the historic PBA China Tiger Cup at Suzhou Tiger Bowl, the first PBA event ever held in China.

Rash, from Montgomery, Illinois, defeated Johnson, from nearby Oswego, 211-194 and 227-207 for the title. Rash's conversion of the 2-4-8-10 split in the ninth frame to win game one was the pivotal shot in the match.

The two Illinois bowlers were part of a seven-player PBA delegation that bowled in a single-elimination match play event that also included nine PBA members from China and Chinese Hong Kong. Rash collected \$20,000 for his win; Johnson received \$10,000 as runner-up.

The finals were livestreamed Tuesday on FloBowling.com by the PBA's online streaming partner. The finals also are available in the FloBowling archive.

The tournament was an out-growth of a movement that began early in the current decade when China expressed interest in developing bowlers as PBA-level competitors. The PBA invited a contingent of Chinese bowlers who had established bowling averages of 200 and higher to participate in the 2014 PBA World Series of Bowling in Las Vegas. That experience, along with continuing conversations between PBA Commissioner Tom Clark and China's Frank Zhao, founder and president of Longmarch Bowling, eventually led to the inaugural China Tiger Cup tournament.

The American PBA players were invited based upon competition points earned during the 2019 FloBowling PBA Summer Tour. Joining Rash and Johnson were Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri; Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, South Carolina; Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pennsylvania; Jason Sterner of Rochester, New York, and Kyle Troup of Taylorsville, North Carolina.

The American players were seeded into a 16-player match play elimination round against nine Chinese representatives who earned their berths in a preliminary qualifying event involving nearly 100 players from China, Chinese Hong Kong, Chinese Taipei, Malaysia and Korea.

The Chinese players demonstrated how far they have advanced in less than 10 years, winning five of the eight first-round matches and eliminating American stars Troup, Jones and Sterner in the process. Rash advanced to the title match by eliminating a pair of Chinese representatives in 2-0 sweeps while Johnson ousted fellow U.S. players O'Neill and Sherman, also winning both matches without losing a game.

The PBA China Tiger Cup was the final event of the 2019 Go Bowling! PBA Tour season. The PBA Tour will be idle until it kicks off its 2020 schedule with the PBA Hall of Fame Classic in Arlington, Texas, in January.

Jason Belmonte Wins Fifth Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year Award

Tennessee's Mykel Holliman named top rookie; Chuck Gardner, Martin Larsen also honored

AUSTIN, Texas (Dec. 11, 2019) – Australia's Jason Belmonte was the overwhelming choice as 2019 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year for a fifth time, Professional Bowlers Association CEO Colie Edison and PBA Commissioner Tom Clark announced in a special FloBowling livestreaming event Wednesday from FloSports headquarters in Austin, Texas.

In addition, Mykel Holliman of Collierville, Tennessee, was recognized as 2019 Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year; Bowl 4 Life founder Chuck Gardner of Charlotte, North Carolina, was named recipient of the 2019 Tony Reyes PBA Community Service Award, and Sweden's Martin Larsen became the first international player selected by his peers as winner of the Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award twice.

Belmonte, 36, not only had another dominant season to earn Player of the Year honors, but continued his assault on the PBA record book, winning the PBA Tournament of Champions for a record-tying third time and then winning the PBA World Championship to set the PBA record with 11 career major titles. He also became the first player to reach the championship finals in four majors in a single season for the second time, finishing second in the PBA Players Championship and fourth in the U.S. Open to equal a feat he first accomplished in 2013.

The Australian two-handed star was the only player to win four Go Bowling! PBA Tour titles in 2019, led the PBA Tour in earnings (\$288,290) and competition points, and finished in the top five 12 times in the 18 tournaments he entered. In addition to his two majors, Belmonte also won the DHC PBA Japan Invitational and the PBA Chameleon Championship during PBA World Series of Bowling X to improve his PBA Tour career titles total to 22. Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Arizona, was a distant second in the voting.

In winning Player of the Year for a fifth time, Belmonte is along in third place among the career POY award winners. Walter Ray Williams Jr. won the honor seven times and Earl Anthony was a six-time winner.

Holliman, a 27-year-old lefthander, reached the championship round in two events, including the USBC Masters where he lost in the title match to Butturff. His other championship round appearance was a fifth-place finish in the Cheetah Championship during PBA World Series of Bowling X. Holliman also led Go Bowling! PBA Tour rookies in competition points and earnings (\$36,580), easily out-distancing Greg Young of Viera, Florida, in the ROY voting.

As Rookie of the Year, Holliman receives a \$2,500 cash award from Gardner's Bowl4Life Foundation and a \$2,500 scholarship will be awarded by Bowl4Life to a youth bowler in Holliman's name.

Gardner, 60, is a 36-year PBA member who actively competed in PBA Tour and PBA Regional events prior to joining Columbia Industries as both a Tour Staff Player and Tour Rep in 2001. In 2007, he joined Brunswick as Southeastern Product Specialist and Pro Staff Representative, a role he continues to serve along with a number of other industry-related activities.

He was selected as Tony Reyes PBA Community Service Award recipient, however, because he founded the Chuck Gardner Bowl4Life Foundation in 2013 to assist youth bowlers with scholarship funding. He actively raises funds to support the scholarships while absorbing 100 percent of the expenses associated with his fundraising efforts. He conducts scholarship tournaments, provides free lessons and much more. His goal for 2019 was to award \$50,000 in scholarships; to date that total has exceeded \$63,000.

Larsen, a 40-year-old 10-year PBA Tour veteran, has been one of Europe's premier bowlers for years, and established himself as a world-class player in PBA Tour circles after making his debut in 2009. While he has yet to win a PBA Tour title, he has seven championship round appearances including a pair of runner-up finishes. Larsen was first selected as the Nagy Award recipient during the 2011-12 season. His 2019 schedule was limited after he was struck by a car and seriously injured prior to the start of the PBA Harry O'Neale Chesapeake Open in Virginia Beach, Virginia, in mid-August.

Other finalists in the Nagy voting were newly-elected PBA Hall of Famer Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, South Carolina; Canada's Francoise Lavoie; Brad Miller of Lee's Summit, Missouri, and Kyle Sherman of O'Fallon, Missouri.

The PBA Player and Rookie of the Year awards are elected by veteran members of the bowling news media along with the PBA membership. The Reyes Award recipient is selected by a panel of PBA executives. The Nagy Award is voted upon by PBA Tour players who have bowled in at least 50 percent of the current year's tournaments.

The four award winners will be recognized during the PBA Hall of Fame induction ceremonies in Arlington, Texas, on Saturday, Jan. 18, as part of the PBA Hall of Fame Classic tournament weekend.

• **Patrick Allen**, a 13-time PBA Tour champion and 2019 PBA Hall of Fame inductee, has been elected to the United States Bowling Congress Hall of Fame along with eight-time PWBA titlist **Marianne DiRupo**, a fellow New Jersey resident. Allen had a career-year during the 2004-05 season when he earned PBA Player of the Year honors after winning the PBA World Championship and finishing among the top five in the other three major championships (U.S. Open, USBC Masters and PBA Tournament of Champions). Other PBA members on USBC's Superior Performance ballot were **Bryan Goebel, Wes Malott, Randy Pedersen, Mike Scroggins** and **Mark Williams.** The USBC Hall of Fame induction ceremonies will take place on April 29 during the USBC Convention at The Orleans in Las Vegas.

PBA 2019: The Year's Top Stories

CHICAGO (Dec. 19, 2019) - There was no shortage of historic news coming out of the Professional Bowlers Association's 61st season in 2019. The purchase of PBA by Bowlero Corp, the first season of television coverage by FOX Sports and livestreaming by partner FloBowling, another record-breaking year by Australian two-hander Jason Belmonte and Kris Prather's historic win in the inaugural PBA Playoffs were just a few of the landmark stories in 2019.

Here's a look back at some of the PBA's headline events in 2019:

Bowlero Corp purchases PBA - Bowlero Corp, the world's largest owner and operator of bowling centers, became the third owner of the Professional Bowlers Association (PBA), the pinnacle of professional bowling since 1958, when it purchased the organization from principal owner Mike Slade. The purchase brought an end to the nearly two-decade ownership era of Microsoft executives that included Slade, Rob Glaser and bowling enthusiast Chris Peters who was the driving force behind their purchase of the organization in 2000.

Jason Belmonte completes another record-setting season – Just two weeks after winning the PBA Tournament of Champions for a record-tying 10th PBA major title, Jason Belmonte successfully defended his PBA World Championship title for a record 11th major victory. The 35-year-old two-hander defeated Jakob Butturff of Tempe, Ariz., 236-227, in the stepladder finals televised live by FS1 at Thunderbowl Lanes in suburban Detroit. In his 11th season on tour, Belmonte broke a tie with PBA Hall of Famers Earl Anthony and Pete Weber for the most major titles. In the process, he became the youngest player to win 10 majors, and with a runner-up finish in the PBA Players Championship plus a fourth-place finish in the U.S. Open, he became the first player ever to record championship round finishes in four majors in a single season twice (he also achieved that feat in 2013). By winning his third TOC, he tied Hall of Famers Jason Couch and Mike Durbin for most Tournament of Champions titles. Ending the year with a tour-best four titles and \$288,290 in earnings, Belmonte won his fifth Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year award. Other 2019 award winners were Mykel Holliman, Harry Golden PBA Rookie of the Year; Martin Larsen winning his second Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award and Chuck Gardner receiving the Tony Reyes Community Service Award.

Kris Prather wins inaugural PBA Playoffs - Kris Prather of Plainfield, Illinois, made critical shot after critical shot in defeating Bill O'Neill, 226-215 and 216-185, in the Race-to-Two Points finale to win the inaugural PBA Playoffs and the \$100,000 first prize at Bayside Bowl. The championship match aired live on FOX, concluding a 13-tournament qualifying series that led into a 24-player match play elimination competition to determine the champion.

Two-hander Anthony Simonsen becomes youngest to win two majors at age 22 – At age 22, No. 2 seed Anthony Simonsen of Little Elm, Texas, defeated top seed Jason Belmonte, 232-212, in the championship match of the PBA Players Championship at Wayne Webb's Columbus Bowl to become the youngest player to win two PBA Tour majors. In 2016 he won the USBC Masters at age 19 to become the youngest to win a PBA Tour major.

Norm Duke wins back-to-back PBA Tour titles at age 54 – Three weeks shy of his 55th birthday, PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Florida, won the Go Bowling Indianapolis Open and Go Bowling Jonesboro Open back-to-back to become the oldest player to win consecutive tour titles. The wins also increased his career titles total to 40, third all-time behind Walter Ray Williams Jr. with 47 and Earl Anthony with 43.

Go Bowling PBA Tour completes first season on FOX Sports – The robust multi-platform PBA-FOX Sports agreement, announced in March of 2018, featured four telecasts on FOX and 26 on FS1. The 2019 TV schedule included 60 hours of coverage, nearly double the previous year's schedule, and the most in decades. Nineteen live telecasts were the most in 11 years and included an unprecedented five straight nights of national prime-time coverage from World Series of Bowling X. Four 2019 events airing on FOX marked the most PBA action on network broadcast TV since 1999.

Sean Rash wins PBA China Tiger Cup in PBA's first visit to China – Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, added another unique accomplishment to his portfolio when he swept fellow American PBA member AJ Johnson of Oswego, Illinois, in the best-of-three-game final match, 211-194 and 227-207, to win the historic PBA China Tiger Cup at Suzhou Tiger Bowl in Suzhou, China. The PBA special event, the first ever held in China, featured the top seven U.S. players in FloBowling PBA Summer Tour points and

nine PBA members who advanced from a qualifying event that drew nearly 100 bowlers from China and the Asian Rim.

Home team Portland Lumberjacks wins its first PBA League title – With the raucous Portland bowling fans rushing the lanes after the win, the Portland Lumberjacks overwhelmed L.A. X in four consecutive games at Bayside Bowl to win its first PBA League Elias Cup in the event's seven-year history. Led by manager Tim Mack, the team featured Mark Roth PBA League MVP Wes Malott along with teammates Kris Prather, Kyle Troup, Ryan Ciminelli and Canadian Mitch Hupe'.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. wins record-tying 14th career PBA50 Tour title – All-time PBA titles leader Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, won the first three PBA50 Tour tournaments of the season to boost his career titles total to a record-tying 14 (with John Handegard) on the tour for players 50 and over. Based on his performance in 2019, the seven-time Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year also earned his third PBA50 Player of the Year honor. Williams also continues to compete in PBA Regional tournaments, winning three PBA50 Regional titles to boost his all-time PBA titles total at all levels of PBA competition to a record 115 (47 PBA Tour, 14 PBA50 Tour, 34 standard PBA Regional and 20 PBA50 Regional). Other "senior" award winners were Eugene McCune, PBA50 Rookie of the Year; Ron Mohr, earning his fourth consecutive PBA60 Player of the Year honor (for players 60 and over), and Sammy Ventura, Dick Weber Sportsmanship award.

PBA completes first season on FloBowling – To complement PBA's FOX Sports and CBS Sports Network coverage of Go Bowling! PBA Tour events, fans also had access to year-round live coverage of bowling across all levels of PBA competition – more than ever before – through a new partnership with its livestreaming partner, FloSports. FloBowling, a subscription-based online service, provided live and ondemand coverage of more than 40 professional events that included preliminary rounds and finals of Go Bowling! PBA Tour, PBA50 Tour, selected PBA Regional and other special events. FloBowling.com also enhanced its coverage of PBA events with original content including multi-lane live action coverage, interviews with PBA's top stars and emerging talents, instructional features and insights from many of the bowling industry's leading advisors, coaches and pro tour representatives.

Canadian Francois Lavoie wins his second U.S. Open – Canada's Francois Lavoie, 26, defeated 14time PBA Tour champion and top qualifier Sean Rash, 221-172, to become the 12th bowler in history to win the U.S. Open more than once. Lavoie became the first Canadian to win the U.S. Open in 2016 when he also bowled the first nationally televised 300 game in U.S. Open history on his way to winning PBA Rookie of the Year honors. His 2019 win gave Lavoie his fourth PBA Tour title and made the fourth-year professional the first foreign-born player to win the U.S. Open more than once. Finland's Mika Koivuniemi (2001) and Dom Barrett of England (2018) also have won the event.

Tommy Jones teams up with good friend Boston Red Sox star Mookie Betts to win CP3 Celebrity Invitational - Boston Red Sox star outfielder Mookie Betts along with good friend and now PBA Hall of Famer Tommy Jones broke through to win the 2019 PBA CP3 Celebrity Invitational which benefits NBA star Chris Paul's CP3 Foundation. In his two previous CP3 events, Betts had finished second with his pro partners but found the right chemistry with Jones to win the 2019 event defeating the team of Hall of Famer Pete Weber and NFL Hall of Famer Terrell Owens in the title match.

PBA Regional Program continues to groom future stars – As the PBA Regional program enters its 50th anniversary season in 2020, the PBA "minor league" network continues to provide thousands of PBA bowlers, young and old, with opportunities across the nation's seven regional jurisdictions (plus Japan) to improve their skills while learning how to compete against many of the PBA's elite players. In 2019 the PBA Regional program crowned its 1,900th different champion and surpassed 6,500 tournaments staged throughout its history. No player has embraced the PBA Regional program more than Chris Warren of Grants Pass, Oregon, who won a pair of PBA50 titles in the Northwest Region, boosting his record for regional victories to 47 in standard events and 55 including PBA50 tournaments. The first PBA Regional

event – the National Resident Pro Championship – was held in Cincinnati in 1969; in 1970 the PBA introduced an expanded schedule of competition in seven regions and the program has flourished ever since.

PBA Spare Shots

BOWLERO ELITE SERIES FINALE SET TO AIR ON NBC SUNDAY AT 1 P.M. EST

The semifinalists are set for the Bowlero Elite Series finale that will air Sunday at 1 p.m. ET on NBC. The professional side of the unique pro-am competition at Bowlero Jupiter in Florida has been culled down to newly-elected PBA Player of the Year **Jason Belmonte** and recently-elected PBA Hall of Famer **Tommy Jones**.

The two PBA stars will bowl a one-game match with the winner taking on the survivor of the Bowlero league bowler side of the bracket that will include former Saginaw Valley State collegiate bowler **Garrett Shovan** vs. Illinois' **Luis Gonzalez**, who won the first event in the three-event Bowlero Elite Series competition. The winner of the Jupiter tournament will receive \$100,000.

Leading up to the semifinals, PBA titlist **Kyle Troup** eliminated PWBA champion Clara Guerrero, 248-246, before losing to Belmonte in the quarterfinal round, 247-246. Belmonte knocked out fellow two-hander **Anthony Simonsen**, 263-257, in his first match. In the lower half of the pro bracket, Jones defeated PWBA Bowler of the Year **Shannon O'Keefe**, 226-196, and **Marshall Kent**, 235-218, to reach the semifinals. Kent ousted **Kyle Sherman**, 257-197, in his first-round match.

On the amateur side of the match play elimination bracket, **Douglas Herron** defeated **Greg Thompson**, 230-172, before losing to Shovan, 179-161. In the lower half of the amateur bracket, **Jay Nephew** eliminated **Elizabeth Jones**, 204-191, before losing to Gonzalez, 243-216. In the other first round matches, Shovan knocked out **Mike Ewing**, 199-167, while Gonzalez topped **Amy Brehm**, 226-175.

Gonzalez won the inaugural Bowlero Elite Series tournament in suburban Chicago, defeating Troup in the final match, 237-226. Simonsen won the second event in New Jersey, eliminating Brehm in the final match, 259-220.

HALL OF FAMER PETE WEBER HELPS ROOKIE MYKEL HOLLIMAN WIN FIRST TITLE With a little Hall-of-Fame help from **Pete Weber**, 2019 PBA Rookie of the Year **Mykel Holliman** of Collierville, Tenn., won his first PBA title Sunday in the PBA/PBA50 Houston Emerald Bowl Doubles in Houston, Texas.

Holliman, PBA's top rookie in 2019, finished second in the USBC Masters but had yet to capture his first PBA title. Weber, on the other hand, is one of two players in PBA history to win 100 titles at all levels of PBA competition. He has won 37 PBA Tour titles (including 10 majors); 11 PBA50 Tour titles, 47 standard PBA Regionals and six PBA50 Regionals, including his win at Emerald Bowl in Houston, for a total of 101 – 14 behind all-time leader **Walter Ray Williams Jr**. The duo split a \$7,000 first prize.

The winning duo finished the eight-game qualifying portion of the event in third place. After winning only four of their first nine matches in the 10-game round robin finals, they were still stalking the leaders in

third place going into the final position round match. The father-son duo of **Deo Benard** from Henderson, Nev., and **Rick Benard**, now living in Keller, Texas, had just assumed a slim lead over WRW and his PBA Tour champion partner **Dick Allen** from Lexington, S.C. With only 73 pins separating the top three teams, Williams and Allen combined for a 420 team game to top the Benards' final game of 404, while Weber and Holliman handily defeated the team of **Paul McCordic** of Sugar Land, Texas, and **Justin Bui** from Terrytown, La., 468-422. Earning 50 match bonus pins, Weber and Holliman overtook Williams and Allen by 11 pins. 8 539-8 528 in 18-game total pinfall to

Professional Bowler Tommy Jones Wins Final Bowlero Elite Series of 2019 at Bowlero Jupiter in South Fla. and First Place Prize of \$100,000 by Jerry Schneider | Sunday, December 29, 1:08 PM

New York, NY, Dec. 29th, 2019 – Professional bowler Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., became the new Bowlero Elite Series Champion during the third and final installment of the pro-am bowling tournament of 2019, which featured 16 of the world's top professional and amateur bowlers on Sunday, Dec. 29, at Bowlero Jupiter.

The 41-year-old professional bowler defeated amateur bowler and Denver pro shop attendant Garrett Shovan (266-200) in the championship title match to win 2019's final Bowlero Elite Series tournament and a \$100,000 top prize—one of the largest winnings in the sport. Shovan received a second-place prize of \$25,000.

Prior to the final match, Jones went head-to-head with professional bowlers in three single-elimination rounds where he competed against 2019 PWBA Player of the Year Shannon O'Keefe (226-196), four-time PBA Titleholder Marshall Kent (235-218), and the current, five-time PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte (279-216).

"Bowling for \$100K in our sport is rare and I'm so grateful to have participated in the Bowlero Elite Series," said Tommy Jones. "I consistently bowled well throughout the competition and had fun in the process, meeting amateurs from around the country. Looking forward to a successful tour season in 2020 with Bowlero's support!"

Shovan's matches during the tournament also kept the crowd on their toes. Shovan went head-to-head with Bowlero league bowlers in three single-elimination matches where he played against Phoenix father Mike Ewing (199-167), YouTuber and host of "DOUGIEEEVISION" Douglas Herron (179-161`), and Bowlero Elite Series Tournament One Champion Luis Gonzalez (236-202).

"The Bowlero Elite Series is such an amazing event and an incredible opportunity for bowlers like me," said Garrett Shovan. "I am so happy to have advanced to the finals, facing one of my idols growing up. Although I didn't win, I'm happy with the outcome and hope I made my family, my community, and my coaches proud. This is an experience that I will never forget."

"The Bowlero Elite Series always shows us that anything can happen when you gather the world's top professionals and best league bowlers, "said Colie Edison, Chief Customer Officer for Bowlero Corp and President of the President Elite Series. "Every match of this tournament was unpredictable. There was incredible bowling and nail-biting games that went down to the last frame, which goes to show that any outcome is possible!"

The entire roster of competitors for the third event included Bowlero Elite Series Tournament 2 Champion, Anthony Simonsen, three-time PBA Tour Champion, Kyle Troup, three-time collegiate All-American title holder, Kyle Sherman, 2019 PWBA Player of the Year, Shannon O'Keefe, 2019 PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte, four-time PBA Tour Champion Marshall Kent, 2019 Pan American Gold Medalist, Clara Guerrero, and PBA Hall of Fame inductee Tommy Jones. The eight amateur bowlers that competed were selected as the best from over 300,000 Bowlero league bowlers and include Bowlero Elite Series Tournament One Champion Luis Gonzalez, Tournament Two Runner-Up Amy Brehm, as well as Elizabeth Jones, Douglas Herron, Jay Nephew, Mike Ewing, Greg Thompson, and Garrett Shovan.
