D.J. Archer Wins First PBA Title in Emotional Chameleon Championship

Runner-up Ronnie Russell bowls first perfect game at South Point Bowling Plaza in opening match

LAS VEGAS – Two months after losing his mother to cardiac failure, D.J. Archer of Friendswood, Texas, bowled the biggest game of his life, winning his first Professional Bowlers Association Tour title in the PBA Chameleon Championship and stealing the spotlight from Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana, who bowled the first nationally-televised 300 game in the new, \$35 million South Point Bowling Plaza a game earlier.

The Chameleon finals, the third of five PBA Tour title events conducted during GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI, aired Sunday on ESPN.

After starting the championship match with two strikes, Archer left the 1-2-4-7-10 in the third frame and failed to convert. But he quickly righted his ship and closed the match with a string of seven strikes to lock Russell out, winning, 241-215.

"Coming into the finals, with everything that's gone on in my life the past month-and-a-half, I just felt like (my mother) was there," Archer said about the loss of his mother Sharon at age 59 in mid-September. "The only thing that could have happened in the 10th frame was for me to throw two really good shots and that's what I did. I felt like nothing was going to stand up. She knocked the pins over for me, and I'm very grateful."

Archer had finished second once before (in the 2013 Carmen Salvino Classic) during his 12-year PBA Tour career, so he got to experience the thrill of victory for the first time.

"I've been chasing this feeling for years, and now that I know what it feels like, I'm going to work harder and get stronger, and hopefully I'll get this feeling more often," he said. "I'm excited, very excited. Those guys have been beating my head in for a long time and I figured out a way I learned how to bowl."

In the opening three-player shootout match, Russell and Sean Rash of Montgomery, Illinois, each started with six strikes to open a big lead over J.R. Raymond of Bay City, Michigan, who was making his PBA television debut. Raymond opened in the second frame and never had a chance to catch up.

Rash was the first to end his strike string, leaving a 10 pin in the seventh frame and the 1-2-4-10 "washout" in the eighth, while Russell kept on striking on his way to the PBA's 24th nationally-televised 300 game. Rash finished with a 265 and Raymond a 186.

"That was a lot of fun," Russell said, "but you're still trying to get the win. I had three really good breaks where I tripped 4 or 10 pins, and I think that hurt me in the title game because my laydown point went away a little bit. I kept chasing the transition (in the changing lane condition) with my eyes and feet, but I knew I should have changed balls. I just did it two frames too late."

The fourth PBA WSOB VI final to air on ESPN will be the Scorpion Championship on Sunday, Jan. 4, at 1 p.m. ET. In the title match, top qualifier Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix will bowl the winner of a threeplayer shootout match involving No. 2 Scott Newell, Deland, Fla.; No. 3 Martin Larsen, Sweden, and No. 4 Tom Hess, Urbandale, Iowa.

Mika Koivuniemi Wins 14th Career Title in PBA Viper Championship

Finnish native nips top qualifier Connor Pickford to end three-year U.S. television drought

LAS VEGAS – Finnish native Mika Koivuniemi of Hartland, Michigan, defeated first-time television finalist Connor Pickford of Charlotte, North Carolina, 224-214, to win his 14th career PBA Tour title in the PBA Viper Championship at the new South Point Bowling Plaza, ending a three-year title drought on American soil.

The Viper finals, the second of five PBA Tour title events conducted during GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI, aired Sunday on ESPN.

Koivuniemi, 47, had won four PBA International titles after winning the 2011 PBA Tournament of Champions, but he had to threw three strikes in the 10th-frame twice to end a three-year winless streak in U.S.-based competition.

"I was lucky I finished on the left lane," Koivuniemi said of his victory over Pickford. "I was lined up much better on the left lane than I was on the right lane, but I still needed to make a good shot. I got a great break in the fifth frame, but it's about time some luck was with me. I feel like luck hasn't been on my side on TV very much lately.

"It's been three years since I've won in the U.S. so, yes, it feels excellent."

In the title match, Pickford left the 2-4-6-7 split in his fourth frame and failed to convert for the only serious mistake of the match. He followed the open with three strikes, but Koivuniemi took the lead when he carried a high crossover strike in fifth, converting that break into a turkey. Pickford failed to strike in the eighth and ninth frames, giving Koivuniemi room to lock up the title with strikes on his first two shots in the 10th frame and that's what he did.

In the three-player shootout to start the Viper finals, a similar 10th frame performance got Koivuniemi into the title match. Koivuniemi started with four strikes and appeared to have the match under control, but he missed a 4-7 spare attempt in the fifth and momentarily lost his strike shot. He stayed out of trouble, leaving makeable spares until throwing three strikes in the 10th frame to lock up the match. His 221 game was too much for Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana (190) and England's Dom Barrett (126).

Barrett, the reigning PBA World Champion, ran into early trouble, leaving splits he couldn't convert in four of the first six frames, and quickly bowled himself out of contention. Two more splits resulted in the second-lowest nationally-televised game in PBA history (the record is Tom Daugherty's 100 game in the 2011 PBA Tournament of Champions).

Russell stayed close to Koivuniemi until he left the 6-7-10 split in the eighth frame. After a strike in the ninth frame, a 10 pin on his first shot in the 10th ended his title hopes.

The next GEICO PBA WSOB VI final to air on ESPN will be the Chameleon Championship on Sunday, Dec. 28, at 1 p.m. ET. In the title match, top qualifier D.J. Archer of Friendswood, Texas, will bowl the winner of a three-player shootout match involving No. 2 Russell; No. 3 Sean Rash, Montgomery, Illinois, and No. 4 J.R. Raymond, Bay City, Michigan. Raymond will be making his PBA television debut.

"Rookie" Marshall Kent Wins First PBA Title in Saudi Arabia's 8th Kingdom International Open

Former collegiate star now eligible to enter 50th Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (Dec. 2, 2014) – Professional Bowlers Association rookie Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, won his first PBA Tour title Tuesday, defeating Sweden's Martin Larsen, 257-206, to claim the eighth Kingdom International Open title at Universal Bowling Center Tuesday.

Kent earned \$10,000 and became eligible to enter the 50th anniversary Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions in Indianapolis in February. The Kingdom International Open is the final PBA International Tour-World Bowling Tour event on the 2014 schedule.

Kent, 22, a former two-time Collegiate Bowler of the Year with Robert Morris University-Illinois, was the top qualifier for the finals in Riyadh and defeated No. 4 qualifier Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas, 243-237, to advance to the championship match. Larsen, who also was trying for his first PBA title, defeated Kuwait's Khaled Al Dubyyan, 224-174, in the other semifinal match.

The Kingdom International Open featured a unique format. All players bowled three six-game qualifying rounds on different lane conditions. The first round was contested on World Bowling's 39-foot Seoul oil pattern, day two on the 45-foot Mexico City pattern, and day three with the Seoul pattern on the left lane and Mexico City pattern on the right lane. After each day's competition, the top four players for that day bowled a "shootout" round for a \$5,000 first prize, and after 18 combined games, the top 30 plus the top six Saudi Arabian competitors advance to Tuesday's "masters" finals.

In the daily "shootout" rounds, Craig Nidiffer of Trenton, Michigan, won both the Seoul pattern and mixed pattern events, earning \$5,000 in each event. He defeated England's Dom Barrett in the Seoul finale, 278-269, and Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas, 239-228, in the mixed pattern final. Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, won the Mexico City event, defeating Saudi Arabia's Bader Al Shaikh, 223-181, for the \$5,000 first prize.

The masters qualifying round involved nine games from scratch (no carryover pins), three game each of the Seoul, Mexico City and mixed conditions. The top four after nine games bowled advanced to the one-game single-elimination match play finals with qualifier No. 1 meeting No. 4, and No. 2 vs. No. 3. The two winners then bowled a one-game match for the title.

Following the Kingdom International Open, a number of PBA members from the U.S. and around the world will close out the year by competing representing their home countries in the World Men's Bowling

Championships – a non-PBA event – in Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. The Men's World Championships will include singles, doubles, trios, Baker team, all-events and Masters events.

The PBA Tour officially concludes its 2014 season with the finals of the PBA World Championship which will air live on ESPN on Sunday, Jan. 11, at 1 p.m. ET from South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas. The PBA World Championship finalists, in qualifying order, are Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas; Fagan; Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana; Todd Book of Russells Point, Ohio, and Stuart Williams of England.

England's Dom Barrett Repeats as Qatar Open Champion

Countryman Stuart Williams falls seven pins short in two-game title match

Korea's Song Si Ra Wins It's Daejeon International Open

First woman to win World Bowling Tour "major" title

DAEJEON, Korea (Nov. 22, 2014) – Korea's Song Si Ra became the first woman to win a World Bowling Tour major title when she upset countryman and top qualifier Choi Tae Seung, 231-205, to win the It's Daejeon International Open at the Daejeon World Cup Bowling Centre Sunday.

Song, 24, advance to the title match by defeating Canada's Dan MacLelland, 213-195, in the semifinal match after MacLelland won a three-player shootout match to start the championships round.

In the It's Daejeon International Open, like many international events, women who entered the "open" division received eight handicap pins per game, but Song didn't need the "bonus" pins because she won each match by more than eight pins. Along with her title, Song earned 40 million Korean won, the equivalent of \$37,200 U.S. dollars. Choi earned \$18,600 and MacLelland took home \$9,00 for his third-place finish.

In the shootout match, which was televised nationally in Korea, MacLelland's 196 eliminated Korea's Lee Na Hyun (168) and Jang Dong Chul (167). Lee was the second woman to make the championship round.

Song does not receive credit for a PBA International Tour title because she is a non-member, and in order for a woman to earn a PBA Tour title, she must be a PBA member and bowl the event without receiving handicap pins.

Buffalo Area PBA Players Struggling Through Historic Snowfall

Ryan Ciminelli and friends contending with catastrophic early winter storm; rain and flooding next?

CHEEKTOWAGA, N.Y. (Nov. 21, 2014) – Two-time Professional Bowlers Association titlist Ryan Ciminelli feels lucky today to be among the survivors of what may be the worst snowstorm to bury the Buffalo, New York, area in a century.

Ciminelli, a 28-year-old lifelong resident of Buffalo suburb Cheektowaga, explained his harrowing story while taking a break Friday from trying to clear more than five feet of snow from the roof of his house.

Last Sunday, Ciminelli flew home from Tokyo, where he had competed in the Round1 Japan Cup, when the lake-effect snow across Lake Erie began to bury the region in up to nine feet of snow. Ciminelli's personal troubles began with an airline maintenance problem that delayed his arrival in Buffalo from Monday night until Tuesday.

"When we got in, there was only about three inches of snow on the ground at the airport, but no one could come and get me, so I decided to walk home (about three miles)," he said. "I wasn't dressed for the snow. I didn't have a hat or gloves, or anything. By the time I got to the end of my street, there was no way I could get to my house. I could either try to walk through five feet of snow to a neighbor's house, or turn around and go back toward another friend's house near the airport. I decided to try for my neighbor's house.

"By the time I got through the snow – it was less than 500 feet – my legs had gone numb. I literally fell into their garage. They got me inside and warmed me up, but I couldn't stay there, so I went to another neighbor's. I was really scared; I'm convinced I almost died," he said.

"Apparently someone called in a false alarm to the fire department, so a small bobcat went through and plowed a path down my street on Wednesday morning, so I was able to follow that path to get home. That night, my wife Chelsea was making dinner, and I looked up and saw stress cracks all over the ceiling, so we called the fire department to ask what we should do. They told us they couldn't remove the snow, but we should evacuate the house, so we went to my parents' house.

"We decided to go back and try to get the snow off our roof," Ciminelli continued. "I had a couple of guys helping and we got most of it off, but Chelsea said it seemed pretty cold in the house. Turns out our furnace is broken, so we've had no heat for the past 14-16 hours.

"And it could get worse. Rain is on the way, which will add more weight to the snow on the roof," he added. "I think the news said there were 30 roof collapses last night alone, and there have been 13

deaths reported so far. And it's supposed to warm up to 40-50 degrees, so it's going to flood. It's bad, really bad."

Fellow Cheektowaga resident Liz Johnson had similar issues with snow, but made it safely back to the Buffalo airport late Monday night following the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling, where she qualified for the ESPN finals of the PBA Cheetah Championship presented by PBA Bowling Challenge Mobile Game, followed by a promotional engagement in Las Vegas. She made it home without incident but knowing heavy snow was on its way, immediately headed to the closest hardware store to buy a new snow blower.

"All of the snow blowers were gone, and by the time I got back home, it was insane. It didn't stop snowing for two days, so other that going outside to try to help others dig out, I haven't been out of the house," Johnson said Friday. "It's unbelievable. I live about a half mile from (Ciminelli), and we got about 80 inches of snow, but you can go five miles north, and they got next to nothing. The bands of snow were amazing. There are areas with next to nothing, but then you run into a wall of snow.

"I've lived here for 15 years," the native of nearby Niagara Falls said, "and I remember some pretty bad snowfalls before. But this is double the worse I've ever seen. It's pretty, but it's pretty crazy. And now we're going to have to deal with the flooding."

Two-time PBA titlist Jack Jurek, who lives in Lackawanna on Buffalo's south side – right in the path of the worst of it – said he got home from work Monday night "just when it started, and it snowed steadily for the next 30 to 36 hours. The band of snow coming off the lake never moved.

"I was born and raised in Lackawanna," the 50-year-old PBA50 Tour "rookie" said, "but I've never seen anything like this. The blizzard of '77 was bad, but that one didn't have as much snow. It just covered a bigger area. This time we got as much snow in two days as we normally get in a whole year."

Other than being tired from shoveling, Jurek said "we're getting low on milk, but otherwise we're good, and there's light at the end of the tunnel. It's going to start warming up, so the snow is going to start melting. But now we'll start worrying about flooding."

Other PBA players who live in the area, but apparently were spared the worst of the weather, are John Szczerbinski, who lives on the north side of Buffalo; Buffalo resident Joe Ciccone and Brad Angelo, who lives northeast of Buffalo in Lockport.

Korea's Kyung Shin Park Wins 28th Round1 Japan Cup

Eventual champ eliminates Loschetter, ends Williams' bid for history en route to title

TOKYO, Japan (Nov. 15, 2014) – South Korea's Kyung Shin Park became his country's first Round1 Japan Cup winner Saturday when he defeated Japan's Akio Ishihara, 241-203, in the 28th edition of the international tournament.

Park, who ended Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr.'s bid for history in the Round of 8 at Minami Suna Round1, earned \$51,700 along with his title. Park also eliminated Chris Loschetter of Avon, Ohio, in the semifinal round, 244-166, ending the PBA's last hope for a title for the second straight year.

In the other semifinal match, Ishihara defeated Korea's Young Kwan Kim, 226-225, to prevent an all-Korea title match.

Williams, 55, entered the championship round seeking his third Japan Cup title, a record 48th PBA Tour title, and his first PBA Tour title since 2010. But Park's 278 made easy work of the Oxford, Florida, superstar.

PBA Rookie of the Year contender Marshall Kent of Yakima, Washington, and past Japan Cup titlist Mika Koivuniemi of Finland also were eliminated in the Round of 8. Ishihara ended Kent's hopes for his first PBA title, 216-203, and Kim knocked Koivuniemi out of the finals, 247-226.

PBA Tour players now travel to South Korea and the Middle East to complete the 2014 season with three PBA International-World Bowling Tour events: the It's Daejeon International Open in Daejeon, South Korean, today-Nov. 22; the Qatar Open in Doha, Qatar, Nov. 22-27, and the 8th Kingdom International Open in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, Nov. 28-Dec. 2.

Walter Ray Williams Jr. Headlines Round1 Japan Cup Finalists

55-year-old PBA Hall of Famer seeks third title in Japan, 48th all-time PBA Tour title

TOKYO, Japan (Nov. 14, 2014) – A month after celebrating his 55th birthday, Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, put himself into position to add to his stunning portfolio of PBA accomplishments, advancing to the Round of 8 finals in the 28th Round1 Japan Cup Friday at Minami Suna Round 1.

Williams, the only player who has bowled in all 28 modern Japan Cups, will try for his third Japan Cup title and a 48th PBA Tour title – expanding upon his PBA titles record – when the eight finalists bowl for the \$51,700 first prize on national television in Japan Saturday. The eight-time PBA Player of the Year hasn't won a PBA Tour title since the 2010 United States Bowling Congress Masters.

Williams, the 1991 and 2006 Japan Cup winner, will join fellow PBA Tour competitors Mika Koivuniemi, Finland; Chris Loschetter, Avon, Ohio, and Marshall Kent, Yakima, Wash., in the eight-man finals along with Japan's Akio Ishihara and Takuya Miyazawa, and Korea's Park Kyung Shin and Kim Young Kwan.

Williams advanced to the Round of 8 by sweeping Park Sang Pil, Korea, 3-0, and fellow PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke of Clermont, Fla., 3-0, before finally losing a game to Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas, in a 3-1 win during Friday's best-of-five-game elimination matches.

Another player pursuing a milestone first PBA Tour title is Kent, a former Robert Morris-Illinois University star and Team USA member, who needs a PBA victory to become eligible for the 50th anniversary Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions in February.

Saturday's finals will be a continuation of the bracket elimination matches, but matches will be one game.

23 PBA Players Advance to Round1 Japan Cup Match Play Finals

Defending champion Yuya Kato among players who failed to advance

TOKYO, Japan (Nov. 13, 2014) – Twenty-three Professional Bowlers Association players who traveled to Tokyo to compete in the 28th Round1 Japan Cup have advanced to the field of 64 match play finalists at Minami Suna Round 1.

After 10 qualifying games by the field of 176 players from around the world on Thursday, Japan's Shigenori Sakata led the 32 players who advanced out of A Squad with a 10-game total of 2,483 pins – a 248.3 average – while two-time PBA Tour titlist Tom Smallwood of Saginaw, Michigan, paced the B squad qualifiers with a 2,437 total (243.7 average).

The tournament field was split into two squads of 88 players, with PBA Tour players divided between the two squads. Among those who failed to advance to match play was defending Japan Cup champion Yuya Kato, who became the first Japanese player in 25 years to win the event in the 47th edition of the tournament held last December.

Under the Japan Cup format, the top 32 qualifiers from A squad and the top 32 from B squad will begin best-of-five-game, single-elimination play Friday. Winners will remain in their respective brackets into the Round of 8, which will be nationally-televised in Japan.

PBA World Championship top qualifier Wes Malott goes No. 2 by Pittsburgh Jack Rabbits

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 31, 2014) – Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., was the first of 40 players selected in the 2015 PBA League Draft, held Friday at South Point Bowling Plaza. Eight PBA League teams will compete for the Elias Cup in two days of competition at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine, March 28-29.

Malott Clinches No. 1 Berth for PBA World Championship Finals

England's Stuart Williams claims fifth position with strong finish

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 30, 2014) – Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, captured the top qualifying position for the PBA World Championship, the concluding event of the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI, by 118 pins over Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas, Thursday at South Point Bowling Center.

Malott, Fagan, Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana; Todd Book of Russells Point, Ohio, and Stuart Williams of England will return to South Point's new 60-lane Bowling Plaza for the live ESPN stepladder finals on Sunday, Jan. 11. The World Championship is officially the third and final major championship of the PBA's 2014 season.

Malott, a 38-year-old nine-time PBA Tour champion, averaged 229.44 over 52 games conducted on five different lane conditions to pace the World Championship qualifiers with a 12,381 pinfall total, 118 pins ahead of Fagan.

"I never really put anything together tonight. I just stayed out of trouble, and got a couple wins here and there," Malott said. "The biggest thing was in the second game tonight against Sean Rash. I doubled in the 10th to shut him out and that gave me some confidence and opened the gap a little.

"I was disappointed with my loss to Fagan in the last match Wednesday. I had a big lead and let him catch up, but I was able to get past that, focus on the positive and that helped."

If Malott wins the title in January, his 10th title will qualify him for PBA Hall of Fame consideration at some point down the road, but it's not something Malott is concerned about.

"We'll have a couple of months to prepare and think about the finals," he said. "Ten titles, yeah, maybe it's in the back of my mind, but it's not a big thing at this point. It's not like I'm going for the most PBA titles or anything. If my career ended today, I'd be very happy. I'm very grateful and fortunate to be where I'm at, and I'm still living the dream."

Fagan, 33, chased Malott throughout the 24-game match play finals, but could never quite catch up. Russell, who qualified for his third World Series television final, finished 16 pins behind Fagan. Book, 43, will make his second television appearance in eight years as mostly a part-time touring player.

Williams, who won his only PBA Tour title in the 2011 Viper Championship, made the biggest move, advancing from seventh to fifth with a 258-194 victory over defending World Champion and fellow Englishman Dom Barrett in the final match game.

Draft-Eligible List Set for Friday's 2015 PBA League Draft

Xtra Frame to cover player selections live at 3 p.m. ET from South Point Bowling Plaza

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 30, 2014) – An all-star list of bowling stars has set confirmed for Friday's 2015 PBA League Draft, which will be conducted Friday at 3 p.m. ET (noon PT) from the new South Point Bowling Plaza. A live international audience will be able to watch the third annual PBA League draft on PBA's online bowling channel, Xtra Frame.

The eight-team PBA League will compete for the Elias Cup March 28-30 at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

The 2015 PBA League in 2015 will feature the same eight team names and team managers from last season, but after a random draw will determine the draft order and managers will fill their rosters with five players each for the Elias Cup competition in Maine. The Elias Cup will be decided by points earned in singles, doubles, trio and Baker team matches.

Based on the competition points list, the top 10 players in the draft, in points order, will be Jason Belmonte, Dom Barrett, E.J. Tackett, Sean Rash, Wes Malott, Tom Smallwood, Pete Weber, Bill O'Neill, Chris Barnes, Ryan Ciminelli.

Returning team managers are: Mark Baker (defending Elias Cup champion Silver Lake Atom Splitters), Carolyn Dorin-Ballard (GEICO New York City WTT KingPins), Johnny Petraglia (Brooklyn STyLES), Norm Duke (Dallas Strikers), Tim Mack (Pittsburgh Jack Rabbits), Jason Couch (Philadelphia Hitmen), Andrew Cain (L.A. X) and Del Ballard Jr. (Barbasol Motown Muscle).

• Players eligible for the PBA League Draft were based on PBA Tour competition points between the 2013 World Series of Bowling V and the 2014 Oklahoma Summer Swing, plus any player who was on a PBA League roster for 2014.

• For the draft, players who committed to participation in the PBA League program will be ranked based upon their position on the points list. The first player elected by each team must be taken from the group of players ranking 1-10 on the points list. The second player drafted will come from the group ranked 11-20 in points, plus any undrafted players from group one. The third player drafted will come from those ranked 21-30 in points. The fourth player will come from those ranked 31-40 in points, and the fifth player will come from the players ranked 41-50 and previous team members not among the points leaders. Players undrafted in each round will be eligible in the following round, expanding the pool of players as each round continues. The draft exception will be Dallas player-manager Norm Duke, who finished 39th on the points list, will draft himself in the fourth round.

• A random draw will determine the team draft order. The draft will then be conducted in "serpentine" format whereby Team No. 1 will pick first in the first round and last in the second round, and Team No. 8 will pick last in the first round and first in the second round, etc.

Wes Malott Takes PBA World Championship Lead into Final Match Play Round

Fort Worth's Mike Fagan finishes strong to move into second place

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 29, 2014) – Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, won 11 of his 16 matches Wednesday and will take a 125-pin lead into Thursday's final round of match play in the PBA World Championship, the concluding event of the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI, at South Point Bowling Center.

Malott, who qualified for the match play finals in fourth place after four PBA animal pattern championships held earlier in the week, led by more than 200 pins going into Wednesday night's final match against fellow Texan Mike Fagan of Fort Worth.

Fagan, after rolling a 300 a game earlier, defeated Malott, 276-204, to cut Malott's lead in half. Malott, a nine-time PBA Tour title winner, finished with a 44-game total of 10,541 pins. Fagan, who also fired 276 and 268 games earlier in the second round, had a 10,416 total.

Recently-retired PBA Hall of Famer Jason Couch of Clermont, Florida, returned to competition and sat in third place with 10,226 pins. A third Texan, two-handed player Shawn Maldonado of Houston, also rolled a 300 game to move into fourth place with 10,213 pins. Defending PBA World Champion Dom Barrett of England was fifth with a 10,168 total. Seven other players were within less than 100 pins of qualifying for the ESPN finals.

The final eight-game match play round will take place Thursday at 2 p.m. PT. A total of 52 games of qualifying and match play will determine the five player stepladder finalists who will return to South Point's new Bowling Plaza on Sunday, Jan. 11, for the live ESPN finals.

Michael Haugen Jr. Earns Top Berth in PBA Scorpion Championship

England's Barrett heads field as 24 PBA World Championship qualifiers set for match play

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 28, 2014) – Three-time Professional Bowlers Association titlist Michael Haugen Jr. of Phoenix jumped from sixth to first in the final game Tuesday night to capture the top berth in the PBA Scorpion Championship in the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling Tuesday at South Point Bowling Center.

Haugen, who entered the final qualifying round in 13th place, fired games of 203, 255, 223, 234, 226, 216 and 247 to finish the Scorpion event with a 14-game total of 3,213 pins and a four-pin lead over Scott Newell of Daytona, Florida. Sweden's Martin Larsen qualified third with 3,206 pins and Tom Hess of Urbandale, Iowa, qualified fourth at 3,205 – one pin ahead of Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, South Carolina and four pins ahead of first-round leader B.J. Moore III of Apex, North Carolina.

Newell and Hess have each won one PBA Tour title. Larsen will be trying for his first when the finals are conducted Saturday in the new South Point Bowling Plaza. The finals will air on Sunday, Jan. 4, at 1 p.m. ET.

"That was a little too exciting, but I don't do anything the easy way," Haugen said. "I was losing my ball reaction a bit. I drilled a new ball for the night round, but it was slipping away. I knew I had to either make better shots or change balls, so I changed balls again and went with it."

Haugen said an open frame in the seventh almost ended his hopes, "but I threw the last five strikes and the other guys waited for me. Go figure."

The first round of the Scorpion Championship earlier Tuesday was the fourth and final qualifying event to determine the 24 match play finalists for the PBA World Championship. The match play finals include eight-game rounds Wednesday at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., and Thursday at 2 p.m. England's Dom Barrett was top qualifier for the World Championship with a 6,430 pinfall total, three pins ahead of Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana, and 14 ahead of Moore. Bryon Smith of Roseburg, Oregon, captured the 24th spot by two pins over Newell.

B.J. Moore Back on Top as PBA Scorpion Championship First Round Leader

England's Barrett heads field as 24 PBA World Championship qualifiers set for match play

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 28, 2014) – B.J. Moore III of Apex, North Carolina, was back on top of the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling Tuesday at South Point Bowling Center as the first round leader in the PBA Scorpion Championship, but this time he is hoping for a better long-term outcome in Tuesday night's final qualifying session.

Moore, 26, had never finished higher than 26th place in his six previous PBA Tour appearances before he led the Viper Championship after one round on Sunday. But he couldn't hold on during the evening round, finishing sixth and missing his first television show by 11 pins.

Tuesday, he rolled games of 258, 226, 280, 239, 246, 224 and 211, averaging 241 for a seven-game 1,687 total and a 16-pin lead over another non-title winner, John Szczerbinski of North Tonawanda, New York. Both will be among the 24 players who will bowl a second seven-game qualifying round Tuesday night to determine the field of four Scorpion Championship TV finalists.

The first round of the Scorpion Championship also was the fourth and final animal pattern qualifying event to determine the 24 match play finalists for the PBA World Championship. Moore's strong performance Tuesday assured him a spot in the World Championship match play finals which will include eight-game rounds Wednesday at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m., and Thursday at 2 p.m. England's Dom Barrett was top qualifier for the World Championship with a 6,430 pinfall total, three pins ahead of Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana, and 14 ahead of Moore. Bryon Smith of Roseburg, Oregon, captured the 24th spot by two pins over Scott Newell of Daytona, Florida.

"I missed the Viper TV show by 11 pins and I kept replaying that in my mind yesterday (in the Chameleon Championship). I wasn't there mentally, but it was a re-group day and today I came back re-freshed," Moore said. "I had a talk with my coach about what to expect and how to attack the lane conditions, and I stuck to my plan. I didn't want to over-think anything. I just shut down my brain and threw one shot at a time.

"In the Viper second round, I'd never been in the position to make a TV show before and I'm not happy with what happened, but I'm not going to beat myself up about it. I kind of worked myself up last time, so tonight I'm just going to shut my brain down and bowl."

Texan D.J. Archer Leads PBA Chameleon Championship Field into ESPN Finals

Indiana's Ronnie Russell paces PBA World Championship qualifying after three of four rounds

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 27, 2014) – D.J. Archer of Friendswood, Texas, stumbled out of the gate, but righted himself quickly to take charge of the PBA Chameleon Championship, the third of four animal pattern events in GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI, Monday at South Point Bowling Center.

Archer, a 34-year-old, 12-year veteran who is still trying for his first PBA Tour title, fought through the emotional memories of his mother's death in September on his way to the top qualifying position in the Chameleon Championship television finals. After rolling a 175 game to start the day, he rebounded immediately with a 275 and scored at a blistering 242.29 pace in the morning round. Raymond, who will make his ESPN debut in the finals on Saturday, Nov. 1, at the new South Point Bowling Plaza, qualified fourth with 3,142 pins.

"What's crazy is that in practice this morning, I threw about 20 strikes in a row. Normally when that happens, the first game is always bad and I don't know why," Archer said. "I said to myself, 'this isn't good,' but after that, it was just like it never happened and I bowled real well. I bowled 275 the second game and I just matched up with the right ball all day. When you get those things on the right page, you can throw a lot of strikes in this facility."

The Chameleon Championship was the third of four qualifying events that will determine the 24-player field for the PBA World Championship match play competition Wednesday and Thursday. The sevengame qualifying rounds in the Cheetah, Viper, Chameleon and Tuesday's Scorpion Championships will be combined to determine the World Championship finalists.

Russell leads Dom Barrett of England in PBA World Championship qualifying by 29 pins with a 21-game total of 4,904 pins heading into Tuesday's Scorpion Championship, the final qualifying event. Barrett, who led World Champion qualifying a year ago on his way to winning that event for his first PBA major title, was another 34 pin ahead over Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill. Scorpion qualifying rounds will take place at 8 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. PT.

Connor Pickford Wins No. 1 Berth for PBA Viper Championship Finals

Fourth-year pro from North Carolina to make national television debut

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 26, 2014) – Connor Pickford of Charlotte, North Carolina, who has never finished higher than 14th in his abbreviated four-year Professional Bowlers Association Tour career, will make his national television debut as the top qualifier in the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI's Viper Championship.

Pickford, 22, averaged 230.57 for 14 games on the Viper lane condition at South Point Bowling Center Sunday, finishing with a 3,228 pinfall total to capture the No. 1 berth in the Viper Championship ESPN finals by 32 pins over Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana. England's Dom Barrett jumped for fifth to third with a 223 final game and veteran Mika Koivuniemi of Hartland, Michigan, held on to fourth place with a 3,141 total, six pins ahead of Australia's Jason Belmonte and 11 ahead of first-round leader B.J. Moore III of Apex, North Carolina.

The top four players will bowl for the Viper Championship title on Saturday, Nov. 1, in the new South Point Bowling Plaza. The finals will air on ESPN on Sunday, Dec. 21.

"I had an amazing ball reaction tonight," Pickford said. "I've had all of my success with a MOTIV Venom Shock, my purple ball. I told my ball rep when I got into that ball tonight, it was game on. I didn't realize scores were so low because my ball reaction was so good."

Being in position to win his first national professional title is a dream Pickford began chasing at age 14 when he entered a PBA regional tournament, with parental consent. His dreams were temporarily derailed, he said, when he won \$100 in a youth tournament, which resulted in a year-long suspension from the national governing body. After sitting out a year, he was reinstated and returned to PBA competition, earning 2011-12 PBA South Region Player of the Year honors.

"That's when I decided this is what I'm supposed to do with my life," he said. "It's unbelievable to know (making his first TV final) is what I've worked for. A couple of years ago, I watched Jason Sterner – a fellow South Region competitor and a good friend – three all three strikes in 10th to make the show and I remember it was an incredible feeling. Now I get to bowl for my first title. I don't know what to think, but I'm pretty sure I won't get much sleep tonight."

World Series competition continues with qualifying for the PBA Chameleon Championship, the third of four qualifying legs in the PBA World Championship, Monday. Qualifying squads will bowl at 8 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. local time.

North Carolina's Moore Takes First Round Lead in PBA Viper Championship

Texan Shawn Maldonado leads PBA World Championship qualifying after two rounds

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 26, 2014) – B.J. Moore III of Apex, North Carolina, who has never finished higher than 26th place in six previous Professional Bowlers Association Tour appearances, seized the first round lead in the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI's Viper Championship Sunday at South Point Bowling Center.

Moore, a 26-year-old one-time PBA South Region title winner, averaged 234.57 on the Viper lane condition, rolling games of 226, 265, 213, 201, 258, 234 and 245 for a 1,642 total and a 26-pin lead over Ronnie Russell of Marion, Indiana. Connor Pickford of Charlotte, North Carolina, who also is trying for his first PBA Tour title, was third with 1,606 pins heading into Sunday night's second qualifying round.

The top four players after Sunday night's round will advance to the Viper Championship finals on Saturday, Nov. 1, in the new South Point Bowling Plaza. The Viper Championship finals will air on ESPN on Sunday, Dec. 21.

Moore said his success Sunday was based on bad decision-making Saturday in the Cheetah Championship presented by PBA Challenge Mobile Game, the first of the four animal pattern championships that are part of the World Series.

"Yesterday I had a game plan and I bailed on it, and it cost me making the cut," Moore said. "Today I just reiterated the same plan and told myself not to bail out on it.

"The plan was that I had certain bowling balls I wanted to use as I moved across the center. During practice they looked like I had planned, so I put them into play and it worked out. Yesterday I had the same plan, but I was a game too late in making the ball changes I should have made, and it cost me."

Moore said competing in World Series V a year ago at South Point also was a factor in Sunday's success.

"I didn't do very well last year, but it was a matter of getting your feet wet and seeing what it was like," he said. "It definitely gave me a lot of notes to work on. It helped me out a lot in knowing what to expect this time."

The Viper Championship also was the second of four qualifying events that will determine the 24-player field for the PBA World Championship match play competition which starts Wednesday. The combined seven-game qualifying round scores in the Cheetah, Viper, Monday's Chameleon and Tuesday's Scorpion Championships will determine the World Championship match play field. After 14 of 28 games, the

leading World Championship qualifiers are two-handed player Shawn Maldonado of Houston, Texas, with a 236.85 composite average and 3,316 pins, six ahead of Brad Angelo of Lockport, New York. PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber of St. Ann, Missouri, a 37-time PBA Tour title winner, is third with a 3,297 total.

World Series competition continues Monday with the PBA Chameleon Championship qualifying rounds. Squads will bowl at 8 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. PT.

South Carolina's Dick Allen Tops PBA Cheetah Championship Qualifying

Liz Johnson makes women's bowling history as GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI gets underway

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 25, 2014) – Dick Allen of Columbia, South Carolina, averaged 244.36.71 for 14 games Saturday to earn the top qualifying berth for the PBA Cheetah Championship presented by PBA Challenge Mobile Game as the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI officially got underway at South Point Bowling Center.

Allen needed a double in the final frame of his last game to retain the No. 1 position, but a bigger story developed a couple of pairs of lanes away when Liz Johnson of Cheektowaga, New York, completed a charge out of 24th place at the end of the first round to finish fourth and become the first woman to advance to a second PBA Tour national television finals. Johnson was the first woman ever to appear on a PBA Tour television show when she finished second in the 2004 Banquet Open in Wyoming, Mich., losing in the title match to 15-time PBA Tour tillist Tommy Jones.

After a 190 game in her second game Saturday night, Johnson caught fire, rolling games of 279, 245, 278, 258 and 248 to track down PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber of St. Ann, Missouri, and knock him out of the four-player television finals field by 43 pins.

Brad Angelo of Lockport, New York, who returned to competition after a year of battling injuries, qualified second with 3,414 pins, seven behind Allen, and Anthony Pepe of Elmhurst, New York, advanced to his first PBA TV final in third place with 3,412 pins.

Allen, who led the World Series field of 240 players throughout the day, is trying for his fourth PBA Tour title.

"I had a bad first game (185), but then I switched to a ball that worked better and started making shots," the 36-year-old Allen said. "Most of it was probably due to my off-season preparation.

"I lost 15 pounds after the Summer Swing in Oklahoma last May. Physically I felt a lot better, and I worked a lot on correcting my spine tilt from front to back and side-to-side on the approach. The end result is more shots are thrown correctly for a longer amount of time. It's all about leverage and consistency. Today was the day I really tried it in competition and it seems to be paying off."

The GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI continues Sunday at South Point with seven-game qualifying rounds for the Viper Championship at 8 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. Pacific Time.

Hall of Famers Monacelli, Williams Lead Field of PBA Challenge Finalists

PBA50 Tour, PBA Regional, PBA Women's Regional representatives advance to ESPN special event

LAS VEGAS (Oct. 24, 2014) – Professional Bowlers Association Hall of Famers Amleto Monacelli of Venezuela and Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Oxford, Florida, advanced to the finals of the PBA Challenge, a made-for-ESPN special event, as the GEICO PBA World Series of Bowling VI got underway Friday at South Point Bowling Center.

Monacelli and Williams finished one-two in an eight-game match play qualifying event for the 2014 season's top PBA50 Tour players, earning berths in the November 2 PBA Challenge television finals. Also advancing to the PBA Challenge from the PBA Regional qualifier were Josh Blanchard of Gilbert, Arizona, representing the PBA's West Region, and EJ Tackett of Huntington, Indiana, representing the PBA Central Region. The PBA Women's Regional finalists will be Colombia native Clara Guerrero of Pflugerville, Texas, representing the PBA Southwest Region, and Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, California, who won the PBA West Region berth in the qualifying event.

The PBA Challenge will include four one-game matches, with the four winners than competing in a unique Knock-Out Round finale on Sunday, Nov. 2, at the South Point Bowling Plaza. The ESPN telecast will air on Sunday, Jan. 19. The top 24 players after 28 combined games on the four animal patterns will advance to match play competition Wednesday and Thursday. A total of 52 games of qualifying and match play will produce the five finalists who will return to South Point for the live ESPN finals of the PBA World Championship on Jan. 11.

New Scoring System for Competitive Bowling to be Unveiled During World Bowling Tour Finals at WSOB VI

International task force develops fast-paced, easy-to-understand format for match play competition

ARLINGTON, Texas (Oct. 23, 2014) – Athletes and bowling fans around the world will be introduced to a proposed new scoring system for competitive bowling during the World Bowling Tour (WBT) Men's and Women's Finals in Las Vegas on November 2.

The new scoring system for competitive bowling is the result of the work done by an all-star panel of international bowling experts, including World Bowling leaders, athletes, coaches, news media and commercial bowling industry executives. The international task force, with the additional input of Professional Bowlers Association (PBA) leadership, developed the new system in order to make the sport more attractive and easier to understand for casual bowling fans, the news media and the competitors.

The new system, which impacts how the sport is scored as well as the format for competition, will be unveiled during the WBT Finals. The singles match play competition will be conducted as follows:

- 1) A match will involve 12 frames.
- 2) In each frame, each player will throw one shot.
- 3) If Player A gets a higher pin count than Player B, he/she will win the frame.
- 4) If both players strike, the frame will be tied.
- 5) If neither player strikes, but each has the same pin count, each player will try to convert the spare. If both successfully convert their spares, the frame will be a tie. If one player has a higher pin count than the other after two shots, that player will win the frame.
- 6) Scoring for the match will reflect who has won the most frames (example, 1 up, 2 up, etc. Allsquare means the match is tied).
- 7) At the point one player has won more frames than frames remain (example: 3 up after 10 frames), he/she will be declared the winner.
- 8) If a match is "all-square" after 12 frames, the tie will be broken using the single-frame format described above until the tie is broken.

The new system emphasizes winning the frame, much like golf's Ryder Cup places emphasis on winning a hole. This new system is expected to dramatically reduce the length of time and complexity of scoring required to complete a two-player match.

World Bowling President and CEO Kevin Dornberger noted "We believe we have found the right balance between modernizing our sport while retaining credibility and tradition our athletes and fans value. All of us involved with this project are looking forward to its introduction in Las Vegas".

The World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals will be contested in the new South Point Bowling Plaza in Las Vegas on Sunday, Nov. 2, and will air on ESPN on Sunday, Jan. 25.

About the World Bowling Tour Finals: The top-ranked bowlers in the world will be featured in the season-ending World Bowling Tour (WBT) Finals in November in the grand finale to the WBT season. The top three men and top three women in the WBT rankings were finalized over the weekend as the final stop on the 2014 schedule was held in Bangkok, Thailand. The finalists were determined based on the WBT points standings and will compete for a \$70,000 prize pool on Nov. 1 or 2 in Las Vegas.

Bob Glass, Chris Peters, Barb Wilt Elected to PBA Hall of Fame

2015 induction ceremonies planned for February 10 in Indianapolis

CHICAGO (Oct. 20, 2014) – Bob Glass, a dominant player during a 10-year career on the PBA50 Tour; former Microsoft executive Chris Peters, who played a key role as a new owner in reviving the Professional Bowlers Association, and Barb Wilt, the longest-tenured employee in PBA history, have been elected to the PBA Hall of Fame.

Induction ceremonies will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 10, at the Marriott Indianapolis North in conjunction with the 50th anniversary Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions. The Hall of Fame Dinner will be open to the public; ticket information will be announced later.

Glass was elected in the PBA50 Performance category. Peters and Wilt will be recognized in the Meritorious Service category for their extraordinary efforts behind the scenes to advance the PBA.

Glass, one of the first true power players on the PBA50 Tour, competed as a senior between 1997 and 2007 when he won nine titles and finished in the top five 38 times in 78 tournaments, earning just shy of a half-million dollars (\$487,215). He won a pair of majors – the 2000 Brunswick PBA Senior Championship and 2001 United States Bowling Congress Seniors Masters – and earned PBA50 Player of the Year honors in 2000, 2001 and 2004.

Glass, who holds a PhD in economics and has a law degree, lives in Lawrence, Kansas, and currently is Chief of Economics and Rates with the Kansas Corporation Commission in nearby Topeka. Glass will celebrate his 67th birthday on Friday, Oct. 24.

"I was really surprised," Glass said of his election. "I bowled some on the regular tour, and I really only bowled full-time 5 1/2 years on the senior tour. I just feel real lucky. It's kind of shocking.

"I used to tell people that my game degenerated slower than other people's because as a senior, I was able to beat guys who used to beat me regularly," he added.

With an imposing 6-foot-2, 230-pound frame, Glass said, "I was still pretty strong when I came out (on the PBA50 Tour). Actually, Steve Wunderlich (a three-time PBA Tour titlist), who was with Track at the time, probably saved my career when he convinced me to drop from 16-pound equipment for 15 pounds because the heavier ball was too powerful."

Peters, an early employee of Microsoft who later became an executive with the company, led the effort to purchase the PBA with partners and fellow Microsoft executives Mike Slade and Rob Glaser in 2000. Peters and his partners provided an infusion of capital to ensure a solid foundation for the organization

while at the same time providing vision and innovative ideas to enhance the fan experience especially in the areas of event presentation and online coverage. The introduction of a professionally-designed "arena style set for TV finals, including professional presentation of signage and an overall enhanced image, helped the PBA generate more new non-bowling corporate sponsorships than the PBA had seen in several years.

During Peters' tenure as an owner and Chairman of the PBA Board of Directors, the PBA:

• Hired former Nike executives to enhance the organization's position as a major sports organization;

• Re-launched a more comprehensive and fan-friendly PBA.com;

• Developed live online broadcasting of PBA competition through Strike Pass subscription service (now Xtra-Frame). Strike Pass was one of the first online ventures in the sports world to provide fans with live video-streaming coverage;

• Successfully negotiated long-term contracts with ESPN to establish a consistent time slot for PBA Tour telecasts;

• Introduced the PBA Exempt Tour for the 2004-05 season, creating an "elite" tour to better showcase PBA Tour players and provide the Tour's most successful players with guaranteed opportunities to make a living by including record prize money for standard events. Each major featured a minimum \$100,000 first prize, with the PBA World Championship offering a then-record \$120,000 first prize.

"I was very excited when (PBA Commissioner) Tom Clark called," Peters said. "It's great. I'm a bit overwhelmed, but obviously this is shared with (co-owners) Rob (Glaser) and Mike (Slade). They were responsible, not just financially, but with their enthusiasm and ideas and everything else. I never could have done this without them.

"It's been 15 years since I first talked with (former PBA Commissioner) Mark Gerberich," Peters continued "Way back then, Rob and Mike and I thought there might be a way to showcase bowling on the Internet. The idea was crazy at the time, but now the world is catching up, and that's great to see.

"The nicest thing about my involvement is the people I met in the bowling industry," he added. "They are the nicest people I've met in the world, bar none, and that's what makes this so special. The PBA didn't have to do this. It's a huge honor. It's kind of a sad note, but my father was a big bowling fan, and he died during the past 15 years. He was the first one I wanted to call, so that kind of explains how much this means to me."

Wilt, who joined the PBA staff in 1970, retired to North Carolina in 2014 after 44 years of service to the organization. Her duties ranged from processing all PBA Tour entries to managing all of the PBA's statistical records, and virtually every other hands-on office chore over her extensive career.

When the PBA was sold in 2000, the new owners asked Wilt to assist with the transition to the new headquarters in Seattle, so she moved to Seattle and continued to work to make improvements in membership, entries and statistical processes.

She was the face of the PBA among most of its thousands of members over four-plus decades, providing a familiar and friendly voice to help them with their needs, and she was conduit between PBA's national and regional tournament directors in bridging the gap between the "office and the road." She also became the organization's unofficial historian and served as a guardian of old records, photographs and historical information.

"I'm overwhelmed. I never believed this would happen," Wilt said. "It's pretty overwhelming and I'm very very honored.

"I did a job I loved to do, and worked with great people and terrific athletes, and I got the better end of the deal. It's pretty cool."

There were no candidates elected in the PBA Performance category.

Eligibility for the PBA Hall of Fame in the performance category requires a minimum of 20 years of PBA membership plus a minimum of 10 standard PBA Tour titles, or five titles plus two majors. Eligibility for the PBA50 performance category, which is intended to recognize players who excelled after reaching the age of 50, requires a minimum of 10 years of PBA50 competition plus a minimum of eight PBA50 Tour titles, or five standard PBA50 titles plus two majors. Candidates must receive a two-thirds majority of ballots cast in order to be elected.

SEATTLE (Aug. 28, 2014) – Who will be the first player selected when the Professional Bowlers Association conducts its 2015 PBA League Draft on Friday, Oct. 31, during the PBA World Series of Bowling VI? Reigning Player of the Year Jason Belmonte? Hall of Famer Pete Weber? A left-hander, right-hander, budding future star?

A live international audience watching the third annual PBA League draft on PBA's online bowling channel Xtra Frame, will be the first to know as eight team managers select all-new team rosters in preparation for the PBA Tour's first-ever visit to the state of Maine.

The eight-team PBA League will compete in two days of team competition for delayed telecast on ESPN on Saturday and Sunday, March 28-29, at Bayside Bowl in Portland, Maine.

The PBA League in 2015 will feature the same eight teams it fielded during its first two seasons, but the only thing about the teams that will remain the same is their names and team managers. After a random draw to determine the draft order, managers will fill their rosters with five players who will compete in Maine in two days of intense competition featuring Baker-format elimination rounds leading to the Elias Cup Finals. The Elias Cup will be decided by points earned in singles, doubles, trio and Baker team matches.

Highlights of the 2015 program include:

• The 2015 draft will be held on Friday, Oct. 31, during PBA WSOB VI at South Point in Las Vegas and carried live on PBA's Xtra Frame online bowling channel. Team managers will be: Mark Baker (defending Elias Cup champion Silver Lake Atom Splitters), Carolyn Dorin-Ballard (GEICO New York City WTT KingPins), Johnny Petraglia (Brooklyn STyLES), Norm Duke (Dallas Strikers), Tim Mack (Pittsburgh Jack Rabbits), Jason Couch (Philadelphia Hitmen), Andrew Cain (L.A. X) and Del Ballard Jr. (Barbasol Motown Muscle).

• Players eligible for the 2015 PBA League Draft will be the top 50 in PBA Tour competition points between the 2013 World Series of Bowling V and the 2014 Oklahoma Grand Casino and Resort Summer Swing, plus any player who was on a PBA League roster for 2014, but didn't qualify based on points (see the complete draft-eligible player list below).

• For the draft, eligible players will be ranked based upon their position on the points list. The first player elected by each team must be taken from the group of players ranking 1-10 on the points list. The

second player drafted will come from the group ranked 11-20 in points, plus any undrafted players from group one. The third player drafted will come from those ranked 21-30 in points. The fourth player will come from those ranked 31-40 in points, and the fifth player will come from the players ranked 41-50 and previous team members not among the points leaders. Players undrafted in each round will be eligible in the following round, expanding the pool of players as each round continues. The draft exception will be Dallas player-manager Norm Duke, who finished 39th on the points list, will draft himself in the fourth round.

• The only draft-eligible woman on the list is Colombia native Clara Guerrero, who last year became the third woman in history to bowl in a nationally-televised final when she qualified for the PBA Cheetah Championship stepladder in WSOB V, eventually finishing fourth.

• Draft-eligible players must declare their desire to participate in the PBA League. Players may begin declaring for the draft on October 1. The deadline to declare is October 15.

• A random draw will determine the team draft order. The draft will then be conducted in "serpentine" format whereby Team No. 1 will pick first in the first round and last in the second round, and Team No. 8 will pick last in the first round and first in the second round, etc.

In the 2015 PBA League playoffs, players will compete for a projected \$250,000 in prize money.

The three-day visit to Portland will include a day of practice and pro-am activity where Maine adult, youth and senior league bowlers will have a chance to bowl with the stars of the PBA, followed by two days of Baker-format team competition for delayed telecast on ESPN. The quarterfinal round will include four best-of-two-game Baker team matches, with all five players bowling two frames per game. The four winning teams will advance to the two-game, Baker format semifinal round which will produce two winners to bowl for the Elias Cup.

The Elias Cup will be decided based upon total pinfall for a singles match (with 10 bonus pins to the winner), alternate-shot doubles match (15 bonus pins), trios match (20 bonus pins) and five-player Baker team match (50 bonus pins).

• ESPN will televise the PBA League quarterfinal, semifinal and Elias Cup Finals on four consecutive Sundays, March 29, April 5, 12 and 19.

Jack Jurek Wins PBA50 South Shore Open for First PBA50 Tour Title

HAMMOND, Ind. (Aug.7, 2014) – Jack Jurek of Lackawanna, N.Y., who has endured a series of bad breaks in his quest for his first PBA50 Tour title, made a breakthrough Thursday night when he struck on eight of his first nine shots to defeat PBA Hall of Famer Randy Pedersen of Clermont, Fla., 242-205, in the title match of the PBA50 South Shore Open at Olympia Lanes.

"It's never an easy battle out here," Jurek said. "I've won a couple of Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Awards because I've lost a lot of times in title matches and people think I'm a nice guy."

Jurek, who had disappointing losses in Dayton, Ohio, a week earlier after losing a crushing loss to Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. earlier in the year in the USBC Senior Masters title match, came into the finale in Hammond with a fresh attitude, thanks in part to some advice he got from Pedersen, his traveling roommate.

"(Randy) and I talked a little after my debacle in Dayton and he gave me some thoughts about how he approaches things," Jurek said. "It helped. I've got a lot of guys who have been trying to help. (PBA legend) Mark Roth has been telling me, stop being so nice. Go beat people, so tonight I just decided to go for it. I was a lot more aggressive than I have been."

Against Pedersen, Jurek's only major mistake was leaving a 2-4-8-10 split in the fourth frame, but otherwise he was nearly perfect.

"Jack was due," Pedersen said. "He's been bowling really well. After he left the 2-4-8-10 (in the fifth frame), I was wondering if the old Jack was going to show up or the new one. He preserved."

In the first semifinal round between a pair of PBA Hall of Famers, Pedersen defeated Pete Weber of St. Ann, Mo., 267-226, putting a crimp in Weber's hopes to overtake fellow PBA Hall of Famer Norm Duke in the 2014 PBA50 Player of the Year race. That battle will be decided in the PBA50 Tour's season finale in Welch, Minn., next week.

Duke, who leads the race with 56 points, failed to add to his total in Hammond when he was eliminated in the Round of 8. Weber picked up four points for finishing fourth to increase his total to 48 heading into Welch, Minn. Tom Baker of King, N.C., also remains in contention with 44 points. In the Player of the Year competition, 16 points will be awarded to the tournament winner, the runner-up gets eight points, third-place is worth four points and the fourth-place finisher earns two points. In the second semifinal match, Jurek, a PBA50 Tour rookie and two-time PBA Tour title winner, used a string of nine strikes to defeat Canadian John Chapman, 267-206. For Chapman, who was trying for his first PBA50 title, it was his highest finish as a senior player.

The most dramatic match of the tournament came in the best-of-five-game Round of 16 when Chapman eliminated Duke, 3-2. After Duke jumped out to a 2-0 lead, Chapman rallied to win the last three games, 247-234, 231-224 and 248-247.

The PBA50 Tour concludes its 2014 season next week with the PBA50 Treasure Island Resort & Casino Open presented by Hammer at Island Xtreme Bowl in Welch, Minn. The season-finale gets underway with a special "Pete Weber Knock Down Pins for Cancer" event on Sunday, Aug. 10, followed by eight-game qualifying rounds Monday and Tuesday at 9 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. each day. After 16 games, the top 32 players will advance to single-elimination match play competition beginning at 8 a.m. Wednesday. The Round of 8, followed by semifinal and championship rounds, begin at 5 p.m.

50th Anniversary Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions Returns to Indianapolis

Historic PBA major championship returns to the city of its birth Feb. 11-15, 2015

INDIANAPOLIS (Aug. 7, 2014) – Woodland Bowl, the host for some of the most memorable championships in Professional Bowlers Association history, will once again step into the spotlight early in 2015 when the 50th anniversary PBA Tournament of Champions returns to the city where it was born.

The newly-renovated Woodland Bowl will host the milestone Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions Monday, Feb. 11 through Sunday, Feb. 15, when ESPN will televise the finals live at 1 p.m. ET. First prize will be \$50,000. All qualifying and match play rounds will be covered live on PBA's subscription-based online bowling channel, Xtra Frame.

Throughout its history, Woodland Bowl has hosted 30 PBA Tour events including four U.S. Opens, two PBA World Championships, two PBA Touring Players Championships and, most recently, the 2013 PBA Tournament of Champions which was won in historic fashion by PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber.

Weber also won the 1991 U.S. Open and 1992 PBA Touring Players Championships at Woodland.

"I told (Woodland Bowl general manager) Jim Doty, what a great place to break Earl's record," Weber said, referring to the fact that he's currently tied with PBA legend Earl Anthony with 10 PBA major titles. "I feel comfortable when I walk in the door because I know I'm going to bowl well."

Weber will have opportunities to break the majors record in the PBA World Championship later this year in Las Vegas or the United States Bowling Congress Master the week prior to the Tournament of Champions, but if he doesn't win either of those events, he'll come to Indianapolis with a lot of confidence.

"When I heard the news that we're going back to Woodland, I told myself I know I can win there. You always want to do something Earl hasn't done, so winning my 11th major there would be really cool."

Weber tied Anthony for most PBA majors when he defeated Australia's Jason Belmonte, 224-179, to win the 2013 Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions, becoming the oldest player ever to win at the TOC at age 50 and becoming the only player in PBA history to complete the PBA Triple Crown (TOC, U.S. Open and PBA World Championship) twice. Belmonte will return to Indianapolis as defending TOC champion after winning the 2014 title in Allen Park, Mich.

The return of the TOC to Indianapolis is significant because the tournament originated at Play Bowl in 1962 in Indianapolis and Indianapolis was the home to titled sponsor Barbasol when it was invented as the first commercial shaving cream in 1919.

"We're very happy to continue our long-standing partnership with the PBA," said Barbasol Director of Media Relations Dean Bring. "Barbasol has a rich legacy of sports sponsorship and to be aligned with the PBA's signature event is a great fit for both of our organizations."

Tournament of Champions week will begin with PBA Hall of Fame induction ceremonies on Tuesday, Feb. 10. The PBA will announce additional details regarding the hall of fame soon.

A capacity field of 150 champions will begin competition on Wednesday, Feb. 11, with eight-game qualifying rounds at 10 a.m. and 5 p.m. Every PBA member in good standing who has ever won a PBA title – PBA Tour, PBA50 Tour, PBA International Tour, PBA Regional or PBA Women's Series – will be eligible to participate.

After a third qualifying round Thursday morning, the top 24 players will advance to eight-game roundrobin match play rounds Thursday and Friday to determine the five stepladder finalists.

Saturday's schedule will feature three pro-am squads for Indianapolis area grassroots men, women, youth and senior league bowlers.

In addition to live coverage of the finals on ESPN, the Tournament of Champions will be seen around the world on Xtra Frame from the start of qualifying through match play, plus pre- and post-finals special shows. World's top players to compete in traditional events; new PBA Challenge added to ESPN lineup

SEATTLE (Aug. 4, 2014) – Entries will open on Friday, Aug. 15, for the Professional Bowlers Association's World Series of Bowling VI which returns to South Point Bowling Center in Las Vegas Oct. 24-Nov. 2 with a proven formula, a capacity field of the world's most talented bowlers and a few new wrinkles.

The World Series, which made its debut in suburban Detroit in 2009, has evolved into an international showcase for bowlers from around the world, and the sixth edition of the multi-event championships will carry on the tradition of drama and excitement with the addition of a new PBA Challenge television show and a first-look at the new South Point Bowling Stadium which will host World Series TV finals.

PBA Adjusts Women's Dues, Re-Schedules Central, Midwest Region Events

SEATTLE (July 18, 2014) – Based upon input from women bowlers, Professional Bowlers Association Deputy Commissioner Kirk von Krueger announced Friday that the PBA has adjusted membership dues for women for the balance of the 2014 season as part of a revised PBA Women's Regional program.

The inaugural PBA Women's Regional program, offering women bowlers close-to-home opportunities to bowl in PBA-caliber competition, will culminate with a PBA Challenge television event on ESPN which also will feature the PBA Regional Finals match, PBA50 Tour Finals match and Teen Masters Grand Championship match. To enhance the program, the PBA will pro-rate membership dues for women to \$75 for the balance of the 2014 season, and waive the standard initiation fee for new members.

Von Krueger also announced tournaments originally scheduled for this weekend in the Central and Midwest Regions have been replaced due to an unforeseen conflict with the BPAA Women's All Star which gets underway Sunday in Rockford, Ill.

"We've received a lot of favorable reaction from interested women bowlers since we announced this new program, and based upon that feedback, we're making a few other adjustments to the program – including a pro-rated membership structure for women for the rest of the 2014 season – to make it more accessible and more affordable," von Krueger said.

The new regional program will result in eight women's points leaders based on three-tournament series conducted by the PBA's East, South, Central, Midwest, Southwest, West/Northwest combined and Japan Regions advancing the PBA World Series of Bowling VI in Las Vegas.

The PBA Women's Regional Finals in Las Vegas will feature an eight-game round-robin match play competition at South Point Bowling Center on Oct. 24. The top two players will advance to the ESPN telecast. The eight regional qualifiers also will receive paid entries into the World Series where they will compete in the PBA Cheetah, Scorpion, Chameleon and Viper Opens – all leading to a chance to qualify for the PBA World Championship.

Additional updates to the women's program announced Friday include:

• A new \$75 PBA membership, with no initiation fee, will be offered to women for the duration of 2014 if they wish to join. Women who want to compete for berths in the PBA Women's Regional Finals in Las Vegas must be PBA members in order to earn points in their regions, and to enter the PBA World Series of Bowling VI.

• Tournaments scheduled in the PBA Central and Midwest Regions for the July 19-20 weekend have been re-scheduled to avoid a conflict with the BPAA Women's All Star in Rockford, Ill., and to give more players an opportunity to enter (see revised schedule below).

• The competition points leaders for three designated tournaments in the eight regional programs will also receive paid entries to bowl in the PBA World Series of Bowling VI. The top two women in combined West/Northwest Region points will qualify for the PBAW Regional Finals.

• A PBA Regional title will be awarded if the regional tournament field includes 20 or more PBA women members, or if a woman wins the "open" portion of the regional outright. Winning a PBA Regional title also means a player is eligible to enter the PBA Tournament of Champions.

Other aspects of the PBA Women's Regional program will continue as originally announced:

• Women will bowl with and against male bowlers in each regional tournament, but women will be guaranteed at last one cashing spot (minimum \$250). All women will be eligible to cash in the general prize fund and if she is a PBA member and wins the regional, she will earn a PBA Regional title (which also means eligibility for the PBA Tournament of Champions).

• Women who are PBA members may enter regionals at the PBA member entry fee; non-member women will pay the non-member entry fee.

"This is an entirely new program for us," von Krueger added. "We are going to watch it closely, listen to players and do whatever we can to make it bigger and better in the future. We know there are hundreds of women bowlers across the United States who are looking for a place to bowl in high-level competition, and that's what we're striving to provide."

"My secret was I practiced and prepared a lot," the recent Eau Gallie High School graduate said.

After a disappointing performance in the 2013 Teen Masters when he bowled as a member of Junior Team USA, Coffey said he was determined to do better this time around.

"I practiced with the two (Teen Masters) balls all year long," he said. "I worked on my grip, throwing at any speed I needed, different hand positions, different angles on the lane. I knew I could do basically anything I wanted. I just had to stay calm and make good shots.

Bill O'Neill Cruises to Oklahoma's King of the Swing Victory

PBA Badger Open champ brings PBA Summer Swing to near perfect ending

SHAWNEE, Okla. – Top qualifier Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., brought the Professional Bowlers Association Tour's Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing to a near-perfect close, cruising past Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., to win the King of the Swing finale, 245-181, at the Grand Event Center.

The concluding event in Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing aired Tuesday on CBS Sports Network. The Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing was contested on the 52-foot Badger lane condition, selected by O'Neill as the Summer Swing points leader. O'Neill won the PBA Badger Open earlier in the swing.

The final match was decided early. O'Neill struck on eight of his first nine shots and held a 55-pin lead after five frames when Rash failed to convert the 4-7-9-10 split in his fifth frame. After a second split and open by Rash in the seventh frame, O'Neill had the match locked up. O'Neill's open in the 10th frame was meaningless.

The King of the Swing was a special event. No PBA Tour title was awarded, but O'Neill took home \$10,000 and a lot of restored confidence.

"I've been working hard. I've had some struggles over the past couple of years, but I've tried to stay mentally right," he said. "Any time you win it's a boost to your confidence, but to win the way I did here by doubling in the 10th on a really difficult condition (to win the Badger Open), and bowling a really good game today really helps. You don't often bowl a guy like Sean and have the match closed out by the eighth or ninth frame.

"I'm just really happy overall," O'Neill said with a smile. "It may not be an official PBA title, but I got a trophy and it's a title in my heart."

In the first match, Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., who earned the "wild card" berth as the player with the most Summer Swing points without winning a title, eliminated Bear Open champion Ronnie Russell of Marion, Ind., 236-206, in a contest that featured seven strikes by Jones and five 10 pins sandwiched between strikes by Russell.

Rash, the Wolf Open winner, started match two with six strikes to take a 33-pin lead over Jones and won handily, 257-212. Jones' rally was cut short when he left the 4-9 split in the ninth frame and failed to convert.

In the semifinal match, Oklahoma Open winner Jason Belmonte of Australia had a chance to eliminate Rash with two strikes in the 10th frame, but he left a 10 pin on his first ball and missed the spare. Rash won, 236-224, and advanced to the championship match.

The PBA Tour will return to action Oct. 24-Nov. 2 when South Point Hotel, Casino and Bowling Center in Las Vegas hosts PBA World Series of Bowling VI, a multi-event competition featuring the PBA Cheetah, Scorpion, Chameleon and Viper Championships, the PBA World Championship, the World Bowling Tour Men's and Women's Finals, and a new PBA Champion's Challenge special event. In the interim, PBA players will compete in World Bowling-PBA International Tour's World Bowling Tour Thailand in Bangkok, Aug. 18-25.

PBA Introduces New Women's Regional Tournament Program

Six PBA Regional programs to offer three events; series to conclude at PBA World Series of Bowling VI

SEATTLE (June 24, 2014) – The Professional Bowlers Association has created a new PBA Women's Regional Tour program that will begin in July and culminate at the PBA World Series of Bowling VI in Las Vegas this fall, Commissioner Tom Clark announced today.

The PBA Women's Regional Tour will provide women bowlers with opportunities to compete against other women in the same kind of affordable, close-to-home tournament structure that has given thousands of male bowlers an opportunity to develop their skills since the PBA introduced its regional program 1969.

"Women bowlers have been without a formal tournament structure for too long," Clark said. "The PBA took steps to address that problem when we introduced the PBA Women's Series in 2007. The program was suspended after three seasons, but we have always wanted to provide women with a place to compete. This new program is a step in that direction. Our sincere hope is that it will evolve into something more substantial in the future."

The PBA has allowed women to bowl with and against their male counterparts since 2004, and a number of women bowl in PBA Tour, PBA Regional and PBA50 events each year. Eight women have won PBA Regional Tour titles. Kelly Kulick of Union, N.J., made history when she won the 2010 PBA Tournament of Champions.

Under the new program, six PBA Regional programs (East, South, Central, Midwest, Southwest and West/Northwest combined) will each conduct three events that will be designated as PBAW competition points events (see schedule below). Women will bowl with and against their male counterparts, but there will be specific prizes and benefits for women only, similar to the cashing system for "super seniors" who bowl in PBA50 tournaments. The tournaments will not diminish PBA Regional prize funds in any way, but at least one woman will cash for \$250 in each tournament if a woman doesn't cash in the regular prize list. Additional cash prizes will be paid based upon the number of women entered.

In each designated event, competition points will be awarded based upon how the women finish. The leader in competition points in each of the six programs will receive a paid entry into PBA World Series of Bowling VI at South Point Bowling Center in Las Vegas Oct. 24-Nov. 2, and the six regional qualifiers will compete in a special six-game, round robin Champion's Challenge Match Play round on Oct. 24. The top two women from the match play round will compete for the PBA Women's Regional Finals title.

Women's entry fees for regional events will be the same as for men: \$220 for members or \$285 for nonmembers. Non-members are welcome for all PBAW events, but only PBA members will earn points and be eligible for the paid WSOB entries.

Bill O'Neil Slows Brian Valenta Express to Win PBA Badger Open

Pennsylvania veteran throws clutch double in 10th frame to win fifth PBA Tour title

SHAWNEE, Okla. – Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., derailed Brian Valenta's hopes for a first title, throwing two strikes in the 10th frame to edge Valenta, 243-235, in the Professional Bowlers Association Tour Badger Open championship match at the Grand Casino Resort Event Center.

The finals of the third of five Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing events, contested on a 52-foot Badger lane condition – the longest oiling pattern in PBA's library of lane conditions – aired Tuesday on CBS Sports Network.

Along with his fifth career PBA Tour title – and first since the 2012 Cheetah Championship – O'Neill earned \$10,000 and a berth in Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing, a special event that will conclude the Summer Swing.

While Valenta, a two-handed, high-revolution player, played a severe inside line, lofting the ball 10 feet or more down the lane, O'Neill moved to the right side of the lane and played a much straighter shot to the pocket.

"I knew I couldn't play (as far inside as Valenta was playing)," O'Neill said. "Mika (Koivuniemi) couldn't do it, Marshall (Kent) couldn't do it and Pete (Weber) couldn't do it. If Pete can't play inside, I have no business being there, so I told myself two hours ago, in practice, I'm going to stay right here and make it work.

"It was one of those days when everything worked out, and when I got up in the 10th, I really wasn't nervous. I knew what I had to do. Whatever (Valenta) did, it didn't matter. I knew I was going to get up there and double, and that's what I did.

"It felt great to do so. It's been a while since I've been in that position. I couldn't be happier."

Valenta was obviously disappointed about falling short of his first title, but the 29-year-old seventh-year pro was pleased about winning three matches in his first PBA Tour television appearance.

"My 'A' game is lofting, and I did pretty well today," Valenta said. "I only made two bad shots. I knew if other guys played to the right of me, they had to go straight. If they moved left to where I was, then it

was playing my game against yours and we'll see who wins. I wanted them to come my way because I figured my rev rate would be the equalizer.

"I had a great time," he added. "I got a little intense, but I didn't go crazy."

In his first match, Valenta threw strikes on his first five shots and filled the final five frames in cruising to a 237-172 win over Koivuniemi, a 13-time PBA Tour winner from Hartland, Mich.

With the oil burning out in the front part of the lane, Valenta began lofting the ball past the arrows and continued striking in an easy 236-165 win over Kent, a PBA rookie from Yakima, Wash., who didn't strike until the eighth frame.

Valenta moved even farther left and lofted the ball farther down the lane, putting together one string of three strikes in a cat-and-mouse battle with Weber, a PBA Hall of Famer and 37-time titlist, in the semifinal match. Weber trailed by four pins after eight frames, but missed a 7 pin spare attempt in the ninth to let Valenta escape with a 204-190 decision.

The title match was a frame-to-frame battle all the way to the 10th where Valenta doubled to force O'Neill to duplicate his feat for the win.

Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing continues next Tuesday at 7 p.m. ET on CBS Sport Network with the finals of the PBA Oklahoma Open. Finalists will be top qualifier E.J. Tackett of Huntington, Ind., the 2013 PBA Rookie of the Year; Chris Loschetter of Avon, Ohio; Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa.; Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., and reigning PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte of Australia. Indiana's Ronnie Russell Wins PBA Bear Open for Second PBA Tour Title

New-found confidence key to first victory in U.S. after 11 years, 159 tournaments

SHAWNEE, Okla. – After 11 years and 159 tournaments, Ronnie Russell of Marion, Ind., won his first Professional Bowlers Association Tour title on U.S. soil at the Grand Casino Resort Event Center, defeating top qualifier Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., 234-164, to win the PBA Bear Open.

The finals of the second of five Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing events, contested on a demanding flat, 40-foot Bear lane condition, aired Tuesday on CBS Sports Network.

Russell, who said he discovered what it takes to win when he won the 2013 Brunswick Euro Challenge in Munich, earned \$10,000 for winning the Bear Open.

He also claimed a spot in the Oklahoma's Grand Resort Casino King of the Swing special event that will conclude the Summer Swing. Wolf Open winner Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., previously qualified for the King of the Swing.

Russell, a 34-year-old right-hander, said a high level of focus and excellent spare shooting led to his title, but in the title match, it was a string of four strikes and another double that made it look easy as Jones struggled the entire match.

"The biggest key is, I've bowled on TV quite a bit now and I've been through the worst imaginable things you can do to lose titles – I mean absolutely the worst – so now I just tell myself to focus on the shot and no matter what you do, you can't do as bad as you did before," Russell said. "I've been to the bottom, so I figured there has to be a top somewhere.

"Ever since I threw a strike to win in Germany, I've known I can do it again. My composure and everything has changed, and I actually have confidence now. It's awesome."

Russell advanced to his first title-match appearance in the U.S. since the 2009 Chameleon Open, where he lost to Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa. He avenged that loss in the semifinal match when he took a 21-pin lead over O'Neill, the No. 2 qualifier, with a string of four strikes early in the game and held on for a 215-212 victory when O'Neill failed to double in the 10th frame.

In the first match, Dick Allen of Columbia, S.C., missed a 3 pin in the fifth frame to give Rhino Page of Dade City, Fla., the lead, but Allen followed the missed spare with a string of five strikes to pull away to a 234-213 victory.

In match two, Allen and Russell were never more than eight pins apart and Allen's spectacular conversion of the 2-8-10 split in the ninth frame gave him a chance to win after Russell failed to double in the 10th frame. Needing a double to advance, Allen got the first strike but left a 10 pin on his second, handing Russell a 195-192 decision.

The finals capped a calm, steady qualifying performance by Russell in the preliminary rounds at nearby FireLake Bowling Center.

"I didn't shoot under 200 the entire (first 12 games at FireLake)," he said. "My spare shooting was awesome. The only reason I didn't lead the tournament was that every time I had a chance to shoot 240, I'd open in the 10th frame. I just stayed in that pace between 200 and 220 and ground it out."

PBA to Expand Regional Tournament Program into Japan

Inaugural eight-event series will be part of qualifying for 2015 DHC Japan World Challenge

SEATTLE (June 4, 2014) – The Professional Bowlers Association and Japan Bowling Promotions have jointly announced an historic agreement that will create the first PBA International Regional program, a series that will serve as a qualifying system for the DHC Japan World Challenge in January, 2015.

The first events, the PBA Japan Women's DHC Cheetah Open and PBA Japan DHC Cheetah Open for men and women, will be held July 5 and 6, respectively, at Tokyo Port Bowl in Tokyo.

"I am very excited," said Japan Bowling Promotions Managing Director Shinichiro Kinoshita. "This program has been a goal since we formed our company five years ago. It is a huge leap forward for the sport of bowling."

"The cultivation of very high level competition that will help develop world-class bowling talent around the globe has always been a goal of the PBA," said PBA Commissioner Tom Clark. "This landmark program is an example of how cooperation at the highest levels can produce great results for the international bowling community."

The inaugural PBA Japan Regional series will include eight tournaments – six sponsored by DHC Corporation, Japan's largest skincare product company and two events with multiple sponsors – and two with multiple sponsors. Five of the events will be for men, three for women. All of the tournaments will involve qualifying for the 2015 DHC Japan World Challenge, a PBA International Tour event that will feature an estimated \$225,000 prize fund for its men's and women's divisions next January.

All of the PBA Japan Regional events will be contested on PBA "animal pattern" lane conditions, providing international players an opportunity to experience the same lane conditioning patterns that are used in PBA Tour competition in the United States. The regionals will be open to any bowler who cares to enter.

The regional format will be: one-day events start with two squads bowling eight qualifying games. The top 14 per squad will bowl two more qualifying games with the top eight per squad bowling two additional games. The top four per squad will then advance to single-elimination match play to determine winners. Each regional will feature an estimated \$20,000 prize fund. The top four men and top two women based on competition points at the end of the regional series will automatically qualify for the DHC Japan World Challenge.

"We have held numerous meetings with the PBA over the past six months to establish this tour," Kinoshita said. "We have faced many twists and turns, but we have solved problems along the way and the PBA has given us the go-ahead.

"We want to provide our Japanese athletes with an opportunity to look beyond Japan to world-wide tournaments," Kinoshita continued. "We hope to create a hero who will attract more news media coverage and build our reputation.

"We thank our sponsors, the Japan bowling centers that have supported us, the Japan bowling industry and the PBA for working hard to help us achieve this goal. Without their cooperation, we could not have accomplished this program."

Clark and PBA Deputy Commissioner Kirk Von Krueger, who spearheaded the project, will attend the July 12-13 Women's DHC Chameleon Open and DHC Chameleon Open at Sound Bowl in Ushiku, a Tokyo suburb.

Sean Rash Rolls 300, Strikes His Way to PBA Wolf Open title

23rd nationally-televised 300 game helps former Player of the Year win eighth career title

SHAWNEE, Okla. – Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., started the Professional Bowlers Association Wolf Open with the PBA's 23rd nationally-televised 300 game and continued his strike barrage in winning his eighth career title in the opening event of Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing at the Grand Event Center.

The first of five PBA Summer Swing events aired Tuesday on CBS Sports Network.

Rash, the 2011-12 PBA Player of the Year, threw 37 strikes out of a possible 48 attempts in defeating Chris Loschetter, 300-236; Martin Larsen, 225-221; Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas, 241-214, and top qualifier Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, 238-179, in the title match. Rash won \$10,000 plus a \$10,000 bonus for his televised 300 game.

"It seems like forever (since my last title in the U.S.), but it's only been two years since I won the Tournament of Champions," Rash said. "Winning's everything. It doesn't matter if it's in a parking lot in Alaska or wherever."

Rash spoiled Loschetter's 34th birthday when he threw his perfect game at the Avon, Ohio, resident and defending Wolf Open champion in the first match. It was the first nationally-televised perfect game since Barnes threw a 300 game at Rash and Australia's Jason Belmonte in an elimination match in the 2011 PBA Shark Open finals during PBA World Series of Bowling III at South Point in Las Vegas.

"I was a little nervous because I had the front eight (strikes) a few years ago in Medford (Ore.) and I've had a few other chances," Rash said. "You just want to make a good shot to give yourself a chance. It was a great feeling, one of those you'll never forget."

In the second match, an unconverted 4-6-7 split by Sweden's Larsen in the sixth frame allowed Rash to stay close, and a 4 pin on Larsen's first shot in the 10th frame gave Rash a chance to win. Working on a strike in the ninth frame, Rash added three more in the 10th frame for a come-from-behind 225-221 victory.

"All you can ask for in situations like that is a chance," Rash said. "If (Larsen) strikes on that first shot in the 10th, my day is over. But I still had to double. You just have to put yourself in the right frame of mind. You have to go through the process because once you let go of the ball, you have no control over the end result. Fortunately it turned out the right way for me."

In the semifinal match, Fagan struggled with pin carry, throwing only three strikes in the first eight frames while Rash struck on eight of his first nine shots on his way to a 241-214 victory. In the title match, Rash continued to pound the pocket while Barnes never built any momentum.

"Fagan and (Larsen) both threw urethane balls and I think it backfired on them," Rash noted. "They didn't have the hold and the look they had in the preliminary round at FireLake (Bowling Center, where preliminary rounds were contested). I think if Barnes had a re-do, he'd probably throw a different ball, but the ball he threw (at FireLake) got him into the lead and he ran away from the field. He has a lot of confidence in that ball."

While Rash's strikes were key to his victory, the deciding factor actually was his spare shooting. He had only two open frames in four games – one a split, one a chopped 6-10 spare attempt.

"When the scoring pace is high, you can't miss the pocket, but you also have to fill frames," he said. "The one thing I'm proud about this week is that I bowled 52 games and missed four spares. That's what I really work on at home. I don't practice throwing strikes very much."

With his win in the Wolf Open, Rash claimed the first berth in the Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing special event that will conclude the Summer Swing.

E.J. Tackett Tames Bear, Captures Top Berth in PBA Oklahoma Open Finals

2013 Rookie of the Year takes on veteran field in bid for first PBA title

SHAWNEE, Okla. (May 22, 2014) – Professional Bowlers Association 2013 Rookie of the Year E.J. Tackett of Huntington, Ind., tamed the PBA's Bear lane condition Thursday afternoon and used that momentum to capture the No. 1 position in the PBA Oklahoma Open stepladder finals Thursday night at FireLake Bowling Center.

Tackett, a 21-year-old in search for his first PBA Tour title, averaged 223.255 for 36 games on the PBA's Wolf, Bear and Badger lane conditions, and as top qualifier, selected the flat, 40-foot Bear lane condition for the Oklahoma Open finals. The finals in all five Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing events will be contested Saturday and Sunday at the Grand Resort Event Center for telecast on CBS Sports Network beginning June 3.

Tackett, who finished the Oklahoma Open with a 36-game total of 8,367 pins, including 330 bonus pins for winning 11 of his 18 matches. It's the first time he has led a traditional PBA Tour event, although he was the leading qualifier in the United States Bowling Congress Masters – a double-elimination match play tournament – earlier in the year before losing to reigning PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte in the title match, 221-177.

Also advancing to the Oklahoma Open stepladder finals were Chris Loschetter of Avon, Ohio, with 8,358 pins; Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., with an 8,307 total; Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., with 8,297 pins, and Belmonte, who rallied from seventh place in the final game to qualify fifth with 8,257 pins.

"I think the only lane condition I've bowled on that was more difficult than the Bear pattern today was in the U.S. Open," Tackett said. "I don't know why I bowled better than the other guys. I don't think I threw the ball that much better than anyone. I think my bowling ball just matched up with the condition better.

"It feels really good to lead the field," Tackett continued. "The only way to learn how to deal with the pressure of bowling for a title is to put yourself in position to win, so I'll try to do what I did today – stay positive and make good shots.

"I watched my performance in the Masters finals a couple of times," he added. "I started okay, but I didn't make moves fast enough. It comes with experience. The Masters was mine to win. Belmo got a couple of breaks, but he made shots when he had to and I didn't. I didn't beat myself up over losing, but we'll see what happens this time."

The Summer Swing concludes Saturday and Sunday with the stepladder finals in five events: the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens on Saturday, and the Oklahoma Open and Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing special event on Sunday. All finals will be contested on a special lane installation in the Grand Resort Events Center.

O'Neill Captures Top Qualifying Berth for PBA Badger Open Finals

Kent and Valenta to bid for first title against veteran field of all-stars

SHAWNEE, Okla. (May 21, 2014) – Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., charged out of 11th place Wednesday night to capture the top qualifying berth for Saturday's finals in the Professional Bowlers Association's Badger Open at FireLake Bowling Center in a battle that saw the top five players separated by only 18 pins, and defending champion Jake Peters eliminated from the stepladder finals by another three pins.

O'Neill, a four-time PBA Tour champion, averaged 230.33 to finish the 12-game Badger Open qualifying rounds with 2,764 pins, winning the top spot in the stepladder finals by two pins over PBA Hall of Famer and 37-time champion Pete Weber of St. Ann, Mo. PBA rookie Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., who joined the PBA the week before Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing started, qualified third with a 2.761 total – one pin behind Weber. Two-handed player Brian Valenta of Lockport, Ill., qualified for his first PBA television show in fourth place with 2,750 pins, and 13-time PBA Tour winner Mika Koivuniemi, a Finnish native now living in Hartland, Mich., fired a 257 final game to nip Peters for the fifth spot in the finals.

"If you don't like matches being close and games coming down to final frame, you're in the wrong business," O'Neill said. "That's why we do what we do. If you lead by 100 pins, when it's over, it's over; it's kind of anticlimactic. When it's tight like this was and you lead, there's no better feeling."

O'Neill, who has admittedly been in a funk over the past couple of years, said he discovered a flaw in his game only a couple of weeks ago, and that was the difference here.

"On my fourth step in my delivery, I was drifting to the right instead of going straight," he said, "so my arm swing was going off to the right which means the ball could go either direction. When I straightened out my fourth step, the ball fell right into place. Now if I throw a bad shot, I know exactly what to do to fix it."

Earlier Wednesday, with a big first round in the Badger Open, Tom Daugherty of Wesley Chapel, Fla., led the field of 18 players who qualified for the Oklahoma Open based on combined six-game rounds in the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens. Three rounds of match play in the Oklahoma Open will be contested Thursday at 10 a.m., 2 and 6:30 p.m. at FireLake with the top five advancing to the stepladder finals Sunday at noon at the Grand Events Center.

After a total of 36 games, the 18 Oklahoma Open match play finalists will be reduced to the top five for the Oklahoma Open finals Sunday at noon at the Grand Event Center. In leading the Oklahoma Open

field, Daugherty averaged 227.33 across the three "animal" lane conditions for a 4,092 total. O'Neill, who also qualified third for the Bear Open finals, is second with 4,088 pins followed by Mike Fagan, Ft. Worth, Texas, at 4,069; Bear Open qualifying leader Tommy Jones, Simpsonville, S.C., at 4,054, and Koivuniemi with 4,031 pins.

Fast Start Helps England's Williams Takes Badger Open Lead; Daugherty Tops Oklahoma Open Field

SHAWNEE, Okla. (May 21, 2014) – England's Stuart Williams rolled 268 and 269 games out of the starting block and held on for the first round lead in the Professional Bowlers Association's Badger Open at FireLake Bowling Center Wednesday.

Williams, the first English bowler to win a PBA Tour title (2011 Viper Open during PBA World Series of Bowling III), averaged 238.67 for six games on the long 52-foot Badger lane conditioning pattern for a 1,432 pinfall total and an 11-pin lead over Tom Daugherty of Wesley Chapel, Fla., into Wednesday evening's second qualifying round.

With his big Badger round, Daugherty led the field of 18 players who qualified for the Oklahoma Open, based on their three six-game rounds in the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens. Three rounds of match play in the Oklahoma Open will be contested Thursday at FireLake with the top five advancing to the stepladder finals Sunday at noon at the Grand Events Center.

"I had 60 clean frames today. That was a novelty," Williams said after his round.

Williams said he came into Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing with bittersweet emotions. He had just learned of his election into the UK Tenpin Hall of Fame (induction ceremonies will be held in October), and he and wife Tina (Stickney), a former collegiate star for Texas A&M, had just returned from England where they had planned a second wedding ceremony on behalf of Williams' ailing grandmother, who was unable to travel to the U.S. for the couple's original wedding last year. But Williams' 89-year-old grandmother died before the ceremony could be held.

"I had very little practice because of that, but I won a local tournament on this same lane condition in Tucson which gave me some confidence knowing moves I was going to make here," he said. "I'd really like to win my second title. There are a lot of people who have won one title; there aren't so many who have more than one. You want to prove it wasn't a fluke."

The top 18 players in the Badger Open advanced to the second qualifying round at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday. Behind Williams and Daugherty were Brian Valenta, Lockport, Ill.; Anthony Lavery-Spahr, Pasadena, Texas, and Marshall Kent, Yakima, Wash., all tied at 1,402. The top five after 12 games will compete for the Badger Open title Saturday on the special lane installation at the Grand Event Center.

The top 18 players based on combined six-game qualifying totals from the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens also advanced to the Oklahoma Open match play rounds Thursday at 10 a.m., 2 and 6:30 p.m. The top

five players based upon a total of 36 games, including match play bonus pins, will bowl for the Oklahoma Open title Sunday at the Grand Event Center. Daugherty averaged 227.33 across the three lane conditions for a 4,092 total. Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa., was second with 4,088 pins followed by Mike Fagan, Ft. Tommy Jones Wins No. 1 Qualifying Berth for PBA Bear Open Finals

14-time PBA Tour champion is feeling healthy, eager to end six-year U.S. title drought

SHAWNEE, Okla. (May 20, 2014) – One day after missing the stepladder finals of the PBA Wolf Open by four pins, 14-time Professional Bowlers Association Tour champion Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., raced away with the top qualifying berth for the finals of the PBA Bear Open at FireLake Bowling Center Tuesday.

Jones, who hasn't won a PBA Tour title on American soil since the 2008 GEICO Championship in West Babylon, N.Y., averaged 220.5 for 12 games on the most difficult of the Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing lane conditioning patterns, a flat 40-foot condition that is almost identical to the U.S. Open lane oiling pattern. Jones finished with a 2,646 pinfall total to top No. 2 qualifier Bill O'Neill of Langhorne, Pa., by 24 pins.

Also advancing to the Bear Open stepladder finals Saturday will be No. 3 Ronnie Russell of Marion, Ind., with 2,620 pins; Rhino Page of Dad City, Fla., with 2,608 pins and No. 5 Dick Allen of Columbia, S.C., with a 2,606 total. The Bear Open finals will be contested at 2:30 p.m. CT on the special lane installation at the Grand Event Center. The finals will air on CBS Sports Network on Tuesday, June 10, at 7 p.m. ET.

Pacing the Bear field was a bit of redemption for Jones after Monday's disappointing finish.

"It wasn't the finish that bothered me as much as I threw a couple of shots into the gutter and missed the TV show by four pins," he said. "Leaving those pins out there is what leaves a bitter taste in my mouth."

Jones also is aware it's been six years since he has won a title in the U.S. He has won three times in PBA International Tour events since then, but overcoming hip and neck injuries over the past five-or-so years has been frustrating.

"To win in the U.S. is definitely a goal, and to go in feeling healthy is a good thing," he added. "Some of my problems have been bad bowling, some has been being overly cautious about my health issues. But so far this week, everything's been good."

The Bear Open is the second of five events that compose Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing. All five events will be televised on CBS Sports Network on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. ET, beginning with the Wolf Open on June 3.

The Bear Open also was the second of three qualifying legs in determining the field of 18 who will advance to the round-robin match play segment of the Oklahoma Open. After 12 of 18 qualifying games, the top five were Dom Barrett, England, 2,744; Jones, 2,741; Mike Fagan, Ft. Worth, Texas, 2,737; Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa., 2,722, and Chris Barnes, Double Oak, Texas, 2,721. The first six games in Wednesday's Badger Open will determine the Oklahoma Open match play finalists.

The Badger Open, which features a 52-foot lane conditioning pattern, gets underway Wednesday when Squad A bowls six qualifying games at 8 a.m. followed by Squad B at 2 p.m. The top 18 after six games advance to an additional six-game qualifying round at 7:30 p.m. to determine the five Badger Open stepladder finalists.

Chris Barnes Earns No. 1 Berth for PBA Wolf Open Finals

17-time PBA Tour titlist bowls nearly-flawless 12 games in opening event of Oklahoma's Grand Casino PBA Summer Swing

SHAWNEE, Okla. (May 19, 2014) – After averaging 256.5 for his first six qualifying games, Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, started Monday night's final qualifying round in the Professional Bowlers Association's Wolf Open at FireLake Bowling Center with a 279 game and never looked back in earning the top berth for Saturday's stepladder finals.

Barnes, a 17-time PBA Tour title-winner, completed the 12-game qualifying portion of the Wolf Open with an overall 249 average and 2,989 pins to win the top spot in the finals by 136 pins over Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas. In 12 games, Barnes had only one open frame – a split he failed to convert in the ninth frame of his final game.

Also advancing to the stepladder finals will be Sweden's Martin Larsen in third place with 2,838 pins, Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., in fourth with a 2,835 total and defending Wolf Open winner Chris Loschetter of Avon, Ohio. Loschetter rallied to make it into the 18-player second-round field by five pins and then finished the second round with back-to-back 257-258 games to win the fifth seat in the finals by four pins over Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C.

The Wolf Open is the first of five events that comprise Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing. All five events (Wolf, Bear, Badger and Oklahoma Opens plus the Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing) will be televised by CBS Sports Network on consecutive Tuesday nights at 7 p.m. ET, beginning with the Wolf Open finals on June 3.

"I had a strong enough ball to control the gutter shot, and I took some of the patchy spots out of play," Barnes said. "I didn't have nearly as much difference in ball reaction from pair to pair as the other guys had.

"Last year (in Milwaukee) I made some mistakes and I didn't use my equipment to my advantage," he added. "This year I came into the Wolf Open more determined to stay in control of the pocket rather than worry about my pin carry, and it worked out."

Barnes finished 17th in last year's Wolf Open, the worst of his five 2013 Summer Swing events, and he won the Milwaukee Open – last year's version of this year's Oklahoma Open – with a 246-237 decision over Norm Duke in the title match.

Former major league pitching star John Burkett of Southlake, Texas, finished 91st in his first PBA Tour appearance since 2007. Burkett, 49, is preparing for his debut in PBA50 Tour competition in 2015.

"Right now I'm just another casher," Fagan said. "I need to stay focused and continue doing what I'm doing in the second round."

Chase to Catch Reigning PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte Resumes in Oklahoma

FireLake Bowling Center, Grand Casino Resort to host PBA Summer Swing beginning next Monday; Summer Swing concludes with five finals airing on CBS Sports Network

SHAWNEE, OKLA. (May 12, 2014) – The chase to catch reigning Professional Bowlers Association Player of the Year Jason Belmonte resumes next Monday when the multi-event Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing gets underway at FireLake Bowling Center.

The Summer Swing will conclude when five finals, airing on CBS Sports Network, are conducted May 24-25 in a special bowling arena installed inside the Grand Event Center in the Grand Casino Resort complex. CBS Sports Network will televise the finals on five consecutive Tuesday nights at 7 p.m. ET, beginning June 3.

The Summer Swing will include four PBA Tour title events – the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens and the PBA Oklahoma Open – and the Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort Summer King of the Swing special event involving four winners plus a "wild card" player.

Coming into the Summer Swing, Belmonte has jumped into a huge lead in defense of his 2012-13 PBA Player of the Year title after winning the PBA Tour's first two major championships of the 2014 season. In late January, Belmonte defeated Wes Malott of Pflugerville, Texas, 219-218, to win the Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions in Allen Park, Mich., and in late February the Australian two-handed star won his second straight United States Bowling Congress Masters title, defeating 2013 PBA Rookie of the Year E.J. Tackett of Huntington, Ind., 221-177, in North Brunswick, N.J.

Those two victories have given Belmonte big leads in PBA Tour earnings (\$99,800 vs. \$47,181 by England's Dom Barrett), scoring averages (236.51 vs. Barrett's 228.84) and competition points (80,000 vs. Malott's 30,199) heading into the Summer Swing. Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, who won the PBA International Tour's H.H. Emir Cup in Qatar in late February, is third in earnings (\$45,344) and just over 10 pins behind Belmonte in average (226.41) while Barrett ranks third in points (28,461).

Belmonte also comes into the Summer Swing as the defending PBA Bear Open champion. Belmonte defeated Barnes, 235-211, in the title match of the most demanding Summer Swing event, contested on a 40-foot lane condition that is very similar to the lane conditioning pattern used for the U.S. Open.

Barnes returns as the Oklahoma Open champion (re-named geographically; last year it was called the Milwaukee Open). The Oklahoma Open, which will feature the top 18 overall performers based upon

combined qualifying pinfall total from the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens, uses all three unique lane conditions for its 18-game round-robin match play finals.

The Wolf Open, which will be contested on Monday, May 19, uses the shortest of all PBA "animal" patterns (32 feet). The Bear Open will be held on Tuesday. The Badger Open, which uses the longest of all "animal" patterns at 52 feet, will be conducted on Wednesday. Chris Loschetter of Avon, Ohio, won his first PBA Tour title in last year's Wolf Open and Jake Peters of Henderson, Nev., won his first PBA Tour title in the 2013 Badger Open.

In addition to those four PBA Tour title events, the four winners along with a "wild card" player – whoever scores the most points without a title – will compete in a special Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing event to conclude the Summer Swing. If any player wins more than one preliminary event, whomever finishes second in the ensuing event(s) will earn a spot in the King of the Swing. Norm Duke of Clermont, Okla., is defending King of the Swing winner.

"It's going to be a fabulous event," PBA Commissioner Tom Clark predicted. "We're going to bowl for four PBA Tour titles, conduct a King of the Swing special event, and provide PBA fans around the world with more than 50 hours of live coverage on Xtra Frame in addition to 10 hours of nationally-televised coverage on CBS Sports Network."

The Summer Swing will feature a sold-out field of 120 players representing 11 different countries. Oklahoma will be represented in the Summer Swing by veteran PBA Tour champion Mike Edwards of Tulsa along with Kyle Biggs of Sapulpa, Jeff Hatt, Oklahoma City; Will Hoge of Sand Springs, Justin Morris, McLoud; Thomas Patterson of Owasso and FireLake Bowling Center manager Chris Skillings of Shawnee, and Jayden Warren of Muskogee. The field also will include four PBA Hall of Famers (33-time titlist Parker Bohn III, Jackson, N.J.; 37-time champions Norm Duke , Clermont, Fla., and Pete Weber, St. Ann, Mo., and the winningest player in PBA Tour history, 47-time title-winner Walter Ray Williams Jr., Ocala, Fla.) and four women.

In addition to the CBS Sports Network televised finals, all qualifying and preliminary match play rounds of the summer swing events will be covered live on PBA's exclusive online bowling channel, Xtra Frame.

Collegiate Star Marshall Kent to Make Debut as PBA Member in Oklahoma

Washington native to join pro tour in time for multi-event PBA Summer Swing in Shawnee May 18-25

SEATTLE (May 8, 2014) – Marshall Kent, a 21-year-old native of Yakima, Wash., and predicted by many observers to be headed toward stardom in professional bowling, has announced he is joining the Professional Bowlers Association and will compete as a PBA member in Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing in Shawnee, Okla., May 18-25.

Kent, a two-time Collegiate Bowler of the Year while bowling with Chicago-based Robert Morris-Illinois, has one more year of collegiate eligibility, but has decided to forego that option because he will graduate from Robert Morris in July with a degree in business management.

"Joining the PBA has been a lifelong dream," Kent said. "I always wanted to make a TV show and bowl for a PBA title. I grew up watching Tommy Jones and Pete Weber and Norm Duke, and guys like that. I wanted to be out there with them one day."

Kent – who is not related to PBA Hall of Famer Doug Kent – said he has bowled "since I was able to walk. My parents bought a bowling center before I was born, so I pretty much grew up in the sport."

Kent will compete in Shawnee as part of a sold-out field of 120 of the world's top players, including competitors from 11 different countries. The PBA Summer Swing will include PBA Wolf, Bear and Badger Championships, the Oklahoma Open and Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort King of the Swing, a special event for the four title winners plus a "wild card" player.

Kent's arrival on the PBA Tour has been anticipated for some time after he demonstrated during the past year that he's ready to compete with the world's best players in the professional arena. As an amateur, he finished fourth in Bowling's U.S. Open last July in Columbus, Ohio, losing in the stepladder finals to eventual champion Wes Malott, 200-193. Following that performance, he was granted an exemption to bowl in the PBA World Series of Bowling V last fall in Las Vegas by PBA Commissioner Tom Clark where he earned the No. 1 qualifying berth in the Scorpion Championship finals, losing to Tom Smallwood in the title match, 221-216.

A three-time member of both adult and Junior Team USA where he gained valuable experience in international competition, Kent had a break-through victory in March in the Brunswick Euro Challenge in Munich, Germany, throwing 10 strikes on his first 11 attempts to win the prestigious World Bowling/PBA International Tour event with a 277-258 victory over Sweden's Daniel Fransson.

Other career highlights include gold medals won in PABCON and World Youth Championships competition, the 2012 Team USA Trials men's championship, the 2010 USBC Junior Gold Championship and a runner-up finish in the 2012 QubicaAMF World Cup.

"Marshall is obviously a tremendously talented player, but also a great young man who will be a fantastic role model for our sport," Clark said. "His joining the PBA is one of the most widely anticipated in years."

Kent said he has always worked on developing sound fundamental skills, trying to keep his game simple. But he also has closely observed his idols, borrowing "tricks" here and there.

"I kind of adopted Tommy Jones' knee bend at the foul line, and watched Pete Weber's open hand technique at his follow-through, stuff like that," Kent said. "I got to meet some of those guys when I attended a PBA tournament when I was young and got some autographs. Then I made Team USA and got to bowl alongside some of them. And then I bowled in the USBC Masters and U.S. Open where I got to bowl against them."

All five PBA Summer Swing events will be televised on CBS Sports Network on consecutive Tuesdays beginning in June. Qualifying and match play for each event will be conducted at FireLake Bowling Center in Shawnee with the stepladder finals moving to a special bowling lane installation in the Grand Event Center. PBA Champion Mike Edwards Looks Forward to PBA's Return to Oklahoma

Home state native among 120 PBA stars set to compete in Grand Casino Resort Summer Swing May 17-25

SHAWNEE, Okla. - After bowling on the PBA Tour for more than 12 years without a title, Mike Edwards of Tulsa held a record he didn't especially want: most prize money won without a PBA Tour title.

After several runner-up finishes during that span, the native Oklahoman put an end to that record on April 16, 1994 when he won the IOF Foresters Bowling for Miracles Open at Club 300 Bowl in Markham, Ontario, for his first PBA Tour title.

Edwards, who was top qualifier for the ABC-TV Pro Bowlers Tour-televised finals 20 years ago, turned back fifth-seeded Pete Weber, the tournament's defending champion, 203-192, in the championship match for the \$43,000 first prize.

"It was one of those 'strike-to-win' moments I dreamed of as a kid," Edwards recalled. "I just made up my mind to be aggressive and leave it all out on the table which helped me get over the nerves."

That championship match 20 years ago wasn't easy, but Edwards remembers it as if it happened last week. He and Weber were neck and neck through the first seven frames before Weber, who would eventually become a member of the PBA Hall of Fame, gave Edwards an opening by leaving the 4-6-7-10 split in the eighth frame. Knowing victory was within reach, Edwards clinched the match with a strike on his first shot in the 10th frame.

"I had an idea that the scoring would be lower by the time we bowled the championship match so my game plan was to keep the ball in play," the now-52-year-old Edwards recalled. "Any mistakes you make would be exaggerated so staying focused and not getting caught up in the moment was important."

Edwards, who now splits his time between the PBA50 Tour – for players 50 and older – and the so-called "kids' tour," will be among the 120 top PBA players when the Grand Casino Resort and FireLake Bowling Center in Shawnee hosts Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort PBA Summer Swing May 17-25. The Summer Swing will mark the PBA's first visit to Oklahoma since the 2005 Tulsa Championship at The Lanes at Coffee Creek, which was won by Tommy Jones.

The Summer Swing will include four PBA Tour title events – the Wolf, Bear and Badger Opens, and the PBA Oklahoma Open – plus Oklahoma's Grand Casino Resort Summer King of the Swing special event which will include the four tour event winners plus a "wild card" player. The finals of each event will be taped over the May 24-25 weekend on a special lane installation in the Grand Casino Resort Events Center for airing on CBS Sports Network beginning in early June.

One of Edwards' most cherished accomplishments is his induction into the American Indian Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997. He is the only bowler to be inducted into the Hall.

"It was a feeling of pride for not only myself but also for the sport," Edwards said. "To be recognized with the other great athletes in the Hall was a great honor."

Edwards is still a highly-competitive player. He demonstrated he can still play the game at a high level when he finished third in the 2012 PBA Senior U.S. Open – the first tournament he entered as a "senior" competitor – and won the United States Bowling Congress Senior Masters a week later.

Beyond his participation on the lanes, he has increasingly turned his eyes toward helping the PBA off the lanes. He and his wife Samantha Mulligan, who is a member of the PBA staff, were instrumental in bringing the Summer Swing to the FireLake Bowling Center and the Grand Casino Resort.

"The Grand Casino people have really embraced the sport and competitive bowlers," Edwards said. "They started by hosting successful regionals including last year's RPI and they want more tournaments. We approached them about the idea of hosting the Summer Swing and they were immediately very interested. We're just happy to be able to bring the sport back to Oklahoma."

All qualifying and match play rounds in the Summer Swing will be held at FireLake before the finals move to the specially-constructed lanes in Grand Casino's Center. The eight-day program also will include a PBA Southwest Region tournament at FireLake over Memorial Day weekend.

Bowling fans will be able to follow all of the preliminary action on PBA's online bowling channel, Xtra Frame, or by watching the "live scoring" feature on pba.com. Silver Lake Sweeps Philadelphia, Advances to PBA League Elias Cup Finals

Atom Splitters to battle L.A. X for 2014 PBA League championship on ESPN on April 13

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – Chris Barnes and his Silver Lake Atom Splitters teammates swept the Philadelphia Hitmen in the final Professional Bowlers Association League semifinal match to earn a berth in the 2014 Elias Cup finals against Jason Belmonte and his L.A. X team.

The final semifinal round match at Thunderbowl Lanes aired Sunday on ESPN. The all-Los Angeles area battle for the Elias Cup will air on ESPN on Sunday, April 13, at 2 p.m. ET.

After finishing in sixth place among eight teams in the 2013 introductory PBA League season, the Atom Splitters, presented by Spiceworks and owned by Internet podcast innovator and television host Chris Hardwick, bolstered their 2014 lineup with the addition of former PBA Players of the Year Tommy Jones and Wes Malott, and won 11 of a possible 12 points in matches against the Dallas Strikers and the Hitmen, presented by High 5 Gear, to advance to the Elias Cup finals at Brunswick Zone Carolier in North Brunswick, N.J.

"Our team keeps getting better as we go," Barnes said. "We'll switch venues for the Elias Cup, which will have an impact. Carolier hooks a lot less than Thunderbowl does. As far as L.A. X's fearless leader (Australian two-handed star Belmonte) is concerned, that's not much of a deal, but I don't know about the rest of their team. They have a lot of good shot-makers, but so do we. I think we're down to the two strongest teams."

Belmonte agreed.

"The Atom Splitters are a stacked team," the L.A. X team leader said. "I feel our performance speaks for itself. If there's a team that's going to give (Silver Lake) a run for their money, it's us."

L.A. X, presented by GoBowling.com, eliminated the BROOKLYN STyLES and the defending Elias Cup champion New York City WTT KingPins in earning its berth in the Elias Cup finale.

Barnes gave Silver Lake a 1-0 lead by winning the singles match against Philadelphia franchise player Bill O'Neill. Barnes survived a 3-4-6-7-10 split in the sixth frame after throwing five strikes to start the game. After he failed to convert the split, he threw another string of four strikes for a 248-236 win.

In alternate ball doubles, Philadelphia's Josh Blanchard and Ryan Ciminelli threw back-to-back strikes in the ninth and 10th frames to overcome the Atom Splitters' one-pin lead, but Barnes and partner Bryon Smith answered with three strikes in their 10th frame to pull out a 228-226 win for a 2-0 lead.

Silver Lake's Tommy Jones, Dom Barrett and Wes Malott started the Baker trios contest with six strikes, building a 53-pin lead, and held on for a 233-216 win over Ciminelli, O'Neill and Dan MacLelland for a 3-0 lead.

The Atom Splitters completed the sweep with a convincing 247-224 victory in the Baker team finale. Smith, Barnes, Barrett, Malott and Jones struck on eight of their first nine shots and Silver Lake never gave the Hitmen a chance.

"We're five players deep," Barnes said. "We didn't bowl very well in our first match (against Dallas), but we survived that. We figured that was as bad as it could get, so we threw everyone back out there and it worked out. We just don't like to lose. Ever."

L.A. X Upsets Defending Champs, Advances to PBA League Elias Cup Finals

Clutch spare by Jason Belmonte, strike by Parker Bohn III eliminates New York City WTT KingPins

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – A clutch ninth-frame spare by reigning Professional Bowlers Association Player of the Year Jason Belmonte followed by three equally clutch 10th frame strikes in the Baker team finale by Parker Bohn III gave L.A. X a 5-1 victory over the defending PBA League champion New York City WTT KingPins and a berth in the 2014 Elias Cup finals.

The first PBA League semifinal round match at Thunderbowl Lanes aired Sunday on ESPN. The second semifinal match will pit actor/comedian Kevin Hart's Philadelphia Hitmen, led by captain Bill O'Neill, against the Silver Lake Atom Splitters, owned by "Nerdist" creator Chris Hardwick and led by captain Chris Barnes, on ESPN on Sunday, April 6, at 1 p.m. ET. The Elias Cup finals will air on ESPN on Sunday, April 13, at 2 p.m. ET.

The Baker team game, worth a decisive three points in the PBA League elimination competition, was a three-pin contest when Belmonte left the 3-4-7-10 split in the ninth frame, and converted the difficult spare. The spare forced New York City captain Pete Weber to double in the 10th frame to take the lead, but Weber left a 4 pin on his first ball, giving L.A. X. a chance. Bohn, needing a mark and good count, struck out for a 218-204 win to send Los Angeles Clippers star Chris Paul's team to the Elias Cup finals.

The win was redemption for the Los Angeles-based team that missed a trip to the 2013 finals by two points. It probably wouldn't have happened if Belmonte hadn't converted the split he left in the ninth frame.

"I wasn't too confident; that was an interesting looking spare," the Australian two-handed player said. "I didn't know whether to hook it or throw my spare ball, but I threw my spare ball straight at it and it paid off.

"We get one shot on each lane in team event and I went through the nose on that lane in practice, so when we came back to that lane, I made a five-board move left and threw it really good," he said of the shot that resulted in the split. "I thought it was a strike off my hand, but then I saw it hook and there were grandma's teeth staring at me."

L.A. X is now ready for whichever opposing team advances to the Elias Cup finals.

"We wanted to improve on our position from last year. Our goal was to play in the finals," Belmonte said. "We accomplished that today. I'm stoked. We gelled as a team. We lifted each other. We made spares when we had to. We struck out when we had to. It wasn't just one guy. We have a great team."

In the singles game between team captains to start the match, Belmonte claimed the first point for L.A. X with a 234-208 victory over Weber. The decisive shot was Weber's pocket 7-10 split in the ninth frame.

L.A. X added its second point on a near-perfect performance by Mika Koivuniemi and Bohn in a 299-216 romp in alternate-ball doubles. The perfect game was spoiled when Bohn left a 10 pin on the team's 12th shot.

The KingPins, owned by women's sports icon Billie Jean King and presented by GEICO, averted a sweep with a 249-235 come-from-behind win in the Baker trios game. L.A. X, presented by GoBowling.com, was cruising behind Belmonte, Andres Gomez and PBA Rookie of the Year E.J. Tackett until Tackett failed to convert the 10 pin in the ninth frame. New York City's Stuart Williams struck in the ninth and anchor Scott Norton threw three strikes in the 10th to claim the trios point.

Philadelphia Sweeps Pittsburgh to Roll into PBA League Semifinal Round

Bill O'Neill's Hitmen avenge disappointing 2013 finish, reach final four

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – Bill O'Neill and his Philadelphia Hitmen recorded the first sweep in the 2014 Professional Bowlers Association League Elias Cup eliminations, knocking the Pittsburgh Jack Rabbits out of the tournament at Thunderbowl Lanes and atoning for a disappointing finish to their 2013 campaign.

A 235-225 victory in the five-man Baker team finale completed Philadelphia's 6-0 sweep of the singles, alternate ball doubles, Baker trios and Baker team competition and landed the Hitmen, owned by actor/comedian Kevin Hart, a berth in the semifinal round against the Silver Lake Atom Splitters. The battle of Pennsylvania, the fourth and final single-elimination quarterfinal round match in the eight-team PBA League competition, aired Sunday on ESPN.

It was a redeeming performance for the Hitmen, presented by High 5 Gear, who were in position to make the Elias Cup finals in 2013 only to fade in the final qualifying round to finish sixth.

"It bothered me a lot that we did as bad as we did last year," O'Neill said. "We had a bad last day. If we had avoided that, we would have been fine. But we're back this year with a couple of different guys and it's turned out well because they've done nothing but strike so far. We didn't lose a game, so that's about as good as it gets.

"Now we have the supposed 'dream team' next, so hopefully we'll be able to beat their butts," O'Neill added, referring to a Silver Lake team loaded with past PBA Players of the Year Chris Barnes, Tommy Jones and Wes Malott as well as 2013 POY contender Dom Barrett and 2003 USBC Masters champion Bryon Smith.

O'Neill started the sweep of the Jack Rabbits, presented by HotelPlanner.com, with a 215-212 win in the singles match against Jack Rabbits' team captain Osku Palermaa, taking advantage of a pair of splits and open frames by the Finnish two-handed player in the second and third frames. Palermaa recovered from his mistakes with a string of five strikes. Needing two strikes in the 10th frame to complete his rally, he left a 10 pin on his first shot.

Dan MacLelland and Ryan Ciminelli kept the Philadelphia momentum rolling in the alternate ball doubles match, striking on eight of their first nine shots en route to a 257-239 win over Pittsburgh's Ronnie Russell and Eugene McCune.

The Jack Rabbits, owned by newly-signed Oakland Raiders all-pro linebacker LaMarr Woodley, never wilted, however. In the Baker trio match, Philadelphia's O'Neill, Blanchard , DeVaney again set a torrid

pace, striking on eight of their first nine shots, but led by only one pin heading into ninth frame. O'Neill's spare in the 10th gave Palermaa a chance to win for Pittsburgh with two strikes in his final frame, but he left the 4-9 split to end the threat and Philadelphia won, 256-251.

The Hitmen, who are managed by PBA Hall of Famer Jason Couch, completed the sweep with a dominating team effort. Open frames in the fifth and eighth frames hindered the Jack Rabbits, but they used a barrage of strikes to remain in contention until O'Neill's 10th-frame spare locked up the win.

"They never gave us any breathing room," Pittsburgh team manager Tim Mack said. "It was a matter of one shot here and there that made the difference. We were in every match until the 10th frame, but it wasn't our day."

The PBA League now moves into the semifinal round where the defending champion New York City WTT KingPins, owned by women's sports legend Billie Jean King and led by team captain Pete Weber, will meet L.A. X, owned by Los Angeles Clippers star Chris Paul and led by captain Jason Belmonte, on ESPN on Sunday, March 30, at 5 p.m. The Hitmen will bowl the Silver Lake Atom Splitters, owned by "Nerdist" creator Chris Hardwick and led by Barnes, on ESPN on Sunday, April 6, at 1 p.m. ET.

The two semifinal round winners will battle for the Elias Cup on ESPN on Sunday, April 13, at 2 p.m. ET.

U.S. Collegiate Star Marshall Kent Wins Brunswick Euro Challenge in Munich

Team USA, Robert Morris-Illinois amateur tops Sweden's Daniel Fransson for victory

MUNICH, Germany (March 23, 2014) – Amateur Marshall Kent of Yakima, Wash., a member of Team USA and a collegiate all-American with the Robert Morris University-Illinois team, won the 11th annual Brunswick Euro Challenge at Dream-Bowl Palace Sunday, striking on 10 of his first 11 shots in a near-perfect 277-258 victory over Sweden's Daniel Fransson.

Kent, who reached the television finals in the 2013 U.S. Open and the PBA Scorpion Championship during the PBA World Series of Bowling V, where he competed on a special invitation, earned 11,111 Euros (US\$15,300), but he doesn't get credit for a PBA title because he is an amateur.

Denmark's Thomas Larsen Wins Kuwait International Open for Second PBA Tour Title

KUWAIT CITY, Kuwait – Denmark's Thomas Larsen defeated England's Dom Barrett, 208-205, to win his second PBA Tour title in the 11th Kuwait International Open Friday at Cozmo Bowling Center.

Larsen, the top qualifier after Friday's modified match play round, claimed the title and \$25,000 first prize after Barrett split and opened in the ninth frame. Larsen's previous PBA title came in the Abu Dhabi WBT in December in the United Arab Emirates.

Barrett, a three-time PBA Tour titlist including the 2013 PBA World Championship, advanced to the championship match by defeating fellow Englishman Stuart Williams, 243-202, in the semifinal match. In a special women's stepladder final for the top three women who bowled in the tournament, former PBA member Shannon O'Keefe of Arlington, Texas – one of nine women who have won PBA Regional titles – defeated PBA member Sandra Andersson of Sweden, 242-196, for the \$1,000 first prize.

The Kuwait Open was the third in a series of four WTBA-PBA International Tour events as part of the World Bowling Tour points competition. Next on the schedule is the 10th Brunswick Euro Challenge at Dream Bowl Palace in Munich, Germany, March 15-23. Ronnie Russell of Marion, Ind., is defending champion.

East Region PBA50 Player of Year John Conroy to Receive National Honor

Career paramedic named American Ambulance Association Star of Life Award winner

McLEAN, Va. (March 10, 2014) – On March 24, the day after John Conroy hopes to defend his only PBA title in the PBA50 Rossi Lanes Eastern Open in Elmira, N.Y., he'll head to Washington, D.C., where he will be presented the American Ambulance Association's highest honor, the Star of Life Award.

Conroy, a 51-year-old New York City native and 2013 East Region PBA50 Player of the Year, has worked in the emergency medical field for 31 years, including the last 28 as a paramedic. Now living in Mahopac, N.Y., he worked most of his career in New York City where he was among the first responders not only for the 9-11 attack on the World Trade Center, but the 1993 bomb attack on the WTC's north tower. In addition, he was awarded the Emergency Medical Services Medal of Honor after entering a burning apartment building and rescuing four trapped people.

"John Conroy is the North Shore LIJ Health System Center for EMS Manhattan Division selection for The AAA Star of Life Award," a release from the American Ambulance Association noted. "He is worthy for this distinction not because of a single act, but a body of work that includes countless pre-hospital saves, rescues from the WTC bombing and tireless work at the WTC after the attacks of September 11th, 2001, in addition to numerous professional awards and distinctions.

"There is no question to John's professional career being an outstanding one. In addition to all his professional accolades, John is a professional bowler who won the 2013 East Region PBA50 Bowler of the Year."

Conroy will receive his award along with other class of 2014 honorees during a three-day conference on Capitol Hill March 24-26. He also will have a chance to meet with members of congress, and key congressional aides to discuss legislative issues critical to all Emergency Medical Service professionals.

"I never thought about awards," Conroy, the 2013 PBA50 Rossi Lanes Eastern Open champion, said. "I just get a lot of joy out of taking care of people. It feels real good (to be named the Star of Life recipient), because it also will give me a chance to talk to our congressman about EMS and ways to improve."

Silver Lake Atom Splitters Advance to PBA League Semifinal Round

Chris Barnes and friends just miss sweep over Dallas Strikers in third quarterfinal round match

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – Chris Barnes and his Silver Lake Atom Splitters dominated Norm Duke and the Dallas Strikers to advance to the semifinal round of the Professional Bowlers Association League Elias Cup competition at Thunderbowl Lanes.

Behind a 205-185 victory in the five-man Baker team finale, Silver Lake, presented by Spiceworks, defeated Dallas, presented by the United States Bowling Congress, in a near-sweep, 5-1.

The third in a series of four single-elimination first-round matches in the eight-team PBA League competition aired Sunday on ESPN. One point was awarded to the winner in singles, doubles and trios matches, and three points were awarded to the Baker team winner.

In the singles match, Duke – the only PBA League competitor serving the dual role of team manager and team captain – pulled himself out of his match against Barnes after recording four single-pin spares and one strike in five frames while Barnes started with six strikes for a 52-pin lead. Duke replaced himself with left-hander Rhino Page to give Page more practice on the PBA League lane condition, but it didn't matter. Barnes ran his string of strikes to nine before losing his bid for a perfect game. He left the 4-6-7 split in the 10th frame, but still won the singles point comfortably, 265-208.

Neither team could generate any momentum in alternate ball doubles. Silver Lake's Barnes and Bryon Smith took a one-pin lead into the 10th frame where Duke struck and then converted Mike Machuga's 3-6-9-10 leave. Smith needed a strike to clinch the win for Silver Lake, but left a 10 pin. Barnes converted the spare, but again needing a strike for a one-pin victory, Smith knocked down eight pins to hand Dallas the doubles point, 195-194.

The Atom Splitters, owned by "Nerdist" creator Chris Hardwick, won the Baker trios point, 213-184. Consecutive strikes by Dom Barrett, Wes Malott and Tommy Jones staked Silver Lake to a 31-pin lead after four frames. The Strikers, owned by NFL all-star receiver Terrell Owens, never mounted a threat, recording only three strikes through nine frames.

Dallas continued to struggle in the Baker team finale, failing to record back-to-back strikes until the seventh and eighth frames, but the Strikers still had a chance after Jones left the 2-8-10 split in the 10th frame. Page, anchoring for Dallas, needed three strikes to pull out a one-pin victory, but left a solid 7 pin on his first ball in the final frame.

"We weren't very happy with how things ended last year," Barnes said, referring to Silver Lake's sixthplace finish in the PBAL's inaugural season. "We didn't bowl very well. When Mark (Baker) came in (as team manager), we talked about the new rules and made some key additions (former PBA Players of the Year Malott and Jones).

"It's nothing against the guys we had before," Barnes continued, "but we went from two really good players to a contending player of the year (Barrett) and two previous players of the year. We like our chances moving forward."

The final quarterfinal round elimination match will pit actor/comedian Kevin Hart's Philadelphia Hitmen presented by High 5 Gear, led by team captain Bill O'Neill, against Pittsburgh Steelers all-pro linebacker LaMarr Woodley's Pittsburgh Jack Rabbits presented by HotelPlanner.com, captained by Finland's Osku Palermaa, on ESPN on Sunday, March 23, at 1 p.m. ET. The winner of the Hitmen-Jack Rabbits match will bowl the Silver Lake Atom Splitters on ESPN on Sunday, April 6, for right to advance to the Elias Cup finals.

PBA World Series of Bowling VI Returns to South Point in Las Vegas

WSOB VI to include four animal pattern championships, final major championship of 2014 season

SEATTLE (Feb. 26, 2014) – The Professional Bowlers Association World Series of Bowling VI will return to South Point Hotel, Casino and Bowling Center in Las Vegas Oct. 24-Nov. 2, PBA Commissioner Tom Clark announced today.

The PBA World Series, which originated in 2009 at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., as a multievent international showcase of bowling talent, will again feature four exclusive PBA "animal pattern" championships – the Cheetah, Viper, Scorpion and Chameleon Championships – which also will serve as qualifying events for the 2014 season's third major championship, the PBA World Championship.

Since its inception, the PBA World Series has welcomed bowlers from 31 different countries, including representation by a record 21 different nations in 2013. The PBA has received communications that China may send its first players in 2014.

Defending 2013 champions are Wes Malott, Pflugerville, Texas, Cheetah Championship; Chris Barnes, Double Oak, Texas, Viper Championship; Ryan Ciminelli, Cheektowaga, N.Y., Chameleon Championship; Tom Smallwood, Saginaw, Mich., Scorpion Championship, and Dom Barrett, England, PBA World Championship.

Additional events associated with the World Series will be announced at a later time.

Bowling fans around the world will again be able to follow WSOB qualifying and match play competition through live coverage on PBA's exclusive online bowling channel, Xtra Frame. All WSOB VI finals will be televised by ESPN.

Defending Champion New York City WTT KingPins Advance to PBA League Semifinal Round

Pete Weber and friends to meet L.A. X for berth in PBA League Elias Cup finals

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – The defending champion New York City WTT KingPins have advanced to the semifinal round of the 2014 Professional Bowlers Association League Elias Cup competition, defeating last season's runner-up team, the Motown Muscle, 4-2, at Thunderbowl Lanes.

The second of four single-elimination matches in the 2014 PBA League series, pitting the top two teams from the inaugural PBA League season, aired Sunday on ESPN. The KingPins, led by PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber and owned by women's sports legend Billie Jean King, will meet newly-crowned PBA Player of the Year Jason Belmonte and his L.A. X team, owned by Los Angeles Clippers star Chris Paul, in a semifinal round match with the winner earning a berth in the Elias Cup finals on Feb. 23 at Brunswick Zone Carolier in North Brunswick, N.J.

"It was a total team effort," said KingPins manager Carolyn Dorin-Ballard after a 227-172 victory in the Baker team finale that gave New York City three points and the win. "The guys communicated well, they read the lanes the right way and we never gave up. We got a couple of bad breaks in doubles and trios, but it all came together in the team event."

"We're here to win," Weber said. "(Team bowling) is a little different for me. I love it because I grew up around team bowling. Dad (PBA Hall of Famer Dick Weber) being part of the Budweisers made it easy for me to do, so I love it. I love having four other guys to rely on."

In the opening singles battle between team captains, Weber staked his team to a 1-0 lead with a 232-225 win over Motown's Mike Fagan. Weber jumped ahead with a spare and four strikes, but failed to convert the 7-10 and 3-4-7-10 splits in the next two frames. Fagan took the lead, but Weber rediscovered the strike pocket, throwing another four-bagger for the win.

After a first-frame spare in the alternate-ball doubles match, Motown's Chris Loschetter and Fagan put together a string of eight strikes to run away from John Szczerbinski and Weber, 268-214, to even the match at 1-1.

Motown, presented by Barbasol and owned by Detroit native and former Pittsburgh Steelers star Jerome Bettis, then won the Baker-format trios point with a 247-234 victory over the KingPins, presented by GEICO. Motown's Mike Scroggins, Tom Daugherty and Brian Kretzer finished the game with five consecutive strikes to cancel out a five-strike New York City rally by Scott Norton, Jake Peters and Stuart Williams late in the game. New York City kept its hopes for an Elias Cup repeat alive by winning the five-player Baker Team finale, worth three points. Motown struggled on the left lane, getting only one strike in the first five frames to fall behind by 14 pins. A 6-7 split by Scroggins in the seventh frame further hampered Motown, and consecutive strikes by New York's Williams, Peters and Szczerbinski opened up a 47-pin lead as the KingPins ran away with the team win.

The victory also was a personal triumph for Dorin-Ballard over her husband, PBA Hall of Famer Del Ballard Jr., who is Motown's team manager.

"There was a family bet," she laughed, "but I don't want to tell anyone what it was. We're going to go out and eat and celebrate, but everyone knows we're pretty competitive."

Quarterfinal match three, pitting Norm Duke and the Dallas Strikers presented by the United States Bowling Congress against Chris Barnes and the Silver Lake Atom Splitters presented by Spiceworks, will air on Sunday, March 2, at 3 p.m. ET. The final quarterfinal round match, between Bill O'Neill and his Philadelphia Hitmen presented by High 5 Gear vs. Osku Palermaa and the Pittsburgh Jackrabbits, presented by HotelPlanner.com, will air on Sunday, March 23, at 1 p.m. ET.

Next Sunday ESPN will air the finals of the United States Bowling Congress Masters live from Brunswick Zone Carolier in North Brunswick, N.J., at 2 p.m. ET. Qualifying and three-game double-elimination match play rounds of the Masters will be covered live on Xtra Frame, the PBA's official online bowling channel, Tuesday through Saturday, and live scoring all of action will be available on bowl.com, USBC's official website.

L.A. X Tops BROOKLYN STyLES in Opening Match in 2014 PBA League Series

Key strikes by Jason Belmonte, Parker Bohn III propel Los Angeles team into semifinal round

ALLEN PARK, Mich. – L.A. X, with key strikes from Jason Belmonte and Parker Bohn III in the ninth and 10th frames of the Baker team match, defeated the BROOKLYN STyLES, 237-215, and advanced to the semifinal round of the Professional Bowlers Association League Elias Cup competition at Thunderbowl Lanes.

The first quarterfinal round single-elimination match in the 2014 PBA League season aired Sunday on ESPN.

With its win in the five-man Baker team event, Los Angeles-based L.A. X, owned by Los Angeles Clippers all-star guard Chris Paul and presented by GoBowling.com, earned three points for a 4-2 victory over the STyLES (owned by actor Jesse Williams and presented by Concrete Software's PBA Bowling Challenge), and will meet the winner of the match between the defending Elias Cup champion New York City WTT KingPins, sponsored by GEICO, and Motown Muscle, sponsored by Barbasol, in the semifinal round. The KingPins vs. Muscle contest will air next Sunday at 3 p.m. ET on ESPN. The semifinal round winner will advance to the Elias Cup finals which will be contested on Feb. 23 at Brunswick Zone Carolier in North Brunswick, N.J.

L.A. X, which was eliminated from Elias Cup contention in 2013 by a modest two points, didn't forget last season's close call.

"We came into this tournament wanting to do better than last year and we're on our way to doing that," Belmonte said. "We're a very close-knit team even though we're quite diverse, but I felt like we really gelled.

"Last year was last year," the newly-named 2012-13 PBA Player of the Year said. "When 2014 rolled around, that's the only year that matters to us. What happened last year is irrelevant. We just wanted to make sure we performed well, and we'll see what happens."

L.A. X claimed the first point when team captain Belmonte defeated Brooklyn team captain Sean Rash, 255-223, in a singles contest. Belmonte took the lead after Rash left the 4-6-7 split in the second frame and failed to convert, and Rash was unable to recover.

The STyLES tied the match when PBA Hall of Famer Walter Ray Williams Jr. and Jason Sterner nipped Mika Koivuniemi and Parker Bohn III, 238-234, in alternate-ball doubles. The second frame again was key when Bohn, a left-hander, left the 7 pin and Koivuniemi, a right-hander, failed to convert the spare. Brooklyn put together a string of five strikes to take the lead, but Sterner left a 10 pin on in the 10th frame, giving L.A. X a chance to double for the win. Bohn struck on the first shot, but Koivuniemi left a 10 pin to hand Brooklyn the point.

In the Baker-format trios match, where three players bowled alternate frames, Rash, Tom Smallwood and Williams combined for seven strikes on their first nine shots in cruising to a 247-218 win over L.A. X's Belmonte, E.J. Tackett and Andres Gomez for a 2-1 lead.

The Baker Team finale, worth three points, involved all five players bowling two frames each. Belmonte's strike in the ninth frame gave Bohn a chance to strike to lock up the win and move his team into the semifinal round.

"Jason set me up with his strike in the ninth," Bohn said. "At that point, we couldn't be shut out. I knew it was a matter of making a quality shot and fortunately I was able to make a perfect shot."

Bohn hasn't done a great deal of team bowling during his career, but he said he called upon his experiences bowling in the old American Bowling Congress Team Challenge program when it came time.

"Our team has great karma," Bohn said of his L.A. X team. "These guys put me in the same kind of situation I was in back in the old Team Challenge days when they asked me to bowl anchor. That's what was going through my mind, even though it's 20 years later and fortunately I was able to deliver.

"We were short (by two points) a year ago and we weren't happy about that," he added. "We made some changes to our team, and so far they've worked out. I don't see why they won't continue to work out moving forward."

Ryan Shafer Wins Second PBA Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award

SEATTLE (Jan. 17, 2014) – Ryan Shafer of Horseheads, N.Y., has been selected by his fellow Professional Bowlers Association members as winner of the 2012-13 Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award, PBA Commissioner Tom Clark announced today.

It was a bittersweet moment for Shafer, who also won the Nagy award in 2009, coming a day after the funeral services for his wife, Michelle, who died unexpectedly five days earlier.

Shafer, a 47-year-old who has won four titles in a 27-year PBA Tour career, has been a champion for underdogs on the PBA Tour for years, encouraging non-winners to continue their quests for a title, because he understands how difficult it is to win against the greatest players in the world. Shafer's personal challenges have been complicated because he has bowled his entire career while combating diabetes. Recently he has served as a spokesman for Animas Corp., a company that makes the insulin pump that has made it easier for him to live a normal life.

"Winning the Steve Nagy Award has always been important to me because it shows the respect of your peers as a sportsman and someone who cares about them," Shafer said via e-mail. "I have been through a lot this past week, so it's hard for me to be happy today about winning.

"I know the other candidates were very deserving. In time, I hope I can reflect and enjoy the fact my fellow players think so highly of me. It's just tough to do that at this moment."

Eugene McCune of Munster, Ind., Shafer's closest friend and a fellow PBA Tour competitor, accepted the award on Shafer's behalf during ceremonies Friday at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., where the Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions gets underway Saturday.

"I want to thank my roommate and one of my best friends in the world, Eugene McCune, for accepting on my behalf," Shafer said. "My wife Michelle and Eugene were good friends. It's only right he accept for me because she loved him as a friend as much as I do."

Others who received votes in the Nagy balloting were: Patrick Allen, Dom Barrett, Kenneth Bland Jr., Parker Bohn III, Nathan Bohr, Ryan Ciminelli, Mike Edwards, Andres Gomez, Steve Jaros and Kelly Kulick.

Established in 1966, the Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award is named after the late PBA Hall of Famer and founding members of the PBA. A colorful and talented performer, Nagy made such an impact on his fellow pros that the award was established shortly after his death. Hall of Famer Johnny Guenther won the first "Nagy."

Mika Koivuniemi Returns Home to Win Finland's Brunswick Ballmaster Open

Finnish star captures 13th PBA Tour title, record fourth Ballmaster Open title

HELSINKI, Finland (Jan. 13, 2014) – Finland native Mika Koivuniemi, now living in Hartland, Mich., returned to him home country and defeated England's Dom Barrett, 188-172, to win a record fourth Brunswick Ballmaster Open title Sunday at Tali Bowl.

Koivuniemi earned his 13th PBA Tour title and his ninth European Bowling Tour title in the first World Bowling/PBA International Tour tournament of the 2014 season. The No. 2 qualifier heading into the stepladder finals, Koivuniemi knocked off fellow Finn Joonas Jehkinen, 236-201, in the semifinal match after Jehkinen eliminated Ronnie Russell of Marion, Ind., 256-184, in the opening match.

The 44th Ballmaster Open is one of Europe's oldest and most prestigious tournaments. A major championship on the European Bowling Tour, it also is the traditional kick-off event for EBT's 21-tournament season.

PBA Tour competition returns to the United States later this week when Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., hosted the Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions. Qualifying begins Saturday, Jan. 18, and continues through Monday, Jan. 20, when the top 24 will advance to match play Monday evening and Tuesday. ESPN will televise the finals live on Sunday, Jan. 26, at noon ET.

Indiana's E.J. Tackett Wins PBA Rookie of the Year Honors

Belmonte, Rash, Weber are finalists for 2012-13 PBA Player of Year

SEATTLE (Jan. 14, 2014) – E.J. Tackett of Huntington, Ind., has been selected as 2012-13 Harry Golden Professional Bowlers Association Rookie of the Year by an overwhelming margin in voting by PBA members and veteran bowling journalists, PBA Commissioner Tom Clark also announced today.

Clark also announced that Australia's Jason Belmonte, Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., and 51-year-old PBA Hall of Famer Pete Weber of St. Ann, Mo., are the three leading vote-getters in the 2012-13 Chris Schenkel PBA Player of the Year competition. The winner will be announced live on PBA's online bowling channel, Xtra Frame, Friday at 5 p.m. ET from Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich., where the Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions gets underway on Saturday.

The end-of-season awards announcements culminate an expanded 14-month campaign that began in November 2012 and ended Dec. 31, 2013, as the PBA returned to a traditional calendar year season that began on Jan. 1.

Tackett, a 21-year-old two-time Junior Team USA and one-time adult Team USA member, was thrilled with his award.

"It's awesome," he said. "I joined a pretty good list of guys, a bunch of hall of famers and future hall of famers, so I'm in pretty good company."

Tackett, who left Indiana-Purdue at Fort Wayne to begin his PBA Tour career in time for the 2013 PBA Winter Swing in Detroit, was the overwhelming choice over Shawn Maldonado, Houston; Craig Nidiffer, Trenton, Mich.; Mik Stampe, Denmark, and Bryan Viator, Friendswood, Texas. Tackett's abbreviated season included a fourth-place finish in the Wolf Open during the 2013 PBA Summer Swing, a sixth-place finish in the U.S. Open and a third-place finish in the end-of-season Round1 Japan Cup, which he entered as a non-invited TQR competitor.

Tackett, who ironically was attending IPFW on a golf scholarship, said he wasn't ready to pursue his college education.

"I was there for a year and a half, but I just really got unhappy with what I was doing," he said "I had no desire to be in school, and it reflected on my school work, so I decided to stop dragging it out and try my hand at the Tour."

He made his PBA Tour debut during the Winter Swing in Detroit where he cashed in three of four events. He made his first television appearance in the Wolf Open in Milwaukee, finishing fourth. PBA World Series of Bowling V was "a little disappointing," he said. "I didn't make a show after being inside the cut three different times, but I had three top 10s, so it wasn't terrible.

"The best tournament I've had was in Japan, and the second best was sixth in the U.S. Open," he said. "That was personally a better tournament than finishing fourth in the Wolf Open."

Tackett's next appearance will be in the Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions, which gets underway Saturday at Thunderbowl Lanes in Allen Park, Mich. He earned his way into the TOC by winning a PBA Central Region title in May in Ohio.

And his next goal? "A title, for sure," he said.

All three of the leading contenders for the PBA Player of the Year award, listed in alphabetical order, had great seasons in one of the closest competitions in years. Player of the Year voting began with 13 candidates, all of whom met minimum requirements for consideration based upon PBA rules. Others on the original ballot included Chris Barnes, Double Oak, Texas; Dom Barrett, England; Parker Bohn III, Jackson, N.J.; Mike Fagan, Fort Worth, Texas; Tommy Jones, Simpsonville, S.C.; Mika Koivuniemi, Finland-Hartland, Mich.; Chris Loschetter, Avon, Ohio; Wes Malott, Pflugerville, Texas; Scott Norton, Mission Viejo, Calif., and Bill O'Neill, Langhorne, Pa.

Belmonte hopes to join Venezuela's Amleto Monacelli and Finland's Mika Koivuniemi as the third foreignborn player to win the PBA's highest annual competition honor. He also would be the first two-handed player to win the award.

Belmonte's 2012-13 season produced two titles, including the USBC Masters – his first major – and runner-up finishes in three other major championships: the 2012 PBA World Championship, U.S. Open and 2013 PBA Tournament of Champions. He won the George Young High Average Award, scoring at a 228.81 pace over 422 games, and the Harry Smith Point Leader Award with 238,903 points. The only major statistical category he didn't win was earnings, where his \$186,465 total ranked third behind Rash's \$248,317 and Koivuniemi's \$227,851.

Rash, the 2011-12 Player of the Year, won two PBA International Tour titles in Kuwait and Thailand, and made TV shows in the 2012 and '13 PBA World Championships and the 2013 TOC. In addition to leading the earnings list, Rash finished third in average and competition points.

Weber, a 37-time PBA Tour champion who has never won Player of the Year, had one of the best years of his career as he entered the PBA50 Tour ranks. In addition to winning the 2013 Tournament of Champions for his record-tying 10th career major, Weber finished third in the 2013 U.S. Open (an event he has won a record five times) and third in the 2013 PBA World Championship.

In addition to the announcement of the 2012-13 PBA Player of the Year on Xtra Frame Friday, Tackett, Tony Reyes Community Service Award winner Parker Bohn III and the 2012-13 PBA Steve Nagy Sportsmanship Award winner will be introduced. The special Xtra Frame webcast will kick off extended coverage of the qualifying and match play rounds of the Barbasol PBA Tournament of Champions Saturday through Tuesday, Jan. 21.

Yuya Katoh Upsets Field to End 25-Year Home-Country Drought in Round1 Japan Cup

Japan PBA journeyman wins first title as Japanese players dominate finals

TOKYO, Japan – Japan Professional Bowlers Association journeyman Yuya Katoh pulled off one of the biggest upsets in Round1 Japan Cup history, defeating countryman Kazuaki Watanabe, 243-235, in the title match to become the first Japanese player in 25 years to win the popular international event.

The finals of the 27th Round1 Japan Cup, which included 16 PBA members who qualified based upon a year-long competition points race plus special invitees and additional Japan, Korean and PBA players, were televised live in Japan and aired Sunday on ESPN.

Katoh, a 10-year Japan PBA Tour veteran who had never won a title, became only the third Japanese player to win his country's most prestigious title title after Watanabe failed to convert a 10 pin in the ninth frame. Katoh's strike on his first ball in the 10th sealed the win. The only previous Japanese title winners were Ken Taniguchi, who defeated fellow JPBA member Kiyoshi Nakarai to win the inaugural Japan Cup in 1985, and Takeo Sakai, who defeated PBA star Wayne Webb to claim the 1988 title.

Katoh, a married father of two who works as a teaching pro in a Japanese bowling center, was aware of his country's 25-year title drought, but didn't want to think about it.

"I didn't concentrate on anything other than thinking 'one shot at a time," he said. "I knew it had been a long time since a JPBA bowler won, but I didn't want to think about that."

He also used the same philosophy to avoid the increasing pressure in the final frames.

"I knew if I watched the other bowler, I'd get nervous so I just closed my eyes and went through my routine," he said. "I didn't pay attention to anything else around me - not how long it'd been since a JPBA player had won, not going for my first title and not how the other bowler was doing. I only thought about my game.

"I'm very happy. This is a huge tournament to win for my first title," he beamed. "I'm just very happy."

The three JPBA players dominated the eight-player finals field. Katoh, who will make his American debut when he bowls in the United States Bowling Congress Masters in February in North Brunswick, N.J., advanced to the title match by eliminating Finland's Osku Palermaa in his first match, 258-226, and defeating countryman Shinichi Horie in the semifinal round, 236-195.

Watanabe eliminated Chris Barnes of Double Oak, Texas, 278-239, in the Round of 8 and ended any PBA hopes for a title when he ousted PBA rookie E.J. Tackett of Huntington, Ind., 249-190, in his semifinal round match.

In the other two Round of 8 matches, Horie struck on his last five shots to slip past reigning PBA Player of the Year Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., 225-224, while Tackett eliminated two-time Japan Cup winner Tommy Jones of Simpsonville, S.C., 226-224, when Jones left the 2-8-10 on his fill ball in the 10th frame after Tackett missed a 10 pin in his 10th frame to give Jones a chance to win.

PBA coverage on ESPN continues next Sunday at 1 p.m. ET with three hours of coverage of three important aspects of PBA competition involving regional, senior and youth bowlers. The telecast will include the PBA Regional Players Invitational Finals, the PBA50 Tour Finals (the final two events in PBA World Series of Bowling V from South Point Hotel, Casino and Spa in Las Vegas), and the Teen Masters Grand Championship finals.

The RPI Finals will feature six PBA Regional Tour qualifiers: Brian LeClair, Athens, N.Y., representing the East Region; Tom Daugherty, Wesley Chapel, Fla., South Region; Brian Kretzer, Dayton, Ohio, Central Region; Dave Beres, Waukesha, Wis., Midwest Region; Chris Barnes, Double Oak, Texas, Southwest Region, and Ben Laughlin, Chandler, Ariz., West/Northwest Region.

The PBA50 Tour Finals includes three PBA Hall of Famers who qualified based on 2013 PBA50 Tour competition points. Pete Weber of St. Ann, Mo., will bowl in the opening match against Venezuela's Amleto Monacelli with the winner facing Walter Ray Williams Jr. of Ocala, Fla.

The Teen Masters Grand Championship finals will feature outstanding youth bowlers including defending grand champion Greg Young of Viera, Fla., and defending girls' champion Ashley Dunn of Palmdale, Calif., in a battle for a \$64,000 scholarship package.

Sean Rash, Kelly Kulick Win World Bowling Tour Finals

Special World Tenpin Bowling Association events culminate two-year points chase

LAS VEGAS – After two years and more than 400,000 miles of global competition, reigning Professional Bowlers Association Player of the Year Sean Rash of Montgomery, Ill., along with PBA Tour titlist Kelly Kulick of Union, N.J., have won the World Bowling Tour Finals.

Rash, a seven-time PBA Tour title winner, defeated Mike Fagan of Fort Worth, Texas, 255-231, to win the WBT Men's Finals presented by the PBA during the PBA World Series of Bowling V, hosted by South Point Hotel, Casino and Spa, while Kulick, the 2010 PBA Tournament of Champions winner, raced away from defending champion Missy Parkin of Laguna Hills, Calif., 267-194, to win the WBT Women's Finals. Both events aired Sunday on ESPN.

Rash, who entered the WBT event as the leader in a two-year rolling points competition involving a series of WTBA/PBA International Tour tournaments held around the world, started his match against Fagan with seven strikes and was never challenged.

Fagan had been nearly perfect himself in eliminating Finland's Mika Koivuniemi, 279-223, in the first match. Koivuniemi, who won the 2011 WBT Men's Finals and finished second in 2012, is the only player to make the series finals in all three years the competition has been held.

"Anytime you have a chance to compete, whether it's in the U.S. or around the world, it's fun," Rash said. "That's why you're an athlete. You love to compete.

"I came into this event with a different mindset," he added. "The World Series wasn't as great as I would have liked, but it wasn't terrible. I feel great. I've been bowling well for the past few months. My life has changed since the arrival of our new baby. I'm in a happy place.

"You have to take advantage of opportunities," Rash continued. "Mike got a little lost on the left lane and that's why I had him finish there. I kinda figured the first mistake would come on that lane and that's what happened.

"It's always good to win. It doesn't matter; it could be league. I like to win."

In the all-U.S. women's preliminary match, Parkin held off Liz Johnson of Cheektowaga, N.Y., 198-195, but was no match for Kulick, who struck on every shot except for leaving a 10 pin (which she missed) in the eighth frame.

"The question I've been asking myself is 'Am I still good enough to be out here? Should I keep doing this?" Kulick said. "The WBT event was just reassurance of my confidence level and my ability as a player. I came out to prove something to nobody except myself today. It was just sheer determination to beat whomever I had to face. It's almost a relief knowing I won again."

The WBT Finals, like the PBA animal pattern tournaments held earlier in the World Series, were bowled on the unique blue-tinted lane conditioner in order to allow onsite fans and ESPN viewers an opportunity to see the WTBA's Atlanta lane oiling pattern. Like the players who had experienced bowling on the tinted oil in previous events, it was a non-factor as far as Kulick was concerned.

"I didn't even see it," she said. "As a professional, we look at ball reaction, so honestly, I didn't even notice it, other than the lane was blue."

PBA competition on ESPN continues on Sunday, Jan. 12, at 1 p.m. ET with the finals of the Round1 Japan Cup from Tokyo. The eight finalists for the single-elimination match play format finals include PBA members Rash; Osku Palermaa, Finland; Tommy Jones, Simpsonville, S.C.; Chris Barnes, Double Oak, Texas; E.J. Tackett, Huntington, Ind., and Japan PBA members Shinichi Horie, Yuya Kotah and Kazuaki Watanabe.

ESPN's coverage of the PBA World Series of Bowling V concludes on Sunday, Jan. 19, at 3 p.m. ET with the PBA Regional Players Invitational Finals and PBA50 Tour Finals, followed by one-hour coverage of the Teen Masters Grand Championship.
