Barbasol PBA Players Championship

Last month the PBA announced that the PBA Players Championship will return to a major tournament status. This will enable PBA players to have a championship of their own. If Norm Duke wins the PBA Players Championship he will join Mike Aulby as being the only two players to complete the super slam. If Chris Barns wins the USBC Masters and then wins the PBA Player Championship he will also join Mike Aulby as being the only two players to complete the super slam. The PBA has not established back the Touring 1 or 2 status for this tournament. It is open to all the PBA members. The Bowlers will bowl sixteen games of qualifying, then they will take the top 1/4th of the field into the cashers round. Those bowlers will come back and bowl eight more games of qualifying. After the casher's round the field will be cut to the top 24 games of match play round robin. After a total of 48 games the field will be cut to the top five for the stepladder finals. Strike Column—Top PBA Stars of the 80s

In the 1980s, Earl Anthony, Mark Roth and Marshall Holman were still a threat on the PBA tour. However, some other bowlers were trying to rise up to the occasion. One especially, was PBA Hall of Famer Dick Weber's son, Pete Weber.


PBA Hall of Famer Dick Weber's son, Pete Weber.
Pete was the 1980 PBA Rookie of the Year. By the end of 89 he would have completed the Triple Crown at the PBA Nationals/World Championship. In 87, he would win his first Major which was the Firestone Tournament of Champions. At the time, he was the fastest bowler to win 10 PBA titles on the tour.

Earl Anthony became the first millionaire in career earnings in 82. In 1986 at the Firestone Tournament of Champions, Marshall Holman would become the 3rd bowler in PBA history to have a millionaire in career earnings. Roth won his only 2 majors in one year and that year was 1984, he would win the U.S. Open and the Touring Player's

Championship.

While these bowler's were definitely making a legend for the PBA Tour, Pete Weber was starting to win on a regular basis. Mike Aulby was also making a name on the tour, by becoming the first bowler in PBA history to have Rookie of the Year in 79 and Player of the Year honors in 85. The very next year, Walter Ray Williams Jr. would win his first title and become Player of the Year.

There were lots of competitors in the 80s, they were trying to make money and win titles. Some of the other players were Brian Voss, Dave Husted, Amletto Monicelli, Wayne Webb and Dave Ferraro. This was an exciting time in bowling history. The chart at the bottom shows how each player contributed on the PBA Tour.




Moment in History

2-Pair 300 Game

At the 1974 Midas Open, just a few minutes before airtime, lane 29 broke down. The automatic pinsetter was having issues. PBA Tournament director Harry Golden had to make a crucial decision. He chose to have bowlers bowl on lanes 28 and 30. In the first game, Jim Stefanich defeated Earl Anthony 256 to 230. In the second match, Stefanich kept on striking as he scored a perfect game by tripping out the 4-7. He tugged the final ball, but the ball held the pocket. He defeated Glen Carlson 300 to 243. He would receive a Lincoln-Mercury Cougar car. The next game, he came up short against Bob Strampe 246 to



244. Jim shot 800 for three games—not even good enough to win the tournament. Dick Ritger won the tournament. Four out of five bowlers would end up in the PBA Hall of Fame.

Bohn Perfection

Last month at Howell Lanes, Parker Bohn III won his 2nd PBA50 Regional title in his home house (Howell, NJ) expanding his 300-lead on the G.O.A.T. (greatest of all time) Walter Ray Williams, Jr.

One of the 300-games was during the championship match. He qualified #1 on Saturday, shooting a score of +2137, averaging 267 during the qualifying portion of the tournament.

He averaged 265 for whole tournament.

Last month, Bill Vint wrote about the sport of bowling being a part of the 2020 Summer Olympics in Toyko, Japan. Bowling has a good chance of appearing at the Olympic Games for the first time, due to recent rule changes made by the International Olympic Com-

mittee. Bowling has survived the first round of cuts in the selection process along with seven other new sports out an initial 33 entries. The bowling community held a press conference and exhibition tournament-Bowling World Open in Tokyo to raise awareness and support to gain status as an Olympic Sport. The winner of the exhibition tournament was Osku Palermaa who beat Isao Yamamoto of Japan 248-244. The tournament proved

to the IOC that bowling is a definite spectator sport. There is still more work to be done in securing a spot at the Olympics as World Bowling President Kevin Dornberger is quoted as saying 'Our next step is to convince the IOC that bowling is serious about moving its premier events to an even higher level'. Bowling fans can only wait in anticipation until August 2016 when 2020 Summer Olympic game schedule of events is finalized in Rio de Janiero.



- In 1973 Don McCune won 6 titles by soaking his bowling ball.
- In 1973 Jim Godman becomes the first player to win multiple TOC titles.
- Dave Davis becomes the second player to win multiple TOC titles in 1975.

- Don Jonson bowls a 299 against Dick Ritger 268 in the 1970 TOC Championship game.
- Jim Stefanich bowls the third perfect game on national television.
- Johnny Petraglia wins three tournaments in a row and was the tournament leader in all of the tournaments
- Earl Anthony becomes the first bowler to earn \$100,000 in the 1975 season.
- In 1978 Mark Roth wins 8 titles in one season.






Adjusting

In adjusting there are three different approaches that a bowler can make. First one is commonly known to bowlers as the 2:1 move however this adjustment is formally called the diagonal move. The bowler will move two boards with their feet and one board with their target. Second adjustment is called the abstract.

Bowlers only move their feet and not their target. The final adjustment is called the parallel move this is where they move their feet and the target the same amount of boards. These adjustments will help bowlers in finding the pocket more often than just playing a guessing game. Which bowlers will experience less frustration.

In previous newsletters I have wrote about getting my PHD in bowling. I was fortunate enough this past January to receive my Bronze certification level by the USBC. I have created the Ten Pin Staffer program with all four taking the exam passing. This is a tool for bowlers to get better at their game. Striking master mind will be a program in which these individuals will know a great knowledge of the sport. This program will teach them more about bowling than they know currently. I have been around bowling all my life. I have learned the game at an early age. Through meeting pro bowlers and leaders in the bowling industry. I have been



fortunate enough to learn the game that I love. In this program it is my contribution to the game. The striking master mind will be somewhat the same thing as a Ten Pin Staffer. This exam will be more in depth on the bowling ball and physical game. Bowlers will have the opportunity to enhance their bowling knowledge. The ball has sixty feet to travel before it hits the pins. The bowling ball dynamics will be a big part of the exam. This exam will help bowlers and bowling coaches to learn the game at a pro-level. This is the best way I know how to impact the game. A number of bowlers do not realize that if they get the ball going through the pins, in the right way, they will have a

better chance to carry. If the ball does not see any friction it will not hook. As soon as the ball sees friction it will hook. Yes, bowlers can drill the ball to hook earlier or later, however, doing this does not give the ball more area on the lane.

In future months there will be more news about this program. Bowlers and bowling fans will be able to take this Striking Mastermind.
